Pitner, 39, comes to Pampa from Fritch where he was police chief for two-and-a-half years. He joined that department as it's chief in June 2000.

"We had some challenges there," he said. "It is one of the best police departments for a community that

Pitner said three new officers who recently joined the department have been working with direct supervision and will be patrolling on their own in just a few weeks. "That will add more patrolling on the street," he said.

He said he doesn't have any immediate plans for restructuring the department. "I have to get settled in and review what is in place," he said. "It will take time."

Pitner said all law enforcement agencies are dealing with drug problems. "That is what we hear most about," he said. "That is a top priority. (Illegal drugs) are not going to be tolerated here.'

The new chief said he has been getting acquainted and reacquainted with many of the local law enforcement agencies. He said he had previously met Sheriff Don Copeland and is looking forward to working with him and his Chief Deputy Kelly Rushing. "They are very professional officers," he said.

He's pleased to be in a community where a Texas Ranger is stationed and where the area Department of Public Safety Office is located. "I'm really looking forward to working with Ranger Gary Henderson and DPS Sergeant Chad Grange," he said.

# BI warns of 'spectacular' terrorist attacl

WASHINGTON (AP) The FBI is warning that al-Qaida may be planning a "spectacular" terrorist attack intended to damage the U.S. economy and inflict largescale casualties. The White House said Americans should remain vigilant, although it left the alert status unchanged.

"The American people are in many ways the first line of defense," said national security adviser Condoleezza Rice. She said the latest warning contained no new information, of intelligence as we know it."

White House spokesman Scott McClellan cited the lack of any intelligence about specific time, date, location or method of possible attack as the reason for keeping the nation's official terrorist threat level at code yellow, the middle of a five-level scale of risk developed after the Sept. 11. 2001, attacks.

"We continue to be on high levels of alert, we continue to take additional precautions," McClellan said.

# **Pakistani who shot** two CIA employees executed in Virginia

JARRATT, Va.(AP) - APakistani man who gunned down two CIA employees outside the agency's headquarters was executed under tight security in Virginia, while armed soldiers patrolled the streets in his hometown in Pakistan to guard against retaliation.

No violence had been reported by Friday evening.

Aimal Khan Kasi, given a lethal injection, softly chanted "There is no God but Allah" until he lost consciousness Thursday night at the Greensville Correctional Center.

His execution focused international attention on the tiny town of Jarratt, where security around the prison was greatly increased in response to warnings from the State Department that his death might put Americans in danger. After Kasi's conviction in 1997, four Americans were shot to death in Karachi,

Pakistan. State troopers accompanied Kasi into the death chamber Two correctional officers with shotguns stood on each side of the road near the prison entrance, and several armed officers were posted in front of the prison.

Kasi, 38, told The Associated Press last week he had no regrets about the 1993 killings but did not want any retaliation for his execution. Kasi's family near Quetta, Pakistan, also pleaded for

"Kasis are a peaceful tribe. We want peaceful solutions to every problem," said his older brother, Nasibullah Kasi. "We do not want the Kasi name to be used to harm anybody.

Kasi killed CIA communications worker Frank Darling, 28, and CIA analyst and physician Lansing Bennett, 66, as they sat in their cars at a stoplight in McLean. Three other men - another CIA analyst, an engineer and an AT&T employee — were

# Teacher, students wrestle gunman to ground

SCURRY (AP) — A shotgun-wielding man believed to n't really look at anybody," be a former student threatened a rural East Texas high school until students and a teacher wrestled him to the ground Friday morning, authorities

The 20-year-old man went into the school office and ordered students into the school cafeteria at about 8:30 a.m. at Scurry-Rosser High School, about 30 miles southeast of Dallas, said Principal Larry Sneed.

The man reportedly began pouring gasoline on the floor. Students then jumped him and subdued him.

"He did not say a word, didsaid Courtney Robertson, a junior at the high school. "Everybody was crying, it was horrible. We thought we were all going to die.'

Robertson said a teacher and Principal Larry Sneed slowly walked up to the man and grabbed the gun, then wrestled him to the floor.

"I shoved the barrel up toward the air," Sneed said. "I got it around his neck so I could hold him and a couple of football players and teachers came up and we got the weapon secured. He never said a

A Kaufman County Sheriff's Office dispatcher said the man was in custody.

Sneed, who said the man was a former student, dismissed classes for the day.

"From what I understand he was a former student. I've been here two years I did not know him. Supposedly he made a statement he was looking for a former principal that was here. When he was told he wasn't here he turned around and walked out of the office and started squirting gasoline down the hallway of the school," Sneed said.

Sneed said the suspect claimed he had planted bombs in the area. Police were sweeping schools looking for evidence of bombs.

School district superintendent Steve Nash said no bombs had been found.

The school has an enrollment of about 220 students.



Several factors may contribute to the collapse, including drought, excessive water pumping, traffic, construction or heavy rain.

The geology of Florida makes it especially vulnerable to sinkholes.

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

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
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Brad Gibson, left, and Dale Langford, right, man the Choir Boosters hamburger stand at last Friday's football game between the Harvesters and Caprock.

# Key allies support decision to suspend American oil deliveries to North Korea

NEW YORK (AP) -Demanding the speedy elimination of North Korea's nuclear program, key allies backed the U.S. decision to suspend future oil deliveries to North Korea as punishment for its secret program to develop a uranium-based bomb.

South Korea, Japan, the European Union and the United States said in a joint statement Thursday after a daylong meeting that future shipments will depend on North Korea's "concrete and credible actions" to completely dismantle its highly enriched uranium program. This must be done "in a visible and verifiable manner," it said.

The isolated communist nation is destitute and depends heavily on the U.S. oil shipments. The United States and its allies are hoping the prospect of a cold winter for millions of North Koreans will pressure Pyongyang to abandon its nuclear ambitions.

"We strongly ask North Korea to take our message seriously and scrap its plan to develop nuclear arms immediately," Japan's Chief Cabinet Secretary Yasuo Fukuda said

The three allies gave their support to the suspension a day after President Bush made a decision to stop oil shipments, accusing North Korea of violating a 1994 agreement with the United States in which it pledged to become a state free of nuclear weapons.

In exchange for the pledge, the United States had promised to provide more than 500,000 tons of heavy oil per year. In addition, South Korea and Japan offered to pay most of the cost for two light water nuclear reactors that are of limited use for a country intent developing nuclear weapons. The fate of that project is unclear.

The European Union, the United States, Japan and South Korea are members of the Korean Peninsula Energy Development Organization, known as KEDO, which operates the 8-year-old oil assistance program.

The KEDO statement said the suspension would begin with the December shipment. In light of the oil cutoff, "other KEDO activities with North Korea will be reviewed," it said. Other programs include economic aid and construction projects.

The allies coupled the suspension with a condemnation of North Korea for violating the 1994 agreement and its treaty obligations to remain nuclear-free. They also warned that North Korea's future relations with South Korea, Japan, the European Union and the United States "hinge on the complete and permanent elimination of its nuclear weapons program."

North Korea's nuclear program threatens regional and international security and undermines the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, the allies said.

Bush decided to suspend the oil shipments following North Korea's acknowledgment of its uranium bomb program on Oct. 4 during a meeting with U:S. officials in Pyongyang. His only concession was to agree to allow a vessel already en route to North Korea to deliver a final oil shipment.

Before the suspension was announced, Secretary of State Colin Powell told a news conference in Ottawa, Canada: "We cannot continue to provide fuel in this manner, in light of North Korean violation of the understanding.'

# Australian authorities clash with protesters

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Hundreds of protesters tried to storm a meeting of trade representatives in Australia on Friday, pulling at a steel fence around the conference site before police pushed them back. Thirty-five people were arrested.

Chanting "WTO and CIA are the real terrorists of the world today!" the protesters marched down one of Sydney's busiest roads, tying up traffic as they headed to the meeting at a hotel in Sydney's

Olympic Park. Inside, the 25 members of the World Trade Organization were trying to strike a deal to provide cheaper drugs to developing countries — a crucial step in efforts to negotiate a new global trade pact, Australia's trade minister said.

As many as 1,000 protesters tried to rip down sections of steel mesh surrounding the hotel on the

second and final day of the talks. They said they were protesting globalization and a possible war with Iraq.

Riot police charged the crowd and formed a human chain to prevent demonstrators from getting close to the hotel while other officers repaired the breaches and dragged protesters off.

Police said 35 people were arrested and would likely be charged with trespassing and violent disor-

An Associated Press photographer was briefly held before being released without charges.

Such protests have become routine at trade gatherings around the world. Police in Italy said an estimated 500,000 demonstrators attended a protest against the war and globalization in the Italian city of Florence earlier this month.

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# Determined tornado victims marry one day late despite losses, injuries THAS FURNITURE one day late despite losses, injuries

HARRIMAN, Tenn. (AP) - A tornado that destroyed their home and half of their community didn't stop the wedding of an injured bride and groom, who tied the knot just one day late by moving the ceremony from a church to an intensive care unit.

Jimmi Langley wore white — and bandages from head to toe — when she married Ronnie Ray from a hospital bed at Roane Medical Center on Thursday, four days after a tornado struck the rural Mossy Grove community.

"The wedding date had been set for Wednesday," Langley said after the wedding. "November 13 was the two-year anniversary of when

The couple had taken shelter in Langley's home when the storm hit. The tornado was one of a string of weekend twisters that killed 17 in Tennessee, including five in Mossy Grove.

"One minute I was in the bathtub with everything blowing up around me," Ray said. "Next thing I know, I'm on the ground and Jimmi is gone.

Ray was cut on his face, arms, and back and is severely bruised on his legs and chest.

The tornado hurled Langley and the tub a hundred yards across the street.

Langley said that "the ride was fine. It was all just all the other things flying through the

air and hitting me." She suffered two broken legs, a broken arm and deep gashes on her hips and ankles, including a cut from a piece of kitchen countertop that slit her hip open to the bone. She is in intensive care, unable to stand or raise her arms, and faces a series of operations.

Hospital workers and the community rallied to make the wedding possible.

Paperwork was refiled, because the wedding certificate blew away in the storm.

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likelihood of success may be as important to a weakened al-Qaida as the target's prominence," according to the warning.

"Thus, al-Qaida's next attack may rely on conventional explosives and lowtechnology platforms such as truck bombs, commercial or private aircraft, small watercraft, or explosives easily concealed and planted by terrorist operatives," it said.

The White House is sensitive to criticism from Democrats that the focus on Iraq is distracting Bush's attention from the broader war on terrorism. "He does not start his day on Iraq. He begins his day on the threat level ... and the war on terrorism," Rice told reporters.

Yet she acknowledged the war against al-Qaida is far from over.

"I don't think we can be certain of what role Osama bin Laden is or is not playing" in the re-emergence of al-Oaida, Rice said. She walked through a long list of victories the United States and its allies have had in the war on terrorism, including the victory in its home base of Afghanistan and the disruption of cells in Buffalo, N.Y., and Germany.

Federal authorities previ-

ously have issued warnings for specific industries and national landmarks in general. But there is clearly worry that the danger of an attack is growing because of increased "chatter" picked up through intelligence channels, the continuing U.S. showdown with Iraq and the recently revealed audiotaped warnings believed to be from al-Qaida leader

Osama-bin Laden.

The government's additional precautions include unspecified "additional steps to ramp up our protection and prevention measures" within federal agencies, he said. The FBI and other agencies also are communicating possible threats and assessments of risk to state and local law enforcement agencies and specific industries that could be targeted.

In recent weeks, the FBI has issued warnings about possible attacks on U.S. railroads and on the energy industry, as well as a more general warning about heightened risk during the Muslim holy month of Ramadan, which started Wednesday and ends Dec. 5.

"We're especially sensitive to timeframes which might be thought by the enemy to be a time when they might want to make a state-Ashcroft said.

On Wednesday, the FBI told authorities in Houston, Chicago, San Francisco and Washington to be aware of threats against hospitals. Even though that threat was assigned low credibility by senior law enforcement officials, the FBI is preferring to err on the side of caution in terms of giving out information, officials said.

The idea is to increase vigilance among local police and people working in industries that are potential targets.

Last week, the State Department warned that Thursday's execution of Pakistani Aimal Khan Kasi in Virginia could lead to reprisals against Americans. Two days after his November 1997 conviction, assailants shot and killed four American oil company workers in Karachi, Pakistan. Kasi was executed for killing two CIA employees in a 1993 shooting outside the agency's headquarters.

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

# Cupholders, cushions take seat in churches

PERRYSBURG, Ohio (AP) - Laurie Wuerfel and her two young sons slipped their coffee : and hot chocolate into the cupholders, eased into cushioned chairs and waited for the sermon to start.

"Who wants to sit in church if you're uncomfortable," said Wuerfel as she sat in the burgundy theater-style seats at CedarCreek Church in suburban Toledo. "I grew up in a Catholic church, and I hated sitting on those benches."

Some denominations are increasingly moving away from rigid, wooden pews that have been around for centuries, manufacturers 'say. Chairs with cupholders, and plenty of space and padding are finding their way into churches where clergy say the seat can be as important as the message.

"For many first-timers, the only way they make contact with the church is on their behind," said Steve Korn, a teaching pastor at CedarCreek. a non-denominational Christian church. "If they're comfortable, like the service and the building, they'll probably come

The 1,400 seats in the church's 2-month-old building have 4-inch padding and cupholders.

Mike Wedel, president of Garnett Church Furnishings, which has been making pews since 1879 in Garnett, Kan., said pews also have been getting wider and more comfortable in recent years.

"I don't know if it's because rumps have gotten bigger or because of the demand for more comfort," he said.

Theater-style seats are popular in large, new Christian churches, southern Baptist churches and synagogues, said Les Lundberg, worship sales manager for Irwin Seating Co.

Still, some denominations - such as the Roman Catholic church — prefer traditional pews, said Lundberg and other seat makers.

In early churches through medieval times, worshippers stood throughout services, said Duncan Stroik, an associate professor of architecture at Notre Dame University. Pews began appearing as sermons lengthened.

Stroik said the current trend of theater-style seating is a throwback to a movement in the mid-19th century, when Protestant churches in America modeled their buildings after theaters with sloping floors and individual seats.

Within a few decades, churches and architects wanted to return to a more traditional look and began designing simpler worship buildings.

The new boom in comfortable church seats has coincided with the growth in the last decade of mega-churches that seat thousands.

"The theater has become the model again," Stroik said.

Irwin Seating, one of the world's biggest seat makers, jumped into church seating within the last year after installing seats in places such as Carnegie Hall in New York and Atlanta Motor Speedway.

"We expect we'll double our business in the next five years,' Lundberg said. The Grand Rapids, Mich.-based company, which only installs the theaterstyle seats, now works on up to 15 church projects a month, he

Part of the strategy of putting comfortable seats in churches is to attract those who may have been turned off by traditional denominations.

"They're almost looking for a non-church look," Lundberg The company is hoping to

expand its reach into denominations such as the Roman Catholic church. "We're never going to sell

TOKYO (AP) — Barry Bonds outslugged Japanese star Hideki Matsui in a home run hitting contest Friday at Tokyo Dome.

Bonds, who hit 46 homers in the regular season, defeated major league prospect Matsui 8-5 in the showdown before Game 5 of the seven-game exhibition series between the major league all-stars and their Japanese counterparts.

Bonds hit four out of 10 homers in the first round while Matsui managed only one. The National League MVP added four more in the second half, and won when Matsui failed to connect on his fifth swing.

"It was great to go up against Matsui," Bonds said. "I hope to do it again one day in the States."

Bonds walked over to Matsui after he finished his first 10 swings and massaged the shoulders of the former Yomiuri Giants slugger, telling him to relax. The advice paid off as Matsui connected for four homers, including one into the upper row of seats in right field.

"At least I had five homers, and 8-5 looks pretty good to me," said Matsui, who led Japan's Central League with 50 homers this season.

"I really admire his power, and he sure is the No. I hitter in the world. He told me to relax and also told me to close my shoulder. It was a memorable day for me."

The 28-year-old Matsui has struggled so far in the seven-game series, going 3-for-19 with no homers.

led Lefors to the district team championship. Stubbs won the regional title and Lefors placed 12th in the team standings.


"Rachel did what she had to do to win and her teammates helped her all year long," coach Summers said. "All of them are good runners and they're good girls. I'm proud of all of them."

# 'Horns take reborn title hopes to unruly Lubbock

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Once written off as a pretender, Texas spent the last month crawling its way back into the national championship picture.

Now the Longhorns have to make sure it doesn't slip away in one afternoon in Lubbock.

The No. 4 Longhorns (9-1, 5-1 Big 12) take their fourgame winning streak to Texas Tech (7-4, 4-2) on Saturday, where Red Raiders quarterback Kliff Kingsbury has made a career out of carving up defenses.

Kingsbury leads the Big 12 in passing with 362 yards per game and 35 touchdowns. He's spread the ball around to 20 different receivers and even threw a pass to himself when a ball got deflected off a player and came back to him.

"The type of offense they run, they score points on you quick," said Texas linebacker Reed Boyd, who noted Tech's

late comebacks in overtime games against North Carolina State (a loss) and Texas A&M (a win).

"You can't let up, even with a little lead or a substantial one," Boyd said. "They're going to fight the entire game."

Texas counters with a defense that leads the Big 12 and ranks second nationally in pass defense, limiting opponents to 125 yards a game.

The 'Horns' pass rush may be limited because the defensive line is banged up with nagging injuries. Two starters, Kalen Thornton (ankle) and Marcus Tubbs (calf) were held out of last week's win over Baylor and are listed as questionable for Saturday.

Cornerbacks Rod Babers and Nathan Vasher and safety Dakarai Pearson, who have 11 interceptions between them, will be counted on to shut down Tech receivers.

# A&M's McNeal earns starting spot

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Texas A&M quarterback Reggie McNeal and Missouri quarterback Brad Smith took different paths to their starting roles.

Even before he enrolled at Texas A&M, McNeal predicted he'd be starting within four or five games. It took him 10. At Missouri, Smith spent his first year running the scout team.

"I just don't think it's the right thing to do," Missouri coach Gary Pinkel said of playing freshman quarterbacks. "In fact, I think most quarterbacks, you want to train for a couple of years and start them as redshirt sophomores."

McNeal defied Pinkel's theory last week. He exploded into the spotlight by throwing four touchdown passes and leading the Aggies to a 30-26 upset of then No. 1 ranked Oklahoma.

His performance earned his first start against the Tigers on Saturday in a battle of Big 12 also-rans aspiring for late-season positioning.

"I've been trying to ease him along," A&M coach R.C. Slocum said. "I know how quickly bad things can happen to young quarterbacks. If you have too many bad things happen to you, it does start to affect your confidence and you start questioning your ability."

The Aggies are having a tumultuous season. McNeal is the Aggies' third starting quarterback this season. Slocum stripped offense coordinator Dino Babers of his play-calling duties after the third game and gave them to assistant head coach Kevin Sumlin

The Aggies blew big leads to Texas Tech and Nebraska before pulling off the big upset against the Sooners. Now, they'll try to push forward against the Tigers (4-6), who have played tough and still lost against top competition this season.

The Aggies see Smith, a redshirt freshman, as a mirror of McNeal, who froze Oklahoma's defense with his ability to run.

"He's a guy similar to Reggie," Slocum said. "He's got an excellent arm and he's got excellent running skills. He's a gifted athlete. I see him throw some great passes and he has a good awareness."



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
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Senior player Jay Gerber and coach Carolyn Quarles visit on the tennis court during a recent match.
