





Tikrit nabs 260 Night raid near

AD-DAWR, Iraq (AP) - Heavily armed U.S. Army forces stormed into a village near the northern city of Tikrit before dawn Thursday, seizing more than 260 prisoners, including one man on the United States' mostwanted list of former Iraqi officials.

U.S. troops encountered no resistance during the five-hour sweep, officers said. About 230 of those detained were being released later in the day, the military said.

Soldiers from the 101st Airborne Division shot and wounded a looter in Mosul after being fired upon, U.S. military officials said. The shooting came a day after military officials, who had been criticized about the continued lawlessness in Iraq, denied issuing a shoot-to-kill policy against looters.

Tikrit is Saddam Hussein's hometown, and the region around it is known as a hotbed of Baath Party supporters and former high-ranking Iraqi military officials who enjoyed favored treatment under the now-deposed regime.

U.S. officials said one of those arrested Thursday was on the "top 55" list but did not give the suspect's name. The U.S. Central Command announced Thursday the arrest of

Fadil Mahmud Gharib, former Baath Party chairman of the Babil district. It said he was No. 47 on the most-wanted list, but the statement didn't say when or where he was arrested and it did not appear that he was arrested in Thursday's raid.

Five Iraqi special security forces offers also were caught in the raid.

"We're going to continue to hunt them until they get so tired of running that they give themselves up or we catch them," said Maj. Mike Silverman, operations officer for the 1st Brigade of the 4th Infantry, the Army division that staged the raid.

"I think it was very successful," Silverman added. "We got one top-55 guy and about a dozen fairly bad guys off the street. And again we sent the message that we know the shadow regime is out there and it won't be tolerated."

Under military rules, the name of the village could not be released by reporters accompanying U.S. forces until permission was given.

Commanders for the 1st Brigade had been planning the raid, dubbed "Operation Planet X," for a week after receiving a tip the men (See RAID, Page 3)





Trucker charged after 18 people die

based trucker was charged in federal court Thursday with transporting illegal immigrants after 18 members of a group abandoned inside a semitrailer at a South Texas truck stop died.

Tyrone Williams of Schenectady, N.Y., was charged with transporting and harboring aliens and conspiracy to transport and harbor aliens, Victoria County District Attorney M.P. "Dexter" Eaves said.

Two people believed to have accompanied Williams were being sought, and other suspects could still be identified, Eaves said.

"We want to get every bit of justice for these guys," Eaves said. "I want this insurance for these 18 people — that they aid not die in vain. I want an accounting." Williams likely will also face state charges, Eaves said.

Williams' wife, Karen, told the Houston Chronicle in a story for its online edition that her husband normally hauls watermelons from the border to the Northeast. She said he told her the trailer was hijacked and that he dropped the trailer "for his own safety and ran.

The immigrants - from Mexico, El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras - were locked early Wednesday inside the back of a sweltering, airless semitrailer and tried desperately to save themselves.

One dialed 911 on a cellular phone and pleaded for help in Spanish. But by the time a South Texas police dispatcher found someone to translate, the call had been lost.

VICTORIA, Texas (AP) — A New York- hole in the trailer's back door as it sped north on U.S. Highway 77. Another motorist saw the signal, but his mobile phone wasn't working, so he couldn't call authorities in time.

> The trailer had arrived at the truck stop about an hour before authorities got a call about an unspecified disturbance there around 2 a.m. Wednesday, Victoria County Sheriff Michael Ratcliff said.

> When authorities reached the trailer, 13 people were dead inside and four other bodies were on the ground. A boy, 5 or 6 years old, was among the dead, and another person in the group died at a hospital several hours later.

The smugglers had apparently unhitched the trailer at a truck stop near Victoria, about 175 miles from the Mexican border, then drove off. Insulation around several small holes in the back door was scraped away, suggesting the immigrants had tried to claw their way to get air.

"In desperation, the people said they broke out the truck's taillights, to try and attract someone's attention and perhaps get some air," said Marco Nunez, press officer for Eduardo Ibarrola, Mexico's consul in Houston. Ibarrola interviewed some of the survivors.



were living in the area. About 2 a.m. Thursday, U.S. troops formed a cordon around the outer perimeter of a nine-block area. The military operation involved more than 500 soldiers, who sealed off the village and went from house to house. About 200 houses and outlying buildings were searched before the sweep ended at 7 a.m.

None of the targets was identified. It was not immediately clear whether another top official also on the mostwanted list had been among those rounded up.

Silverman said no one shot at U.S. forces during the maneuver.

Among the 200 people taken into custody were some teenage boys and elderly men. Each was zip-cuffed and ordered to sit or kneel on the roads outside their homes.

Many were kept in custody outside a large mansion with high walls.

Eighteen Bradley fighting vehicles, 12 Howitzers and 35 armored Humvees secured the area as forces moved in. Six boats patrolled the nearby Tigris River during the maneuver, and Apache helicopters hovered overhead.

Seventeen bricks of plastic explosive were seized from one house, military officials said, and one man was apprehended in a sniper's perch toting an AK-47 assault rifle.

A large stack of brand-new Iraqi currency was found at another house, the military said. At another, a soldier emerged carrying a camouflage military uniform top.

Two explosions were heard after the raid from an area close to the village. Military officials said they believed they were mortar rounds but the blasts caused no damage.

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Texas, our eyes are upon you

Texas politics! There is nothing like it. It's always been outrageous and, to many onlookers, it has a touch of the bizarre. But to Texans it is typical politics. Just when you think you've seen it all, something else comes along.

Texas' Democrat lawmakers are still across the state line in Oklahoma at this writing, I think. When they decided to leave Texas over the weekend to try to stop Rep. Tom Delay's redistricting bill from being passed, I wonder if they knew how wild this scenario would become.


Contentious is probably an understated description of the current 78th Legislative session. The Republicans became the majority political party in Texas over the Democrats following the November 2002 elections for the first time since Reconstruction.

Democrat Pete Laney who had been Speaker of the House for 10 years was put out of that position and Midland Representative Tom Craddick took over the reins. From what the news reports have indicated, there is a definite difference in political styles and personalities of the two

It's kind of like when families merge in this contemporary society - there's going to be a lot of adjustments with fighting and changing on both sides.

When Gov. Rick Perry requested assistance from a couple of adjacent states, he didn't received much cooperation.

As Department of Public Safety troopers and Texas Rangers were ordered by Perry to find the Demos, the New Mexico Attorney General Patricia Madrid didn't offer him cooperation if they were in that state. According to an Associated Press report, she said, "I have put out an allpoints bulletin for law enforcement to be on the look out for politicians in favor of



health care for the needy and against tax cuts for the wealthy."

Oklahoma's governor refused to cooperate on extradition saying he didn't want to get involved in the Texas politics, but he offered the fellow Demos an invitation to the Oklahoma legislature. The federal Justice Department also refused Perry's request for assistance.

The Demos have even braved a threat of tornadoes in Oklahoma.

But the contentiousness didn't begin in this legislative session. For many of the lawmakers the 82 vetoes by Gov. Rick Perry following the 77th session were too much to handle.

Shortly after the November 2002 general election, State Comptroller Carole Strayhorn announced the state would have about a \$5 billion deficit. Then in January 2003, she upped the deficit figure to almost \$10 billion. All Texans were in shock.

Divisive hearings have been held throughout the 78th session about what the cuts without tax increases were going to mean. Most lawmakers said the cuts were going to be devastating to children, senior citizens, colleges, prisons, probation departments, etc. Then there's been school finance and insurance reform.

For those who have followed the legislature action closely since it began the current session, I don't think they're too surprised that something as bizarre as the legislators leaving the state has happened.

While some state historians were plan-

ning a 100th-year observance to pay tribute to the song, "The Eyes of Texas,", some 50-plus Texas Representatives were making their plans to "break the quorum." They were imitating what a group, the Killer Bees, did in 1979.

The Democrats claim the 2001 census redistricting was adequate and said it didn't need to be redone until 2010 census figures were released, claiming that's the way it's always been done. Some Republicans didn't agree, and they are the majority.

Craddick dubbed the group in Oklahoma the "Chicken D's." According to news reports, in true Texas tradition there's already been a song written about them. Can you imagine what will happen if the Dixie Chicks record it? That would be another chapter in the annals of Texas politics.

Many Republicans who are unable to take any action without the rebel Democrats haven't lost their sense of humor as they constructed a deck of playing cards with their pictures on them. Others pasted their pictures on milk cartons

Folk singer Willie Nelson is reported to have sent the Demos a care package at their motel in Oklahoma.

State Republicans have asked the Travis County District Attorney to investigate possible open meeting law violations by the Democrats, saying that the group has been discussing legislative matters because some of the committees have a majority number of legislators in Oklahoma.

Not only the eyes of Texas will be on Austin tomorrow when they go back. At least it's been a brief diversion from the day-to-day operations in Austin. I wonder what will happen next.

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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR Downtown no place for sand, gravel and topsoil

To the editor:

Every citizen of Pampa who has a sinus or respiratory problem owes a debt of gratitude to the citizens who took the time and made the effort to speak to our City commission, mayor and city manager at the Tuesday evening meeting and to one commissioner for having the wisdom and foresight to have the issue of storage of sand, gravel and top soil at the Ballard (or Duncan) street location tabled for further study.

The storage of sand, gravel and top soil at that location could involve health and safety issues that could affect a great number of citizens in Pampa. While the proposed permit for storage would require a solid, three-sided fence to contain the sand, gravel and top soil, it could not prevent particles of sand and air-borne bacteria and spores from the top soil from being released into the atmosphere. These particles do not just blow over the fence and fall immediately to the ground. The wind distributes them throughout the community to be breathed by great numbers of our citizens. Every time a load is lifted at the site, the wind will carry particles, bacteria and spores into the air. This can cause and/or aggravate sinus and respiratory con ditions.

During periods of loading and unloading the sand, gravel and top soil there is the traffic hazard to consider. The traffic problem is greater at that location because of the hill and curve of Ballard (or Duncan) street.

Many citizens are concerned with beautification of Pampa. What could create a worse eyesore than a sand and gravel business in the downtown area?

I am as concerned as anyone about the health and prosperity of our local businesses. However, I am equally concerned about the health, safety and well-being of our citizens.

I wonder how the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) would evaluate such an operation in a heavily populated area?



The prescription for less wealth


Maytag recently announced that it's moving its Galesburg, Ill., production facility to Mexico. A group called Americans Against NAFTA has protested Maytag's decision.

Spokesman Russ Anderson said, "We want to spread the word of what we believe Maytag is doing and the destructive effects it will have on Galesburg and the surrounding area. We want to tell everyone that we don't think it's right to put 1,600-plus people out of work for the sake of corporate greed."

This is a typical plea against more liberalized international trade agreements, and if we followed it our nation would have less wealth. Let's demonstrate this with a simplified example that demonstrates the foolhardiness of trade restrictions.

Suppose a U.S. worker's productivity is such that one worker can produce 10 computer chips each day or one bushel of tomatoes. In Mexico, a worker can produce one computer chip or one bushel of tomatoes each day. One might think there's no basis for specialization and trade, since the U.S. worker outproduces the Mexican worker in chips and is equally productive in tomatoes, but that's where you'd be wrong. The Mexican worker can produce tomatoes far more cheaply than the American worker, but to see this you must take opportunity cost into account.

In the United States, the opportunity cost of a worker producing tomatoes is the number of computer chips that could have been produced had he been producing



chips instead. Thus, the opportunity cost of a bushel of tomatoes is 10 computer chips. In Mexico, the opportunity cost of a bushel of tomatoes is the one computer chip that must be sacrificed.

Given these cost differences, it's cheaper for the United States to specialize in computer chips and Mexico in tomatoes -or, said another way, the United States has a comparative advantage in computer chips and Mexico in tomatoes.

Let's look at the outcome if both countries specialize -- and, to keep the numbers simple, assume each country has two workers. The two U.S. workers would specialize by producing 20 computer chips per day and no tomatoes, and the two Mexican workers would specialize and produce two bushels of tomatoes and no computer chips.

Mexican workers might trade one bushel of tomatoes with the U.S. workers for five computer chips. As a result of specialization and trade, both U.S. and Mexican workers are richer. The U.S. workers now have 15 computer chips and one bushel of tomatoes. The Mexican workers have 5 computer chips and one bushel of tomatoes. If international trade is

denied, there'd be no reason to specialize and, hence, both countries would be poorer.

International -- and, for that matter, any kind of trade -- makes people better off than being self-sufficient. Unequal endowments, whether they're in the forms of natural resources, labor or capital, make for comparative advantages in production.

For example, Alaskan citizens can produce oranges just as Floridians can produce king crab legs. It's simple. Alaskans could build greenhouses that simulate Florida's weather conditions and Floridians could build aquariums that simulate Alaska's water conditions. Both would be self-sufficient in both products, but Alaskans would pay through the nose for oranges and Floridians for king crab.

Probably most of us would agree that preventing trade between Floridians and Alaskans would be stupid and costly. That conclusion would change not one iota if Alaska happened to be another country, instead of another state.

Preventing international trade does benefit some people. In my Mexico/U.S. example, Mexican computer chip manufacturers and U.S. tomato producers would benefit from outlawing trade. It would enable Mexican computer chip manufacturers and U.S. tomato producers to charge their customers higher prices, thereby making for higher profits and wages.

Trade barriers are an excellent means to higher wealth for the few but lower wealth for the many.

But Webber is putting off the procedure, hoping to possibly play again this season if the Kings reach the NBA Finals. That seems like a long shot, considering he's been limping around the

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

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

Schilling strikes out 14 in **D-Backs 2-0 win over Phils**

PHILADELPHIA, PA. -Curt Schilling left one more said. "I spent a lot of time lasting memory at Veterans Stadium.

Perhaps pitching for the final time in his old home ballpark, Schilling threw a two-hitter with 14 strikeouts in the Arizona Diamondbacks' 2-0 victory Philadelphia over on Wednesday night.

The Phillies are moving to a new stadium next April. "When they start selling parts of this place, I'm sure I'll be one of the people buying seats," Schilling said.

It was the second consecutive shutout for Schilling, who pitched for the Phillies from 1992-00. He had some of his greatest games at Veterans Stadium, including a five-hit shutout against Toronto in Game 5 of the 1993 World Series and a 16strikeout gem in a 1997 victory over the New York

Yankees. This one was just as dominant

hoped it would be," Schilling here. I enjoyed being here. My last start here is a win."

In other NL games, it was: Los Angeles 5, Atlanta 1; Cincinnati 4, St. Louis 0; Colorado 6, New York 5; Montreal 6, San Francisco 3; Pittsburgh 3, Houston 2; Chicago 6, Milwaukee 1; and Florida 10, San Diego 3.

Schilling passed Sandy "It was everything I'd Koufax (2,396) and Dennis

Eckersley (2,401) to move into 31st place on the career strikeout list with 2,407.


Alex Cintron hit his first major league homer and Luis Gonzalez had an RBI single for Arizona, which has won six of eight. The Phillies have lost three straight.

Schilling was sent to Arizona in July 2000 after months of campaigning for a trade to a contending team. He helped the Diamondbacks win the World Series in 2001 and won 45 games the last two seasons.

Facing his mentor for the first time, Brett Myers (3-3) allowed two runs and four hits in eight innings. He and Schilling became friends after the Phillies selected Myers with the 12th overall pick in the 1999 amateur draft. The two often speak on the phone, and Myers spent part of Monday afternoon at Schilling's home in suburban Philadelphia.

"Myers pitched real good. He just picked the wrong guy to pitch against," Phillies manager Larry Bowa said.
