# Pampa ISD board 'raises the bar'

**EDITOR** 

After three hours of intense discussion and debate, Pampa Independent School District's Board of Education "raised the bar" for the city's public school system and gave administrators a four-year deadline for Pampa schools to reach "exemplary" status.

Although the effectiveness of Pampa High School's block schedule had become a volatile issue with strong forces both for and against the program, by the time all was said and done in the packed school board meeting Thursday night, the board concluded that the heart of the problem wasn't just in high school scheduling of classPampa's school district has four years to reach the top 10 percent 'in all categories in any comparison to other Texas schools ...'

es, but in the system overall.

"You're never going to find the perfect schedule," said Bill Jones, board member. "I feel there is something wrong with the system ... We're missing the boat somewhere. Achievement levels have not improved in the past 10 or 15 years."

He warned the board to not "micromanage" but to make any needed changes and to trust the professionals to implement them.

Pampa's school board has been

studying the high school's block schedule since Dr. Jay Johnson, board member, brought the matter up during budget sessions this summer, saying he felt the PHS accelerated block schedule was costly and ineffective.

"I'd felt for a long time that we weren't giving our students all we could through the block schedule," said Johnson, who has a 16-year-old daughter attending Pampa High School.

By the time a student graduates

system, he pointed out today, they have 780 hours less classroom time than students who attend schools with traditional seven-period schedules.

"It takes 26 courses to graduate," he explained, "and each one is shortened by 30 minutes." Conceding that the 90minute course periods benefits vocational students, Johnson said he believed "it took too much time in core programs."

An article in the November issue of Texas Monthly gave Pampa High School a one-star score on a five star to one star scale, with five stars being the best. The rating scale had been developed by an Austin non-profit organiza-

HARLINGEN, Texas (AP) — Environmentalists say they were disappointed, but not surprised at a National Park Service decision to approve more gas drilling on Padre Island; the world's longest undeveloped barrier island.





tion, National Center for Educational Accountability (NCEA). Two Pampa elementaries, Wilson and Travis, received one star ratings also. Pampa Middle School and Austin Elementary received three stars, and Lamar Elementary, two stars.

"What I see - we have to look to our professionals, but we, as a board, have to set the bar high, set a timeline and move forward. If the block schedule is a hindrance, then we need to get rid of it ... Bottom line is, no one on the board is satisfied with (the school district's) performance,"Lee Porter, school board president, said.

The board unanimously approved a motion initially submitted by Johnson but with changes to cover the school district instead of the high school only. This is the motion as approved by the board:

"I move the board of trustees of the PISD instruct the district and campus administrations to find the most efficient and cost effective schedule and more ambitious campus plans that will place the district in the top 20 percent in all categories in any comparison to other Texas schools within the same profile by 2004 and in the top 10 percent by 2006. 

# Museum gets new JFK assassination footage

One of the three primary films of the assassination of President Kennedy is being restored, its owners said Friday, the 39th anniversary of his

The "Muchmore film," as it is known, will be remastered with digital technology that will stabilize it and restore scratched damaged images, Associated Press Television News said in London.

Separately, the Sixth Floor Museum in Dallas said it has

acquired new photographs and film, including footage of the presidential motorcade not previously shown to the public.

The APTN film was taken by Marie Muchmore as the president's motorcade turned onto Houston Street in Dallas.

It shows the last, fatal shot to the head and a woman who came to be known as the "babushka lady" filming near the president's car. She never was conclusively identified nor was her film ever retrieved.

Muchmore's film, originally acquired by United Press International, is now part of the library of APTN, which commissioned the restoration.

It will be released in January for inclusion in productions timed for the 40th anniversary.

"If a program maker is using scratched, washed-out images, then viewers aren't going to be giving their full concentration, so we think it's a way of helping to tell the story," said APTN's Christopher O'Hearn.

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

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

# Church settles religious zoning test case

LIMA, Pa. (AP) - A small Baptist congregation near Philadelphia settled one of the first challenges of a 2000 federal act that exempts religious groups from most local zoning rules, unless a community can prove they are necessary for

Freedom Baptist Church cited the act in a lawsuit after Middletown Township ordered it to close a small chapel on the first floor of a dentist's office.

The chapel was next to a synagogue and across the street from a Presbyterian church, but township officials said zoning rules limited the office to commercial purposes. Township lawyers argued that the federal act is unconstitutional.

A federal judge approved the settlement, in which the township changed its zoning ordinance to comply with the federal act and paid the church's \$10,000 legal expenses.

The Becket Fund for Religious Liberty, which defends religions' civil liberties, represented the Baptists.

# Vatican establishes diplomatic ties with Qatar

VATICAN CITY (AP) - The Vatican said Monday it has established diplomatic relations with the Persian Gulf emirate of Qatar, where foreign guest workers outnumber the mostly Muslim native population.

The Vatican said there are some 45,000 Catholics among the workers. The government recently granted the Roman Catholic Church property for a church, the announcement said.

Currently, Catholic services meet in the gymnasium of the American school in the capital, Doha.

# Small Texas town rich in church history

BLANCONI — Driving between Refugio and Beeville, few people are likely to notice the town of Blanconia. It's not exactly on State Highway 202, but rather off Farm-to-Market Road 2441, which intersects it.

For years, no signs of real development, other than a volunteer fire department, have been experienced in the town of 30. Groceries, medical care, fast food and gasoline are available in the two larger cities to the east and west or in nearby Goliad.

But until somewhat recently, Blanconia and nearby residents have had two churches, both with long histories, to attend regularly.

According to researchers, Blanconia was established in the 1830s when John and Michael Keeting acquired a small portion of land from the state of Coahuila and Texas. The land was originally in

Refugio County until Bee County was created in the late 1850s. At about the same time, residents established a Baptist church near Refugio, named N-2 after local resident N.R. McDaniel's cattle brand.

Twenty years later, another church, Our Lady of the Rosary, was created and it later became St. Catherine's Church. According to historical reports, the Baptist church moved to Blanconia in 1888 and the first sanctuary was built at its current site in 1891.

McDaniel's great-greatgrandson, W.A. Myers III, said what is now Blanconia Baptist Church, one of the oldest churches in South Texas, has been through its share of difficulties.

"It was down to six or seven (members) several times," said Myers. "The doors were closed for about a year. There was no pastor."

But churchgoers from Refugio and Beeville now augment the current membership

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of about 50, he said. Most of its members have ties to the church going back generations. Even young worshippers get involved in church activities. Sunday school is services are held every Sunday at 10 a.m. before regular services.

"We got a lot of young people which we haven't had in a long time," Myers said.

A friendly atmosphere keeps people coming back, said Alleene Sullivan, a member of the church since 1980.

But the congregation at St. Catherine's Church has not had regular services for about

Unfortunately, there has been a low turnout and too few priests for regular services. According to the Diocese of Corpus Christi, the church is now considered a station, which means visiting priests perform services at the historic church, but not on a regular basis.

"We don't like that word," said Pat McGuill. "It's still a church to us, a mission."

McGuill's great-grandfather, Thomas McGuill, helped establish Our Lady of the Rosary in the late 1800s.

pie recipe My husband read the recipe in your column last year and asked me to make one for Thanksgiving. We had our family over for dinner, and when I asked if anyone would like dessert, our son-in-law asked for the pecan pie. I served him a slice, and his response was, "D-, this is good!"

Shortly thereafter, without being asked, our son-in-law got up from the table and proceeded to clean up the kitchen. A first! I told him with that kind of reaction I'll make Abby's pecan pie for him every holiday. Thanks, Abby. DOROTHY AND JIM SMITH,

DEAR DOROTHY AND JIM: You're welcome. That wasn't the first time this recipe has made people do wonderful and unexpected things. Here it is:

**ABBYS FAMOUS** PECAN PIE 9-inch unbaked pie crust 1 cup light corn syrup

1 cup firmly packed dark brown 3 eggs, slightly beaten 1/3 cup butter, melted

1/3 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon vanilla l heaping cup pecan halves Heat oven to 350 degrees.

In a large bowl, combine corn syrup, sugar, eggs, butter, salt and vanilla; mix well. Pour filling into unbaked pie crust; sprinkle with

pecan halves.

Bake at 350 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes or until center is set.
(Toothpick inserted in center will come out clean when pie is done.) Cool. If crust or pie appears to be getting too brown, cover with foil for the remaining baking time.

You can top it with a bit of whipped cream, but even plain,

nothing tops this! Serves 8 to 10.

TIP: The original recipe stated that the pie should be baked 45 to 50 minutes in a preheated 350degree gas oven. If an electric oven is used, it may be necessary to add 15 to 20 minutes to the baking time. (Begin testing the pie with a toothpick after 45 minutes.)

DEAR NOVICE COOK: I checked with Charlice Makowski of Santee Dairies in Los Angeles. She reports that there are actually four kinds of cream:

Light cream, which has

not less than 18 percent or more than 30 percent butterfat; Whipping cream, which has between 34 and 36 percent butterfat;

- Heavy cream, which has between 36 and 38 percent butterfat; and

- Manufacturer's cream, which contains 38 to 40 percent butterfat and is used by delis and bakeries for items such as cream puffs.





# OSU seeks to become eligible for bowl by beating battered Baylor

STILLWATER, (AP) — In order to become eligible for a bowl game for the first time since 1997, Oklahoma State must inflict yet another bruise on the battered Baylor football program.

The Bears (3-8, 1-6 Big 12) will be playing their final game for coach Kevin Steele, who was fired Nov. 3. With a loss Saturday the Bears are four-touchdown underdogs - Steele would be 9-36 in his four seasons, with one conference victory.

The Bears haven't had the talent to compete in the Big 12. But opposing coaches haven't questioned how sound the Bears are, or how hard they play, which Steele said is a result of his players believing in the process.

"From Day One, we said we're going to build this thing right," Steele said. "No matter how hard it gets,

we're going to keep doing the right thing the right way, we're going to work hard and we're going to try to just keep on plugging.

"If you do the right thing long enough with the right people, the right attitude, good things will happen."

Not many good things have happened for the Bears, who have been outscored 271-30 in the past six games, three of them shutouts. They rank last in the conference in scoring, rushing turnover margin, and nextto-last in total offense and points allowed.

They face an Oklahoma State team that has won three of its past four games to get to 5-5 overall, 3-3 in the Big 12.

Last week, the Cowboys scored 55 points in a victory over Kansas, their highest total of the season.

In that game, Josh Fields threw for 354 yards and a school-record six touch-

passes went to Rashaun Woods, who leads the league with 1,171 receiving yards and 11 touchdowns.

Those two have been complemented by tailback Tatum Bell, who has run for 100 or more yards in three of the past four games.

"They've got things kind of rolling in the right direction there," Steele said. "That's what you try to do offensively, you try to get a running back, a big-play receiver and a quarterback who can make plays, and they appear to have that."

Oklahoma State's last bowl season was five years ago, when the Cowboys played in the Alamo Bowl and finished 8-4. They haven't had a winning season since then, but would be assured of at least a .500 finish in the regular season by winning Saturday.

Beating Baylor would give Oklahoma State the six victories needed to be considered for a bowl, something coach Les Miles said is vital to the process of turning the program around.

"I hope that the stands will be full, that there is orange from side to side and that we come out as if this is a very important game," he said. "For us it is, and I hope we play it that way.'
