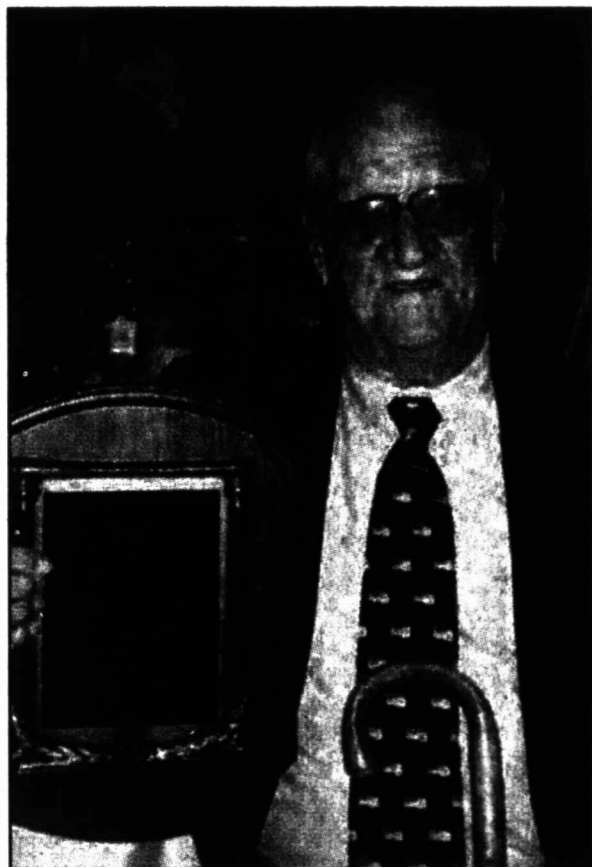

Two residents who both initially came here through the Pampa Army Air Field were named 2003 Citizens of the Year at the Chamber of Commerce banquet Thursday night.

Thelma Bray first came to Pampa as a civilian worker at PAAF and Mike Porter was stationed at the military installation while receiving his training.

Bray has been active beautifying and promoting Pampa for years, said Darlene Birkes in her nomination of Bray.

Active in youth activities while her three children were living at home, she later invested her talents in Pampa Garden Club concentrating on landscaping at Aspen and other parks, promoting rose gardens at the fire stations as well as promoting landscaping at some schools and the post office.

As chairman of the Civic Beautification Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, she originated the plans for the Hike and Bike Trail. She also designed, planned and directed construction of a patio garden at a local convalescent home.

She organized the Pampa Environmental Beautification Foundation which obtained the funds

Bunker busters bomb Baghdad

The biggest bombs dropped on Baghdad so far — two 4,700-pound "bunker busters" — struck a communications tower Friday in an intense U.S. bombardment. In the south, British officers said Iraqi fighters defending the besieged city of Basra fired on hundreds of civilians trying to flee.

U.S. Marines and Iraqi forces traded tank and artillery fire throughout the day in the strategic southern city of An Nasiriyah, one of the areas where resistance has been unexpectedly tough. Several buildings, including the power plant, were ablaze.

An Nasiriyah, a city of about 500,000 on the Euphrates River near a junction of roads that lead from Kuwait to Baghdad, has been the scene of some of the fiercest fighting of the war. Helicopters flying over the area were drawing almost continuous small arms fire and rocket-propelled grenades.

Farther south, the British have encircled Basra and said their troops were trying to rescue and aid civilians wounded by the mortar and machine-gun fire from paramilitaries loyal to Saddam Hussein. A young woman badly wounded by shrapnel was driven to safety in a British vehicle, according to reporters near the scene.

"Here perhaps are the first pieces of evidence of Iraqi people trying to break free... and clearly the militia don't want that," said Col. Chris

Vernon, a British spokesman. British officers said soldiers from the 1st Black Watch battalion, in Warrior armored fighting vehicles, were trying to wedge themselves between the militia fire and the targeted civilians.

At Umm Qasr, near Basra, the first ship arrived at the allied-controlled port with relief supplies for Iraqi civilians. The Sir Galahad, a British ship, carried 255 tons of water, rice, cooking oil, sugar, beans and powdered milk, as well as medical supplies, blankets and emergency ration packs.

Fighting raged across the south and a showdown in central Iraq over Baghdad was clearly drawing closer. With a new front opened by paratroopers in the north, U.S. forces are poised to move on the capital from multiple directions.

Wary of engaging the better-armed allies in open desert warfare, Saddam's government has been goading them to send ground troops into the city.

"The enemy must come inside Baghdad, and that will be its grave," said Defense Minister Sultan Hasidim Ahem. "We feel that this war must be prolonged so the enemy pays a high price."

U.S. Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld, briefing congressional committees in Washington, suggested American troops might lay siege to Baghdad rather than invade, in hopes its citizens would rebel against the government. Rumsfeld drew com-

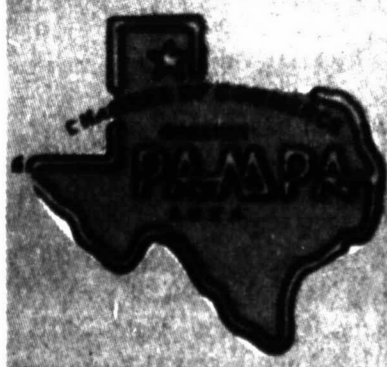

Republicans overcome Democratic resistance and pass tort reform bill

AUSTIN (AP) — After more than a week of long days and bitter infighting, Republicans showed how formidable their grip on the Texas Legislature is by overcoming Democrats' rigorous opposition every step of the way while passing by a vote of 99-45 a House bill designed to limit lawsuits.

The vote came after lawmakers concluded debate late Thursday night on almost 200 proposed amendments to sweeping legislation intended to transform civil litigation in the state. The process was marred by alleged scandal, partisan politics and fiery debates on the House floor.

Among the provisions of the bill are new rules on class-action lawsuit filings, limits on which parties must pay for damages, new protections for retailers and manufacturers, and a measure that would allow a judge to refer some cases to applicable state agencies before going to trial.

The bill also would place a

\$250,000 cap on non-economic damage awards such as pain and suffering in medical malpractice lawsuits.

"I have told you at the beginning and I will tell you again now, we have set out to provide meaningful remedies to those who have been wronged and to protect the rights of those who have done no wrong," Rep. Joe Nixon, R-Houston, said in final testimony for the bill he authored.

Four Democrats gave closing testimony against the lawsuit reform bill before Nixon spoke in favor of it.

Democrats sought repeatedly to seek exemptions in the cap, but one after the other, Republicans knocked down the proposed changes — with votes almost starkly along party lines.

One amendment, by Rep. Craig Eiland, D-Galveston, would have exempted children, elderly and mentally handicapped citizens who either cannot work or who earn very little.

"Some people in this society are not measured by their paycheck," Eiland said. "I'm trying to make sure that our most vulnerable populations have a chance to be adequately compensated."

ly compensated."

Nixon argued against Eiland's amendment, saying exemptions to the proposed caps would defeat the purpose of limiting frivolous lawsuits.

"We've got to hold fast on what we're trying to do on a public policy decision."

"It's overreaching. It goes too far. It's not balanced but we do thank you for taking the time," Eiland said, urging lawmakers to vote against the measure. "It was important to have a fair debate and now you know everything that is in this bill. I apologize for the time that it took, but it is an important bill."

The amendment was tabled 88-55, largely along party lines.

Eiland also lost efforts to establish guidelines for compensating people who stay at home with their children and other people who do not work.

Proponents of the bill said current law already protects the people whom Eiland's amendments addressed.

Rep. Garnet Coleman, D-Houston, said the bill was being passed "on the backs of children."

Also Thursday, an attempt to require juries to "reasonably reflect the ethnic diversity of the county in which the action is filed" was voted down, also along party lines.

Democrats used several legislative maneuvers, but Republican House Speaker Tom Craddick, a staunch supporter of the measure, was quick to overrule their objections at every turn.

and paid for the landscaping funds for M.K. Brown Auditorium, initiated the onion sculpture by Al Smith for Cuyler Street Park and provided landscaping funds for several parks.

As Birkes described Bray's efforts in her nomination, she said Bray "virtually funneled donations to make Pampa a better place in which to live.

"Many of the projects were from ideas by Bray," said Birkes.

Bray's interests have not been limited to horticultural.

She wrote the by-laws and applied for the 501(c)3 non-profit status. The foundation concentrated more on art in the parks because it did not have to be maintained as often as landscaping, and initiated the Art History Wall for the Texas Sesquicentennial.

As chairman of the Civic Development Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, she organized the Festival of Christmas Trees and Gift Boutique. She served as chairman of the 80th birthday celebration for Gray County.

As a member of the Pampa Army Air Field Reunion Association, she helped organize the Pampa Army Air Field/VFW Museum which is now known as Freedom Museum, U.S.A.

She has continually worked with preservation groups of patriotic nature.

She has also been quite active in her church, serving in capacities as secretary, Sunday School teacher, youth director and organizer of religious shows.

Bray constantly uses her creative ability to further Pampa, said Birkes.

"She is interested in a variety of areas, from beautiful plantings for citizens to enjoy to putting Pampa on the map through highlighting the contributions of a one-time resident, Woody Guthrie," said Birkes.

"When she volunteers for a project, she completes it to perfection, as for example organizing the displays by 40 organizations and following up by compiling a booklet of histories written by the displays for the Centennial," Birkes wrote.

She said Bray has worked tirelessly since 1991 to promote the memory of Woody Guthrie in Pampa where the poet-lyricist and folk balladeer lived from 1929 to 1936.

The former Harris Drug Store where Guthrie worked while in Pampa was acquired and will become the Woody Guthrie Folk Music Center largely due to Bray's efforts.

Now in her 70s, Gray is a retired postal

clerk, and continues to donate her time to projects to benefit the Pampa community.

Mike Porter came to Pampa in 1942 and trained at PAAF until his graduation in 1943.

He married a lifetime Pampa resident, Dorothy Stone, in September 1943, before going off to World War II.

He flew B-24s and flew 50 missions as first pilot from March 1944, to September 1944. When he returned to the United States he served as an instructor until February 1945.

He then became Commander of Aircraft Recognition School at Lowry Field, Denver, Colo.

When he left the military in September 1945, Porter had received an Air Medal and four Oak Leaf Clusters, the Bronze Battle Star with five stars, the Unit Citation with two stars, the European Theater and the Reserve Medal.

He remained in the reserves from 1945 to 1968 as deputy commander and training officer for the 9913rd and 9833rd VART Squadron. He retired from the Air Force in December 1980.

Porter maintained his own construction business from 1950 to 1962. During that time, he worked extensively with Boy Scouts of America in several capacities.

He also worked in his church as a Sunday School teacher and leader and building supervisor on volunteer building projects. He worked with youth groups at the church and he and his wife began a Singles Sunday School Class more than 30 years ago. He has also worked with the bus ministry.

In his retirement, Porter has helped to build several buildings for church-related organizations.

He was instrumental in the beginning of the now Freedom Museum, USA, at 600 N. Hobart. He continues to work and give tours at the museum where he has been curator since 1995 in his efforts to preserve the military history.

In 1991, Porter was inducted into the Veterans Hall of Fame. In February 2001, Porter received the Distinguished Flying Cross by Congressman Mac Thornberry at the air field in Wichita Falls.

The award was supposed to have been made to him during WWII, but never reached him. It was given because of a mission over Friedrichshafen, Germany.

Porter continues to speak at schools, colleges and museum associations to relay the history of WWII to young Americans.

He coached in the Optimist Club with both boys and girls over a 20-year period.

parisons with Basra, where British troops have delayed an assault in hopes Iraqi defenders give up or are toppled by anti-Saddam civilians.

The Army's senior ground commander in Iraq, Lt. Gen. William S. Wallace of V Corps, told reporters of The New York Times and Washington Post on Thursday that unexpected tactics by Iraqi fighters and stretched supply lines were slowing down the campaign. "The enemy we're fighting is different from the one we'd war-gamed against," the papers quoted Wallace as saying during a visit to the 101st Airborne Division headquarters in central Iraq.

Brig. Gen. Vincent Brooks, at the daily briefing at U.S. Central Command in Qatar, insisted U.S. war planners had not underestimated Iraqi fighting capabilities, but said acknowledged that battlefield commanders may be seeing a "more precise" reality of resistance than headquarters. He accused the Iraqis of using "terrorist death squads" who changed in and out of civilian clothes.

Brooks also said U.S. and British troops were expanding TV and radio broadcasts in Iraq, including Baghdad, aimed at reassuring civilians and encouraging soldiers to capitulate.

Near the south-central city of Ad Diwaniyah, one Marine was killed and another injured in fighting with Iraqi irregulars at a cement plant in what one Marine officer, Lt. Col. B.P. McCoy, described as "blue-collar warfare." Two other Marines were killed when a vehicle ran them over while they slept.

In Baghdad, smoke drifted across the city.

U.S. officials said bombs and Tomahawk missiles struck

several communications and command-and-control facilities in the city, including the tower hit by two "bunker-busters" dropped from a B-2 bomber. One of Baghdad's main telephone exchanges was hit and gutted, but phones were working Friday in many parts of the city.

Iraqi Information Minister Mohammed Saeed al Sahhaf told reporters that 75 civilians had been killed and 290 wounded in U.S. and British bombardments overnight, including seven deaths in Baghdad. He also said Iraqi forces destroyed or damaged several allied vehicles and killed four soldiers in an attack on a convoy near Najaf, less than 100 miles south of Baghdad.

Sahhaf rejected allied contentions that Iraq planned to use chemical weapons. Sahhaf said having such equipment is standard for any army.

Iraqi state TV broadcast a

sermon by cleric Abdel-Ghafour Al-Qusi; a Kalashnikov rifle was seen resting against the pulpit. "May God install terror in the hearts of our enemies," he said.

Nine days into the war, Pentagon officials said close to 90,000 U.S. troops were in Iraq, with 100,000 to 120,000 more on the way. Some will be deployed in northern Iraq, joining 1,000 airborne troops who parachuted in Wednesday night to secure an airfield.

A paramount U.S. objective in the north is to seize the valuable oil fields near the city of Kirkuk, about 80 miles from the airdrop site.

Russian President Vladimir Putin described the war Friday as a threat to global stability and the most serious crisis since the end of the Cold War. He called for an end to the fighting, and resumption of U.N. efforts to forge a political settlement.

**Arizona rolls past Notre Dame, 88-71**

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Arizona took all the drama out of this one early.

After beating Gonzaga by one point in a double-overtime classic, the top-seeded Wildcats rolled right over Notre Dame 88-71 Thursday night to advance to the West Regional final.

Arizona will face Kansas in the regional final.

Luke Walton, last seen sprawled in exhaustion on the floor in Salt Lake City after grabbing the final rebound in the second round, had 16 points, seven boards and eight assists for Arizona.

Fellow senior Jason Gardner added 19 points in his school-record 134th career start. Channing Frye had 14 points and 12 rebounds, and Hassan Adams added 14 points.

The Wildcats (28-3) are in the round of eight for the first

time since 2001, when they lost to Duke in the national championship game.

Torin Francis had 25 points on 10-of-11 shooting — more than double his average — and 10 rebounds to lead the Irish (24-10). Chris Thomas added 20 points.

Neither team led by more than five points before Arizona took command with a 22-3 run that gave the Wildcats a 47-29 lead with 5:56 remaining in the first half. There were eight lead changes and seven ties by half-time, which ended with Arizona ahead 53-40.

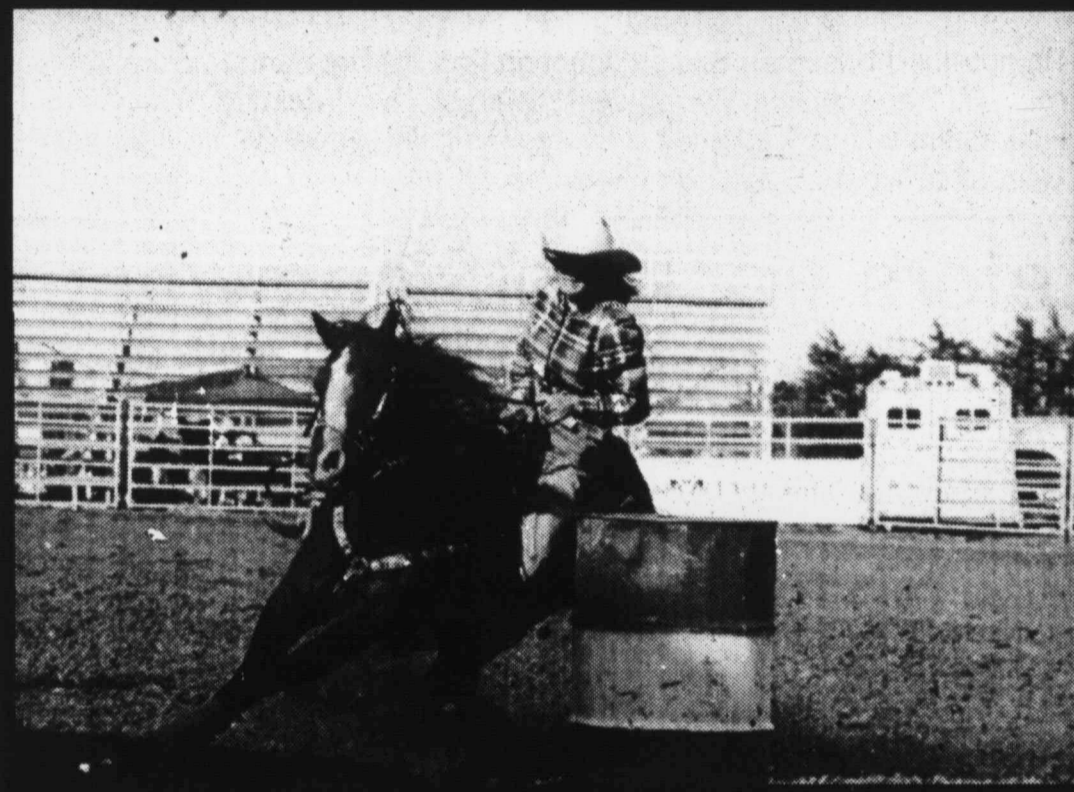
**Miami Cowgirl**

make the team.  
Pete Incaviglia (1989) and Dean Palmer (1994) also hit seven homers.  
Teixeira has played mainly at first, third and designated hitter during spring training.

He was the Rangers first pick in the 1999 June draft and 5th overall.  
As a rookie in 2002, Blalock was the youngest player in an opening day lineup at 21 years, 4 months. Blalock played in 42 games and hit .211 with three home runs and 17 RBIs for the Rangers.

After a slow start, he was sent down to Triple-A Oklahoma on May 12 where he hit .307 with eight home runs in 85 games earning a

September call-up.  
Blalock and Herb Perry were fighting for the starter's job this spring. Perry never played in a major league exhibition game and was finally placed on the 15-day disabled list Monday.

## Major Applewhite: An outstanding man of God

How do you ever know for sure what any person is really all about? What they really stand for and believe? What their real priorities are? Is there any way to really know?

I believe there is. If you really want to know what John Doe is like "deep down," just check him out during the tough times in his life. Don't bother with the successful days or the fun days. That won't tell you much. Check him out on the darkest days, and you'll see clearly who the real John Doe is.

I want to take you on a brief tour of a man's life. His name? Major Applewhite. If you are a Texas Longhorn fan, you'll recognize his name immediately.

For three seasons, he was the starting quarterback for the Longhorns.

He owns 48 of the individual offensive records at UT. He is a dedicated Christian, and during his UT football career, he did more speaking at Fellowship of Christian Athletes events than anyone else. But that doesn't really tell you what Major Applewhite is like "deep

down." Remember, the "deep down" part of a person is only visible during the dark days. Let me tell you about his dark days.

At the outset of the 2001 football season, Major Applewhite (senior) was benched and replaced by superstar Chris Simms, son of NFL great Phil Sims. Major Applewhite had been the

unquestioned leader of the team for three years and had broken all of the significant records and was looking forward to his final season as a Longhorn.

He warmed the bench every single game throughout his senior season. Not what he had planned and dreamed. All season long, I remember reporters interviewing him and Chris, trying to get some dirt and controversy to highlight on the evening sports. Neither one fell for those traps. Of course, it was easy for Chris to avoid the traps; he was starting every game and playing the whole game. Can you imagine how hard it must have been for Major not to express his disappointments or disagreements?

Applewhite is a dedicated Christian. That means he loves the Bible. By his own words, the passage that he trusted in the whole year was I Peter 5:6-7. "Humble yourselves, therefore, under the might hand of God, that He may exalt you at the proper time, casting all your anxiety upon Him, because He cares for you."

He just kept trusting in this scripture and working as hard as he could at keeping himself prepared "just in case."

Throughout the whole season he not only didn't complain or gripe, but he worked as hard as he could to help Chris Simms be the best quarterback that he could be. Chris then broke Applewhite's single season passing record. How would you be feeling if you were Applewhite? How would you be acting?

Then came Saturday, Dec. 1. Number three Texas (in the hunt for the national championship) played No.9 Colorado. Colorado had just knocked off Nebraska the week before.

Chris had his worst game of the season that day. Texas was down 29-17 at half. But then came the second half; the half of exaltation. The second half was the fulfillment of God's promise: "... that He may exalt you at the proper time."

Applewhite brought Texas back with 275 passing yards and two touchdowns. However, the deficit was just too much. Final score: Colorado 39 Texas 37. The national championship was gone. But the exaltation had begun.

Based on his performance in that game, Applewhite started the Holiday Bowl game against Washington. Four hundred-seventy-three passing yards and 4 touchdowns later, Major Applewhite played his last game for UT, and it was his

very best: Texas 47, Washington 43.

In the post game interviews, Major Applewhite refused to toot his own horn. He gave God the credit, quoted scripture and kept talking about how great all of his teammates were. Because he was willing to spend his senior season in the oven of adversity without giving in to bitterness and backbiting, God was able to exalt him at the proper time.

Are you facing adversity? If not, sometime soon you probably will. How will you feel? How will you act? Trust in the Lord so that He can exalt you in the proper time. And by the way, "the proper time" won't be your time; "the proper time" will always be HIS time. Göt bless.
