## Rural ambulances face hard times

Volunteers needed, but hard to get

LEFORS - Lefors only has 559 residents, but when those people need an ambulance they want their local one to be available. The ambulance is there, but there aren't enough trained volunpersonnel. The eight members of the small teers to keep it operating 24 hours a

Lefors Volunteer Emergency Medical Services needs help and it's seeking volunteers and funding to train those volunteers.

Lefors residents may now have to wait for an ambulance to arrive from Pampa's Rural/Metro Ambulance Service to be transported for medical

Texas Department of Health (TDH) has issued a variance for the ambulance service to maintain the service even though there isn't enough trained

community's all-volunteer ambulance service are employed outside the immediate Lefors area and are unable to respond to calls during the day, said Cathy Tinney, director of the Lefors Volunteer Emergency Medical Services.

She is the only paramedic, while seven are emergency medical technicians (EMTs).

Tinney responds to ambulance calls at night, but works in Pampa during the week. She works part-time for a local doctor and also for the Rural/Metro Ambulance Service, and isn't available for Lefors ambulance calls during the day.

Inadequate staffing of the volunteer service is the major culprit and, regrettably, it is a problem all over the Texas Panhandle, said Mike Bavousett, TDH-Canyon.

"Lefors' problem is not unique," said Bavousett. "It's a challenge for all the volunteer ambulance services to keep enough people."

"The volunteer pool is drying up," he said. "In today's world, both spouses are in the workforce. Also, the population is declining in the rural Texas Panhandle area as many people are moving to the urban areas.'

He also said the workforce is aging, and people who volunteered for many years can no longer do so.

"Out of 41 counties in this region, five to seven volunteer ambulance services have been granted a variance similar to Lefors'," he explained.

One ambulance service in the region was recently forced to close due to lack of staffing. He said the vol-(See AMBULANCES, Page 4)

### **Attention lapse** cause of wreck, **DPS officer says**

A 24-year-old Oklahoma woman was killed in a fatal wreck shortly before 11 a.m. Thursday at Loop 171 and Texas 273, south of Pampa.

Dajuana Genee Collins of Edmond, Okla., was traveling south on Loop 171, said Department of Public Safety Trooper Jessie Cerda. He said witnesses told him she had stopped at the intersection's stop sign and was looking down, apparently reading a map.

The 2002 Gray Ford Taurus she was driving edged into the intersection as a tractor-trailer was traveling south onto Texas Highway 273 and broadsided Collins' vehicle, said Cerda. He said she was killed instantly. \*

Cerda attributed the cause to a brief loss of

Driver of the truck was John Frederick Aufleger, 47, of Pampa. The truck is owned by Eastx Crude Co. of Leesburg. The tanker he was pulling was carrying crude oil, Cerda said.

Collins was pronounced dead at the scene by Precinct Two Justice of the Peace Kurt Curfman. He ordered an autopsy and she was transported to Lubbock where the autopsy will be conduct-

Collins was a pharmaceutical representative in the Pampa area.

## Driver charged in traffic death back in jail

A 23-year-old Pampa woman out on a \$50,000 bond for intoxicated manslaughter was returned to jail Thursday because she did not follow the conditions of the bond set by 31st District Judge Steven Emmert in November 2002.

Langwell said Friday morning Davis did not follow the conditions set out by Judge Emmert and her bond was sur-

rendered. When Davis was arrested. Justice of the Peace Kurt Curfman set a bond of ' \$100,000. Judge Emmert reduced the bond to \$50,000 along with setting the three conditions at the bond hearing six days later.

Davis remained in Gray County Jail this morning.

The 1944 treaty calls for Mexico to provide 365,000 acre-feet of water annually and for the United States to supply Mexico with four times that from the Colorado River. The United States has

complied with the treaty. Texas farmers claim Mexico's inability to meet its obligations has cost them nearly a billion dollars in lost crops since 1992.

State and federal officials say Mexico owes the United States about 1.5 million acrefeet of water, or more than 500 billion gallons. The debt began to mount about 10 vears ago.

An acre-foot is the amount of irrigation water it takes to cover one acre to a depth of one foot. It equals 43,560 cubic feet.

Texas officials say farmers in the region have been hit hard by drought and depend on the water that has been withheld by Mexico.

### **Economy: Unemployment rate** holds at 6 percent in December

unemployment rate held steady at 6 percent in December as a dismal holiday season for retailers and manufacturers cost over 101,000 jobs, the sharpest loss in 10 months.

The job cuts last month were widespread and followed a revised loss of 88,000 in November, the Labor Department said

The report is based on two separate surveys, which can sometimes provide a confusing or conflicting snapshot of the health of the U.S. job market. The 6 percent rate is calculated from a government survey of households. Payroll numbers are determined from a separate survey of businesses.

The report capped a gloomy year for jobseekers who saw the unemployment rate surge from 5.6 percent in January to close the year at 6 percent — matching an eight-year high.

The number of people unemployed 15 weeks or more climbed to 3.2 million in December.

The nation's retailers, which typically boost payrolls in December to handle the crunch of the holiday shopping season, shed 104,000 jobs. Factories slashed 65,000 jobs to end the year, and payrolls were down 592,000 positions from the previous year.

The struggling airline industry drove job losses in the transportation industry, which hemorrhaged 23,000 jobs last month.

"President Bush could not have asked for a better endorsement for his tax cut proposal than this report," said Ken Mayland, president of ClearView Economics in Cleveland, Ohio. "This news should light a fire under

The White House seized on the new data as reason for Congress to move swiftly to enact Bush's tax cuts as a salve to the economy. Bush spokesman Ari Fleischer said the president shares the concerns of some economists about the possibility of a "jobless recovery" in which the economy grows, but anemically and without creating new jobs.

as quickly as Congress can to pass his jobcreating initiative," Fleischer said.

The ailing economy has shown no consistent signs of a strong recovery. Many economists are bracing jobseekers for more bad news in the months ahead.

Facing the potential political damage, Bush and a new Republican-controlled Congress quickly pushed through a federal taking on new, full-time help.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's extension of emergency unemployment benefits this week as lawmakers returned for a new session.

In unveiling his tax-cut package Tuesday, Bush said "too many of our citizens who want to work cannot find a job."

Included in his package is a proposal to create "re-employment accounts" of up to \$3,000 for jobless workers. The \$3.6 billion program would help people pay for expenses such as child care, job training, transportation and moving expenses while looking for work.

Congressional Democrats proposed their own package, saying the administration's plan is tilted too heavily toward the wealthy. Bush has denied that and said that some criticism of his program amounts to class war-

Although the economy has been recovering from the 2001 recession, its progress has been slow and uneven, with varying degrees

That climate and fears about a possible war with Iraq and concerns about tensions with North Korea are making companies wary of big commitments in capital investment and hiring — the main ingredients for a strong recovery.

With economists predicting only modest economic growth in the months ahead, the jobless rate could rise to 6.5 percent by the summer, analysts have said.

The holiday season turned out even worse than expected for most of the nation's retailers. Analysts and retailers attributed the weaker-than-expected performance to fewer shopping days, economic uncertainty and consumers' lack of must-buy items.



ACT I met the challenges of 12 scene changes, a cast of 18, with some playing more than one part, and rehearsals interrupted by the Christmas season in its current production "The Women," opening tonight at 7:30 p.m.

Performances are in the Pampa Mall theatre, with entrance midway at the back of the mall, located at 2500 N. Hobart. The drama will be performed again Saturday, with a Sunday matinee at 2 p.m. It will be presented' the following weekend, Friday and Saturday, Jan. 17 and 18, at 7:30 p.m.

A slap at the rich, social-climbing wives, playwrite Clare Boothe Luce wove a comedy around daily activities of women with little purpose but to look pretty, have massages, buy clothes, play bridge, and "concern" themselves with other women's problems which results in gossipy entanglements. Loaded with humorous quotes, the script reflects the attitudes of the 1930s, '40s, and '50s that might also be today as women search for a purpose, that is now more often a career.

Memorable are the character studies, including Cynthia Aler as the elegant, dramatic Sylvia Fowler - "you know you can trust me" friend. Also of note is ACT I veteran Berinda Turcotte, a standout with her snappy humor as Nancy Blake, the all-knowing writer. Another winner is Gina Kane as Edith Potter, always pregnant and always eating, who obligingly accepts her role of caring for her man and kids.

Veteran Rochelle Lacy with her expres-

sions and clipped lingo is delightful in the roles of Jane the maid and the saleswoman. Carla Gifford is the loud countess, the l'amour woman - a mixture of French to western. Lisa Ryan plays the sultry Crystal allen, the root of Mary Haines' husband problems. Portrayed by Karen Smith, Mary falls for the advice of her friends, hands over her husband, and in the end fights back, fulfilling the core of "The Women," that the other fellow will hit you if you don't hit him first.

unteer EMS in O'Donnell near Lubbock closed their service for similar reasons.

"The problem is a challenge for so many small town services," said Bavousett.

He said small towns have tried several ways to try to solve the problem.

Some have hired one or two full-time paid paramedics while the remainder of the staff is volunteer. He said that it works in some communities while it doesn't in other. He said McLean's service is headed by one full-time paid paramedic with several volunteers who are on call in the evenings. He said Stinnett's set-up is similar.

"Claude has an innovative approach to the problem." Bayousett said. "They have wo city employees who read water meters full time, but also have received their basic certification and can respond to emergency calls during the day. The city has paid for their training.'

Canadian has a hospitalbased service and Clarendon has a hospital district-directed

Skellytown has an elected ambulance service director. Bavousett said they previously had a variance, but it expired in July 2001

"As far as I know, Miami has never had a variance, and their service is completely volunteer," he said.

He said White Deer is doing quite well at the present time. A White Deer businessman who is a paramedic is available during the day for ambulance calls.

"Clarendon doesn't have a hospital, but the taxes from the hospital district pay for the service," said Bavousett.

He said Clarendon's approach has been quite successful. They have four paid paramedics and Clarendon's Executive Director Anita Aaron has recently become a basic level coordinator allowing for her to coordinate classes for basic EMTs in the area.

Aaron said Thursday a new class began the past week for the basic class. She was surprised at the number of people who are taking the classes each Monday and Thursday for the next several months.

"We have 25 in the class," she said, "which is a very large class. The response was astounding.

However, the grant funding which Aaron and her staff obtained contributed to the high number of enrollees.

The class normally costs \$350 to \$500 per student Amarillo, Pantex and at which many of them have to pay for themselves. However, grants from Texas Tech and Texas University Department of Transportation reduced that cost to only \$49 per student. Clarendon College is also working on the

"We were truly blessed," said Aaron. "We have people enrolled from Clarendon, Panhandle, Hedley, Lelia Lake, and Groom.'

She said this is her first class to coordinate, and another one is scheduled to begin in Stinnett in late February.

Aaron said Clarendon High School is discussing incorporating a basic class into their curriculum for the upcoming school year.

Panhandle City Manager Loren Brand said he is impressed with Aaron's qualifications and ability.

"She is absolutely fantastic," he said. "She really knows her business.'

"We are sending five people from Panhandle to Clarendon to the classes. We're helping with the gas and textbooks," Brand said.

Brand said Aaron is heading an excellent service.

"Their set-up Clarendon is fantastic, but not all of us have a hospital district for funding," he said. Panhandle's EMS is also

operating with a variance.

"We're doing everything we know how in Panhandle to solve the problem," Brand said. "But attrition catches up with everybody. Daytime is our worst time. So many of our volunteers work in Phillips. So they're not here during the day.

Some towns have hired a paramedic, but others can't afford it, he explained.

"Being an emergency responder is not for everyone," he said. "Some just aren't able to do it. It's not a matter of people not caring. Some people just aren't suited for it. For those that it is suited, we want to locate and

He added that these people are volunteering and not getting paid.

Bavousett said he is seeing this problem throughout his 41-county region, but there are other ways residents can help keep the emergency ambulance ser-

vices in their small towns. "Someone with medical billing experience, or accounting, could help with the billing by donating their time," he said. "Also, older residents can be available to keep the small children of volunteer ambulance personnel when they are on call. There are a number of things people can do to help maintain their small-town way of


Christopher Lee Bennett, 28, is accused of soliciting two men in January 2001 to kill U.S. District Judge Richard Matsch, according to the indictment.

### Southern **Baptists** opposing city class

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A plan to add sexual orientation to the city's list of classes protected from job and housing discrimination has angered the Southern Baptist Convention, which may reconsider staging its 2005 annual meeting in its hometown.

Bill Merrell, an SBC vice president, said the possibility was raised in an official communication to a Nashville tourism official that said: "This alters the nature of Nashville as a convention city for us."

With about 16 million members, the Southern Baptist Convention is the nation's largest Protestant denomination.

About 150 employees of the convention's executive committee work in Nashville, as do about 1,500 employees of LifeWay Christian Resources, the denomination's publishing arm. LifeWay was established in Nashville in 1891, while the executive committee has been based in the city since 1927.

Baptists and other conservative religious leaders are fighting a proposed Nashville anti-discrimination ordinance that supporters say has a simple purpose: ensuring equal opportunity for housing and employment. The ordinance has passed two of three required city council readings.

Opponents say the ordinance, in its present form, would violate the U.S. Constitution by requiring religious groups who consider homosexuality a sin to hire gays and lesbians.

The measure's lead Councilman sponsor, Chris Ferrell, said that's not the intent and he will add a religious exemption before the final vote Jan.

"I'm not going to be in the position of telling anybody what their theology has to be," Ferrell said.

Merrell said Baptist leaders see the ordinance, with or without the religious exemption, as "another attempt by progay activists to secure the approval and affirmation of the broader culture of the homosexual lifestyle."

He said the ordinance could turn Nashville into "the San Francisco of the Southeast."

Nashville gay rights Abby activist R. Rubenfeld, a lesbian parent of two, was amused by the characterization.

## FBI lawyer at center of controversy over award

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some congressional critics of the FBI are questioning a presidential citation and large cash bonus awarded to an FBI supervisor whose headquarters unit denied a pre-Sept. 11 search warrant against terrorism suspect Zacarias Moussaoui.

The FBI's deputy general counsel, Marion "Spike" Bowman, was among nine current and former FBI officials who last month received a Presidential Rank Award for career senior executives, which carries with it a cash bonus of 20 percent to 30 percent of an annual salary.

Bowman, head of the FBI's National Security Law Unit, was praised for efforts to attract within the FBI "a staff of attorneys to examine diverse and highly complex issues for which little or no formal legal education has been available." FBI Director Robert Mueller recommended to the White House that Bowman receive the award.

The decision roiled FBI critics who believe Bowman's lawyers improperly rejected a search warrant request by FBI agents in Minnesota investigating Moussaoui in August 2001. Moussaoui, the only person charged in connection with the Sept. 11 attacks, was in custody the following month when hijackers steered planes into the World Trade

Center and the Pentagon.

Bowman, who declined to comment Thursday, maintains there never was enough evidence for such a warrant under the guidelines of the 1978 Intelligence Foreign Surveillance Act.

An FBI spokesman also declined to comment on Bowman's selection for the award, or specify the amount of his cash bonus.

Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, complained in a letter to the FBI director, "You are sending the wrong signal to those agents who fought — sometimes against senior FBI bureaucrats at headquarters — to prevent the attacks."

Grassley asked Mueller to explain in writing his decision to nominate Bowman. He told Mueller that Senate testimony by Bowman during a closed Judiciary Committee hearing in July raised serious questions about the competence of lawyers in his unit.

Sen. Richard Shelby of Alabama, the senior Republican on the Intelligence Committee during its oversight investigation of the FBI, complained last month that Bowman's law unit provided "inexcusably confused and inaccurate information" to FBI investigators in Minneapolis during the Moussaoui case.

Shelby said in an 84-page report that the FBI unit's advice turned out to be "patently false" and led agents in Minnesota on a "wild goose chase for nearly three weeks."

On Thursday, Shelby said the award showed "no accountability for poor performance at the bureau.

The Senate investigation last fall also criticized Bowman's unit for blocking an urgent request on Aug. 29, 2001, by FBI agents in New York to begin searching for Khalid' Almihdar, one of the hijackers on the American Airlines flight that crashed into the Pentagon.

An FBI agent, who wasn't identified publicly, testified Bowman's lawyers decided

information tying Almihdar to terrorism had been obtained through intelligence channels and thus could not legally be used in a criminal investigation.

"Some day, someone will die ... and the public will not understand why we were not more effective and throwing every resource we had at certain problems," the agent wrote in a prescient e-mail to FBI headquarters. He said he hoped that Bowman's law unit "will stand behind their decisions then."

Although the U.S. indictment of Moussaoui does not directly tie him to the 19 hijackers, prosecutors disclosed months ago

phone number written on a business card recovered from the wreckage of one of the hijacked flights.

Bowman's law unit employs about 15 specialized lawyers to offer advice for FBI agents about applying the powerful 1978 surveillance law during terrorism and espionage investigations. The unit approves or rejects requests for secret surveillance warrants in such cases. then forwards its approvals to the Justice Department. Lawyers there review the FBI requests and can deny them outright or seek final approval for the warrants from a special U.S. that Moussaoui had called a court that meets secretly.

### Wheat production lowest since 1972

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wheat production dropped last year to its lowest since 1972, a casualty of a drought that singed crops across the nation, the Agriculture Department said

U.S. farmers harvested 1.62 billion bushels of wheat, down 17 percent from 2001. Winter wheat in particular did not fare well with production at 1.14 billion bushels the lowest since 1970.

The department's corn production estimates for 2002 remained steady at 9.01 billion bushels — nearly the same amount projected in November.

A lack of water stunted yields. Nebraska, for instance, harvested 940 million bushels of com, down from the 1.14 billion harvested in 2001.

Eastern states such as North Carolina also saw a drop in yields because of the dry weather. North Carolina farmers collected 58 million bushels compared to the 78 million harvested in 2001.

Two states were virtually

untouched by drought and saw record yields: Iowa and Minnesota. Iowa farms produced 1.96 billion bushels and Minnesota produced 1.05 billion

Soybeans also were affected by the weather. U.S. production was 2.73 billion bushels, about 6 percent below 2001.



# Colleagues remember murdered missionaries

JIBLA, Yemen (ABP) -Colleagues and friends of the three American hospital workers killed in a Dec. 30 terrorist attack in Yemen gathered the next morning to bury two of the victims and celebrate their lives and ministries.

The bodies of physician Martha Myers, 57, and hospi-

Koehn, 60, were buried, as they had requested, on the grounds of the Jibla Baptist for more than 25 years. The United States

After the service, most of the 13 American mission workers and their families left for the relative safety of San'a,

tal administrator William the Yemeni capital, for "a time of healing and grieving together," a spokeswoman said.

Six remained behind in Hospital where each worked Jibla - including Donald Caswell, 49, who was injured remains of Kathleen Gariety, by the lone gunman and 53, are being returned to the required surgery, and Koehn's wife Marty - but they expected to join the group later. Some workers plan to return to Jibla when it's deemed safe.

International Mission Board (IMB) said its work in Yemen will go on despite the tragedy, but the hospital likely will be transferred to a Muslim charity as previously planned.

"The transfer is still in process, but with three deaths, the discussions understandably have stopped," said IMB spokeswoman Anita Bowden.

Hours after the slaying, colleagues talked warmly of the slain workers, who were shot by a suspected Islamic fundamentalist.

"We've lost three of the dearest people," said Lee Hixon, assistant hospital administrator, in an interview. "Between the three of them, there are probably 60 years of service. They were here because they loved the people.

Repeatedly co-workers voiced the resolve of mission workers who risk death to minister in dangerous lands like Yemen.

"They already gave their lives - they gave their lives when they came here," Hixon

Ken Clezy, an Australian surgeon who works at the hospital, remembered William Koehn as "a fine administrator, fair and well-liked by the Yemenis.

"He had a heart of gold and did a lot for orphans and prisoners, as well as the truly poor around here," Clezy said. "He had none of the foibles that one sometimes sees in longserving missionaries. And we . loved him unreservedly. He was fearless and had no thought of leaving during the civil war of '93-'94 or the Gulf War.'

In a statement, Koehn's stateside family said the Kansas native "died doing what he was called to do. Bill and Marty were in Yemen because of their love for the Lord. We're saddened by this news, but we understand that this does not reflect on the people of Yemen as a whole. We have found them to be gracious and kind

Randal Pearce Mansfield, Texas, Koehn's son-in-law, told the Dallas Morning News: "He was not a pastor or a doctor. He was an administrator. His job was not to convert people, not telling them what to believe. He did maintenance work, administration, anything to keep the

end, known all over Yemen,"

said Clezy, her surgeon colleague. "She was generous to a fault, if there is such a thing in Christian terminology. She was a radiant, relaxed Christian."

"I think she was prepared to stay there the rest of her life,' said John Wikman, a former missionary who previously served at the hospital. "She could talk Arabic, and the Jibla version of it, as well as the local people."

Myers, who was single, was responsible for immunizing "hundreds of thousands" of Yemeni children, Wikman said. She was the victim of a carjacking several years ago but escaped when her otherwise reliable SUV broke down. "She was kind of scary to drive with," Wikman added.

Kathleen Gariety of Wauwatosa, Wis., also single, managed the medical supplies for the hospital for 10 years. On her infrequent trips home to Wisconsin, she would collect donated medical supplies to fill a shipping container for the hospital. Churches in the Lakeland Baptist Association (LBA), including her home congregation of .Layton Baptist Church in Milwaukee, helped with the collection.

"She was a cheerful, determined individual who was extraordinarily focused in her work," said Keith Cogburn, director of missions for the LBA where Gariety was employed before becoming a missionary. "She epitomized the calling of a missionary who knows beyond a shadow of a doubt that he or she is called to a particular place. I can't think of a stronger challenge than where she was serv-

"She had such a heart for the people," said Wikman. "She really felt the hospital was serving a purpose. They lost someone who really loved them. She was very concerned about the desperate needs of the people."

Gariety was the most vocal advocate for keeping the hospital in the hands of Christians,

colleagues said. "She pleaded with people to try to save the hospital,' Wikman said. "When she said the local Yemeni people wanted the hospital to stay, she knew what she was talking about because the nationals really confided in her ... She ·worked with a lot of the nationals in her job. she had the pulse of the folks, even

more than the doctors did."

Jibla Baptist Hospital, founded by Southern Baptist mission workers 35 years ago, is the only full-service hospital in the poor, rural area around Jibla. It is staffed by 180 local workers, 13 Southern Baptist mission personnel and about 20 other international workers.

Although the hospital is popular among most local residents, some extremists see it as a Western intrusion and an affront to Islam. The gunman, who confessed and surrendered to Yemeni officials, said he shot the American workers cleanse his religion and get closer to Allah.

Lee Hixon, the assistant administrator, declined to speculate on the shooter's motive.

"We're here to help poor people, that's our gift from God," Hixon said.

Even before the attack, as the IMB moved to close or transfer the hospital, some of the mission workers had made plans to leave Yemen or transfer to other jobs in the country. But others say they plan to return to Jibla.

"I do," said Hixon, who has lived in Jibla with his wife and two teenage children for more than two years. "God puts a great love for a people in your heart, and we love the Yemeni people."

He said he is confident his children are up to the challenge. "They are strong in their faith. They know how to go to the Rock. They're good kids."

At 6:30 a.m. on the morning of the shooting, the hospital mission workers gathered for their regular morning chapel service. Ken Clezy, the Australian surgeon, read Hebrews 11:4 which talks about the faith of Abel, Adam's son.

"By faith, he was commended as a righteous man, when God spoke well of his offerings. And by faith he still speaks, even though he is dead." (NIV)

"About an hour later, our friends were dead," Clezy recalled. "We pray that, like Abel, they will speak."



### Sharon lashes out at opposition over corruption charges

JERUSALEM (AP) -Fighting back against corruption allegations that could cost him the premiership, Ariel Sharon accused the opposition Labor Party of slander, before being vanked off the air by a judge monitoring fairness in Israel's election campaign.

"Shut Up Live," read a front-page headline Friday in the Yediot Ahronot newspaper, commenting on the unprecedented decision by Judge Mishael Cheshin, the chairman of the Central Election Commission, to stop

live TV and radio broadcasts of Sharon's prime time news conference Thursday.

Stations are banned from broadcasting "election propaganda" in the month before the Jan. 28 general election, except in special blocs set aside for campaign spots. Sharon's news conference continued without live cover-

Sharon is under police investigation for a \$1.5 million loan from a South Africabased businessman. His rightwing Likud party is also fighting off charges of underworld involvement and corruption in its internal elections.

The wave of scandals has wiped out most of his lead in the polls. Sharon now appears to face a virtual election tie. raising the possibility that dovish Amram Mitzna of Labor, who opposes Sharon's harsh policies toward the Palestinians, could form the next Israeli government.

Newspaper columns Friday focused on the interruption of Sharon's address.

"His news conference yesterday will be remembered mostly because it wasn't broadcast," wrote political commentator Nahum Barnea in Yediot. "Closing the microphone on a prime minister can

be called a historic incident."

The law banning "election propaganda" dates from a time when Israel had only one TV channel and two radio stations. Cheshin said earlier that he would enforce the law rigorously this year in an attempt to show that it must be repealed.

In the news conference, Sharon denied knowledge of the loan his sons took to cover the return of improper camelection. He insisted he had documents to prove he did nothing wrong and charged that Labor cooked up the scandals because it was behind in the polls.

"I never imagined that the behavior of the Labor party would be so irresponsible," he said. "They tried to turn all of us into the mafia, into organized crime, and all for the sake of politics."

Rejecting Labor's demands that he resign because of the scandals, Sharon said he would not step down "because of a political provocation."

Sharon said his son Gilad arranged the loan to help him repay what Israel's state comptroller decided was an improper campaign contribution from an earlier election,

and that the loan was properly

reported to the authorities.

"I did not know exactly paign funds from an earlier how the money was obtained;" Sharon maintained. "Everything was done the proper way ... There is no

> "If the police want to come and interrogate me, let them come and ask questions. I have nothing to hide."

Avraham Burg, a leading Labor legislator, ridiculed Sharon's explanations. "A prime minister doesn't know what's going on in his own pocket?" Burg said. "How does he know what's going on in Israel?"

Also Thursday, the Israeli Supreme Court overturned Election Commission rulings and permitted two Arab Israeli candidates to stand for re-election. Last week the partisan commission, voting along party lines, tried to dis-

qualify them, charging that

they supported Palestinian violence, but the court allowed them to run.

The ruling could be critical to the election outcome. Israeli Arabs make up more than one-sixth of Israel's population and traditionally vote heavily for left-wing parties.

Sharon called elections in November after Labor bolted his "national unity" government in a dispute over Jewish settlements in the West Bank and Gaza. Initial polls showed Sharon's Likud Party and its right-wing allies winning a comfortable majority in parliament.

The scandals have taken their toll, according to polls published Thursday that showed Likud and its bloc with only a tiny majority. Labor and its dovish allies still trail, with centrist parties apparently holding a pivotal role at this point.

### UN: War in Iraq may derail world economy

UNITED NATIONS (AP) the U.N. Conference on Trade and havoc in the region — The world economy is recovering more slowly than projected, and a war in Iraq could put a brake on further growth, according to a new U.N. forecast.

slowdown has The occurred across the globe with the notable exception of China, but growth has been especially weak in developing countries, a U.N. report released Thursday shows.

The global economy will grow by 2.75 percent this year, a bit better than last year's expansion of 1.7 percent. Previous forecasts said growth would pick up in the first half of 2003 but the report forecast a delay because of a host of global

uncertainties. "We are now looking forward to recovery in the second half of 2003," said Ian Kinniburgh, director of the U.N. Development Policy Analysis Division, which produced the report together with

and Development.

The report, titled the World Economic Situation and Prospects 2003, said the recovery is being held hostage to a number of imminent risks, particularly a war in

already having a negative impact on global economic growth through the higher price of oil, rising economic uncertainty and the decrease in business and consumer confidence that they have generated," the report said.

It noted that the new figures take into consideration these troubles but not an escalation into military action, the impact of which would depend on the scale and duration of the conflict.

"It is clear to us, however, that an escalation of conflict in that area would only have damaging effects," Kinniburgh said. Above all, "it would create destruction itself."

Another potential threat to the global economy is its dependence on the United States, whose own recovery is hesitant, the report said.

The U.S. economy needs a short-term stimulus but not at "These tensions are the price of longterm fiscal

stability, Kinniburgh said. The report said the U.S. economy will likely grow by 3 percent this year, outstripping the European Union's 2 percent increase. Japan's economy, which contracted by 0.4 percent in 2002, will grow by 1 percent this year, the report predicted.

"The United States will continue to lead the global recovery, but without significant momentum," the report said. "With domestic demand lacking vigor, economic recovery in Japan and Western Europe continues to rely chiefly on external demand and will remain frag-

Still, Holmes set 10 team records, including 1,615 yards rushing and 21 TDs. He also had three scores as a receiver, and the 24 TDs were two short of Marshall Faulk's league

MIDLAND, (AP) — Three months ago, Randy Velarde was fairly certain that he had just played the last game of his major league baseball career.

In October, after his Oakland Athletics lost to the Minnesota Twins in the American League Division Series, Velarde told sportswriters he was calling it quits after 16 years in the major leagues.

Now, he's not so sure.

"When you think of retirement, those people are 65," he said in an interview with the Midland Reporter-Telegram. "I'm still young in life. There's only so much golfing and hunting and fishing you can do,"

Velarde said he learned in a meeting with his agent two weeks ago that several clubs are interested in him.

"The news left possibilities for this season. There were some bites from the right kind of clubs, but the agent didn't want to get my hopes up," Velarde said. "There's no question I can still be a productive player. Now it's a matter of handpicking the team I want to play for."

Velarde has come close to being on a world champion team. He was in postseason play each of the last seasons three Oakland, but the Athletics were unable to go all the way.

He played for the Yankees the first nine years of his career, from 1987 to 1995, and the year after he left them, the Yankees went on a string in which they won four of the next five

BEREA, Ohio (AP) -Former Dallas coach Dave Campo was hired as Cleveland's new defensive coordinator on Friday, reuniting him with Browns coach Butch Davis.

Campo and Davis worked together for six years as defensive assistants on the Cowboys' staff, helping Dallas win two Super Bowls. The two also coached at the University at Miami.

"I am very excited about the opportunity to work with Butch Davis," Campo said Friday. "We had a great working relationship at the University of Miami and withthe Dallas Cowboys, and I have a great deal of respect for him.'

Davis said Campo is "an outstanding person, and a tremendous teacher and he will have a significant impact on our players."

The 55-year-old Campo leading the Cowboys to their

third straight 5-11 season. He had also interviewed for Seattle's defensive coordinator's job but decided to join Davis' staff.

### Lawsuit thrown for loss

SAN DIEGO (AP) — A year made it difficult for the federal magistrate turned down a disabled activist's request Thursday to block the Super Bowl.

Beverly Walker had sought a federal court order to prevent San Diego from hosting the Jan. 26 NFL title game at Qualcomm Stadium unless the city complied with a 2001 settlement aimed at expanding access for the disabled at the arena.

The oddsmakers don't buy the argument that Michael Vick can cancel out Donovan McNabb in Philadelphia.

They look at the Falcons and Eagles overall, which is why the Eagles are favored by 7 1/2 in their matchup in Philadelphia on Saturday

Even Dan Reeves acknowledges that crumbling Veterans Stadium, in its final season, will be a tough place for his Falcons to play.

"They've got great fan support," says Reeves, who visited Philadelphia often as a player and assistant coach with Dallas and as head coach of the New York

Giants. "So we just go from Lambeau Field to Veterans Stadium. We go from one tough place to another."



### Switzer's charm was a major hook in college recruiting

FORT WORTH, Texas — The coach, pounding the Buffaloes in Boulder, Colo., picks up the phone: "You watching us? We just hung half a hundred on these guys!"

The kid, pumping gas at C.J.'s Conoco in Hooks, Texas, answers: "Is this .

The coach: "Damn right, sittin' here on a pay phone in the locker room. I gotta go finish this butt-kicking. Call you later.

The kid: "Wow And that's how Barry Switzer lured Billy Sims to win the Heisman Trophy at the University of Oklahoma.

While today's coaches use their immaculate facilities, storied traditions and even friendly female escorts to recruit the finest football players, Switzer became the most successful recruiter in the history of college football by taking the folksy charm coaches had

never had into black players' homes, where coaches had never

'We were beating the crap out of Colorado, so I had nothing to say or do at halftime," Switzer said of his impromptu but important call to Sims, who ran his way to the 1978 Heisman. "I saw a pay phone in the corner and decided to call Billy. The ref finally came in and tapped me on the shoulder, and I had to go back out. But Billy knew where I was and knew what I was doing. He knew I wasn't going to hang up and call some other recruits. He knew he was special, and so did I."

Rules, perceptions and eras have been altered since Switzer broke records by breaking down the color barrier in the 1970s.

When the 2003 recruiting season kicks off next week, college coaches, now limited to six offcampus evaluation days and six face-to-face contacts with players,

will rely on costly scouting services, a network of talent evaluators and a color-blind approach in hopes of improving their teams.

To build his crimson-andcream dynasty, Switzer, the fourth-winningest coach in college football history, not only had a school worth selling but also minimal recruiting rules that allowed him 55 scholarships and five full-time recruiters stationed around the country

But mostly, Switzer relied on his past and his presence.

"Barry could do what a lot of other coaches at the time couldn't do, and that was feel comfortable in a black home," said Cowboys scouting director Larry Lacewell, a longtime friend who coached Switzer's defense in 1977. "He thought nothing of going in, taking off his shoes, propping up his feet and talking to mama for hours before he ever mentioned a word

about football. He was a great BS-

Growing up in the integrated poverty of Crossett, Ark., Switzer had the blue-collar, black-friendly upbringing to relate to the explosion of rising stars. He was so charismatic you'd bet on him selling humility to Antonio Bryant.

Or, as he did to Lacewell, have an affair with his wife, only to persuade Lacewell to join his coaching staff and later have Lacewell recommend him for a head coaching job in the NFL.

"My daddy was a bootlegger, a loan shark, and he got shot by a black woman who caught him sleeping with another black woman," Switzer said. "So I'd say I was in touch with black communities. Other coaches at major programs were uncomfortable in black homes, and the families could sense it. Did that give me an advantage? Hell, yes.

At a time when some restaurants and huddles were still segregated, Switzer integrated skilled black players into his famed Wishbone offense.

The Southwest Conference wasn't introduced to its first black recruit, SMU's Jerry LeVias, in 1966. When Switzer took over at Oklahoma in 1973, the conservative Frank Broyles entrenched at Arkansas. At Texas, where the Longhorns were less than five years removed from being college football's last allwhite championship team, there was traditionalist Darrell Royal.

As a recruiter, Switzer was younger, hipper and better. And soon, his teams would be the

"I was 35, and the guys I was competing against for recruits were closer to 50," Switzer said. "And I came along offering legitimate opportunities to black kids

at a time when most schools still had a quota system, still had a white hierarchy of trustees, regents, presidents, alumni and coaches. And I guess I was one of the few coaches who knew how to make the black families comfortable in their own home.'

While others entered poor homes with suits, ties, briefcases, entourages and tension, Switzer notoriously walked in by himself and wound up staying for supper.

"I knew those families had been scurrying around all day cleaning house and they were scared to death," Switzer said. "One of the first things I tried to do was to remove the intimida-

### Trail Blazers hold off Spurs' rally






