

Racial profiling report: Gray County deputies stop more white males in 2002

Males are more likely to be stopped for traffic violations by the Gray County Sheriff's Department than women, according to the first racial profiling report in the county.



Military recruiters try to drum up morticians

HOUSTON (AP) — Military recruiters some up to \$20,000, are for technical perare turning their attention to the dead as well as the living in the continuing armed forces buildup for possible war with Iraq, with the Bush administration challenging the dictatorship over weapons of mass destruction.

Offering a \$6,000 enlistment bonus, U.S. Navy and Marine Corps recruiters want morticians for special duty in Houston and several other cities worldwide.

Military recruiting for a volunteer military force, with emphasis on several desired technical areas, has been in high gear since the administration began ramping up for a showdown with Saddam Hussein.

The U.S. Navy Hospital Corps requires mortician applicants to be less than 35 years old and in good health. They also must have graduation credentials from an accredited mortuary school and a funeral director or embalmer license.

Stateside locations where morticians are also needed include New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, Philadelphia and San Diego.

In the military recruitment effort, enlistment bonuses of several thousand dollars ⁻ are common. Some of the highest bonuses,

sonnel in high demand, such as scientists, engineers and linguists.

The Navy Mortuary Affairs Program, which has worldwide responsibility for final disposition of deceased Navy and Marine personnel and their beneficiaries, promises interesting work and travel for those recruited.

"An enlistment award of \$6,000 is available as well as advanced (salary) rate upon completion of training," a job listing on www.hotjobs.com states.

A Navy representative did not return a telephone call early Monday from The Associated Press.

The Internet job posting states that the openings are worldwide and the jobs "will require relocating," possibly within the United States or to Italy, Spain or Guam. Morticians were part of a national medical emergency system activated by the

Health and Human Services Department following the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. The federal government sent teams of

morticians, anthropologists and forensic scientists to New York and the Pentagon to help identify the dead and prepare them for burial. Portable morgues and other emergency supplies were also provided.

Potential Democratic candidates test political prosects for 2004

WASHINGTON (AP) -With a half-dozen Democratic presidential aspirants already in the race, potential candidates in the next wave are about to test their prospects with party people and voters.

Rep. Dennis Kucinich of Ohio and former Illinois Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun say they're filing papers this week to run for president and will see what kind of response they get in the coming months. Retired Gen. Wesley Clark said he's thinking about a presidential candidacy and getting encouragement from others to run, but he has "no timetable."

The Democratic National Committee's schedule for speaking appearances by the candidates appeared to be a catalyst for decisions announced by Moseley-Braun and Kucinich. Only candidates who have said publicly that they're forming exploratory committees are going to be speaking, party officials say.

On Sunday, the 58-year-old Clark said, "Well, I have thought about it and a lot of

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people have asked me to think about it. The former NATO com-

mander said on NBC's "Meet the Press" that he has no timetable for deciding.

Both Kucinich and Moseley-Braun acknowledge they will give their candidacies a few months to see what kind of public response they get.

"It would be a cold day and probably a snowy day in hell before a liberal Democrat could get back to the White House, but it looks like my time has arrived," Kucinich said Sunday while driving on a snow-covered highway to meet with Democratic Party activists in Iowa.

Moseley-Braun said in Iowa: "If the American people respond to my message and respond to my candidacy, then it will be a viable one."

And Clark said he's thinking about running for president because he has worries about the Bush administration's direction in international affairs.

While Clark says he's not a member of a political party, "it

would be hard to conceive of running as a Republican only because the administration's policy is what's causing me to have these concerns."

"We're at a turning point in American history here. We are about to embark on an operation that's going to put us in a colonial position in the Middle East following Britain, following the Ottomans," he said. "It's a huge change for the American people and for what this country stands for."

Already in the race are former Vermont Gov. Howard Dean, North Carolina Sen. John Edwards, Missouri Rep. Dick Gephardt, Massachusetts Sen. John Kerry, Connecticut Sen. Joe Lieberman and the Rev. Al Sharpton.

Others are maneuvering to keep their options alive.

Aides to Florida Sen. Bob Graham said last week that he's going to be forming an exploratory committee in the next few weeks and will decide in April if he plans to proceed with a candidacy. Former Colorado Sen. Gary

Hart, who ran in 1984 and 1988, is giving four policy speeches around the country through early March and is listening to the response he gets from the public.

And Connecticut Sen. Chris Dodd is reportedly still considering whether he wants to get in the race.

With no clear front-runner in the mix, it is natural for the Democratic field to attract people who want to test how their message will be received.

Developments in the Iraq crisis:

- U.N. weapons inspectors visited three factories involved in missile production as the United States. focused on Iraq's missile program as a litmus test of its commitment to disarmament.

- A deeply divided Europe struggled to close a rift over Iraq and speak with one voice to Saddam Hussein. EU leaders held an emergency summit in Brussels, Belgium, amid warnings that continued disagreement could dilute the continent's influence on the world stage.

- French President Jacques Chirac said his country would oppose any effort to draft a new U.N. resolution to explicitly authorize war against Iraq at this time.

- Turkey's prime minister said it would be difficult to persuade parliament to allow tens of thousands of U.S. troops into the country before officials agree on the conditions of the deployment. Parliament had been expected to vote Tuesday and Washington has been warning Turkey that time is running out. A delay could hamper U.S. war plans to open a northern front in an Iraq war.







Tiger Woods returns to the spotlight

SAN DIEGO (AP) -Tiger Woods spent two months out of golf recovering from knee surgery, the longest layoff of his career. He needed only four days at the Buick Invitational to show that nothing has changed.

No pain in his left knee.

No rust in his game. No problem with Phil Mickelson.

No reason to believe he's any less capable of hitting great shots on demand, and

hoisting a trophy on the 18th green.

Woods was in control to the end Sunday, even conducting his own Q&A.

Yes, he played well. Yes, that was a big birdie putt on No. 5. Oh, it's great to be back and even better to have won against a strong field. "Any questions?" Woods

asked to end his monologue. No, he answered them all in the final round at Torrey Pines.

With another dominant performance in his first tournament since Dec. 12 surgery on his left knee, Woods closed with a 4-under 68 and

won by four strokes over Carl Pettersson of Sweden.

> He can still protect a 54hole lead better than anyone. Woods is 27-2 on the PGA Tour when he has at least a share of the lead going into the final round.

He's still the man to beat. Ernie Els won for the fourth time this year earlier Sunday in Australia — in fact, Woods watched the highlights before teeing off. They won't play in the same event until the Match Play Championship in two weeks.

Woods can still hit clutch shots, such as the 4-iron from 231 yards on the par-3 11th

"I know I answered my questions," Woods said. "Mine was whether this knee would hold up for 72 holes, and would it be sore. On top of that, my competitive feeling on the golf course came back. It was a successful week."

Woods finished at 16under 272 for his 35th career victory on tour, making it the third time seven years that he has started a season by winning.

Better yet, he left Mickelson in his wake again.

Mickelson, who a week ago poked fun at Woods by saying he used "inferior" equipment, never challenged in the final group and finished six shots behind with a 72.

"He's just a very impressive player," Mickelson said. "It isn't easy to step in and out of competition, and he never gives anything back. I knew I was fighting an uphill battle."

For Woods, the rush was not just walking up the 18th fairway to the cheers of an enormous gallery.

Loss to Baylor a blow for OSU

STILLWATER, Okla. AP) - Suddenly, a rugged stretch of the schedule looks even more difficult for Oklahoma State's basketball team.

The 13th-ranked Cowboys visit Norman on Wednesday to play No. 5 Oklahoma. Then they play home games against Texas and Texas Tech before visiting Missouri.

But first they have to make sense of what happened Saturday night, when Baylor - loser of 22 straight road games -- came to Gallagher-Iba Arena and won 74-72.

"That loss hurt," coach Eddie Sutton said. "We'll see how they react."

The Cowboys (19-4, 8 (2)didn't react well to an early run by Baylor 11-10, 2 (8)-. Sutton called three timeouts in the first 10 minutes, the first during a 12-0 run that gave the Bears a 13-4 lead, another after a fastbreak dunk gave Baylor a 22-9 lead, and the third a few minutes later with the lead still at 13.

"I think the disappointment I had with our basketball team, we let 'em get started," Sutton said. "When you're the favorite in a game want to get out and bust 'em and get ahead and make them come to you." Oklahoma did that to

Baylor one week earlier. The Sooners took control of the game from the start and beat the Bears by 49 points, their most-lopsided defeat in 20 years.

But Oklahoma State fell behind by 15 three times in the first half, then twice more early in the second half. Melvin Sanders, who scored a career-high 30, and Victor Williams helped the Cowboys gradually chip away at the lead, and finally they used their defense to drive a 14-2 run that gave them a 68-63 lead with just under five minutes remaining

"The longer you let a team like that stay in the game, an underdog, the more difficult they are to beat," Sutton said. "But once we got ahead by five points, the game should have been over."

It wasn't. The Bears, who made 14 3-point shots, hit from long range on three of their next four baskets to take the 74-72 lead. Oklahoma

"I'd say this ranks as one of the 10 worst defeats since I started coaching," he said.

Oklahoma State has gone 3-3 since winning at Texas Tech on Jan. 26 to get to 16-1 and 5-0. During that stretch, the Cowboys have shot 42 percent and their inside game has continued to struggle. Center Ivan McFarlin is averaging 7.6 points and five rebounds in those games he had zero points and five rebounds against Baylor.

"I don't know what's wrong with Ivan," Sutton said. "I thought he snapped out of it in the second half at Nebraska, but he's just a shell of himself as far as the way he's playing."

Waltrip's first Winston Cup victory came in the 2001 Daytona 500, in his first race with Dale Earnhardt Inc. After his latest victory, Waltrip paid tribute to the seven-time Winston Cup champion and Daytona's winningest driver with 34 victories, including the 1998 Daytona 500.



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

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

London toll charge goes in effect amid opposi

LONDON (AP) — Drivers heading into central London began paying a hotly debated \$8 toll on Monday, as a small group of people rallied to protest the ambitious attempt to ease traffic gridlock.

London Mayor Ken Livingstone has said the toll could end his political career, but it went into effect at 7 a.m. as promised. All car drivers entering the crowded 8-squaremile area of central London, which includes the bustling financial district, must pay.

Livingstone insists the drastic action is necessary to reduce congestion in the British capital, where traffic moves at an average of under 10 mph during the day and motorists spend half their driving time stuck in jams.

"There will be some problems, but by Easter I'm confident that this will have worked," Livingstone told British Broadcasting Corp. radio shortly after the charge came into effect.

But opponents insist it will put further pressure on London's overcrowded buses and creaking subway when thousands of motorists abandon their cars for public transport. They also predicted gridlock on roads surrounding the areas where the tolls would be levied.

But the BBC reported that the main arteries ringing central London were mostly empty. Monday was the first day of a oneweek school vacation, which usually reduces traffic by about 20 percent, the Automobile Association said. London Underground said business was normal on the subway, also known as 'the Tube.'

"The traffic looks OK at the moment," Livingstone's managing director of street management, Derek Turner, told television station Sky News. "The test will be later on."

Sky News showed a small demonstration near one of the entry points, which are marked with a

ed on signs and the road. About a dozen protesters waved banners and posters, but cars streamed across the boundary at a steady pace.

Steve Jordan, from Farnborough south of London, said he would do everything he could to avoid entering the zone. "It's another tax on people and we get ripped off enough," he said.

The BBC reported heavier than usual traffic heading into central London before 7 a.m., as some commuters appeared to try avoiding payment by reaching work early.

Even so, Livingstone admits that it could be his downfall. "But what's the point of being in politics if you don't do something with your position?" he told BBC.

Critics of the toll say its timing could hardly be worse. The overstretched London Underground is under added strain after a Jan. 25 crash on the busy Central Line, which remains closed until further notice. During rush hour, Kings Cross and Euston stations are regularly closed because of overcrowding on platforms.

New policy would deny overseas AIDS money to abortion promoters

WASHINGTON (AP) -By restricting the use of federal AIDS-fighting money by organizations that promote or perform abortions overseas, President Bush is trying to balance his firm anti-abortion health services in poor counpolicies with his new commitment to battle the AIDS epidemic.

Under the policy, such organizations' family planning operations would be prohibited Parenthood.

The plan drew praise Saturday from anti-abortion forces, but groups that advocate abortion rights and provide tries were angry. "They're placing a gag rule on health organizations," said Kirsten Sherk, spokeswoman for international programs at Planned

Outlined by a senior White House official and in a State Department memo, the policy deals with disbursement of federal money under Bush's proposed new \$15 billion global AIDS relief program to social service agencies that promote or perform abortions. To receive the money, they would have to administer AIDS programs separately from family planning, the official said.

Not all the conditions for acceptable compliance were immediately clear.

AIDS and birth control programs run by an organization in different countries probably would meet the test if the program finances were separate, the official said. Also probably OK would be a group's programs operated at distinct sites in a single country.

Death count reaches 21 after Chicago nightclub disturbance

CHICAGO (AP) - Hundreds of screaming guests rushed the exit of a crowded nightclub after someone set off a chemical spray, and at least 21 people were crushed to death in the panic, fire officials said.

"Everybody smashed; people crying, couldn't breathe," said clubgoer Reggie Clark. "Two ladies next to me died. A guy under me passed out."

Twenty-one people were confirmed dead, Chicago Police spokesman Pat Camden said.

There were more than 1,500 people in the two-story Epitome Night Club on the city's South Side when someone released pepper spray or Mace into the air sometime after 2 a.m., Fire Commander Will Knight said.

"It appears a disturbance from within led to a mass chaos where people headed for the door. Most of the fatalities appear to have been crushed or had injuries due to suffocation," said police Officer Ozzie Rodriguez

Cory Thomas, 33, went to the club to pick up two friends. As he waited outside, he saw people inside the club start to back up against the glass front door.

"You could see a mound of people. People were stacking on top of each other, screaming and gagging, I guess from the pepper spray. The door got blocked because there were too many people stacked up against it," he said.

"I saw them taking out a pregnant woman," Thomas said. "She was in bad shape. I saw at least 10 lifeless bodies."

Kristy Mitchell, 22, was one of the people trampled on the stairway.

"People were stomping my legs," she said. "When they pulled me up, I was dizzy and I couldn't breathe.

Knight said the total number of injuries was unclear because many of those with minor injuries were being taken to hospitals by family and friends.

Amishoov Blackwell, 30, was checking his coat on the second floor when people started rushing past him. The flow of the crowd pushed him back down the stairs and he fell on top of several people, he said. He was trapped on top of the others until firefighters rescued him about 30 minutes later.

"It wasn't nothing but two girls fighting," Blackwell said. "Why'd they have to spray Mace?"


The Rev. Jesse Jackson arrived at the scene early Monday and urged community members to help each other.

"We are asking area ministers to go to hospitals," Jackson said. "My people are overwhelmed with the suddenness of this. At a time like this, you have to lean on your faith."

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
