Businessman accused of projecting child pornography

FORT WORTH (AP) — A North Texas businessman has been jailed after co-workers reported an image of child pornography showed up on a screen as he gave a computer slide presentation recently.

James Andrew Smith of Denton was in the Mansfield Jail under \$300,000 bond after he was charged with

two counts of possessing child pornography and one charge of promoting child pornography.

Exel Inc. co-workers told police Smith had just completed a PowerPoint presentation on Sept. 4 when he tried to open another document on his laptop computer. The co-workers said a photo-

graph of a nude young boy appeared on the screen.

Exel Inc. is a logistics company in Fort Worth.

According to the police report, Smith told Exel officials that a computer virus had caused the image to appear. Nevertheless, police said Exel officials fired Smith and contacted police the following week after a search of his laptop found pornographic photos of children that appeared to have been e-mailed to others.

Police seized the computer, as well as disks containing child pornography and a folder with 65 pages of printed pictures of child pornography that Exel officials had found in Smith's desk, the report stated.

R.W. "Bob" Sidwell, 90, of Pampa, died Thursday, Nov. 21, 2002, at Bedford, Texas. Services are pending with Carmichael-Whately Funeral Directors of Pampa.

Environmentalists concerned about Padre Island drilling

HARLINGEN, Texas (AP) — Environmentalists say they were disappointed, but not surprised at a National Park Service decision to approve more gas drilling on Padre Island, the world's longest undeveloped barrier island.

"This is what happens when you don't control what's under your feet," said Walt Kittelberg, founder and current chairman of the Lower Laguna Madre Foundation, an organization devoted to protecting the Laguna, the narrow bay between Padre Island and the mainland.

The Laguna's warm, hypersaline waters are considered critical habitat to several species of endangered sea turtles and a roster of exotic birds

including the piping plover and reddish egret.

Kittelberg said the National Park Service's approval for permits allowing Corpus Christi-based BNP Petroleum Corp. to put its second drilling operation on the island should serve as a cautionary tale.

When the federal government took over the 133,000-acre barrier island in 1962, it purchased surface rights, but not the subterranean.

It's a situation that is similar to many a South Texas landowner as they find out that their underground has been leased to a gas or oil company. While they may be eligible for royalties, they are ineligible to stop derricks from going up on their property or roads from being cut through their ranches.

National Park Service employees say they can only do their best to make drilling companies as careful as possible.

Donna Shaver, Texas coordinator for the Sea Stranding and Salvage Network, said Thursday her goal was to help the park service establish guidelines for turtle protection

and to work with drilling companies to make them aware of how fragile the turtles were.

The network is a successful program, funded by the government, to save the Kemp's ridley sea turtle by taking clutches of eggs away from predators and beach traffic, incubating them at a special facility at the park station and returning the hatched turtles to the water.

She said she felt the best was being done to protect the turtles.

"The park works very hard and I provided them with my expertise," she said.

Fred Richardson of the Lone Star chapter of the Sierra Club said the Park Service employees are acting under the pressure of higher-ups in the Bush administration, which they say is promoting gas and oil exploration at the expense of the environment.

In a lawsuit that was filed in May, Sierra Club accused several federal agencies of violating the Endangered Species Act by allowing caravans of 18-wheelers to tote construction materials down the beach.

tion, National Center for Educational Accountability (NCEA). Two Pampa elementaries, Wilson and Travis, received one star ratings also. Pampa Middle School and Austin Elementary received three stars, and Lamar Elementary, two stars.

"What I see - we have to look to our professionals, but we, as a board, have to set the bar high, set a timeline and move forward. If the block schedule is a hindrance, then we need to get rid of it ... Bottom line is, no one on the board is satisfied with (the school district's) performance," Lee Porter, school board president, said.

The board unanimously approved a motion initially submitted by Johnson but with changes to cover the school district instead of the high school only. This is the motion as approved by the board:

"I move the board of trustees of the PISD instruct the district and campus administrations to find the most efficient and cost effective schedule and more ambitious campus plans that will place the district in the top 20 percent in all categories in any comparison to other Texas schools within the same profile by 2004 and in the top 10 percent by 2006. I further move the superintendent will bring information and explanations to this board prior to the adoption or implementation of these changes and that this board will receive a quarterly progress report until these goals are met."

"We are too good of a community and too good of a school to be a one-star school," Porter said this morning.

Porter said he felt the board made positive decisions at the meeting and had provided leadership and goals for the city's educators.

"What I heard (from the board) was powerful and positive," Orr said today. "It was a positive statement for the administration and

teachers to take the district to exemplary level."

He described the meeting as "spirited and long," but added that he felt the "outcome was healthy."

Orr said he had set up a meeting with Pampa High School faculty on Monday afternoon.

"I'll be bringing the (school board's) charge to them," he said.

"I think we're moving in the right direction," Johnson said this morning. "We've raised the bar and we're going to hold everyone accountable."

The board also approved the annual district and campus performance objectives as follows:

- The district will have an 85 percent passing rate for all student population groups on each state assessment in grades 3-11. TAKS (the new state assessment test) participation rates will meet or exceed 80 percent. High school completion rates will meet or exceed the state standard.

- All campuses will have, at the minimum, passing rates of 80 percent for each student population group. Special education students will pass the appropriate assessments at the same rate as the general student population.

- Travis, Austin and Middle School will attain passing rates that meet or exceed a 90 percent passing rate for all students and all student groups.

- Wilson and Lamar will meet or exceed an 80 percent passing standard for all students and all student groups.

- Pampa High School will meet or exceed an 80 percent passing rate for all students and student groups and/ or be within two percent of the state average.

- The Pampa Learning Center will meet or exceed an 80 percent passing rate for all students and student groups.

Museum gets new JFK assassination footage

One of the three primary films of the assassination of President Kennedy is being restored, its owners said Friday, the 39th anniversary of his death.

The "Muchmore film," as it is known, will be remastered with digital technology that will stabilize it and restore scratched and damaged images, Associated Press Television News said in London.

Separately, the Sixth Floor Museum in Dallas said it has

acquired new photographs and film, including footage of the presidential motorcade not previously shown to the public.

The APTN film was taken by Marie Muchmore as the president's motorcade turned onto Houston Street in Dallas.

It shows the last, fatal shot to the head and a woman who came to be known as the "babushka lady" filming near the president's car. She never was conclusively identified nor was her film ever retrieved.

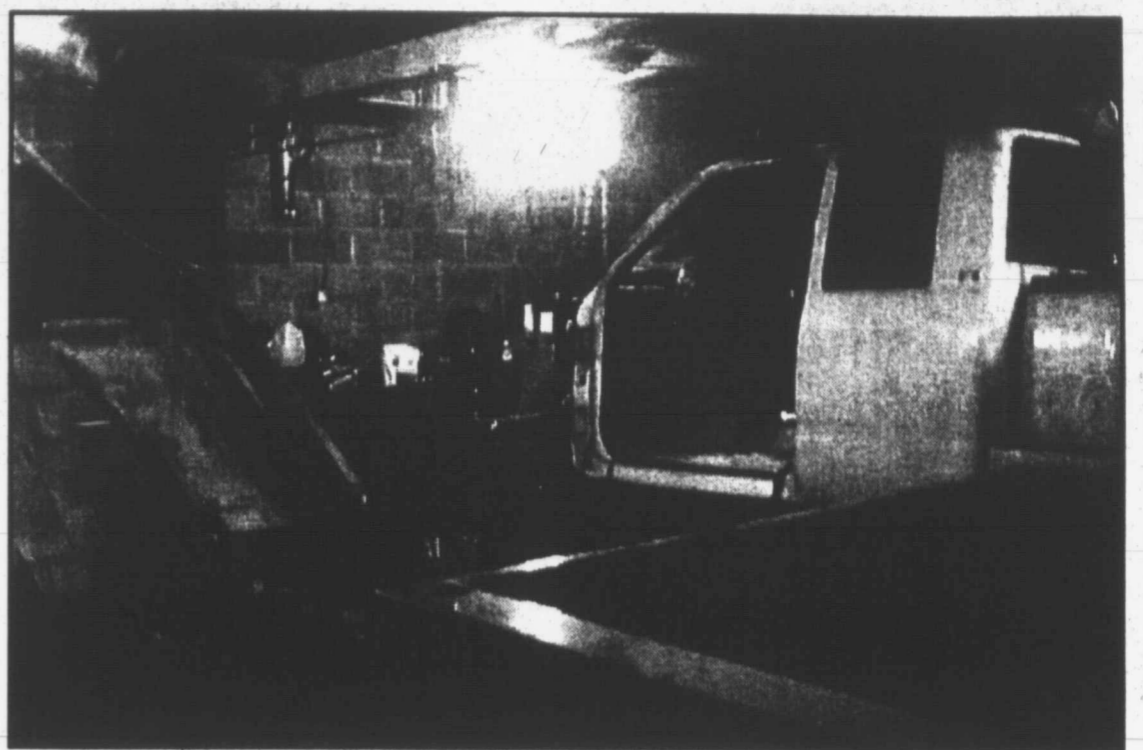
Muchmore's film, originally acquired by United Press

International, is now part of the library of APTN, which commissioned the restoration.

It will be released in January for inclusion in productions timed for the 40th anniversary.

"If a program maker is using scratched, washed-out images, then viewers aren't going to be giving their full concentration, so we think it's a way of helping to tell the story," said APTN's Christopher O'Hearn.

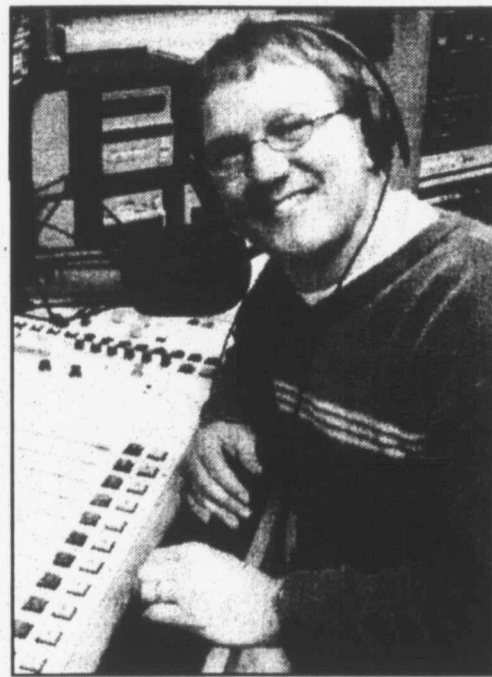

Jewish committee joins Muslims, others in issuing Thanksgiving Day readings

NEW YORK (AP) — The American Jewish Committee said it wants to promote the nation's uniqueness and help unite its people through "A Thanksgiving Reader," which is being distributed free in print form and via the Internet.

The 16-page booklet of materials to be read before Nov. 28 meals was published in conjunction with the Islamic Supreme Council, the NAACP, National Urban League, Cuban American National Council, National Council of La Raza and the Japanese American Citizens League, among others.

The readings express thanks for the United States and its freedoms but note the national past included black slavery, devastation of American Indians and the sufferings of immigrants.

The booklet "puts all Americans on the same page, marking the Thanksgiving holiday with a celebration of our nation's unique democracy and diversity," said the committee's executive director, David A. Harris.

Church settles religious zoning test case

LIMA, Pa. (AP) — A small Baptist congregation near Philadelphia settled one of the first challenges of a 2000 federal act that exempts religious groups from most local zoning rules, unless a community can prove they are necessary for public safety.

Freedom Baptist Church cited the act in a lawsuit after Middletown Township ordered it to close a small chapel on the first floor of a dentist's office.

The chapel was next to a synagogue and across the street from a Presbyterian church, but township officials said zoning rules limited the office to commercial purposes. Township lawyers argued that the federal act is unconstitutional.

A federal judge approved the settlement, in which the township changed its zoning ordinance to comply with the federal act and paid the church's \$10,000 legal expenses.

The Becket Fund for Religious Liberty, which defends religions' civil liberties, represented the Baptists.

Vatican establishes diplomatic ties with Qatar

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican said Monday it has established diplomatic relations with the Persian Gulf emirate of Qatar, where foreign guest workers outnumber the mostly Muslim native population.

The Vatican said there are some 45,000 Catholics among the workers. The government recently granted the Roman Catholic Church property for a church, the announcement said.

Currently, Catholic services meet in the gymnasium of the American school in the capital, Doha.

Small Texas town rich in church history

BLANCONI — Driving between Refugio and Beeville, few people are likely to notice the town of Blanconia. It's not exactly on State Highway 202, but rather off Farm-to-Market Road 2441, which intersects it.

For years, no signs of real development, other than a volunteer fire department, have been experienced in the town of 30. Groceries, medical care, fast food and gasoline are available in the two larger cities to the east and west or in nearby Goliad.

But until somewhat recently, Blanconia and nearby residents have had two churches, both with long histories, to attend regularly.

According to researchers, Blanconia was established in the 1830s when John and Michael Keeting acquired a small portion of land from the state of Coahuila and Texas. The land was originally in

Refugio County until Bee County was created in the late 1850s. At about the same time, residents established a Baptist church near Refugio, named N-2 after local resident N.R. McDaniel's cattle brand.

Twenty years later, another church, Our Lady of the Rosary, was created and it later became St. Catherine's Church. According to historical reports, the Baptist church moved to Blanconia in 1888 and the first sanctuary was built at its current site in 1891.

McDaniel's great-grandson, W.A. Myers III, said what is now Blanconia Baptist Church, one of the oldest churches in South Texas, has been through its share of difficulties.

"It was down to six or seven (members) several times," said Myers. "The doors were closed for about a year. There was no pastor."

But churchgoers from Refugio and Beeville now augment the current membership

of about 50, he said. Most of its members have ties to the church going back generations. Even young worshippers get involved in church activities. Sunday school is services are held every Sunday at 10 a.m. before regular services.

"We got a lot of young people which we haven't had in a long time," Myers said.

A friendly atmosphere keeps people coming back, said Alleene Sullivan, a member of the church since 1980.

But the congregation at St. Catherine's Church has not had regular services for about

the past two years. Unfortunately, there has been a low turnout and too few priests for regular services. According to the Diocese of Corpus Christi, the church is now considered a station, which means visiting priests perform services at the historic church, but not on a regular basis.

"We don't like that word," said Pat McGuill. "It's still a church to us, a mission."

McGuill's great-grandfather, Thomas McGuill, helped establish Our Lady of the Rosary in the late 1800s.

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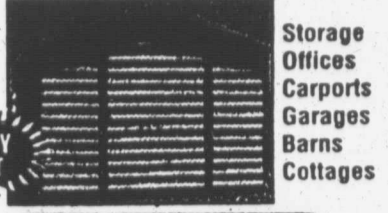

Son-in-Law Goes Nuts Over Abby's Pecan Pie

DEAR ABBY: This is a first for us, but I just had to write after my experience with your famous pecan pie recipe.

My husband read the recipe in your column last year and asked me to make one for Thanksgiving. We had our family over for dinner, and when I asked if anyone would like dessert, our son-in-law asked for the pecan pie. I served him a slice, and his response was, "D—, this is good!" Shortly thereafter, without being asked, our son-in-law got up from the table and proceeded to clean up the kitchen. A first! I told him with that kind of reaction I'll make Abby's pecan pie for him every holiday. Thanks, Abby.

DOROTHY AND JIM SMITH, LE SUEUR, MINN.
DEAR DOROTHY AND JIM: You're welcome. That wasn't the first time this recipe has made people do wonderful and unexpected things. Here it is:

ABBY'S FAMOUS PECAN PIE

9-inch unbaked pie crust
1/3 cup light corn syrup
1 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar
3 eggs, slightly beaten
1/3 cup butter, melted
1/3 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 heaping cup pecan halves

Heat oven to 350 degrees. In a large bowl, combine corn syrup, sugar, eggs, butter, salt and vanilla; mix well. Pour filling into unbaked pie crust; sprinkle with pecan halves.

Bake at 350 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes or until center is set. (Toothpick inserted in center will come out clean when pie is done.) Cool. If crust or pie appears to be getting too brown, cover with foil for the remaining baking time.

You can top it with a bit of whipped cream, but even plain,

nothing tops this! Serves 8 to 10. TIP: The original recipe stated that the pie should be baked 45 to 50 minutes in a preheated 350-degree gas oven. If an electric oven is used, it may be necessary to add 15 to 20 minutes to the baking time. (Begin testing the pie with a toothpick after 45 minutes.)

DEAR ABBY: What does "heavy cream" mean in recipes? I often see the term used, but it doesn't say what it is. Thanks!

NOVICE COOK IN BENTON, KY.
DEAR NOVICE COOK: I checked with Charlice Makowski of Santee Dairies in Los Angeles. She reports that there are actually four kinds of cream:

— Light cream, which has not less than 18 percent or more than 30 percent butterfat;

— Whipping cream, which has between 34 and 36 percent butterfat; and

— Heavy cream, which has between 36 and 38 percent butterfat; and

— Manufacturer's cream, which contains 38 to 40 percent butterfat and is used by delis and bakeries for items such as cream puffs.

Pampa head coach Dennis Cavalier is hoping his squad can do the same thing four years later against another undefeated Riverside team.

The two schools meet again in the area round at 7:30 Saturday night in Midland.

"Riverside has another very good team. We've watched the tapes from that '98 game and evaluated film of this year's team. Coach (Tom) Work (Riverside coach) believes this year's team's is even better than the '98 team we played. And that '98 team was a quality team."

This year's Rangers are certainly putting up the numbers, averaging 476 yards and 44 points per game.

The backfield trio largely responsible for those big numbers are quarterback Mike Stephenson (170-pound senior), fullback Shawn Jordan (235-pound senior) and tailback Tony Gonzales (160-pound sophomore). The 6-foot-1 Stephenson was the district's most valuable player, and like Jordan, is a four-year starter.

"Jordan is big and powerful and he's probably their No. 1 receiver in terms of the number of receptions. Their offense is 80 percent running, at least that's what they've done in the past," Cavalier said. "They run a lot of different formations."

The Riverside defense has been stingy, only allowing 132 yards and 10 points a contest. The Rangers have shut out four opponents.

"Their defense is mobile and athletic," Cavalier added. "El Paso isn't a big team compared to the ones we've played, but they're probably the most athletic," Cavalier said.

Riverside's defense is led by tackle Hyrum Montes (230-pound junior), middle linebacker Eddie Marquez (170-pound junior) and free safety Alfonso Zamora (175-pound senior).

"Their defense is set up to defend the pass, which, of course, is what we do. Marquez is a strong linebacker, a sideline-to-sideline player. Zamora is a standout player. I'd venture to say he's

their star player," Cavalier said.

Riverside (11-0) routed El Paso Burges 72-7, in the bi-district round.

Cavalier praised flanker Jesse Tarango, quarterback John Braddock and middle linebacker Zack Cobb for their play in Pampa's 28-14 win over Andrews in bi-district.

"Jesse was clearly outstanding as a receiver, running back and special teams player. He returned two kick-offs that gave us favorable field position. John did a great job directing the offense. He was accurate with his throws and ran the ball well," he said.

Cobb, who leads the Harvesters in tackles with 94 solo stops and 85 assists, padded his total against Andrews.

"Zack had 15 plus tackles, plus an interception," Cavalier said. "He did a magnificent job."
