United Way to look at changing charter

Pampa United Way Inc. will consider a change in its Charter or Articles of Incorporation at its regular meeting at 5 p.m., Tuesday, April 1, in the board room of the Chamber of Commerce Building.

"When the Pampa United Way was incorporated in 1953, it had to state a specific time for its duration," explained Katrina Bigham, executive director. "Our 50 years are up. Now the law permits non-profit corporations to have a charter perpetually. The amendment would change our duration from the original 50 years to make it perpetual."

Under the provisions of the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act, the measure will be considered only by the Board of Directors instead of the regular membership.

City officials identify community concerns

The collective concerns of the Pampa City Commission are, in order of priority, infrastructure, financial stability and community image, although that does not necessarily reflect the individual priorities of the commissioners.

"If you don't have a good community image and promote the town," said Commissioner Faustina Curry, "it doesn't matter how good the streets are."

Three facilitators, led by John Hatchel, former temporary city manager of Pampa, were meeting with city staff today to develop strategies to deal with the commissioners' concerns.

The commission and department heads spent almost four hours Thursday afternoon at the Pampa Country Club with the three facilitators, all retired city managers from around the state, to identify and prioritize the commissions' goals for the coming year.

In his opening remarks, Hatchel recited the story of Alice in Wonderland and the Cheshire cat. Alice came to a fork in the road and asked the cat which road she should take.

The cat asked Alice where she wanted to go. "I don't know," replied Alice.

"Then it really doesn't matter," the cat said.

"Goals are the guidelines for action," Hatchel said.

They also provide a measuring stick and motivation, he added.

"Goals have to be something you really

want," Hatchel told the commission and staff.

While their initial list consisted of almost 20 items, the facilitators, Hatchel, Don Davis and Kerry Sweatt, helped the city officials narrow the list to seven general categories: infrastructure, financial stability, community image, recreation, promotion of the city, organizational development and charter revision.

Each of the categories consists of various concerns and goals city commissioners would like to see accomplished, ranging from street repair to upgrading 60-year-old water mains to providing more tennis courts to developing the tourist trade.

Curry, noting that a group of Pampa citizens were meeting this week with hotel officials in an effort to bring a new hostelry to the city, said that M.K. Brown Auditorium needed to be upgraded.

Commissioner Jeff McCormick said he would like to see better streets.

"We're constantly battling pot holes," said Public Works Director Richard Morris.

Commissioner Robert Dixon said he'd like to see more streets paved.

Pampa Fire Chief Kim Powell voiced concerns about the younger generation and the need to interest them in staying in Pampa rather than moving away.

Curry suggested an indoor soccer facility. Mayor Lonny Robbins suggested building a skate board facility.

"We need to figure out a way, within our constraints, to promote Pampa," said

War sounds
Sirens, blasts echo through Iraqi capital

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — With the sound of air raid sirens once again blaring, rumblings of explosions could be heard Friday as night descended on the Iraqi capital.

Tracers streaked into the sky over the west bank of the Tigris River, site of two presidential palaces and many government buildings including the headquarters of the Baath Party and the intelligence service.

Intermittent volleys of anti-aircraft fire rattled the city.

A semblance of normalcy had returned to Baghdad earlier Friday after U.S.-led bombings Thursday morning and then again at night. There was traffic on the streets, many shops were open and people were out during the daylight hours.

Iraq's information minister acknowledged Friday that one of Saddam Hussein's homes was hit in the earlier U.S. bombardment, but said no one was hurt.

"They rocketed the resi-

dence of his household," Mohammed Sa'eed al-Sahhaf said at a news conference. "But thank God, they are all safe."

Al-Sahhaf lashed out at the "criminal George Bush and his gang."

"They are superpower of villains. They are superpower of Al Capone," he said. "We will not allow them to get out of this quagmire which we trapped them in. They will see their end there."

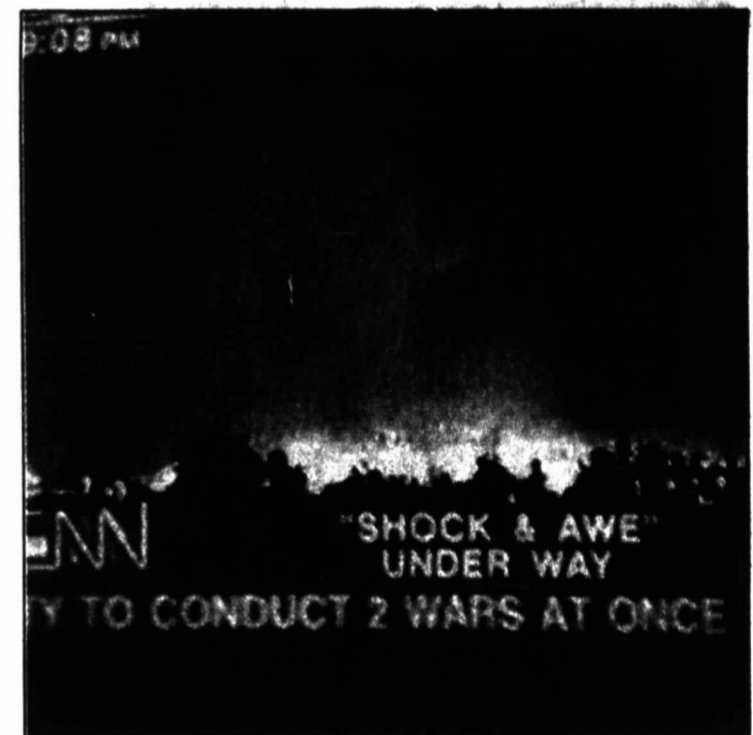
Saddam offered a reward of \$14,000 to any Iraqi who kills an enemy soldier, and \$28,000 to anyone who captures an enemy soldier alive, according to a decree reported by the official Iraqi News Agency.

A semblance of normalcy returned to Baghdad after Thursday night's bombing.

There was a great deal of traffic on the streets, many shops were open and many people were out on the street.

There was still a heavy security presence, including

Texas executes 300th convicted killer

HUNTSVILLE (AP) — Condemned murderer Keith Clay said he wasn't even aware Texas had the death penalty when he was arrested for killing a convenience store clerk during a robbery nine years ago, but he becomes a capital punishment history footnote as the 300th prisoner executed in the nation's most active death penalty state.

Clay's execution Thursday evening, the 11th this year in Texas, came a week after another inmate, Delma Banks, got within 10 minutes of lethal injection before he was spared by a U.S. Supreme Court reprieve.

Clay, however, had no similar good fortune.

The high court refused to review his case a week ago, there were no last-ditch appeals filed on his behalf and the Texas parole board wouldn't even consider his clemency request because it was filed 15 days too late.

"I would like to say first and foremost to the Lord God Almighty that I am sorry and forgive me of every single solitary sin I have committed these 35 years I have lived upon this earth," he said strapped to the death chamber gurney.

"I am truly sorry, and there is not a day that I have not prayed for you," he added, looking at relatives of his victim, who were watching through a window a few feet away.

He also told his mother he loved her and asked her to "let everyone know that I love them." She flashed him two thumbs up just before the drugs took effect. Eight minutes later, he was pronounced dead.

Clay's injection keeps Texas, which resumed carrying out punishments 20 years ago, on a pace to surpass the record 40 lethal injections carried out in 2000. Another is scheduled for next week and three more in April.

Texas accounts for more than one-third of the 839 executions in the United States since 1976 when the death penalty resumed under a Supreme Court ruling. Virginia is second with 87.

Authorities investigate apparent dragging death in Dallas

DALLAS (AP) — The disfigured body of an unidentified man was discovered early Friday in what police think is a dragging death.

Officers were responding to a burglary call in East Dallas when they found a body with tire tracks on it and a few other signs of an apparent dragging.

Traces of blood were found on nearby streets and a burned-out van was close to the site where the body was found, police said. However, police said, it's not clear if the van was related to the death.

Police are still trying to identify the man who is black, in his mid-30s and was wearing pajamas.

Sgt. Ross Salverino said information about the investigation would be released later in the day, but sought to ease fears that the death was race-related.

"If you're going to talk about some rumor that this is some kind of hate crime, no, there's nothing to that," he told The Associated Press.

Commissioner Jeff Andrews. Mayor Robbins voiced a concern about how the city appears to travelers driving through Pampa on U.S. 60.

City Secretary Phyllis Jeffers said that subject has been talked about for the 19 years that she has worked for the city, but nothing has ever been done.

City Manager Mitch Grant said the city needed to capitalize on its open space, particularly the parks.

"If you're going to attract people to your town," he said, "you've got to look attractive."

He also said the city needed to develop an identity.

Commissioner Dixon said the city had a reputation in other parts of the state as being against economic growth and taxes.

Pampa Police Chief Trevlyn Pittner said the city needs to work on its core values, respect, service, productivity, integrity, responsibility, innovation and teamwork.

Community Services Director Bill Hildebrandt suggested more emphasis on

hospitality.

Andrews expressed concerns about the financial stability of the city.

Dixon said Pampa is the most heavily-taxed city in the panhandle.

City Attorney Don Lane said the city, which now has a population of less than 17,000, needs to streamline services that were designed for a city of 30,000 while acknowledging the possibility of increasing them should the city begin to grow again.

Andrews pointed out that each dumpster in the city used to serve four people. Now they are more likely to serve two.

That, Hatchel said, means half the revenue from fees for garbage collection.

Grant said he would like to look into a low cost housing program and do something about dilapidated buildings that dot the city.

"Some or all of this," Robbins said, "is going to require a connection of the private sector and the city."

The city staff is expected to have an outline for the commissioners at their meeting Tuesday evening.

Coalition suffers 14 casualties

As the United States and Britain pushed into Iraq, the allies also suffered their first casualties — including a dozen American and British Marines killed in a helicopter crash that appeared to be accidental.

A U.S. Marine was the first to die in combat. His company was advancing on a burning oil pump station when he was shot in the stomach, a comrade said.

President Bush was informed of the death early Friday and expressed his regrets.

The Marine was from the U.S. 1st Marine Expeditionary Force, said Lt. Col. Neal Peckham, a British military spokesman in Kuwait. He died in the sweep on the Rumeila oil field in southern Iraq, where acrid smoke blackened the sky.

U.S. Central Command gave no other details.

armed members of the ruling Baath Party, security forces and police, and pickup trucks mounted with heavy machine guns.

The official Iraqi News Agency said 37 people were injured in Thursday night's raid at heart of Baghdad and in other locations in and around the city.

Standing next to Al-Sahhaf at the news conference was Interior Minister Mahmoud Diab al-Ahmed, carrying a Kalashnikov rifle and ammunition and wearing a military uniform and flak jacket with a knife in the pocket and a pistol on his hip.

"Some of you might be wondering why do I have a Kalashnikov in my hand and wearing a flak jacket," he said. "Because we have all in Iraq pledged never to relinquish our weapons until the day of victory."

Sahhaf also denied any U.S.-led advance into Iraq and argued that TV images of Iraqis surrendering were fabricated.

"Those are not Iraqi soldiers at all," he said. "Where did they bring them from?"

Al-Sahhaf suggested that any captured U.S. and British soldiers may not be treated as prisoners of war under the Geneva Conventions. Al-Sahhaf said Iraq was considering how to treat them.

"Those are mercenaries. Most probably they will be treated as mercenaries, hirelings and as war criminals. ... For sure, international law does not apply to those," he said.

A busload of journalists was taken to the main Al-Douri power plant, which was damaged in the 1991 Gulf War, where at least 12 human shields from Switzerland, Turkey, France and the United States are staying.

Senate votes to shave new tax cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted Friday to take \$100 billion over the next 10 years from President Bush's proposed new tax cuts to pay for the war with Iraq.

"We cannot blithely go along as if this were a time for business as usual," said Sen. Russell Feingold, D-Wis.

The 52-47 vote on Feingold's amendment to a budget resolution before the Senate was the first setback Bush has encountered in seeking new tax cuts totaling \$726 billion over the next decade.

The package includes elimination of the taxes that investors pay on dividends. Republican leaders used a parliamentary procedure that will allow the Senate to reconsider the vote later.

The House earlier Friday passed a \$2.2 trillion budget that kept Bush's tax proposals intact.

The Senate also voted 54-45 Friday against an amendment by Sen. Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., to increase by \$88 billion Bush's 10-year budget for homeland security. That set the stage for the key showdown on whether to cap the tax cuts at \$350 billion, less than half of what Bush wants.

The two senators who hold the pivotal votes — John McCain, R-Ariz., and Ernest

Hollings, D-S.C. — on Friday reiterated their intent to vote against the amendment trimming the tax cut in half, because they oppose any tax cuts during the war.

The Senate voted 77-22 to defeat Hollings' amendment rejecting any new tax cuts.

"We cannot cut taxes and raise spending until we know what the cost of the war is," said McCain, who opposes the overall budget because it includes the \$726 billion tax cut plan.

Praising the House action, Bush said in a statement Friday: "As we engage in action to ensure freedom and security, it is imperative that we stay focused on important domestic priorities, including creating jobs and strengthening growth at home."

The GOP-run House passed the \$2.2 trillion budget 215-212. It provides broad outlines of tax and spending policies for other committees to follow, and there is no guarantee the final tax bill will give Bush the combination of accelerated income tax cuts

and lower dividend taxes that he seeks.

Moderates leading the Senate fight to halve the Bush tax cut proposal made a long-shot plea to lawmakers opposed to all tax cuts, arguing their plan offered the best opportunity to stop the president's momentum.

"I would prefer no tax cut at this time, but that is not politically popular," said Sen. John B. Breaux, D-La.

Senators worried about paying for the war in Iraq, protecting the nation against terrorist attacks and reversing a growing deficit remained unconvinced. "This is playing for the needs of the campaign next year. And I'm for the needs of the country," said Hollings.

In the House, GOP leaders cemented the last few votes in favor of their budget when they made a late-night concession and matched the Senate's spending on veterans' programs, exempting automatic benefits payments from cuts and adding \$1.8 billion to the president's budget

for next year.

"It will allow us to fully meet our commitments to more than 2.6 million disabled veterans and widows who rely on VA benefit checks every month," said House Veterans' Affairs Committee Chairman Christopher H. Smith, R-N.J. "It's a major win."

GOP leaders also overcame opposition from moderates who disliked their budget's tax reductions and cuts in programs like Medicaid and agriculture. The centrists closed ranks and voted for the budget blueprint only after intensive lobbying by Vice President Dick Cheney, Treasury Secretary John Snow and other administration officials.

The wavering centrists heeded the orders delivered by the White House and Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill., to support the president while he waged war in Iraq. They made it clear they voted for the budget only because they expect a more acceptable version to emerge from negotiations between the House and Senate.

American churches' clergy-laity split on Iraq war shows a frequent pattern

The nation's ranking Christian clergy have formed their strongest anti-war alliance in at least a generation, but the people in the pews don't necessarily agree with their leaders.

There is opposition to the war among leaders of the Roman Catholic hierarchy, almost all the leaders of white, mainline Protestant denominations, and the heads of black Protestant groups.

But with war imminent, polls indicate a majority of the faithful support President Bush.

In the past, says historian Martin E. Marty, clergy successfully prodded parishioners' opinions on major social issues like alcohol prohibition and civil rights. But when it comes to war, lay Christians have gone along with the prevailing public sentiment, regardless of what they hear in church.

"The mainstream Protestant laity has been roughly where the public is as long as I've known them," said Marty, 75, a former University of Chicago professor regarded as the dean of American church historians.

"Barring some special factor, the laity is indistinguishable from the larger culture."

The Gallup Poll said in early March that 63 percent of those who said they attend church almost weekly favored a U.S. military invasion to end Saddam Hussein's rule, compared with 59 percent of the general public in the survey. The margin of error was 3 percentage points. A Pew Research Center poll question last month produced similar results.

Clergy opposition to the Vietnam War eventually grew even more intense than the current anti-war push — but it developed gradually after the conflict began, Marty says.

The clergy have not been so visibly opposed to the outbreak of hostilities since the pre-Pearl Harbor days of 1941, he says.

"Religious leaders are called to be leaders," said the Rev. Wesley Granberg-Michaelson, the anti-war chief executive of the Reformed Church in America. "If they know how to lead well, people will be influenced — not all, but certainly some."

The Rev. Robert Edgar, general secretary of the National Council of Churches and a peace activist, said religious leaders must say what they believe is right — even if some church members disagree.

"It's interesting to see how far apart we are from some of the laity," said Edgar, a clergyman in President Bush's United Methodist Church. "But that's not unlike the prophets and apostles of the Old and New Testaments" who were rejected by their own people.

In mainline Protestant denominations, the clergy-laity political divide first won wide notice in the late 1960s. By 1972, Dean Kelley's book "Why Conservative Churches Are Growing" warned that churches decline when they overemphasize politics and neglect spiritual substance.

Catholic clergy — sensitive to criticism that the faithful might follow the pope rather than the president — once sought to prove their patriotism and rarely questioned national policy.

But the U.S. bishops' made a statement against Vietnam policy in 1971, and that was a turning point. Since then, the hierarchy has made many pronouncements on foreign and domestic policy.

Judging from past conflicts, however, the current war debate won't be a make-or-break issue that will drive hawkish Christians from their denomination. Most simply accept they have a difference of opinion with their spiritual leaders.

Episcopalian Jim Oakes, a medical technology consultant in Washington, D.C., with a son in the Marine Corps, says his church's presiding bishop, Frank Griswold, can believe whatever he likes about war "as a private citizen."

But "I strongly object to his claiming to represent the body of the Episcopal Church, because he doesn't," Oakes said. "It's similar to a rock star making pronouncements on world peace. It's very interesting but what do they know?"

North Korea rejects U.S. concern over religious freedom

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — North Korea rejected U.S. concern about religious freedom in the communist country, calling American criticism a slur campaign.

In an annual report March 5, the U.S. State Department named North Korea as a country of concern for religious persecution, along with China, Iran, Iraq, Myanmar and Sudan.

Telling Washington to "mind its own business," North Korea's foreign news outlet KCNA said Monday that U.S.

censure was meant to "stifle and isolate" North Korea. It accused the United States of oppressing Muslims.

The U.S. assertion is "nothing but sophism intended to invent a pretext for impairing the image of (North Korea's) system and stifle and isolate it at any cost," KCNA said.

U.S. State Department spokesman Richard Boucher said the designation "countries of particular concern" is used to pressure governments to end religious persecution.

WHO to send team to Beijing to investigate mystery illness

BEIJING (AP) — The World Health Organization said Friday it will send a team to Beijing to investigate whether the outbreak of a flu-like illness that has spread to three continents and killed at least 10 people started in China.

Hong Kong health officials say they have traced the outbreak there to a visitor from the Chinese mainland who died of the disease March 4. The man, a professor, arrived in Hong Kong from Guangdong province where the disease erupted in November.

Henk Bekedam, the WHO representative in Beijing, said it now seems "more likely" the outbreaks are linked but added there are still many questions. The disease clearly needs "very close contact" to spread between people, he said.

"We are globally worried, and we're worried about what's happening in China as well," he said. "We know there are cases still here."

Bekedam also said reports of cases in Beijing are being investigated and that WHO has asked the Health Ministry about them but has "not heard anything back."

The U.N. agency said it will send a team of five people to China for five days beginning Sunday.

The WHO has declared the disease a worldwide health threat. The cause has not been confirmed, but health investigators are focusing on paramyxovirus, a family of virus that includes mumps and measles. German doctors and their Hong Kong counterparts reported finding it in case specimens there.

"It's very likely (the virus) is the cause of what is happening now. We still have to do a few laboratory tests to confirm that," Bekedam said.

The professor was one of at least 10 people who have died recently of the disease,

called SARS, or severe acute respiratory syndrome — six in Hong Kong, two in Vietnam and two in Canada. Five other deaths have been reported in China but have not been included in the WHO's official figures.

Six other guests at the hotel where the man stayed became infected and two died. Some were suspected of carrying the disease into Vietnam, Singapore and Canada.

Hundreds of people have come down with the disease. The vast majority are in Asia, but 13 cases are suspected in the United States.

The illness can be difficult to confirm because the symptoms, mainly fever and congestion, are similar to those for other many other diseases.

Chinese health officials say about 300 cases have been discovered in Guangdong, which borders Hong Kong. The official Xinhua News Agency said Friday the illness has hit seven cities in the province but that more than 70 percent of patients had recovered.

Alan Schnur, team leader of communicable disease control for WHO in Beijing, said China's provinces need to begin compiling more detailed and accurate health reports.

"The disease-reporting system needs to be looked at and brought up to times," he said.

Hong Kong health officials complained China was not cooperating fully in the fight to stop SARS from spreading. China was sending its health minister to Hong Kong on Friday in response to Hong Kong concerns.

"Both sides should be more sensitive and act quickly to any crisis," said Dr. Leung Ping-chung at Hong Kong's Prince of Wales Hospital, the site of most local cases of the illness.

Disagreement over use of Turkish air space delays U.S. overflights to Iraq

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — Turkey on Friday delayed opening its airspace to U.S. warplanes for strikes against Iraq despite parliamentary approval for the overflights, insisting the United States agree to its demands to move troops into northern Iraq, officials said.

U.S. and Turkish officials held overnight talks until early Friday, but failed to work out an agreement on the conditions of the overflights, Western diplomats said. Talks were expected to continue.

"The military and diplomatic basis must be prepared," said Deputy Prime Minister Abdullahi Sener. "The fact that the authorization was approved doesn't mean it is automatically put into effect."

When asked how long an agreement would take, Sener said: "It isn't an issue of time."

Turkey's parliament voted Thursday to allow the United States to use the airspace, a measure that would allow strike aircraft on carriers in the Mediterranean to fly more directly into Iraq. The United States could also use Turkish airspace to ferry troops into northern Iraq.

Parliament's resolution also allows Turkey to move its own forces into northern Iraq, where Turkey fears instability. Officials said Turkish insistence on sending troops there has prevented a final airspace agreement.

The United States opposes any unilateral move by Turkey into northern Iraq. Washington has warned a Turkish incursion could lead to friendly fire incidents with U.S. forces. Iraqi Kurdish groups say the move could lead to clashes.

Negotiations are also locked over Turkish

demands that the U.S. military provide information on the type of planes, their mission, and their destination ahead of the overflights, a Turkish military official said, speaking on condition of anonymity. The United States wants to be able to use the airspace without prior notification.

The United States hopes to see the agreement "implemented in the most immediate fashion," said a Western diplomat, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The United States also wants to use refueling aircraft at Incirlik air base in southern Turkey, but Turkey is balking, saying it is not part of the airspace agreement.

U.S. warplanes based in Incirlik have been used to patrol a no-fly zone over northern Iraq, and the refuelers were used as part of that mission.

Thursday's vote granting overflight rights followed intense lobbying by the United States, but fell far short of Washington's original request to send 62,000 soldiers to Turkey to open up a northern front against Iraq.

Polls show up to 94 percent of Turks are against a war, opposition that contributed to months of delays by Turkey's government. Parliament earlier this month failed to pass a resolution that would have let in U.S. ground troops for an Iraq invasion.

The United States had offered Turkey a package of \$15 billion in loans and grants in exchange for letting in U.S. troops for a ground war. The United States withdrew the aid package as war drew closer and it became clear that even if Turkey voted in favor, the military would not have time to bring in the units.

Suspected Tamil rebels sink vessel near Sri Lanka

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — A suspected Tamil Tiger rebel boat attacked and sank a vessel carrying Chinese fishermen off eastern Sri Lanka, killing 17 people on board, the navy said Friday.

The Chinese government said it was "extremely concerned" by the sinking, which appeared to be a case of mistaken identity.

The attack came as government and Tamil Tiger negotiators wrapped up a sixth round of peace talks in Japan aimed at resolving the 19-year civil war.

Both sides agreed to convene naval and political representatives within three weeks to try to prevent future clashes at sea, a Norwegian statement said.

The two sides have been under a Norwegian-brokered cease-fire since February 2002, but the truce is vague in rela-

tion to sea movement and people have been warned not to fish in the area.

The sunken vessel was carrying 23 Chinese and three Sri Lankans. Nine people were rescued by another Chinese vessel nearby, navy spokesman Jayantha Perera said.

"We believe other than those rescued, the rest have been killed," Perera said.

The rebels denied involvement in a message posted on their Web site, saying they told international cease-fire monitors that none of their gunboats were in the area.

The monitors said survivors reported being fired at with machine guns by eight boats of civilian-clothed Tigers.

Two survivors had gunshot wounds on their face and knees, said Teitur Torkelsson, a spokesman for the Norwegian-led monitors.

DEAR ABBY: On Wednesday, April 2, people across the country will observe the National Day of Hope for abused children, part of National Child Abuse Prevention Month. Its goal is to raise public awareness so that each of us will have the power to help an abused child if we so choose.

On a typical day, three children in the United States will die as a result of child abuse in the home. A report of known or suspected child abuse or neglect will be made to the authorities every 10 seconds. However, most people who witness an actual incident of child abuse will not report it.

We urge everyone: If you see something or hear something — do something. Suspicion of neglect or abuse is sufficient to make a report.

For information or local reporting numbers, call the Childhelp USA National Child Abuse Hotline at 1-800-4-A-CHILD (1-800-422-4453), 24 hours a day. All calls are anonymous and confidential.

DEAR SARA AND YVONNE: I hope your letter generates the attention it deserves. Children are some of our most vulnerable citizens. Here are some of the signs and symptoms of child abuse:

Physical abuse: unexplained burns, cuts, bruises or welts in the shape of an object; problems in school; fear of adults.

Emotional abuse: apathy; depression; lack of concentration.

Sexual abuse: inappropriate interest or knowledge of sexual acts; over-compliance or excessive aggression; fear of a particular person or family member.

Neglect: unsuitable clothing for weather; extreme hunger; apparent lack of supervision.

I caution readers to be aware that these are only indicators, and if people see them they should check into the situation more thoroughly. One should not immediately jump to conclusions based on one or two general symptoms.

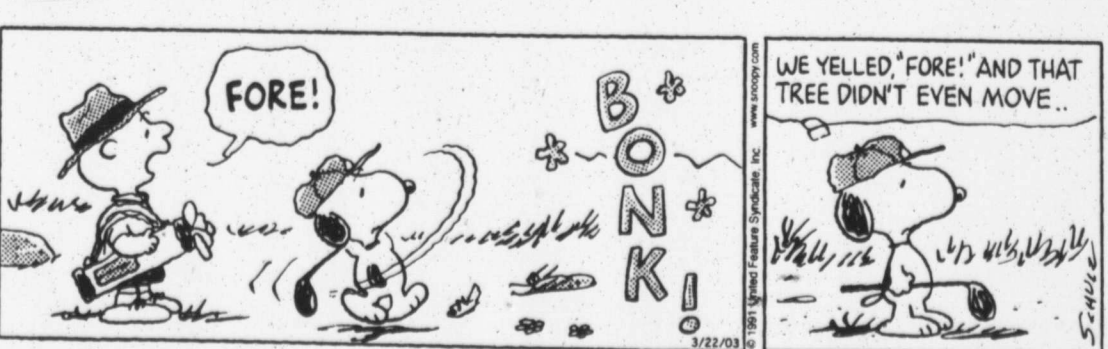

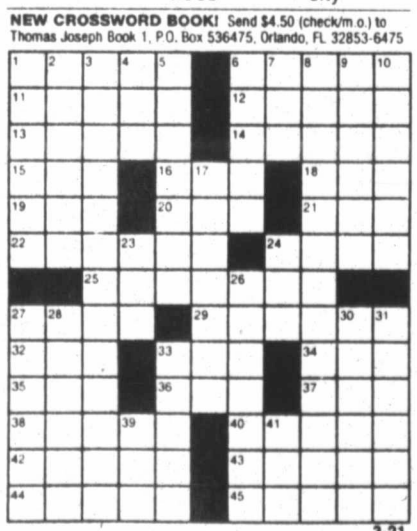

Kansas, Notre Dame hold on for victories

West

Kansas 64, Utah St. 61
OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — One year after surviving a scare against 16th-seeded Holy Cross, Kansas held on to beat No. 15 seed Utah State.

The second-seeded Jayhawks (26-7) questioned their seeding after winning the Big 12 regular-season title, but got more than just a tuneup from Utah State (24-9). They found a way to win, though — Utah State missed two 3-point tries in the final 10 seconds — and will play 10th-seeded Arizona State in the second round Saturday.

Keith Langford scored 22 points and Nick Collison had 18 for the Jayhawks. Desmond Penigar had 25 points for Utah State.

Notre Dame 70, UW-Milwaukee 69
INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — A day after shaving the heads of his Fighting Irish teammates as a show of team unity, Chris Thomas scored 27 points in his hometown to lead them past Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

The 12th-seeded Panthers had a great chance to pull off the upset, but Dylan Page missed a layup just before the buzzer after getting a terrific pass from Clay Tucker.

Torin Francis, who had 23 points and 14 rebounds, scored the winning points on a putback with 32.8 seconds left after grabbing a loose ball in the lane.

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. (AP) — The mastermind behind the betting scam that nearly produced a \$3 million payoff at the Breeders' Cup ended up with the least amount of jail time possible — a year and a day.

Computer programmer Chris Harn, who worked for a company that processes horse racing bets, could have received more than seven years in prison if he had not helped authorities, Judge Charles Briant said.

Co-defendant Glen DaSilva was sentenced to two years in prison and Derrick Davis received three years.

SURPRISE, Ariz. (AP) — Mike Sweeney continued his torrid spring pace, hitting two home runs and driving in five runs as Kansas City defeated the Texas Rangers 9-5 in an exhibition game Thursday.

Sweeney opened the spring 0-for-5, but came into the game on a 19-for-37 tear with three homers and nine RBIs.

"The key to good hitting is getting a good pitch to hit and not missing it when you get it," Sweeney said. "Barry Bonds hit .370 last season and had 198 walks. That tells me you have to be selective to be a good hitter. That's what I have to continue to do."

The three-time All-Star went 3 for 3, spoiling the performance of Rangers starter Joaquin Benoit. The 25-year-old right-hander struck out five and gave up four hits in 3.2 innings. One of the hits was Sweeney's three-run homer in the third inning that put Kansas City ahead 3-1.

Hank Blalock's solo homer had given Texas a 1-0 lead in the second inning.

Benoit was tabbed for his second loss of the spring. He was 4-5 in 17 games with Texas in 2002 and is in the hunt for one of the two remaining spots in the Rangers' five-man starting rotation. Benoit is hoping to join Chan Ho Park, Ismael Valdes and Jon Thompson.

"He had two good innings and then he got in trouble," manager Buck Showalter said. "We've had a lot of guys who've struggled like that. I can't say he hurt his chances to be a starter. There are a lot of factors well have to look at."

After Ruben Sierra extended his hitting streak to 12 games with a solo homer in the fourth that cut the lead to 3-2.

Sweeney connected on a two-run homer in the fifth off reliever Ron Mahay. Dee Brown added a two-run double to cap a four-run outburst that put Kansas City ahead to stay.

The Harvesters improved to 9-6 for the season while the Bulldogs are 6-11 overall.

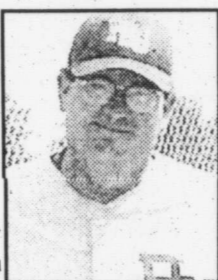

Astros to honor Astronauts

HOUSTON (AP) — The memory of the seven astronauts who died when the space shuttle Columbia disintegrated over Texas will weigh heavy on the Astros' opening day ceremonies in Houston, home of the manned space program.

Prior to the club's first game of the season April 1 — exactly two months after the shuttle disaster — an all-day street festival and midday pep rally will be followed by more somber events: a blood drive and a 45-minute pregame tribute to NASA.

The Astros will wear the STS-107 mission patch for the entire 2003 season in memory of the seven astronauts, who were killed when the shuttle broke up during re-entry on Feb. 1 after a successful scientific flight.

Representatives of the

seven Columbia astronauts' families will throw seven ceremonial first pitches. Members of the current astronaut program will be recognized on the field.

The actual first pitch against the Colorado Rockies is scheduled for 6:05 p.m.

Darius Rucker, lead singer of Hootie and the Blowfish, will sing the national anthem, accompanied by a giant American flag carried onto the field by 107 NASA employees. A trained bald eagle will circle Minute Maid Park.

All seven astronauts lived near and trained at the Johnson Space Center in far southeast Houston. The team's name, adopted for the 1965 season in the space program's infancy, is a nod to NASA's presence in the community.

Athletic events continue as war goes on in Iraq

Montreal hockey fans voiced their displeasure over the war in Iraq by booing the U.S. national anthem, while many athletes and coaches said the military action made their pursuits seem almost trivial by comparison.

Before the New York Islanders played the Canadiens on Thursday night, the crowd was asked to "show your support and respect for two great nations" before the anthems. But a significant portion of the crowd booed throughout "The Star-Spangled Banner."

"I came to the game pretty pumped up, but once I heard that it really got me going," said Islanders forward Mark Parrish, from Bloomington, Minn. "So I guess I can thank them a little bit for getting me more pumped up."

For the first round of the NCAA basketball tournament

Thursday, large decals of red, white and blue ribbons were put on the courts. Moments of silence were held at various venues, and spectators tried to get updates on the war during breaks in play.

"A lot of people sometimes compare playing out on the basketball court to a war. Then you suddenly realize it's a bad comparison," Manhattan's Justin Jackette said as his team prepared to face Syracuse on Friday in Boston.

"There are some kids overseas who are younger than us. It's not a game over there. They are risking their lives to protect our freedom."

Pittsburgh forward Donatas Zavackas didn't need a reminder. The 22-year-old senior from Lithuania said he remembers being 11 and watching footage of unarmed countrymen trying to defend a television transmitter from tanks when Lithuania gained its independence from the Soviet

Union in 1991.

He said he initially thought the tournament should be canceled because of the war. After hearing that members of the military were filling out brackets and following the tournament from overseas, though, he changed his mind.

"I didn't feel right to be playing and the same time a war is going on," he said. "I didn't think anybody should be having fun while they're fighting."

Many athletes saw the games differently, saying they can inspire the troops in the Middle East. After leading Marquette to a first-round victory, guard Travis Diener said he hoped word of the win gives a boost to his cousin, Army Lt. Derek Diener, who's serving as an officer in a Patriot missile unit in Iraq.

"Hopefully for a moment I can give him that pleasure, saying my cousin did this, they won and they're moving on,"

said Diener, who scored a career-high 29 points in Marquette's win over Holy Cross in Indianapolis. "So I dedicated this victory to him."

Detroit Pistons star Richard Hamilton expressed hope that games might provide a welcome distraction from the tense developments.

"It's weird, but we're giving fans and people around the world a source of entertainment," Hamilton said before the Pistons' victory over Philadelphia in Detroit. "If we can take people's minds off of the very important things going on for a couple of hours, I think that helps everybody."

As Tiger Woods approached the 18th green in the Bay Hill Invitational in Orlando, Fla., a young girl ran out to the fairway and handed him a small U.S. flag. In previous years, the girl has given Woods flowers. "She's just a little sweetheart," Woods said. Security was stepped up at

venues around the country, and fans were learning to cope with lines and extra screenings.

"I feel safe," said Todd Martin, competing in the Nasdaq-100 tennis tournament in Key Biscayne, Fla. "I feel like our country has done what they have been able to prepare for whatever might come next — if anything does come next on our soil."

The D.C. Marathon, scheduled for Saturday in Washington, was canceled because of the war and security concerns, and Japan's soccer team called off two exhibition games in the United States.

However, Japan's top female figure skaters, Yoshie Onda and Fumie Suguri, left Friday for the World Figure Skating Championships next week in Washington, D.C.

"There is no way I'm going to let the war stop me from competing," Onda said.

Pitino, Louisville back in NCAA tournament

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — It's not as if Rick Pitino ever really had NCAA tournament withdrawal while he coached the Boston Celtics.

He just became a fan instead of a participant.

"We all had our brackets out," the Louisville coach said Thursday on the eve of his return to the tournament he once ruled. "We were all kidding each other, whether you were a Kentucky grad or a Kansas grad."

"Everybody follows it so closely, but I did miss the feeling."

Pitino finally has that feeling again, accomplishing his charge to lead the once-mighty Cardinals (24-6) back to

national prominence and to their first Conference USA tournament title in his second season.

Fourth-seeded Louisville, which missed the tournament the past two seasons, faces No. 13 Austin Peay (23-7) in the first round of the East Regional Friday night.

No. 5 Mississippi State plays No. 12 Butler in the other East Regional game at Birmingham-Jefferson Civic Center.

The South Regional games pitted top-seeded Texas against No. 16 UNC-Asheville and No. 8 LSU against No. 9 Purdue. The marquee name in the group isn't on the back of a jersey — not Texas guard T.J.

Ford or Louisville's Reece Gaines.

It's Pitino, back where he belongs. In the process, he has joined Lefty Driesell, Jim Harrick and Eddie Sutton as the only coaches to lead four teams to the NCAA tournament.

His tournament pedigree — he led Kentucky to three Final Four trips and the 1996 national title — doesn't wipe out the jitters.

"At age 50, you wouldn't think that you'd have butterflies in being in it so much, but you do more than ever," said Pitino, who's won 26 of his 33 NCAA tournament games.

Perhaps past history has something to do with his nerves.

In 1987, Austin Peay took Pitino's Providence team — on its way to the Final Four — into overtime before losing 90-87 in Birmingham.

"With one second to go, they got two foul shots," Pitino recalled. "The score's tied, they miss both. We win in overtime."

The Cardinals weren't looking too stressed Thursday, dividing up for a 3-point shootout in their afternoon practice session followed by a dunk-a-thon at the arena.

"We're definitely relaxed and together as a team," Gaines said.

Besides Pitino, only Gaines and center Marvin Stone have tournament experience for

Louisville — and Stone's was at Kentucky.

Still the Cardinals have been to 29 NCAA tournaments and seven Final Fours.

Then there's Austin Peay. As the team media guide helpfully points out on Page 1, it's not located in Austin, Texas, and Peay is pronounced "like the Southern vegetable" black-eyed pea.

Total NCAA tournament wins: Two, in four appearances. The Governors earned their first NCAA trip since 1996 by winning the Ohio Valley Conference tournament.

"This is a really big moment for us. It's a really big moment for our school," center Josh Lewis said.

Tiger one stroke back at 2-under

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — The Bay Hill Invitational didn't produce a clear-cut leader after the first round, only a unanimous opinion about the golf course.

"If these greens get baked out, if the wind stays up like this, it could be one of the tougher golf courses we'll face, except for the majors," Tiger Woods said after two birdies on his final three holes gave him a 2-under 70.

That kind of score is usually good enough to be in the middle of the pack. On his occasion, it left him only one stroke out of the lead and licking his chops about what the rest of the week might hold in his bid to win Bay Hill for the fourth straight year.

"If we get no rain, it should be awesome by the weekend," he said.

Not many felt that way, only the guys at the top.

The list ran a half-dozen deep — Stewart Cink and Jonathan Kaye, in the first group out Thursday morning, were later joined by J.L. Lewis, Jeff Maggert and a couple of foreign youngsters, Aaron Baddeley of Australia and Trevor Immelman of South Africa.

Immelman, 23, was the only one at 69 who teed off in the afternoon.

"Every time I hit my bad shots, I managed to find a way to get away with it save my par," Immelman said. "And every time I hit a good shot, I converted. All in all, it was an extremely pleasing round for me."

Not everyone felt that way.

Nine players failed to break 80, and David Duval was on the verge of joining that group until he made good pars on the final two holes to salvage his 79. Duval sat on the tailgate of a jeep in the parking lot and summed up the scoring.

Spurs whip Mavericks in overtime

DALLAS (AP) — If Tony Parker keeps showing so much poise and ability at such a young age, the San Antonio might even think twice about pursuing Jason Kidd as a free agent this summer.

Parker nailed a twisting fadeaway with 29.3 seconds left in regulation to put the Spurs ahead, then came up big again in overtime with a spectacular shot over two 7-footers with 1.2 seconds left that gave the Spurs a 112-110 victory over the Dallas Mavericks on Thursday night.

It's tough for anyone to come through like that. For a 20-year-old to do it is even more impressive. And to do it in a game with major playoff ramifications?

"That's why he's going to have a great career in this league," said Dirk Nowitzki, Dallas' own young rising star, who had 34 points and 12 rebounds.

Tim Duncan had 25 points and 18 rebounds, and Parker and Malik Rose each had 22 as San Antonio moved within 2 1/2 games of Dallas in the race for the NBA's best record and, just as importantly, the Midwest Division.

The Spurs, who have won seven of eight, are guaranteed of no worse than tying the season series, which is important because that's the first tiebreaker. San Antonio also has two more conference wins than Dallas, putting it ahead in the next tiebreaker. The teams meet

A good round Friday, and he might wind up in the mix.

No one else broke par, which was just fine with Arnold Palmer.

Told that some of the players were complaining about the course being set up too difficult — tough pins, greens that sounds like they had a layer of concrete beneath them — the 73-year-old tournament host made mock frown.

"Aaahhh, that's too bad," Palmer said. "What the hell? It was the same for everybody. What do they do when they play the national Open? Or the TPC? Or the Masters?"

"I had the worst score on the board, and I thought the golf course was fair."

Palmer had an 87, his worst score at Bay Hill, but he wasn't bringing up the rear. Club pro Charlie Meade had an 89.

"This golf course doesn't let up, which is good," Baddeley said. "You're going to find out who's playing the best this week."

Ernie Els might have been closer to the lead if not for one hole. He three-putted from 4 feet on the par-3 14th and took triple bogey, giving him a 74. Then again, his approach to the 18th caromed off the rocks and onto dry land, and Els made a 20-footer for par.

"I think it's the toughest golf course I've played this year," said Els, who has won twice in Hawaii and twice in Australia.

Spurs whip Mavericks in overtime

DALLAS (AP) — If Tony Parker keeps showing so much poise and ability at such a young age, the San Antonio might even think twice about pursuing Jason Kidd as a free agent this summer.

Parker nailed a twisting fadeaway with 29.3 seconds left in regulation to put the Spurs ahead, then came up big again in overtime with a spectacular shot over two 7-footers with 1.2 seconds left that gave the Spurs a 112-110 victory over the Dallas Mavericks on Thursday night.

It's tough for anyone to come through like that. For a 20-year-old to do it is even more impressive. And to do it in a game with major playoff ramifications?

"That's why he's going to have a great career in this league," said Dirk Nowitzki, Dallas' own young rising star, who had 34 points and 12 rebounds.

Tim Duncan had 25 points and 18 rebounds, and Parker and Malik Rose each had 22 as San Antonio moved within 2 1/2 games of Dallas in the race for the NBA's best record and, just as importantly, the Midwest Division.

The Spurs, who have won seven of eight, are guaranteed of no worse than tying the season series, which is important because that's the first tiebreaker. San Antonio also has two more conference wins than Dallas, putting it ahead in the next tiebreaker. The teams meet

again in the season finale April 16.

"We had a chance to put a cushion between us and them," said Mavericks guard Nick Van Exel, who had a season-high 35 points to help make up for the absence of Michael Finley, out with a strained hamstring. "We just have to stay positive."

In the only other games Thursday night, Sacramento beat the Los Angeles Lakers 107-99, and Detroit defeated Philadelphia 113-85.

The Kings have a 3 1/2-game lead over Portland in the Pacific, a race that likely will settle the second seed in the West. The Dallas-San Antonio runner-up is almost a lock for the third seed.

"The Mavericks control their own destiny," Duncan said. "What we're worried about is our end of it. Whatever happens, happens

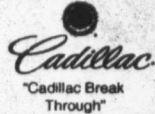

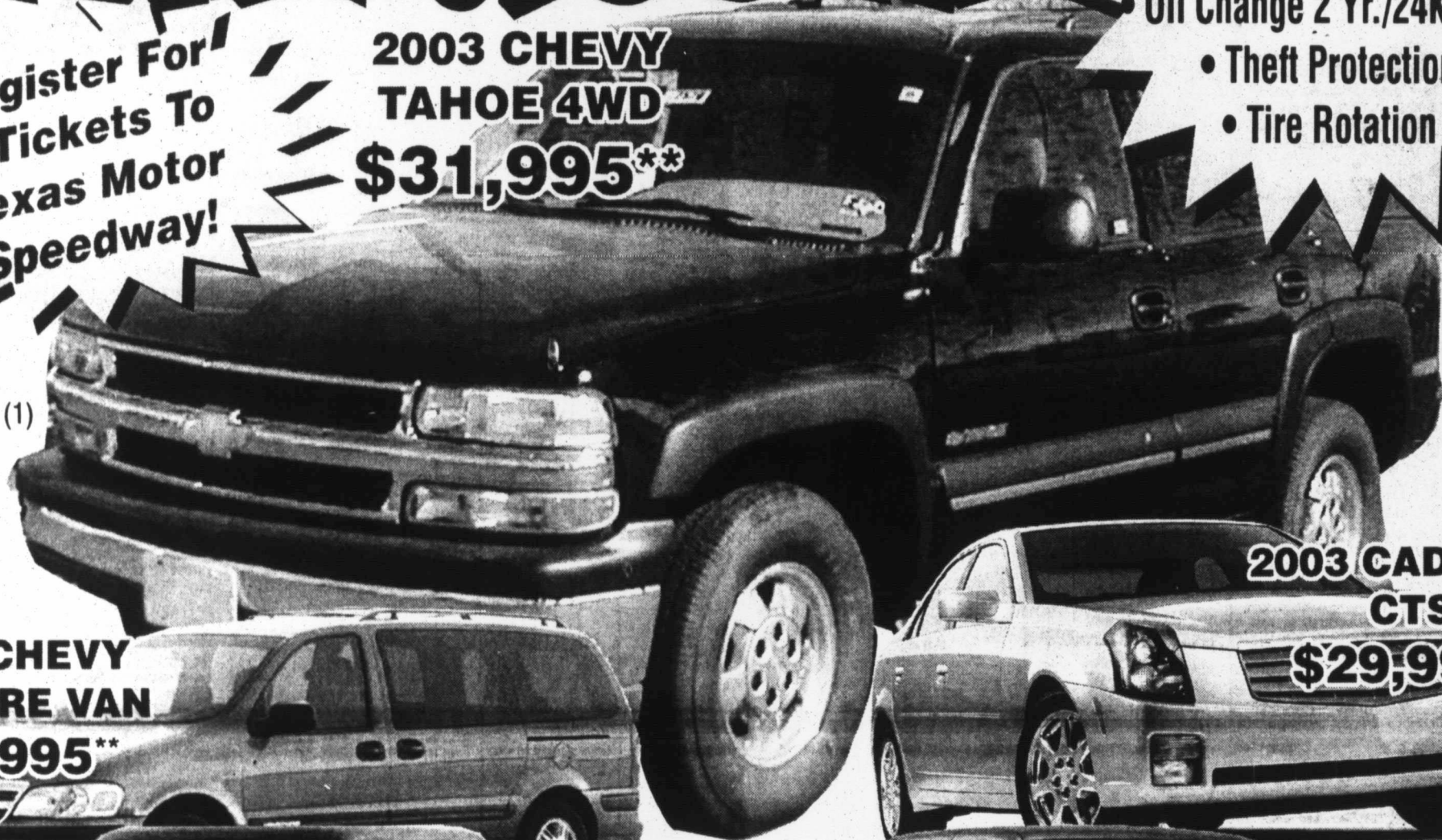

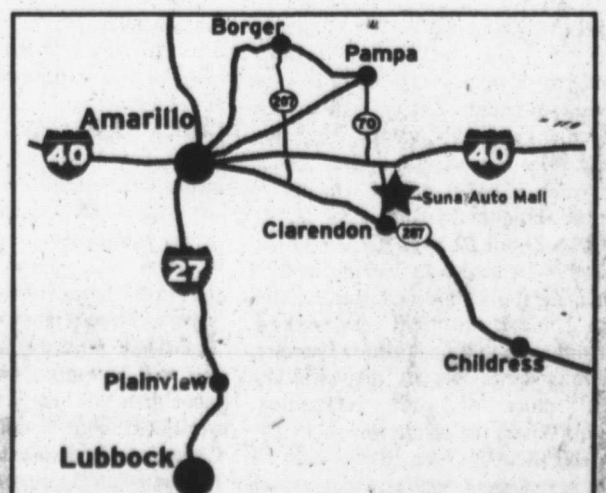
