## Justices to review filters at libraries

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court said Tuesday it will decide if public libraries can be forced to install software blocking sexually explicit Web sites.

Congress has struggled to find ways to protect children from Internet pornography without infringing on free speech rights for Web site operators.

Lawmakers have passed three laws since 1996, but the Supreme Court struck down the first and blocked the second from taking effect.

The latest measure, signed by President Clinton in 2000, requires public libraries receiving federal technology funds to install filters on their computers or risk losing aid.

A three-judge federal panel ruled the Children's Internet Protection Act violates the First Amendment because the filtering programs also block sites on politics, health, science and other non-pornographic topics.

"Given the crudeness of filtering technology, any technology protection measure mandated by CIPA will necessarily block access to a substantial amount of speech whose suppression serves no legitimate government interest," the judges wrote earlier this year.

The Bush administration argued libraries are not required to have X-rated movies and pornographic magazines and shouldn't have to offer access to pornography on their computers.

The three judges recommended less restrictive ways to control Internet use, like

requiring parental consent before a minor is allowed to log on to an unfiltered computer or requiring a parent to be present while a child surfs the Net.

"Although Congress continues to propose legislation to protect children, all of these laws have been shown to seriously burden the right of adults to access protected speech on the Internet. They're all flawed," Ann Beeson, an attorney for the American Civil Liberties Union, said Tuesday.

The ACLU, the American Library Association, and other groups had challenged the law.

Paul M. Smith, the attorney for the library association, said more than 14 million people use libraries for Internet access. The latest restriction "takes a meat ax approach to an area that requires far more sensitive tools," he argued.

Texas had asked the Supreme Court to uphold the law.

"Parents should not be afraid to send their children to the library, either because they might be exposed to such materials or because the library's free, filterless computers might attract people with a propensity to victimize children," wrote Texas Attorney General John Cornyn, who was elected to the U.S. Senate last week.

Congress knew the latest law would be challenged, and directed any appeals to go straight to the Supreme Court after a trial before a three-judge panel.

U.S. Solicitor General Theodore Olson said the lower court panel's ruling hurts Congress' effort to ensure that money spent "for

educational and other purposes does not facilitate access to the enormous amount of illegal and harmful pornography on the Internet."

The Supreme Court struck down the 1996 Communications Decency Act, which made it a crime to put adult-oriented material online where children can find it. The court said the law violated free-speech rights because it would keep material from adults who have a right to see it.

Earlier this year the court upheld part of the 1998 Child Online Protection Act, which required Web sites to collect a credit card number or other proof of age before allowing Internet users to view material deemed "harmful to minors." But justices did not rule on the law's constitutionality, and the government was barred from enforcing it.

The case is United States v. American Library Association, 02-361.

The Supreme Court also agreed to consider whether companies that run restaurants, lodges and gift shops at national parks are covered by the same law governing disputes with the government as other federal contractors.

The National Park Service has determined that the concessionaires are not covered by the contract disputes law, which gives contractors the right to have disputes heard by a neutral arbiter and the ability to appeal to either the federal courts or an agency's board of contracting appeals. The case is National Park Hospitality Association v. U.S. Department of the Interior, 02-196.

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# Iraq parliament unanimously rejects U.N. resolution

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — Iraq's parliament unanimously recommended rejection of a U.N. resolution on arms inspections Tuesday, hours after President Saddam Hussein's son urged its acceptance if Arabs were included on the inspection teams. Lawmakers, however, said the final decision rests with Saddam.

The United Nations has asked Iraq to respond by Friday.

Tuesday's vote by representatives who must pledge loyalty to Saddam to earn a place in parliament could be seen as strengthening Saddam's hand if he wants to push for a change in the U.N. resolution along the lines proposed by his son and earlier by Arab foreign ministers.

The United States, though, has said it will have no

patience with any Iraqi attempts to manipulate U.N. demands.

Parliament Speaker Saadoun Hammadi described the vote as "a message to the United States that the people of Iraq are united behind their leadership, and it also shows that the people of Iraq know that in the U.N. resolution ... there are major allegations which are baseless."

"This decision by the Iraqi National Assembly is the right and patriotic stance, which expresses the Iraqi people's opinion," he told reporters.

Odai Saddam Hussein, Saddam's eldest son, appealed for approval of the resolution in a letter distributed to lawmakers as they reconvened Tuesday but said weapons inspectors should include experts from Arab countries:

"We have to agree to the

U.N. Security Council resolution with limits on certain points, but not, we say, conditions."

Russia called on Baghdad "to exercise self-control and pragmatism" by accepting U.N. Resolution 1441, which would open the way for weapons inspectors to return to Iraq.

The resolution "offers the possibility of avoiding the development of a situation of force around Iraq and resuming U.N. inspection activity in accordance with existing resolutions," the Interfax news agency quoted Deputy Foreign Minister Yuri Fedotov as saying.

In the clearest such statement yet from France, French Foreign Minister Dominique de Villepin said Tuesday on France-Inter radio that force would be used against

Saddam if he does not cooperate with U.N. weapons inspectors. France had opposed making the recourse to force automatic.

Meanwhile, The New York Times reported Tuesday that Iraq has ordered large amounts of atropine, a drug that can be used to counter the effects of nerve gas, mainly from Turkish suppliers. Quoting senior Bush administration officials, the Times said the United States is pressing Turkey to stop the sales.

A Turkish official denied the report.

"There is no such a thing, there has been no such request from Iraq in our records, there has been no such demand," said Turkish Health Ministry spokesman Ebubekir Akkaynak.

Mustafa Karpuzcu, general director of Drogzan, a Turkish

company which manufactures atropine, said the company had no commercial ties with Iraq and had not received any orders from Baghdad.

White House deputy press secretary Scott McClellan refused to confirm the report.

"I don't think anyone needs proof that Saddam Hussein possesses biological and chemical weapons and has a willingness to use them," McClellan said Tuesday.

According to a resolution read during Tuesday's session, the 250-member parliament accepted an earlier recommendation from its foreign relations committee to reject the U.N. resolution.

It went on to say the "political leadership" should "adopt what it considers appropriate to defend the Iraqi people and Iraq's independence and dignity and authorizes President Saddam Hussein to adopt what he sees as appropriate, expressing our full support for his wise leadership."

Hammadi asked deputies to vote on the first clause of the resolution by a show of hands and announced that it had been accepted unani-

mously. It was not clear how many members were present.

Hammadi then called for a vote on the second clause referring the matter to Saddam, and again announced unanimous approval. A third vote was held for the entire proposal, and it also was approved unanimously.

If Iraq rejects the resolution the U.N. Security Council approved unanimously last Friday, or accepts it but falters afterward in following the tough provisions of the resolution, the United States and Britain have made clear they will attack Iraq.

Tuesday's session of parliament was not broadcast live on Iraqi television, leaving Iraqis relying on international radio to follow the parliament session. The opening and the vote were carried live by Al-Jazeera, the Qatari-based Arabic satellite channel. Iraqis cannot receive Al-Jazeera as the government bans satellite dishes.

Saddam had asked lawmakers to convene an emergency session to advise the ruling Revolutionary Command Council he heads on how to respond to the United Nations.

# Victims begin recovery from storms

MOSSY GROVE, Tenn. (AP) — Thirty-six people who had been missing after a deadly tornado tore through the area turned up alive Tuesday, as survivors of storms in 13 states struggled to put their lives back together.

Around the Morgan County community, clothes fluttered from tree limbs, power lines dangled from poles, cars lay crumpled like discarded toys.

"Yesterday, we had a nice brick house and four vehicles.

Today, we don't own a toothbrush," said Susan Henry of Mossy Grove, the devastated tiny town about 40 miles west of Knoxville.

Four people remained missing in the area, down from an initial high of 40, state emergency management officials said Tuesday. Rescuers had thought most of them were alive but out of touch with family because the storm disabled phones and blocked roads. Seven people were

killed in eastern Tennessee's Morgan County, which includes Mossy Grove.

In Tennessee's Coffee County, an aunt of 10-year-old Hobart Martinez, who was killed when his home collapsed, dug with her hands in the muddy heap of her relatives' belongings, looking for family photos and mementos — and found a box for the boy's favorite toy, PlayStation.

"He was a sweet, lovable

person," Michelle Blanco said.

More than 70 tornadoes and thunderstorms during the weekend and into Monday killed at least 35 people in five states. Sixteen deaths were reported in Tennessee, 12 in Alabama, five in Ohio and one each in Mississippi and Pennsylvania. More than 200 people were injured.

Utility crews struggled to restore electricity and power Tuesday and Morgan County schools were closed.

made by the anonymous sender would all be misdemeanors if they are determined to be criminal.

Misdemeanors have a limit of two years on statute of limitations, and some of the incidents alleged to have occurred were more than two years ago, he said.

"We're going to get this done as quickly as possible," he said. "I hope to have it taken care of when this

grand jury's term is up in December."

Originally, Roach asked the state attorney general's office to investigate the allegations.

The AG's office handed off the matter to the state auditor's office which said it did not have jurisdiction. The issue was returned to Roach's office.

Roach said he had looked to the state for assistance in investigating the matter because he wanted an out-

side agency looking into the allegations.

Of the 38 allegations, Roach said the grand jury decided not to pursue some of them, but said there were others they wanted to consider further.

#### Is a 'lone ranger' out there?

About a week ago, Toni Bohlar, city secretary of McLean, wrote a letter to this paper complaining of abusive tactics by some law enforcement officer during a stop as her son was leaving Pampa.

Responses to this paper from the Pampa Police Department and the Gray County Sheriff's Office were that they had no personnel in the area of the stop.

There has been no indication that the matter has been looked into. Ms. Bohlar's only response from her complaint has been from an elderly person who said they had been treated the same way by some unidentified officer.

There were several things wrong in this stop. The officer did not identify himself, check the boy's operator's license, run the vehicle registration, unprofessionally attempted to run three (3) sobriety tests which were negative. The boy had not been drinking. He was not asked if he would consent to the sobriety tests.

The boy was required to look into the headlights of the officer's vehicle to prevent the officer's identification. The pickup truck was searched without permission. When the boy looked toward the officer, he was cursed and slammed down on the vehicle, made to look at the headlights and handcuffed. The stop apparently was to look for illegal drugs without probable cause.

Since there has reportedly been at least one additional similar complaint it is entirely likely Pampa has a "lone ranger" type wannabe.

There is no indication this matter has been pursued. If the person responsible is not identified and placed under some control, the possibility exists that Gray County could face a liability greater than their ability to pay. If all law enforcement agencies in the county profess no knowledge of the officer's identity, then the matter is worthy of investigation as an impersonation incident.

Ms. Bohlar and her son are due an apology and the law enforcement personnel have someone in their midst who makes them all look bad.

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## Hunters head for the Hill Country

I've been deer hunting - once. I was about 10 or 11 years old when I went deer hunting with a friend and her father on his ranch along McClellan Creek. My memories are pretty dim, but it seems like a deer jumped over where we were hiding behind a fallen tree trunk. It's awesome to watch a deer jump from that angle.

I remember shooting a 12-gauge shotgun for the first time, too. This same friend's father handed me a double-barrel shotgun. I brought the heavy gun up to my shoulder, pulled the trigger (or triggers) and the next thing I knew I was looking up at the sky and my ears were ringing like crazy. The blast had knocked me flat on my back. That was the last time I shot a 12-gauge shotgun.

Hunting brings up ambivalent feelings in me. A trip to the Texas Hill Country this weekend reawakened those feelings.

We traveled to Llano, near Fredericksburg, so husband Vic could attend a safe opening school.

"Dee Dee, I counted 27 dead deer on the side of the road," he told me after his first trip to Llano a few years ago.

Sure, I thought, and I've told you a million times not to exaggerate.

He wasn't exaggerating. The only thing I saw more of than dead deer on or near the highway were dead raccoons and dead skunks.

Obviously, it was open season in the Hill Country and they were using vehicles as weapons.

Deer hunting is big business there this time of year. Every store had signs, "Welcome Hunters." A banner across the busiest street in Llano proclaimed, "WELCOME HUNTERS!"

Mason, a town of about 2,900 people about 35 miles from Llano, was hosting a big community dinner Saturday night. The menu? All wild game. Apparently it's one of their best fund-raisers.

Anyone not driving a four-wheel drive pickup truck around there is in danger of getting run over. Fortunately, I fit right in with the rest of them with my Chevy Z-71 - except for the camouflage. I've never seen so much camouflage in my life. Fort Campbell Army base didn't have as many people wearing camouflage as Llano. Even the little kids wore camouflage.

So, even though I can't bear the thought of killing an animal, I know these deer hunters are providing a service by thinning out the deer population. Most of them will act responsibly in the process.

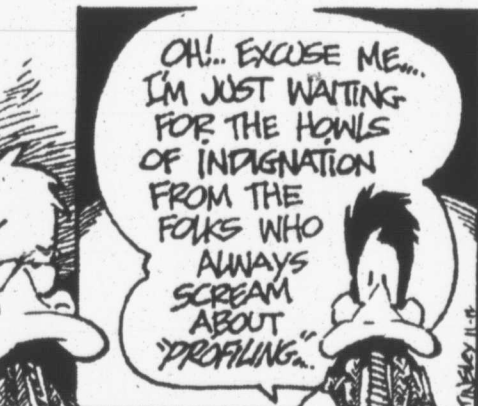
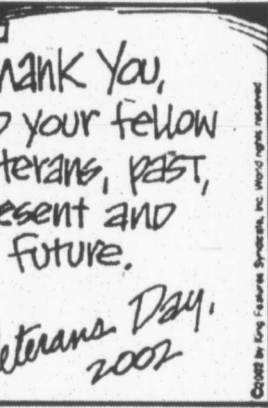
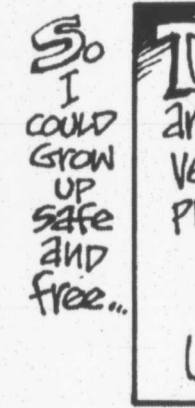
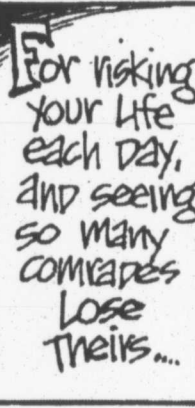
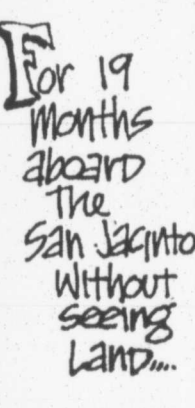
That's where my ambivalence comes in.

## Remember, politics is a collision sport

Smack! Whack! Wallop! Election night in Austin, Texas, began with bodies slamming into each other at full speed.

These were not polling places in South Dakota, where charges of election fraud flew. These were the playing fields of Pop Warner football, and lessons learned there will determine who will win the political Waterloos of the next generation.

During practice, Coach David Contreras alternately thundered and coaxed, pressing for intense effort and team bonding. He has succeeded; as 12-year-old tailback Ben Olasky put it, "We're like brothers. We hit each other hard, but we don't get angry." Would that our other national collision sport, politics, were like that.

Liberals are likely to become very angry as they analyze the election returns and see that the oft-reviled "religious right" has made another comeback. In Colorado, where Republican Wayne Allard held onto a Senate seat many predicted he would lose, exit polls showed the "religious right" turning out and going 85-12 in his favor. In Georgia, evangelical voters gave a surprise Senate victory to Saxby Chambliss. So it went across the country.

A non-scientific but interesting poll on one Christian conservative web site, cbn.com, showed fewer than 5 percent of respondents saying "this election is not important" or "Christians should not be involved in politics." The vast majority were praying about the election and encouraging others to vote - and not always Republican. In Arkansas, conservative Christians rightly turned away from

Sen. Tim Hutchinson, who won election on a family-values platform but then divorced his wife and married a staffer. Hutchinson lost.

Once again, the "religious right" has not gone gently into the night. Frequent predictions of its disappearance remind me of the story of an elderly, dying man who suddenly smelled the aroma of chocolate chip cookies wafting up to his bedroom. He gathered his remaining strength, forced himself down the stairs and gazed into the kitchen. Spread out upon platters on the kitchen table were hundreds of his favorite chocolate chip cookies. Mustering one great final effort, he threw himself toward the table and reached out, but - smack! - a spatula came down on his hand. "Stay out of those," his wife growled. "They're for the funeral."

The funeral for conservative Christian involvement in American politics is still a long way off. Millions of Bible-oriented voters did not listen to separatists who advised giving up on politics. And now Republicans, with Senate and House majorities, need to remember that politics is a collision sport.

George W. Bush, Trent Lott and Denny Hastert should tell their team what Coach Contreras said to his players during elec-

tion-night tackling practice: "Do not slow down. Run up there, and knock him on his butt. You've got to take him down. This is football. There you go, son. That's what we're talking about. Nice work. You time it; then, you step up and nail his rear end. Get there. Get there. You've got to wrap up. Nice work. Good job, son."

The context of those words and actions is important. Coach Contreras emphasizes that injuries and penalties are most likely to occur when players have not learned the fundamentals of correct blocking and tackling. So it is in politics. Red-faced, veins-popping bellowing leads to voter disgust. Calm determination - biblical meekness, with "meek" properly understood not as weak but as obedient to God - can lead to victories.

Coach Contreras runs tough practices, and the results are impressive: His team is undefeated, and his players are learning that hard work yields results. Coach Bush now has the opportunity to put together a second-half victory by getting the economy moving again with a pro-growth economic plan that builds on his first-half tax cut. Then, he can keep the winning streak alive with judicial appointments long held up by pro-abortion Democrats.

Republicans can also pass bills to enhance national security and domestic energy production. They can end federal discrimination against faith-based charities and stay the course on welfare reform.

This is a time to hit hard. No unsportsmanlike conduct, but not shying away from collisions that are inevitable when a team is committed to advancing the ball.

McDowell and his wife, Amy, returned to their hometown to be near their parents as both are natives of the local community.

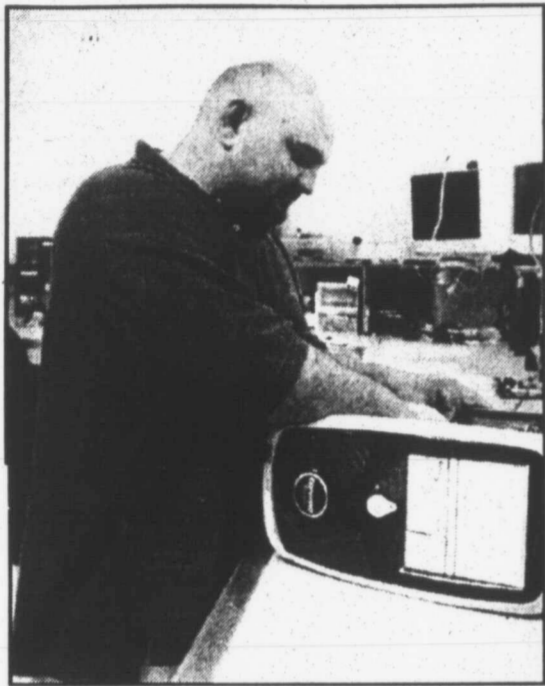
"We don't strive to be the cheapest, but we are the best," he said. He added that most computers are in and out of the store in 24 hours.

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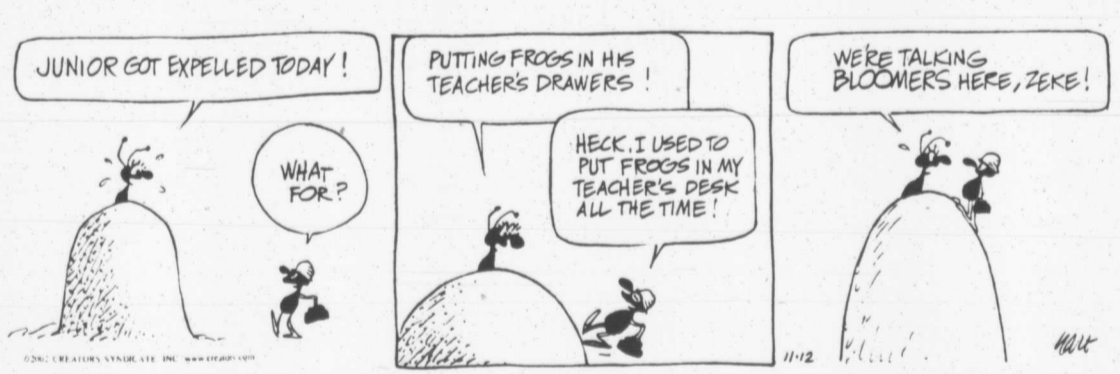

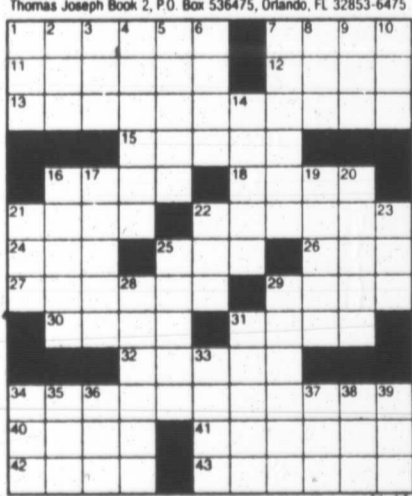

### HORSE RACING

**WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. (AP)** — Three former fraternity brothers surrendered to the FBI on Tuesday morning in connection with a complicated horse racing bet on the Breeders' Cup that paid \$3 million and quickly raised suspicions that computers had been rigged. Derrick, Davis of Baltimore, Glen DaSilva of New York and Chris Harn of Newark, Del., surrendered at the FBI's office in White Plains and were expected to go before a judge later Tuesday, said Herb Hadad, spokesman for U.S. Attorney James Comey. Comey, who announced Friday that he had joined the investigation, called a news conference for Tuesday afternoon.

Davis placed the bet in question, on six Breeders' Cup races Oct. 26. DaSilva placed an earlier wager along the same elaborate lines and Harn worked for the company that handles most computerized horse betting. The New York Daily News reported Monday that the men would be charged with wire fraud conspiracy. Wire fraud statutes apparently would apply because the elaborate Pick Six bet was made by telephone on Davis' account with Catskill Off-Track Betting, a Pomona-based division of the state OTB system. Hadad said Tuesday morning that no complaint had yet been filed. An attorney for DaSilva, Rae Koshetz, would not comment on charges. Davis' attorney, Steven Allen, would say only that his client was innocent and Harn attorney Daniel Conti did not return calls.

## Oklahoma looking to rebound

For the first time all season, Oklahoma is not OK.

Coach Bob Stoops is confident the Sooners, knocked from No. 1 to No. 4 by an upset loss to Texas A&M on Saturday, will bounce back. But he recognizes that taking that first loss this late in the season carries extra sting.

"There are added mental differences when you've won for a long period of time," Stoops said Monday on the Big 12 coaches teleconference. "Regardless of what anybody says, all the BCS talk, all the media attention, you have to deal with all of that." Stoops said Oklahoma players might have been unduly influenced by positive press during their 8-0 start.

"Dealing with the media is a different dynamic than it used to be," Stoops said. "Our players are smart and know it doesn't mean anything, but it can take some of the edge off." The Sooners (8-1, 4-1 Big 12) trail Texas (9-1, 5-1) in the South Division heading into Saturday's game against Baylor.

"We didn't walk out of that locker room with our tail between our legs," Stoops said. "We also recognize we've got a lot in front of us, and it'll be up to us how we go after it. We still believe we're a much better team than a year ago and whether we can finish it, we'll find out."

Stoops pointed at secondary breakdowns as the primary reason the Sooners aren't still unbeaten. On all four of Texas A&M freshman quarterback Reggie McNeal's touchdown passes, he said the receivers were wide open.

"Can we play better? I think so," Stoops said. "Bottom line is we didn't. Why it happens, I don't know."

Baylor coach Kevin Steele certainly isn't looking forward to seeing the Sooners this

week. "They don't need motivating factors at Oklahoma," Steele said. "They're going to come and play championship-style football, regardless of what happened last week."

**GO FOR 22:** Knowing his defense was struggling, Missouri coach Gary Pinkel still never considered going for a 2-point conversion and an instant verdict in Saturday's 42-35 overtime loss to Colorado after the Tigers scored late to force the extra period.

He said he never will, either. "Knowing we each have an equal opportunity in the overtime, I don't know how we could miss the conversion and look my players in the eye," Pinkel said. "I couldn't do that. I'll go in and have an equal chance to win the game, give my team a chance to win." Pinkel didn't quibble with a perhaps controversial ruling that Darius Outlaw fumbled away the Tigers' chance in overtime.

"You know what, I really thought that was close; I didn't think it was one you could argue either way," Pinkel said. "Trust me, if I felt without question that he did not have control I would say that, but I can't say that."

**BROWN FOR HEISMAN:** Colorado coach Gary Barnett said junior running back Chris Brown, the nation's leading rusher with 1,617 yards, is deserving of the Heisman Trophy.

But he said he has virtually no chance of winning it because the national media seems to be preoccupied with quarterbacks and staying with preseason candidates.

"I don't think it would do me much good to talk about Chris Brown," Barnett said. "I think he's the best running back in the country and he's carrying us, but that isn't what everybody thought would happen before the season."

"You never see a guy come out of nowhere to win the Heisman. It doesn't sound like Chris has a chance."

## Bonds wins fifth MVP award

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)** — Barry Bonds' latest MVP award left him longing for something more.

No, not that elusive World Series ring. He wants to be liked — just as much as Michael Jordan, Wayne Gretzky, or Joe Montana.

The San Francisco slugger won a record fifth National League Most Valuable Player award Monday, and did it unanimous fashion for the first time.

He was thrilled. He was also hopeful that all of those who are offended by his prickly personality could try to better understand him.

"I wish I was liked as much as them for the accomplishments I have," Bonds said from Japan, where he is on the major league all-star tour. "I

wish I had the same respect as them. People really admire their accomplishments."

Bonds has rubbed many the wrong way, though Bonds defended himself saying he does not try to be standoffish. He just concentrates so hard each day when he takes the field and can't afford to waste one ounce of his energy, he said.

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## Harvesters are favored by four over Andrews

Harris Ratings has Pampa listed as a 4-point favorite over Andrews in the Class 4A Division II bi-district clash at 7:30 Friday night in Andrews.

Andrews may have the home field advantage after winning a coin flip, but Pampa will be motivated by revenge after dropping a 14-7 overtime decision to Andrews last year in bi-district.

Andrews finished the regular season with a mediocre 5-5 record, but the Mustangs came close to knocking off unbeaten Frenship in a district game. Andrews was leading 20-19 with 9 minutes left in the game when Andrews rallied to take a 25-20 victory. At the time, Frenship was ranked No. 4 in 4A by The Associated Press.

Randall and Palo Duro join Pampa in the playoffs out of District 3-4A. Randall is favored by 10 over Big Spring in Division II, while Palo Duro is a 14-point underdog to Frenship in Division I.

### High School Football

**GROOM** — Both teams missed out on the playoffs this season, but Groom and McLean had quite an offensive outing to end the 2002 season. In the end, McLean won out 60-40 in the District 1-1A six-man game.

James Alexander led McLean's offense with seven touchdowns, including one on a 67-yard kickoff return. His other TDs came on runs of 45, 24, 16 and 18 yards. Alexander also caught TD passes of 30 and 25 yards from Josh Seymour.

Doug Fields and Kelby Noack scored two touchdowns each for Groom. Fields scored on runs of 68 and 8 yards. Noack returned a kickoff 67 yards for a score and caught a 30-yard TD pass from Bobby Ratterre. Fields also threw a TD pass, a 45-yarder to Cody Babcock.

## Raiders rout Broncos

**DENVER (AP)** — Denver was determined to not let Oakland beat them deep. The Raiders didn't, but Rich Gannon sure picked the Broncos apart.

Gannon threw for 352 yards and three touchdowns, and completed 21 straight passes during one stretch as the Oakland Raiders ended a four-game losing streak with a 34-10 victory over the Denver Broncos on Monday night.

Gannon was sharp as Oakland opened the season 4-0, but struggled at times during the Raiders' losing streak. Against Denver, he could hardly miss.

Gannon completed 29 of his first 30 passes, and his 21 straight completions in the second and third quarters broke Ken Anderson's single-game record of 20 set nearly 20 years ago.

"He takes a three-step drop and they're max-protecting him, it's hard to get to the QB," Denver DT Lionel Dalton said. "We tried to push and get our hands up in his face, and he kept throwing it over our hands. Unfortunately, he was hot."

Denver (6-3) dropped its safeties deep in coverage and

rushed Gannon with as few as two players, which Gannon used to his advantage. He repeatedly dropped off passes underneath, then threw over the top when Denver tightened its coverage.

Gannon didn't miss until his ninth pass, and that came when running back Charlie Garner was unable to come down with both feet inbounds. He threw touchdown passes of 6 and 34 yards to Jerry Rice, and was 9-for-9 for 94 yards during a third-quarter scoring drive that Jerry Porter capped a 22-yard TD reception.

"They weren't going to let us take a whole lot of shots downfield, so we were real patient," said Gannon, who had a quarterback rating of 131.6. "And that's the thing, you need a quarterback who is going to be patient against a defense like that, and not try and jam it in the seams and turn the ball over. We knew if we could do that, we'd have a chance."

The 36-year-old Gannon had help from the rest of Oakland's old folks.

The 40-year-old Rice continued to play like he's 20, catching nine passes for 103 yards to break the NFL record for all-purpose yards.

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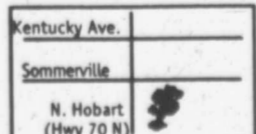
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## Nowitzki has 26 points, 17 rebounds to lead Mavericks over Trail Blazers, 82-73

# Currency problems plaguing Zimbabwe

**HARARE.** Zimbabwe (AP) — Restaurant customers in Zimbabwe pay with thick wads of local currency bulging in their bags. Real estate buyers hand over deposits of millions of Zimbabwean dollars stuffed into suitcases and car trunks. Newspaper advertisements have begun offering currency counting machines for sale.

With inflation out of control and a massive shortage of hard currency, the value of the Zimbabwe dollar has collapsed — the latest sign of this nation's economic collapse.

"We are looking at total meltdown. It could in the next few months push the country into absolute collapse," said Harare political analyst Brian Raftopoulos.

On the black market, the value of the Zimbabwe dollar fluctuated wildly Monday. By the afternoon, \$1 bought 1,800 Zimbabwe dollars compared to Friday's 1,500.

"The rate is changing by the hour," said one black market dealer on condition of anonymity.

The official rate stands firm at 55 to 1. Meanwhile, exasperated officials at the central bank are running out of local currency as black marketers and money launderers withdraw massive amounts of bank notes to buy hard currency.

Central bank officials said they would monitor large cash withdrawals from banks of more than 500,000 Zimbabwe dollars in a bid to trap them.

The government has repeatedly refused to devalue the currency. Unofficial trading has been spurred by a severe hard currency shortage stemming from political instability that has disrupted the main hard currency earning industries: tobacco, tourism and gold mining.

Independent economists say the black market exchange rate has been pushed up by desperate state enterprises seeking hard currency at unofficial rates to pay debts for oil, imported electricity and external fees and debts owed by the state airline. Many of those debts face foreclosure and the termination of supplies and services.

The central bank said last week it deferred a decision on issuing a 1,000 Zimbabwe dollar bank note until after the retirement at the end of the year of Leonard Tumba, the bank's governor.

# Renaissance Holiday Feast planned at WT

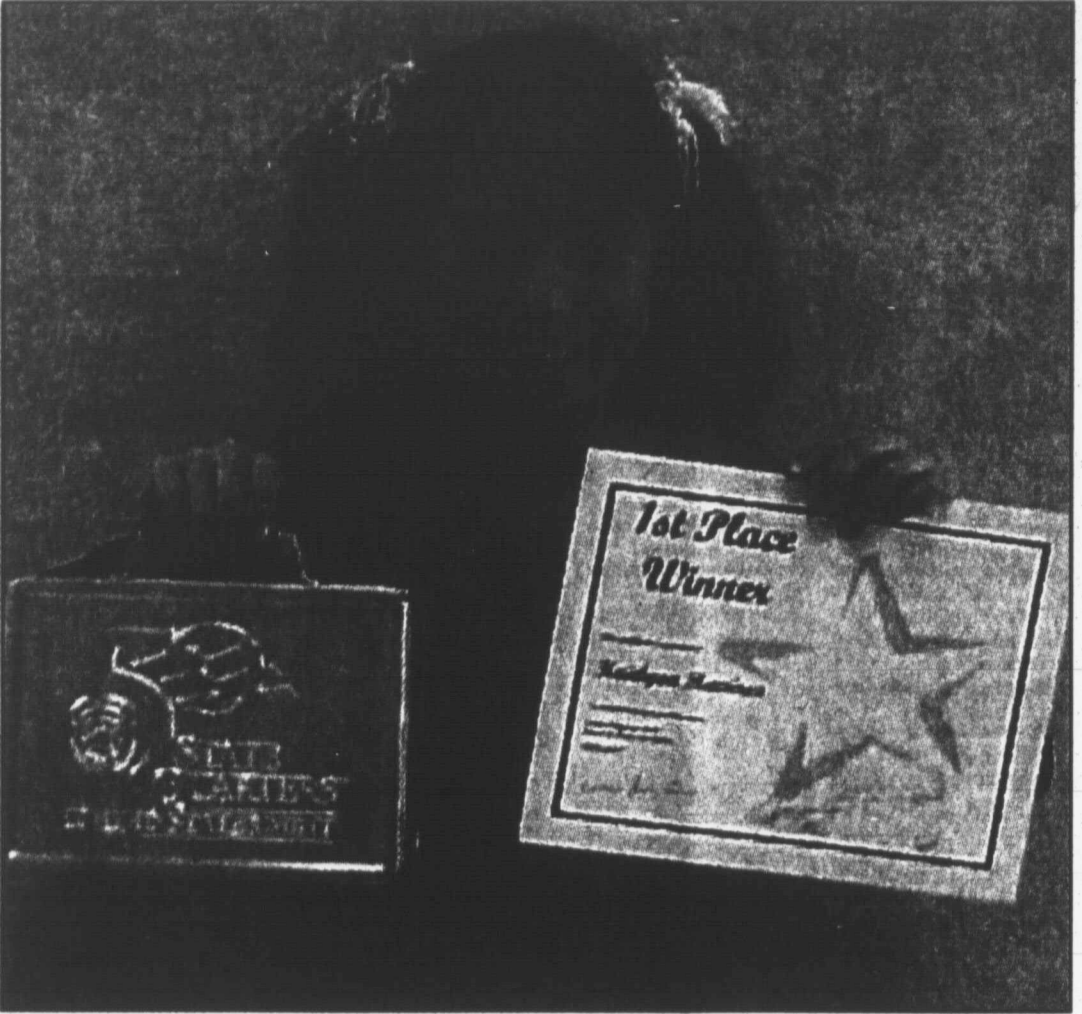

# Microsoft to invest millions in India

**NEW DELHI, India (AP)** — Microsoft Chairman Bill Gates announced Tuesday that his company would invest \$400 million to improve computer literacy and expand his company's activities in India.

The announcement came a day after he pledged \$100 million to fight AIDS in India.

In a statement released Tuesday before he was scheduled to address a news conference in the Indian capital, Gates said the \$400 million investment would be spread over three years and would include expanding the company's software development center and improving computer literacy.

Gates made the announcement on the second of his four-day visit to India, where Microsoft first opened its office in 1987.

"As we enter the digital decade the opportunities before us to drive innovation are immense," Gates said. "This presents a unique role for the government of India to create vibrant knowledge-based economy that encourages innovation."

Part of the money will be used training teachers and students at government-run schools about computers and software. Microsoft aims to reach 80,000 teachers and 3.5 million students under "Project Shiksha," the Hindi word for education.

Gates said his company would also set up 10 Microsoft Information Technology Academy Centers in partnership with Indian states.

The staff at its center in the southern Indian city of Hyderabad — the only software development center Microsoft has outside the United States — was expected to increase to 500 by 2005, he said.

In collaboration with Indian companies, Microsoft intends to promote the use of its Web tool .Net — Microsoft's equivalent of Java — in the country.

Microsoft's .Net has not drawn the expected attention from Internet programmers and Web developers in India, who prefer Java as more user-friendly.

Gates will also meet with industry leaders and other government officials during his stops at Bombay and the southern software hubs of Hyderabad and Bangalore.

Microsoft also unveiled a plan to launch Windows XP and Office in Hindi, the language spoken by a majority of India's 1 billion-plus people, within the next year.

# Latin American bishop kidnapped in Columbia

**BOGOTA, Colombia (AP)** — One of Latin America's leading bishops was kidnapped as he went to hold a religious service in central Colombia in the latest attack on religious figures in this war-battered nation.

No group claimed responsibility for Monday's kidnapping of Colombian bishop Jorge Enrique Jimenez, but the abduction took place in an area where leftist guerrillas are active.

Jimenez is president of the Latin American Episcopal Conference, an organization of Roman Catholic bishops that determines church policy in the region. The conference's mandate covers the 22 nations of Latin America, which hold almost half the world's Catholics.

Jimenez was abducted along with the Rev. Desiderio Orejuela as the men headed to the town of Pacho, 35 miles north of the capital Bogota, for a religious ceremony, fellow clergyman Raul Alfonso Carrillo told Radionet radio station.

Carrillo said he was told of the kidnapping by the men's driver, who was also captured but then released. "We don't have any information as to whether it was

guerrillas or common delinquents," Carrillo said.

The Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia, or FARC, are active in the area. The FARC has kidnapped a number of high-profile Colombians to push its political agenda. The rebels also kidnap average citizens, using ransoms to help finance their insurgency.

Gen. Carlos Alberto Ospina, commander of the Colombian army, called on Colombians to help rescue Jimenez, who works at the Zapaquirá cathedral just outside Bogota. The army offered a reward of about \$37,000 for help in finding him.

Earlier this year, the archbishop of Cali was shot and killed after performing a mass wedding in a poor neighborhood. Archbishop Isaias Duarte was an outspoken critic of all sides in Colombia's conflict. Authorities are still investigating the motive for his murder.

In 1999, the smaller leftist National Liberation Army abducted dozens of worshippers from a church in Cali, angering Colombians and church leaders.
