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Action tabled on use permit

For the second time in as many weeks, the Pampa City Commission tabled a proposed special use permit after more residents showed up to oppose it.

The Pampa City Commission met in special session this morning to consider the second and final reading of an ordinance that would grant a special use permit to store sand, caliche, stone or gravel in the 400 block of North Ballard.

A number of residents near the planned project who spoke at the commission's regularly scheduled meeting last Tuesday night, returned to voice their opposition based mostly on blowing dust and allergy problems.

Dr. Louis Haydon, 111 E. 28th, questioned whether the commission should consider the health of all of Pampa's citizens, whether it was in the best interest of downtown businesses to have a sand and gravel yard near downtown, whether an environmental impact study had been done and whether Texas Commission on Environmental Quality requirements have been met.

Edna Haydon told the commissioners that in the 1980s when Highway 70 was being redone, dust and dirt inundated her yard on 28th Street despite a six foot fence around the yard.

"I would take a garden hose to the house and wash down rivers of mud and the dirt accumulated in the window sills," she said.

Mrs. Haydon said the sand

and gravel facility should be located elsewhere.

"Honestly," Brenda Hernandez asked the commission, "would you want this by your house?"

Patricia Lundy said she canceled a doctor's appointment to attend the meeting and other nearby residents had to take off from work to go to this morning's 10 a.m. meeting in the city commission chambers.

"This is not something that needs to be done in town," said Pamela Russell Herring, who told commissioners that she fears the wind blowing over the storage yard will sandblast her new vehicle.

"What's the hurry?" questioned Ivone Romero. "Are you trying to get it approved so residents won't hear about it?"

She said that even though a permit has not been issued, sand is already piled at the site.

Marisal Martinez said her daughter's allergies have gotten worse since the project started.

"I probably wouldn't want it next to my house," said Commissioner Jeff McCormick.

Mayor Lomny Robbins said he didn't think the commission was ready to vote on the permit yet.

"I don't think we're there," Commissioner Jeff Andrews agreed.

With one commissioner absent from the meeting, Faustina Curry, the remainder voted unanimously to table the motion again.

"We will continue the process," Robbins said.

Ari Fleischer resigns post

WASHINGTON (AP) — White House press secretary Ari Fleischer, the public face of the Bush administration through two wars and a terrorist attack, said Monday he will resign in July to enter the private sector.

"I love this job," Fleischer told reporters at his informal Monday morning briefing. "I believe deeply about President Bush as a man and I believe deeply in his policies, but it's my time to go."

He would not speculate on who would take his place, but presidential aides said deputy press secretary Scott McClellan was the likely successor, although there are other possibilities.

Fleischer said he wanted to leave the hard-driving job before Bush's re-election campaign geared up.

"I want to do something more relaxing — like dismantle live nuclear weapons," he quipped.

Fleischer clashed at times with the White House press corps and had an uneasy relationship with some senior Bush aides, but he said the departure was his idea. He notified Bush of his decision Friday. The president ended the conversation "by kissing me on the head," the spokesman said.

"I informed him that after 21 years of nothing in my career other than government and politics, after almost four wonderful years with Gov. Bush/President Bush, my time has come to enter the private sector to pursue more relaxing endeavors and see more of my wife," he said.

Caution urged in travel

Local Department of Public Safety officers as well as county deputies and the local police department officers are asking drivers to be cautious over the upcoming Memorial Day week — end and to remember the three steps to roadway safety: don't speed, don't drink and drive and always wear a seat belt.

"Pampa Police Department is involved and will be doing high visibility enforcement," said Police Chief Trexlyn Pitner. "There will be zero tolerance."

He said there will be extra patrols in highly traveled areas of Pampa.

"Tickets will be issued for people without a seat belt and for unrestrained children," he said.

The cost for not wearing a seat belt is \$100 which includes court cost and fine, according to Justice of the Peace Kurt Curfman's office. The cost for a child not buckled up is \$150.

DPS troopers and many other police agencies are increasing patrols over the week end to stop drunk drivers, speeders and seat belt violators. Through a statewide campaign,

Click It or Ticket, DPS and the Texas Department of Transportation are urging motorists to buckle up or face a fine. Other police agencies throughout Texas are also focusing their efforts on enforcing the state's occupant protection laws for adults and children.

Another nationwide effort designed to reduce fatalities is C.A.R.E. Combined Accident Reduction Effort program. State police across the nation participate in C.A.R.E., maximizing enforcement on major interstate highways to reduce fatalities commonly associated with holiday week ends.

Designating a sober driver and making sure that everyone in the vehicle is wearing a seat belt or the children are buckled into the appropriate child safety seat is urged by Col. Thomas A. Davis, Jr., director of the DPS. "We want to encourage all drivers to take responsibility for their own safety and that of their passengers," he said.

He said that statistically the deadliest time on the road during Memorial Day week end is between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. "It is a time frame when alcohol and fatigue often are cited as factors," he said.

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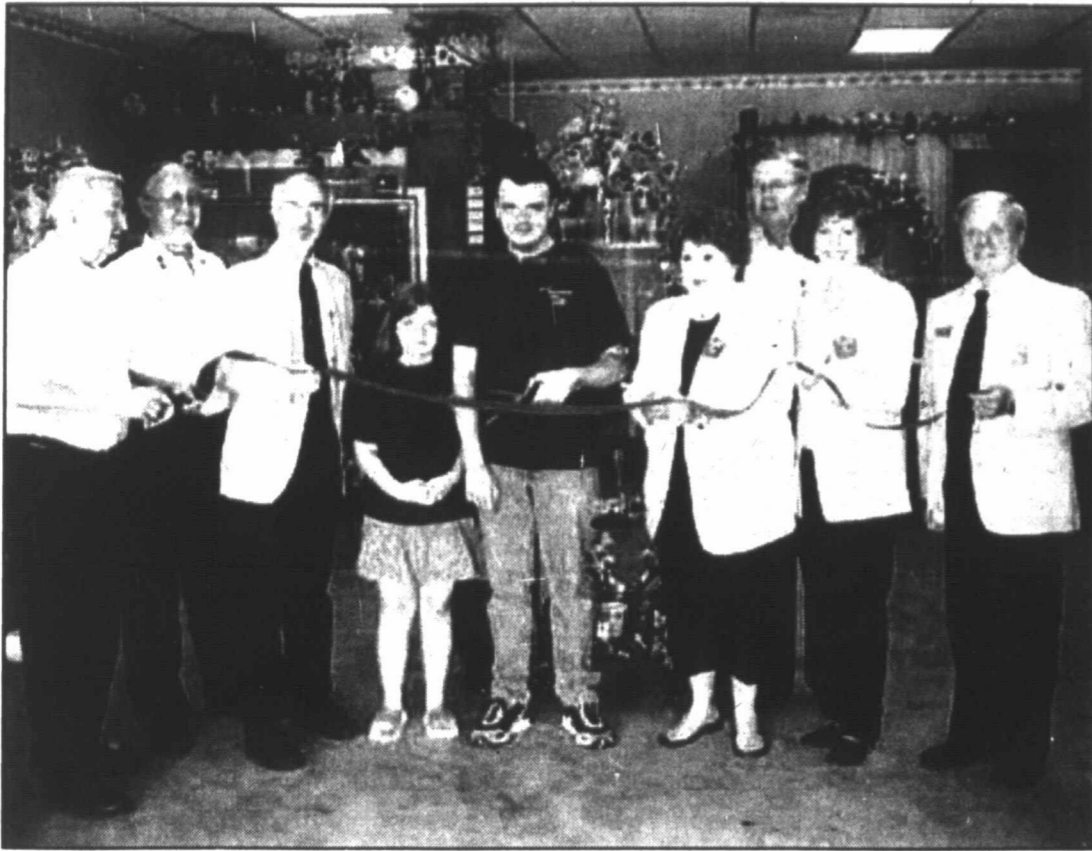

DEAR ABBY: I had a child when I was 17. I wasn't ready and I have missed out on a lot because of it.

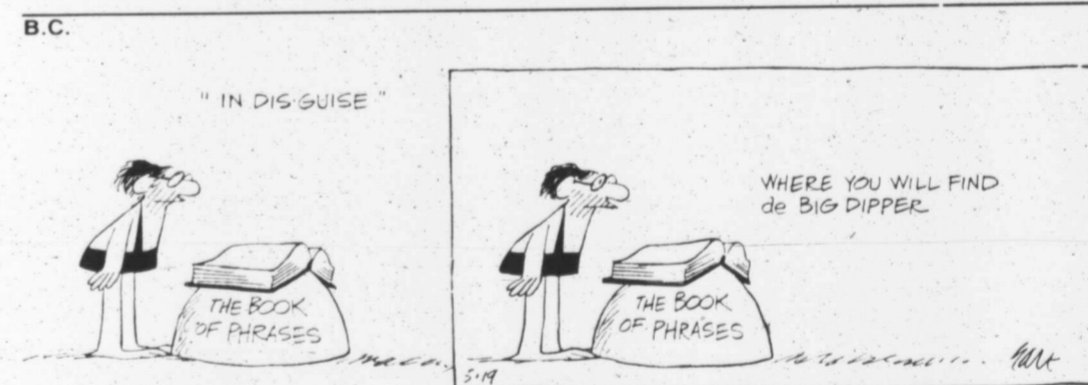
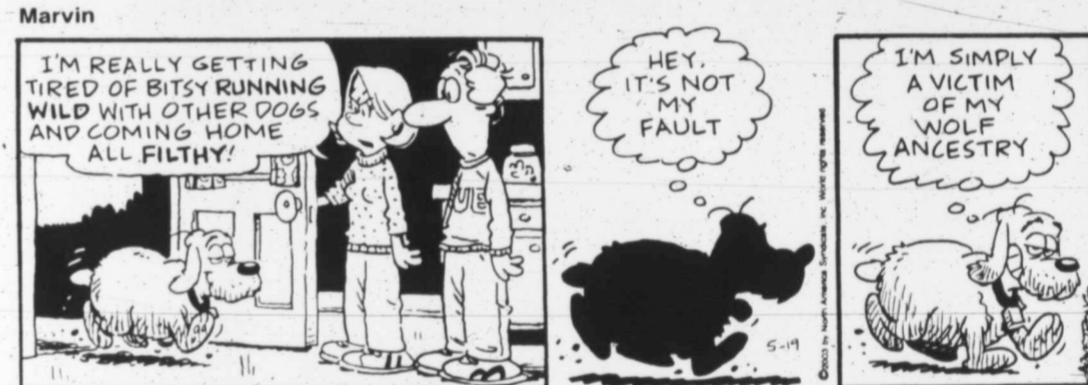

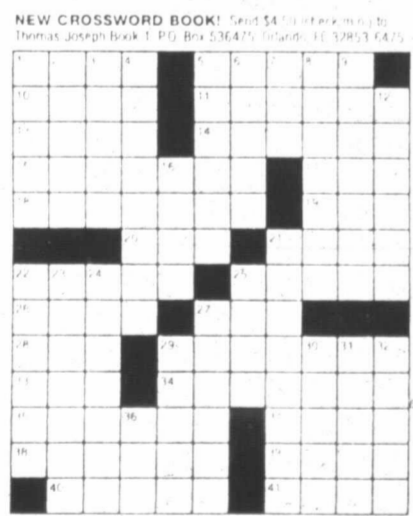

The score was tied at 9-all when the Matadors scored three runs in the top of the ninth inning to pull out the victory. 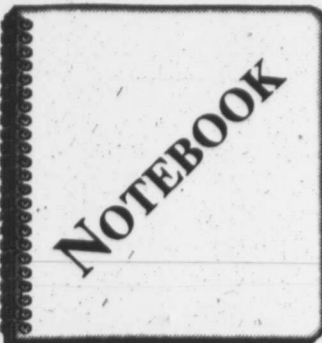

Rockies' Chacon masters Coors Field once again

Pitching a shutout at Coors Field is a baseball rarity. Somehow, Shawn Chacon has started two of them in less than a month.

Chacon pitched six scoreless innings, Jay Payton homered and the Colorado Rockies beat the Montreal Expos 4-0 Sunday in the 22nd shutout ever at Coors.

"I didn't try to do too much today," Chacon said. "I just tried to stay within myself and get back to what I had done in spring training and in April."

It was the Rockies' second shutout this season and 13th overall at Coors, which opened in 1995.

Chacon was part of the other one this year as well, pitching seven scoreless innings in an 8-0 win over San Diego on April 20.

Chacon (5 2) allowed four hits to outpitch Tomo Ohka (3-5) and win for the first time this month. After going 4-0 with a 1.04 ERA in April to win the NL pitcher of the month, Chacon was 0-2 with a 10.13 ERA in his last three starts.

"I think part of the problem was overanalyzing what

I had done in the last few starts," Chacon said. "I had been trying to go harder when things got tough. When guys get on base, you tend to get in that trap where you want to go harder and make pitches nastier. Today I just let off the gas a little bit and let my stuff work."

In other NL games, it was St. Louis 6, Chicago 3; New York 5, San Francisco 1; Atlanta 6, San Diego 3; Los Angeles 2, Florida 1; Arizona 8, Pittsburgh 6; Philadelphia 3, Houston 1; and Cincinnati 6, Milwaukee 3.

After the Rockies stranded a runner at third in each of the first two innings, Payton hit a solo homer in the third.

Colorado went up 2-0 in the fifth on Todd Helton's infield single as second baseman Henry Mateo couldn't flip to shortstop Orlando Cabrera in time to get Payton at second.

Belliard added a two-run double in the eighth off Dan Smith.

"We've been waiting for that kind of hit for the last two weeks," Belliard said.

Despite the loss, the Expos went 5-2 on the just-completed road trip. Montreal was 0-for-12 with runners in scoring position and stranded 11

of the ninth.

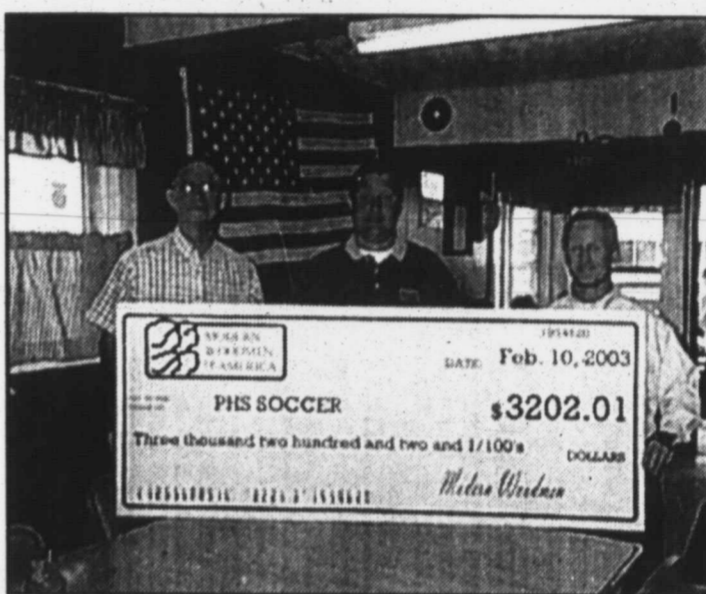
Cardinals 6, Cubs 3

BALTIMORE (AP) — Funny Cide ran away from the field on the turn for home and finished with a near-record 9 3/4-length victory in the Preakness on Saturday.

It was the second remarkable win in two weeks for Funny Cide, journeyman trainer Barclay Tagg and the owners, who kicked in \$5,000 apiece to start Sackatoga Stable in 1995.

The gelding's victory was

second to Survivor's 10-length victory in the first Preakness, in 1873.

On June 7, Funny Cide will attempt to become the 12th Triple Crown champion and first since Affirmed in 1978. The chestnut will be the fifth horse in the last seven years to get a Triple Crown chance, and ninth since Affirmed swept the Derby, Preakness and Belmont a quarter century ago.

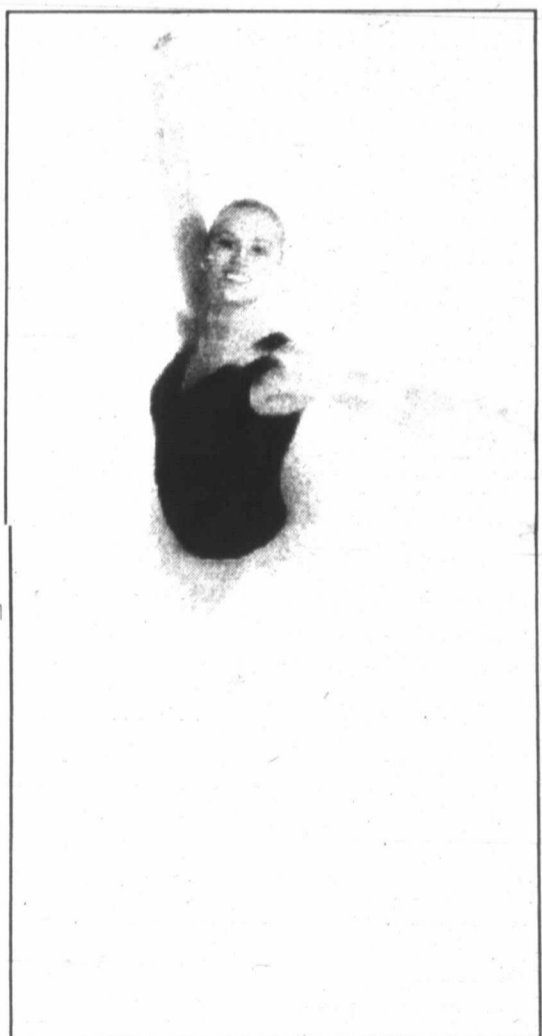

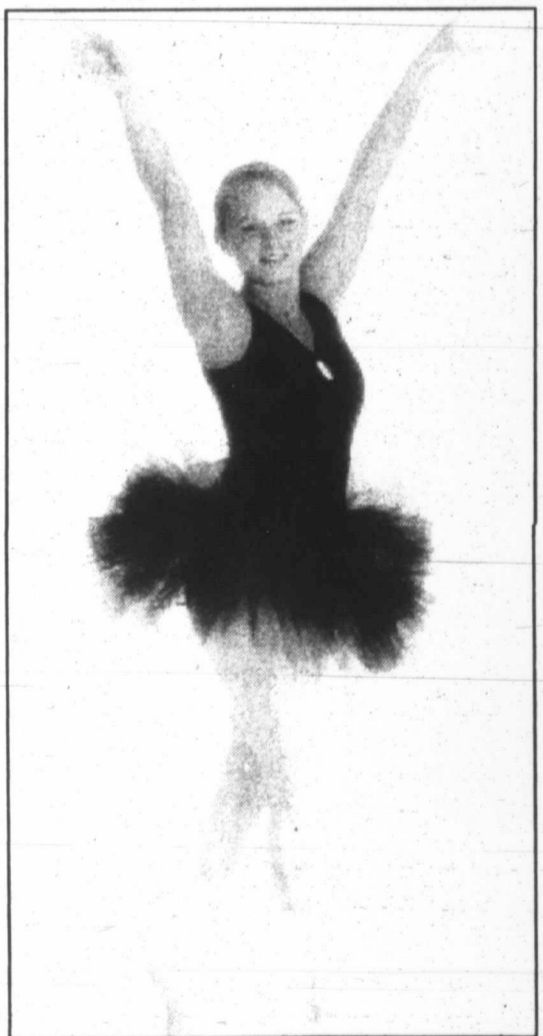

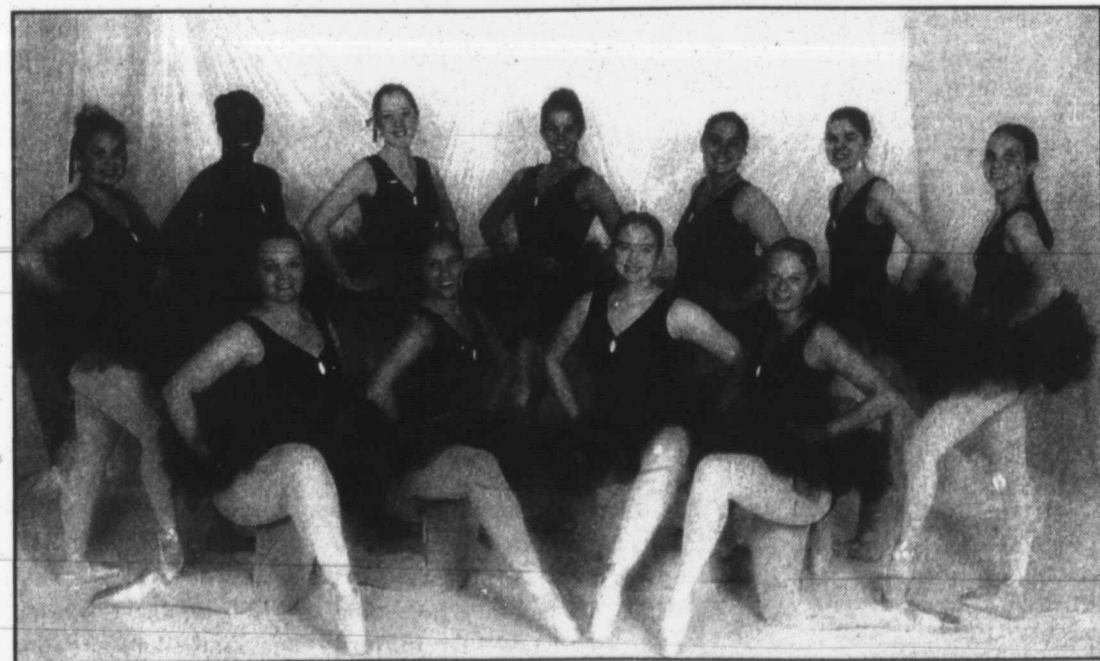
