Voters to pick mayor tomorrow

Two men are vying for Pampa mayor in a runoff election as voters prepare to go to the polls on Saturday.

Voters will decide between Lonny Robbins, who is completing his first term as mayor, and Jeff Andrews, who has been city commissioner of Ward 2 since 1994.

Robbins, minister of the local Trinity Fellowship Church, was elected to the mayoral position in 2001 by a narrow vote when he ousted three-term incumbent mayor Bob Neslage.

A total of 2,210 ballots were cast in the May 2001 election. Robbins garnered 1,187 votes over Neslage's 1,000 votes.

Andrews has served as Ward 2 Pampa City Commissioner since 1994. Prior to seeking the commissioner spot, he served on the Planning and



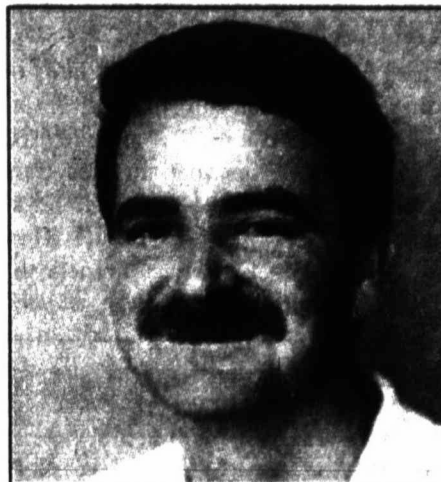

Zoning Commission.

He is a corporate comptroller for Bourland and Leverich.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at M.K. Brown Civic Auditorium for voters to cast their ballots.

Robbins and Andrews were among

five candidates seeking the mayoral spot in the May 3 election.

Robbins received 46 percent of the vote with 844 votes. Andrews was second highest in the race with 510 votes and 28 percent of the vote.

Pampa's city charter provides for a

runoff in commission spots if one candidate does not receive 50 percent of the vote plus one vote, said City Secretary Phyllis Jeffers. As no candidate received a majority of the vote, a runoff was called.

Other candidates in the five-man race were Mike Rummerfield with 195 votes while Norman Stephens was fourth with 187 votes. John Goddard received 86 votes.

Jeffers said 1,829 voters cast ballots in the May 3 election.

If early voting is an indicator of voter interest, Jeffers expects a heavy turnout Saturday at the polls. She said 758 voters cast ballots for the Saturday, May 31, election compared to 591 who voted early in the May 3 election.

Any qualified registered voter in the City of Pampa may vote in Saturday's election, said Jeffers. "They didn't have to vote in the May 3 election to vote in Saturday's runoff," she said.

JP sets bond at \$500,000

Goldsmith remains in jail for alleged beating death of wife

A Pampa man, Jeffrey J. Goldsmith, 42, remains on suicide watch in Gray County Jail today in lieu of a \$500,000 bond. He is charged in the brutal beating death of his wife, Ethel Jean, 31.

Precinct Two Justice of the Peace Kurt Curlman set the half-million-dollar bond this morning on Mr. Goldsmith. He is charged with murder.

Pampa Police Chief Pitner said Mrs. Goldsmith died from blunt-force trauma.

"She was brutally beaten," he said.

"Goldsmith is on suicide watch," said Gray County Sheriff Don Copeland. "There's no indication of any problems, it's just the type of deal it was. We're just going to take precautions. He's being watched very closely."

Pampa Police Department officials reported in a press release Thursday that

Goldsmith confessed to the murder of his wife after police received a call from her employer when she didn't show up for work. According to officials, Goldsmith was arrested Wednesday night after police questioning regarding his wife's whereabouts. Her body was found approximately two hours later in an isolated area in Wheeler County, authorities said.

Pitner said Friday morning that he understood both the Goldsmiths were originally from the Wheeler area.

An autopsy was performed Thursday in Lubbock. Results of the autopsy are expected next week.

The chief added that PPD officers had responded to at least one prior domestic disturbance involving the pair. He said the call was in May 2002, but was not at the couple's current address in the 900 block of Oklahoma. He said they did not live at that

Sharon gives Israeli pledge to negotiate Palestinian state after terror crackdown

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon told his Palestinian counterpart he would negotiate the creation of a state for the Palestinians if they fight terrorism, setting a guarded but optimistic tone for next week's three-way summit with President Bush.

Though statements from both sides were couched in positive terms early Friday, Sharon and Palestinian Prime Minister Mahmoud Abbas maintained their basic positions in their meeting the night before.

The Palestinians want the U.S.-backed "road map" plan leading to a Palestinian state to

be put into place. The Israelis say all additional steps are contingent on a crackdown against violent groups responsible for attacks against Israelis.

Abbas prefers stopping violence through dialogue and told an Israeli newspaper an agreement with the largest militant group, Hamas, could be reached next week. Hamas has been responsible for most of the suicide bombing attacks that have killed more than 350 Israelis in 32 months of violence.

The U.S. Embassy announced on its Web site Friday that it has received "credible reports" of plans to

kidnap U.S. citizens in Gaza. "At this time, Americans are advised to be particularly cautious," the announcement said. Hamas and another Islamic militant group, Islamic Jihad, are mainly based in Gaza.

The three-hour meeting Thursday night between Sharon and Abbas came ahead of a summit between the two leaders and Bush, planned for the Jordanian resort of Aqaba next week.

Bush said in comments released Friday that he would tell Mideast leaders that the United States needs help to achieve peace. "We need countries like Egypt and Saudi

Lawsuit targets state border watch group for allegedly attacking, detaining illegal aliens

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A lawsuit is targeting a Texas border watch group whose members have been accused of attacking and detaining undocumented immigrants.

Private and civil rights lawyers who sued Ranch Rescue on Thursday described the group as an illegal paramilitary unit, motivated by racial hatred, that must be put out of business.

"The object of the suit is to

bankrupt Ranch Rescue and to bankrupt Joe Sutton, so other landowners will not be willing to work with Ranch Rescue," Laredo lawyer Ricardo de Anda told the San Antonio Express-News in Friday's editions. "We feel if we get the landowners to stop cooperating with these Ranch Rescue paramilitary types, they will wilt on the vine."

Sutton, named as one of five defendants in the lawsuit, is a

Jim Hogg County rancher who this spring invited armed Ranch Rescue volunteers to repel undocumented immigrants who regularly cross his property.

Members of the Abilene-based border watch group have as a stated mission the defense of private property. They have conducted similar "operations" along the U.S. southern border, rounding up undocumented immigrants and even seizing drug loads.

The lawsuit also names as defendants Henry Conner and Casey Nethercott, both of whom participated in the March patrol of Sutton's ranch, and Ranch Rescue founder Jack Foote.

De Anda was joined in filing the suit by the Southern Poverty Lav. Center, based in Montgomery, Ala., and the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund, based in Los Angeles, on behalf

of six undocumented immigrants. The four Mexicans and two Salvadorans allegedly were terrorized and abused by Sutton and Ranch Rescue volunteers this spring.

One Salvadoran, according to the lawsuit, was pistol-whipped by Nethercott and attacked by Nethercott's dog. Both Nethercott and Conner were charged with assaulting the man. Nethercott is awaiting trial, but charges against Conner were dropped.

Four Mexicans caught crossing Sutton's ranch were robbed, according to papers filed in the lawsuit, and forced to "walk barefoot through cactus and rattlesnake infested country" after having their shoes confiscated.

Sutton, Foote and Nethercott told the newspaper Thursday

that all the accusations of abuse are false.

"It's total hogwash," Sutton said. "I interviewed all six (of the plaintiffs) and they made it crystal clear to me they were not hungry, were not abused, and they weren't thirsty."


Sutton said the four shoeless Mexicans merely had to sit on the pavement by his ranch gate while federal agents came to pick them up. And Sutton complained about having to do the government's job in detaining them.

"They're all trespassers and they're all illegal, but did any law enforcement officers ever call me up offering to put them in jail? They don't care," Sutton said.

Foote, 45, said the two Salvadorans were treated well but he knows nothing about the Mexicans.


"No one was hit, assaulted or robbed," he said. "They were given food and water, and a warm ride in a van to the front gate."

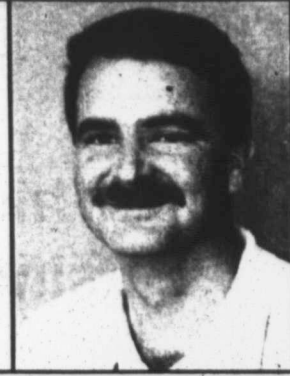

Capitol Almanac

Highlights Thursday from the Texas Legislature

AUSTIN (AP) — Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn boosted her revenue estimate Thursday for the coming two-year budget cycle by \$604 million, attributing the increase to new federal money coming into the state.

Her updated estimate ends speculation that she would lower her original revenue estimate before Monday's close of the regular legislative session.

Even though Strayhorn adjusted downward the franchise tax component of her estimate by \$105 million, she said an influx of \$709 million in new federal money into the state's general revenue is contributing to the net gain.

She said she expects the funds to be directed to medically needy children, community services for Texans with disabilities and other vital programs.

In fact, last weekend House and Senate budget writers hammered out an agreement on the state's \$118 billion budget and began making plans for use of the anticipated new federal money. The state is getting \$1.26 billion in federal aid for Medicaid and other programs as part of President Bush's 10-year tax cut package that includes aid to states.

A chunk of the total new money is dedicated to Medicaid. The remaining \$709 is "flexible grant" money.

Lawmakers are planning to use the money for mental health, nursing homes and to try to restore reimbursement rates to doctors and others who care for patients in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program.

The Legislature has wrestled all spring with a \$9.9 billion budget shortfall. Republican legislative leaders have vowed to balance the budget by cutting expenses, not raising taxes.

LIMITING LAWSUITS

With the end of the session approaching, House and Senate leaders working to cement legislation to cap medical malpractice awards for pain and suffering continued to clash Thursday on where those limits should be, but appeared to be making slight headway.

Sen. Bill Ratliff, who wrote the Senate plan, set up a negotiating team Thursday to hammer out a final version. For a week, he had refused to do so. The House set up their negotiating team last week.

The move seemed to be a step forward in what has been a stalemate between the two chambers.

Earlier, Ratliff said an agreement with all parties had been reached that would cap awards at \$250,000 for physicians and

\$500,000 for hospitals and institutions for a maximum of \$750,000 per claimant.

Just a few moments later, Rep. Joe Nixon, who wrote the House version, said no such agreement had been reached.

"No one has agreed to that cap," Nixon said.

Nixon wants a hard \$250,000 cap.

With just four days left in the legislative session, Gov. Rick Perry has said he would call a special session as early as next week if the Senate doesn't move to reduce medical malpractice award caps.

SOCIAL SERVICES

The House declined to agree with Senate changes to House Bill 2292, a sweeping social services reorganization bill by Rep. Arlene Wohlgemuth, R-Burleson. A House-Senate conference committee is being assigned to work out the differences.

The bill would reorganize the state's health and human services agencies, consolidating 12 departments into four under the umbrella of the Department of Health and Human Services.

The Senate approved the legislation late Wednesday night. It is estimated to save more than \$1 billion.

Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Lewisville, said the bill would result in 2,162 fewer state jobs over the next few years. But one Senate Democrat put that figure closer to 4,000 to 5,000.

TUITION DEREGULATION

A tuition deregulation bill is headed to a House-Senate conference committee.

Under a bill approved Tuesday night in the Texas Senate, public universities could raise tuition by more than 50 percent over the next two years. The House also has approved a tuition deregulation bill. Proponents say tuition deregulation, which would take the task away from the Legislature and give it to universities, would give higher education institutions the flexibility they need in times of budget cuts.

Opponents say it could drive up college costs.

Meanwhile, Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn, a supporter of tuition deregulation, said Thursday new enrollments in the state's pre-paid college tuition program may be halted for a while because of overall rising tuition costs.

The move may be needed to protect those already in the program, she said.

Arabia and Jordan and others to work together to cut off funding for terrorist groups, to prevent the killers from moving around, to help provide security."

Assistant Secretary of State William Burns and Elliott Abrams, who heads the Middle East desk at the National Security Council, were to meet with Israeli Foreign Minister Silvan Shalom on Friday to lay the groundwork for the summit.

The road map requires declarations from each side recognizing the other's rights to statehood and security. Palestinian Foreign Minister Nabil Shaath said a joint Palestinian-Israeli committee was meeting Friday to work out final wording for the statements.

The road map is to begin with a halt to the violence and lead to a full-fledged Palestinian state in 2005.

The Israelis are insisting that first, the Palestinians must dismantle armed cells, confiscate illegal weapons and jail militants.

In a statement after the meeting at Sharon's Jerusalem office, Israel said it would cancel a two-week closure on the West Bank and Gaza that had idled Palestinians who work in Israel. The Israelis said they would allow 25,000 Palestinians to return to their jobs.

The Israelis said they would release some Palestinian prisoners.

An Israeli official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the military was preparing to release 100

Palestinians of about 1,000 who are being held in military detention centers without trial or charges. All together, more than 7,000 Palestinians are in Israeli custody, according to figures from the International Committee of the Red Cross.

At the request of the Palestinians, Israel pledged to free Khaled Abu Sukar, 68, the oldest and longest-serving Palestinian prisoner, and Tayseer Khaled, a member of the Palestinian Liberation Organization's executive committee.

The statement did not say when the measures would be taken but Sharon aide Raanan Gissin said it would be done shortly. A Hamas spokesman Friday welcomed the release and said the group would make a decision on a possible cease-fire next week.

Israel also repeated its offer to pull its troops back from West Bank Palestinian towns and cities reoccupied in a series of incursions over the past year and redeploy troops in Gaza to give Palestinians a chance to enforce security.

Shaath said this could be done only after reaching a cease-fire with Hamas and other Palestinian groups.

"Now we will try our best to reach this agreement ... and I'm optimistic," he said.

Beyond a cease-fire, Israel wants to see Hamas and other militant groups disarmed. A Palestinian official said on condition of anonymity that Abbas made clear to Sharon that the cease-fire would be followed by the militants' disarmament and eventual incorporation into the political system.

He said Abbas was pursuing this route to avoid a direct

confrontation with the groups that could develop into a civil war and that Sharon seemed to understand this position.

Sharon adviser Zalman Shoval said, "There was an understanding but I want to be clear that they have to start cracking down on terror immediately. If they want to do this by starting with a cease-fire, then we welcome this."

A poll published Friday showed 57 percent of Israelis support Palestinian statehood. The survey by the New Wave polling company, published in the Maariv newspaper, also showed 62 percent in favor of ending Israel's occupation of areas of the West Bank and Gaza.

The poll surveyed 593 adults this week and had a margin of error of plus or minus 4 percentage points.

Palestinian Labor Minister Ghassan Khatib said he was disappointed that the summit ended without an Israeli declaration recognizing the Palestinians' right to an independent state.

The Israeli statement said if the Palestinians eliminate terrorism, Israel would negotiate a peace agreement according to principles set down in a Bush speech from last June, "in which framework it will be agreed to establish a provisional Palestinian state and afterward a permanent state."

Israel's government prefers to link its policy to the Bush speech, rather than the road map, because it objects to some of the wording in the plan, sponsored by the European Union, Russia and the United Nations along with the United States.

Hurricane forecaster raises predicted number of storms this year; greater chance of U.S. hit

FORT COLLINS, Colo. (AP) — The 2003 hurricane season may have more storms than an earlier prediction, with an above-average chance a hurricane will reach the United States, forecaster William Gray said Friday.

The weakening of El Nino, an unusual warming of parts of the equatorial Pacific Ocean,

and the likely formation of its opposite, an unusual cooling called La Nina, prompted Gray's team at Colorado State University to warn that storm activity this year may be well above average.

In a forecast released before the official start of the Atlantic hurricane season Sunday, Gray's team predicted 14

named storms, two more than predicted in April.

The forecast for eight hurricanes, twice as many as last year, remained the same. Three were predicted to become "intense" hurricanes, defined as those with winds of at least 111 mph.

There were 12 named storms last year.

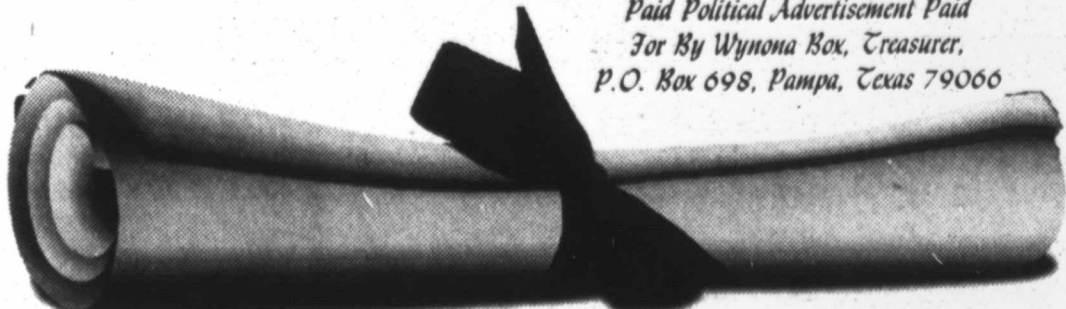



Pampa's evolution of religion began in 1905

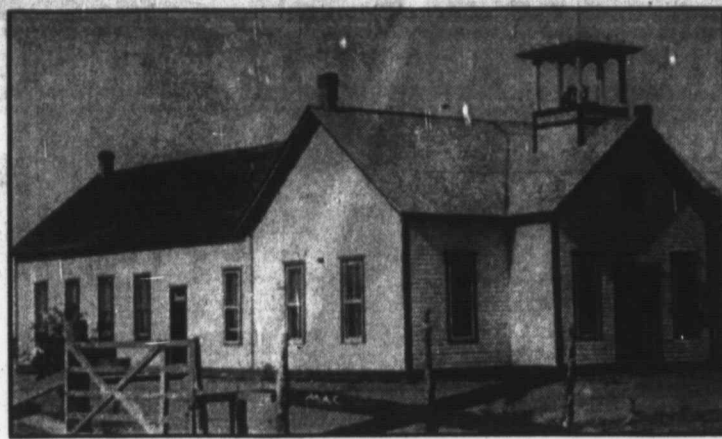
Editor's Note: This is the last in a series of articles by local historian Eloise Lane on the evolution of religion in Gray County.

Pampa's church history began about 1905 when John V. Thomas (brother of Sam, Charles and Josephine) organized a Sunday School in the school building where he taught. This building was the original one-room schoolhouse near 513 E. Francis to which two rooms had been added. Two clergymen of the congregational faith, Rev. Chatfield and Rev. Daisy, began preaching there and the Union Church developed with an active membership of about 60 members of various denominations.

On Sept. 29, 1906, five Methodists withdrew from the Union Church and formed the first denominational church in Pampa - the First Methodist Church. The members met in a building at Cuyler and Foster (now Dollar General) before they had their own building at the corner of East Foster and Starkweather in 1908.

After an unsuccessful attempt, the First Baptist

Church was organized on April 6, 1907, with 22 charter members. In September of 1907, the church called J.W. Whatley as quarter-time pastor. (Note: J.W. Whatley is not related to Rev. H.R. Whatley who came later in 1921.) The first convert, Mrs. Elizabeth Sills, was baptized in the lake at Recreation Park.

For a time the First Baptist Church met in the red brick school building constructed at 309 N. Cuyler in 1910. One Saturday afternoon, some women found the door locked when they met to organize a Women's Missionary Union. They sat on the steps of the building and proceeded to

elect officers and have their first meeting.

For a baptismal service in 1914, a stock tank was brought in to Pampa and set up near the red brick school building. Leona Martin (Mrs. L.B. "Bush" Haggard) and several others were baptized at that time.

First Baptist Church dedicated its first building, the gray "stone church" at 120 E. Kingsmill on Sept. 12, 1915.

On a Sunday afternoon in 1908, M.K. Brown, who attended the Union Church, was asked to take a visitor on a tour of the territory surrounding Pampa. In a horse-drawn buggy, they started south

toward Lefors and stopped to witness an outdoor baptism at a dirt tank White Deer Lands had built to furnish water for cattle. The minister had come to Pampa for the purpose of baptizing Mrs. Henry Lovett, but he obtained another convert also. (See p. 46 in "M.K. Brown Legacy.")

The First Christian Church of Pampa was organized on April 4, 1909, in the small frame schoolhouse at the corner of East Francis and North Starkweather. Eight members signed the charter and five persons became members a few weeks later.

In September of 1909, a revival was held in the newly-constructed red brick school building at 309 N. Cuyler. At this time, plans were made to purchase lots on which to erect a church building. The Methodists graciously allowed the use of their building during the construction of the First Christian Church building at the corner of East Kingsmill and North Ballard, dedicated on Easter-Sunday, April 16, 1911.

In the early 1920s, a political disagreement developed in Pampa with the result that some citizens decided to start another town. Eight landown-

ers got a charter for a new town about five miles south/southeast of Pampa and founded Amarado in 1922. A mission that started in 1924 was sold to Elmer Barrett for a dollar and then the dollar was returned to Barrett, who continued the mission for a number of years.

Some early Pampa churches were organized in homes. In 1925, St. Matthew's Episcopal Church met in the home of C.P. Buckler at 410 Buekler Ave. Catholic mass was first offered in the home of Dr. and Mrs. A.R. Sawyer at 321 N. Gray in 1926. The Presbyterian Church was organized in 1926 with 75

charter members. Mary Ellen and Harvester Church of Christ began with meetings in the homes of members who constructed their first building at East Francis and North Warren in 1927. The first meeting of the First Church of Christ Scientist was in the home of Mrs. Emma LeFors at 309 N. Frost.

Religion continued to be a vital force in Gray County during the days of the oil boom when people from many different areas with various beliefs came to this area. It continues to be a vital force today when there are many churches providing a choice for everyone.

Life's trials will seem small

Much about the life of Charles de Gaulle, former prime minister of France, is quite well-known. What is not so widely known is that Charles and Evonne de Gaulle were the parents of a Down's syndrome child.

She was a treasure to them, as well as a very special concern. Regardless of the affairs of state, De Gaulle arranged his life so that he and his wife would have some time almost every day with their infant daughter. When they would put her to bed and the child had fallen asleep, Evonne would often ask, "Oh, Charles, why couldn't she have been like the others?"

As had been predicted by the attending physicians, de Gaulle's daughter died in her youth. There was a private graveside mass, and when the priest had pronounced the

benediction, all present began to leave the graveside ... all except the mother.

In her grief, she could not pull herself away. Charles went back to her, gently touched her on the arm and said, "Come Evonne. Did you not hear the blessing of the priest? She is now like the others."

That's a touching, beautiful insight. Yes, people hurt and need help in our world today. Many will go to bed tonight hungry. There are parents who tonight will stand by the bedside of their deformed little child and question why or how

such a thing could possibly be. Some, and you might be one of them, will ask why their child must go through life with a body that is crippled.

Yes, there is pain and many unanswered questions. There are people who are homeless. Others are deprived of any semblance of human dignity because of some circumstance beyond their control. Many may be so lonely that it can almost be felt like a presence in their rooms.

One of the problems of the gospel of Jesus Christ is that an age is coming when the problems and limitations of this life, things that hold us back, will no longer govern our existence. A time is coming when all who are members of the kingdom of God will be set free from this life's bondages. There is promise of power and freedom and wonderful restorations and no more losses. It's a day of promise.

The songwriter summed it up when he wrote: "It will be worth it all / when we see Jesus. / Life's trials will seem so small / when we see Him."

Evangelist, musician to present testimonies to Briarwood June 1

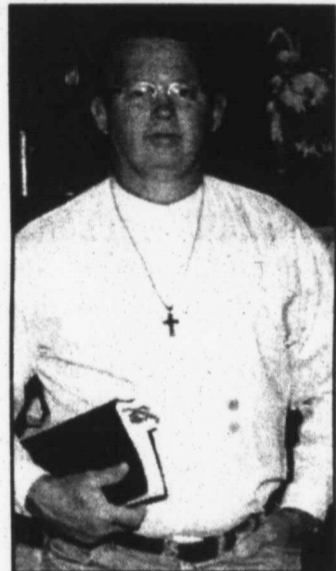

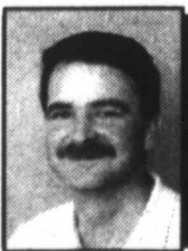

Autopsy: Tape found around Peterson baby's neck

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — An autopsy indicated that the body of Laci Peterson's unborn son had a significant cut and plastic tape wrapped around the neck, according to news reports that prompted prosecutors to ask that the results be unsealed.
 A source close to the case who requested anonymity confirmed information in the autopsy to The Associated Press on Thursday.
 Prosecutors responded later in the day by saying it was misleading.
 "The information being leaked has clearly been skewed in favor of the defense," wrote Deputy Stanislaus County District Attorney David Harris. "By releasing the autopsy reports the court will allow the media to see what the actual facts are and then accurate information may be reported to mitigate recent adverse publicity."
 The information was first reported by cable news channel MSNBC, which said it had received a portion of the autopsy report completed by the Contra Costa County coroner's office. Results had been sealed by court order after Stanislaus County prosecutors said releasing them would jeopardize Scott Peterson's right to a fair trial.
 Only the prosecution and defense were given copies of the reports and prosecutors said they had not shared results with police or Laci Peterson's family.
 In a statement, District Attorney James Brazelton said "evidence in this case should be presented in court through the testimony of witnesses and not selectively leaked to the news media by unknown persons whom the press will not identify."

Girl Assaulted By Friend's Dad Doesn't Know What To Do Next

DEAR ABBY: Last Saturday night, I went to a church dance. I didn't want to go, but my mother made me. I danced a few times, but mostly sat with another girl who's a good friend. When I got up to make a phone call in the hallway, I was unaware that her father had been watching me.

He followed me down the hall, grabbed me, and wouldn't let go. I tried to break away, but the harder I struggled, the tighter he held me. Nobody saw us. When I finally got away from him, I ran out of the building and all the way home.

I haven't told my mom about it because she would jump to the wrong conclusions — and if I tell my friend, she might accuse me of lying about her dad and it would wreck our friendship. What should I do, Abby?

TROUBLED TEEN GIRL IN LOGAN, UTAH

DEAR TROUBLED: You have to tell your mother. Tell your clergyman. Your friend's father is a predator. He assaulted you and he must be reported. If you remain silent, he could do something more serious to you or some other young girl. Please don't wait.

DEAR ABBY: I have been living with "Ken" for seven years. On two occasions in the past few months, he has told me he's dating someone else. Each time, Ken allowed me to believe it for more than an hour. Then he admitted he was "putting me on" — that he was only testing me to see if I really loved him.

We were already having problems, and this "game" has caused me to doubt our future together. When Ken realized how upset and manipulated I felt, he apologized and said he regretted ever making such a statement.

I am trying to believe him and forgive him, but I'm having a hard time. Am I wrong for having doubts about him?

DEAR ANGRY AND CONFUSED: Your boyfriend's game is sadistic. You're right to have second thoughts about him. If Ken pulls something like this again, dump him and don't look back.

DEAR ABBY: I read with interest the letter from "Michigan Grandmother," whose son had recently divorced and whose grandchildren were starting to steal. In your reply you advised, "When couples separate, they still have a joint responsibility to the children they brought into this world."

I think that on some level, children know this. Often, when parents are having trouble in their lives (divorce in this case), children will act out in some manner — such as stealing — so that family members must come together to handle the crisis. The grandchildren in this instance may not actually expect their parents to reunite, but their stealing is "rewarded" by seeing their parents involved and coming together to work through

the problem. In this way, they are once again a family — even if it's just for a little while.

Time and love are great healers. Your advice to "Michigan Grandmother" was on the money. Spend more time with the boys until they have adjusted to the divorce. If they don't make the adjustment, family counseling is the next step.

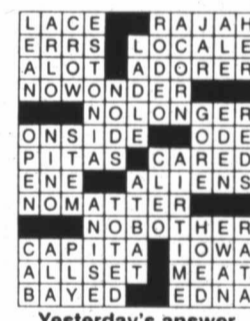

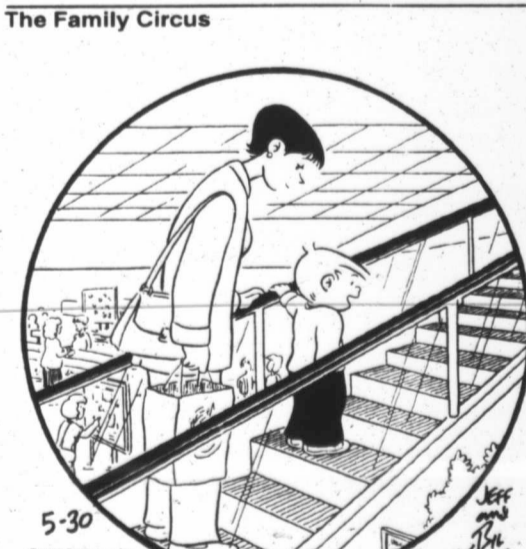

Pampa's Braddock signs with Illinois State

PAMPA — John Braddock, Pampa's record-setting quarterback this past season, signed a letter-of-intent Thursday to play football at Illinois State University.

Attending the signing were John's mother, Susan Braddock, and his grandparents, Charles and Jan Lockhart; Pampa quarterbacks coach Dale Ammons and Pampa offensive coordinator Heath Parker.

"It's a Division I school, so it's a good deal for me. I'm looking forward to it," Braddock said.

Ammons said it was an honor and a privilege to coach a player as talented as Braddock, who broke single-season school records in passing with 2,987 yards and 26 touchdowns. Those statistics were also the best in the Amarillo area.

"John set a great example with his work ethic in the weight room and on the field. He's got great potential to be a good college quarterback if he makes his mind up to get it done," said coach Ammons.

Braddock was named to All-District 3-4A First Team and was named the Golden Spread Super

Team Offensive Player of the Year by the Amarillo Globe-News.

It was PHS head coach Dennis Cavalier, who died of a heart attack last weekend, who was largely responsible for Braddock's scholarship.

"Coach Cavalier had a contact at Illinois State, who had been an assistant coach with him at Chickasha. He sent film of John to the college and they were very impressed with John. They went out of their way to get him," Ammons said.

Braddock made good on 65 percent of his passing attempts in helping lead the Harvesters to the third round of the playoffs in 2002. He threw for 200 plus yards in seven games.

In his 10 years as a coach, Ammons said Braddock is by far the best quarterback he's ever coached.

"He has all the tools. He's very smart on the field. He knows how to get it done," Ammons said.

Illinois State is a Division I-AA school in Bloomington-Normal, Ill. The Redbirds, members of the Gateway Football Conference, had a 6-5 record last season.

No. 1 Lleyton Hewitt also needed 3 1/2 hours to beat Nikolay Davydenko 6-3, 4-6, 6-3, 7-6 (5). Davydenko committed 112 unforced errors to 72 for Hewitt, who was also on the court for more than three hours in the opening round.

DUBLIN, Ohio (AP) — Charles Howell III picked up some local knowledge a year ago that provided some much needed insight in the opening round of the Memorial Tournament.

Howell played a practice round last year with Jack Nicklaus, the tournament founder and Muirfield Village designer. Buoyed by some of the advice imparted by Nicklaus, Howell shot an 8-under 64 on Thursday for a one-stroke lead over Kenny Perry.

Howell never forgot the suggestions Nicklaus made.

"It's amazing how he sees holes and how he would play them," said Howell, who played the last 12 holes in 8 under. "Just some little things, here and there. Going through every single hole, it makes a difference."

Howell tied the best first-round score in the tournament's 28 years by rolling in a 45-foot birdie putt on the final hole. He still wasn't able to separate himself from a star-studded 104-player field.

Blalock's bat leads Rangers past Orioles, 8-4

BALTIMORE (AP) — The Texas Rangers knew this wasn't going to be a pitcher's duel.

Facing a team that scored 26 runs in three games against them last week, the Rangers figured they'd need plenty of offense to beat the Baltimore Orioles.

Led by Hank Blalock, Texas got it done.

Blalock went 3-for-3, walked twice and scored two runs as the Rangers ended Baltimore's four-game winning streak with an 8-4 victory Thursday night.

The Orioles were denied a fifth straight win for the first time since May 2001, and their run of nine straight games reaching double figures in hits also came to an end.

"We knew we were going to have to put some runs on the board since they've been swinging the bats very well," Rangers manager Buck Showalter said. "It was a little frustrating we didn't score more runs."

Especially because Texas drew six walks, including five from Orioles starter Pat Hentgen (1-2).

"The team's been playing so well. I hate to stop that winning streak like that," Hentgen said. "You want to keep that train rolling, and I didn't do that tonight. I was wild. I walked five guys in four innings, and you can't do that."

Ismael Valdes (5-2) allowed two runs, four hits and a walk in 5 2-3 innings to earn his second win over

the Orioles in seven days.

"Ishy pitched well, found the strike zone," Showalter said. "I thought the difference was their guy threw some walks and Ishy didn't."

Francisco Cordero, who entered in the seventh, earned his second save.

With two doubles and a single, Blalock boosted his batting average to .359 and regained the AL lead from Baltimore's Melvin Mora.

"I don't pay attention to that day-to-day," Blalock said. "I am curious about it though. I'll just keep doing what I'm doing and see how it turns out. It's May — it's not how you start, but how you finish."

It's been quite a start for the third baseman. He enjoyed his 19th multihit game of the season Thursday, the seventh with at least three hits.

Ruben Sierra hit a two-run homer in the ninth, helping the Rangers to their ninth win in 11 games.

Mora went 1-for-4 with two RBIs. He extended his career-high hitting streak to 11 games, but his batting average dropped three points to .356.

Down 6-2, the Orioles got within striking distance with a two-run seventh against Rosman Garcia. After Luis Matos doubled in a run and scored on a one-out single by Deivi Cruz, Francisco Cordero walked Brian Roberts before striking out Mora and retiring David Segui on a grounder.

Sierra's third homer of the season, off Willis Roberts, clinched it for the Rangers.

"I knew he was going to try to throw a strike. He did

and I jumped on it," Sierra said.

Mighty Ducks fall again to Devils

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — The Anaheim Mighty Ducks are starting to understand what the Minnesota Wild went through.

After smothering the Wild in the Western Conference finals, the Ducks have failed to beat New Jersey goalie Martin Brodeur in the first two games of the Stanley Cup finals.

"It's disappointing not to be able to generate anything offensively," Anaheim captain Paul Kariya said after the Mighty Ducks' second straight 3-0 loss to the Devils on Thursday night.

Game 3 of the best-of-seven series is Saturday in Anaheim.

The Wild were shut out in the first three games against the Ducks in the previous round. They finally scored one goal in Game 4 but it wasn't enough to keep from getting swept.

That gave Anaheim 10 days off before meeting the Devils, and so far the Ducks haven't found their game again.

"We're not playing with the same passion and will as we did in the first three rounds," defenseman Keith Carney said. "They're playing really well. They're doing what they need to do. We can't just accept that."

Brodeur faced 16 shots for the second game in a row. He had no trouble stopping them

all, and few of the shots were generated from legitimate scoring chances.

Backed by second-period goals from Patrik Elias and Scott Gomez, and a third-period score by Jeff Friesen, Brodeur became the first goalie since 1945 with back-to-back shutouts to start a finals series. Toronto's Frank McCool had three straight against Detroit 58 years ago.

"It's kind of hard for me to realize it," Brodeur said. "We're here on a mission to try to be successful in these playoffs."

Brodeur tied Dominik Hasek's record, set last season, with his sixth playoff shutout of the year. He has 19 career postseason shutouts, second only to the 23 Patrick Roy posted in his just-ended career.

Kariya led the Ducks with 81 points in the regular season but has been bottled up by the Devils' penetrating defense. He has one shot in the series, and it came in Game 1. He set up Steve Rucchin for the second of Anaheim's two shots in the middle period, but Brodeur managed to keep the trickling puck from getting all the way through.

"They're playing New Jersey hockey, you've got to give them some credit," said center Adam Oates, put on a line with Kariya in the third

period. "It's nothing we didn't expect. We know they're a very good a defensive team, and obviously Marty's good back there."

John-Sebastien Giguere made 22 saves and played fairly well until Friesen beat him with an unscreened shot 4:22 into the third period. Giguere slammed his stick, breaking it in half.

Since the Stanley Cup finals went to a best-of-seven format in 1939, just three of 40 teams have rallied to win after falling behind 2-0. The Ducks hadn't been behind in any series until they dropped the opener. They eliminated Detroit in a first-round sweep, and then dispatched Dallas in six games.

In all three series, they won the first two games on the road. Their confidence has been shaken by the Devils, who are seeking their third Cup in nine years, but not destroyed.

"I am very confident we will bounce back from this," forward Steve Thomas said. "They're a very good hockey team and we're going to have to play a lot better to compete with them."

Of the 28 teams to sweep Games 1 and 2 at home in the finals, only Chicago, against Montreal in 1971, didn't win the Stanley Cup.

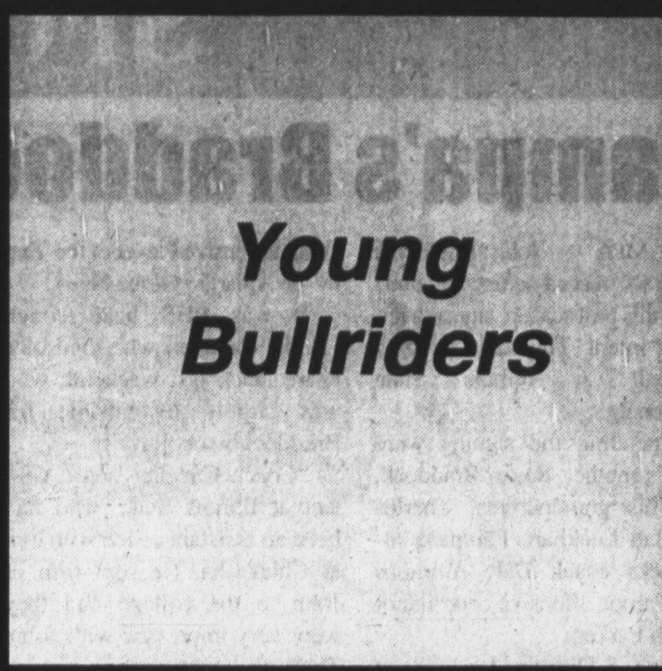
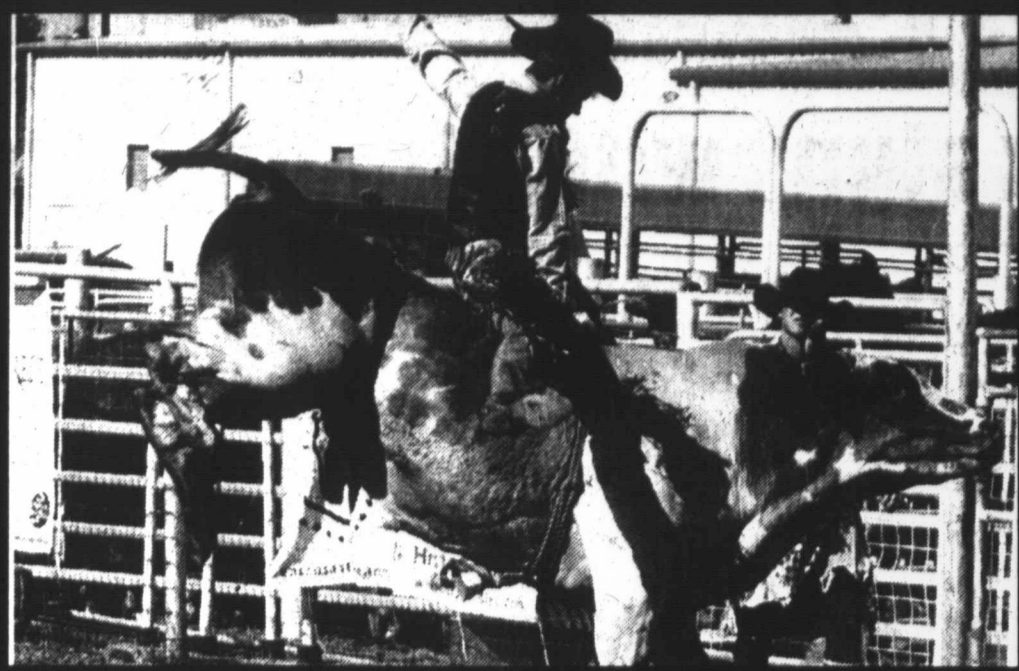

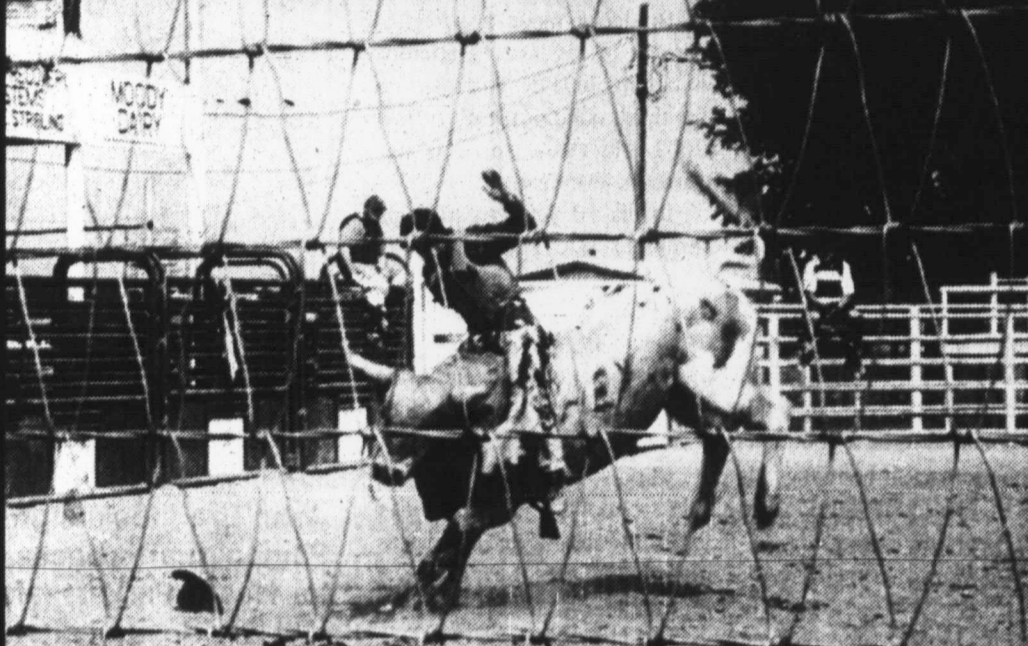

Padres lose matchip of NL's worst

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Even with eight innings of shutout ball, the San Diego Padres can't get a win. For the second time in three nights, a San Diego starter took a three-hit shutout into the ninth and lost it as visiting Milwaukee rallied to beat the Padres 3-2 on Thursday. Brian Lawrence allowed only three hits through eight innings, but gave up four hits in the ninth as all three Milwaukee runs scored with two outs. Lawrence's collapse came just two nights after Jake Peavy took a three-hit shutout into the ninth, only to see the Brewers rally for a win. "Lightning hit us twice," Padres manager Bruce Bochy said. "I've never seen a third out so hard to get." In other games National League games, Colorado beat Los Angeles 12-5, New York blanked Philadelphia 5-0, Montreal edged Florida 3-2, and Houston beat St. Louis 7-4. Lawrence retired 13 of 15 going into the ninth, but gave up a leadoff double to Scott Podsednik. He then retired Richie Sexson on a ground out and struck out Geoff Jenkins. But Brady Clark singled to score

Podsednik, took second on a wild pitch and scored the tying run on Wes Helms' double. "I never had any doubt, I felt like I could get the win," Lawrence said. Instead Lawrence got the loss. Eddie Perez hit a single to center and Helms scored the go-ahead run, chasing Lawrence. "He threw me one that I could handle, and still I didn't hit it good at all," Perez said. "I just hit it in the right place." The Padres nearly rallied in the bottom of the inning, but Sean Burroughs grounded out to first with runners on first and second, ending the game. The Padres have the NL's worst record at 15-39 and lost for the 26th time in 31 games. The Brewers, who have the NL's second-worst record (20-33), took two of three from San Diego and have beaten the Padres five times in six games over 11 days. Leo Estrella pitched the eighth for his first career win. Mike DeJean finished for his 10th save in 13 chances. **Rockies 12, Dodgers 5** At Denver, Todd Helton had his second three-homer game in the

major and a career-high six RBIs to lead Colorado past Los Angeles. Helton hit a two-run homer in the first inning off Odalis Perez, a solo shot in the fourth against Perez and another two-run homer in the eighth off Eric Gagne. Helton, who has 10 homers this season, also singled in a run in the third. Helton, who also homered three times at Coors Field on May 1, 2000, had his 22nd multihomer game, his first this season. The Rockies have won five straight and reached the .500 mark for the first time since May 6. They swept the Dodgers in Denver for the first time. **Mets 5, Phillies 0** At Philadelphia, Steve Trachsel, Graeme Lloyd and Armando Benitez allowed six hits as New York shut out the Phillies. Trachsel pitched 6 2-3 innings and Lloyd bailed him out in the seventh, striking out Jimmy Rollins after Trachsel had loaded the bases with two outs. Benitez struck out the side in the ninth. Cliff Floyd had a two-run double and Rey Sanchez, Jeromy Burnitz and Tony Clark each had RBI doubles for the Mets.

Playa exhibit travels to Mobeetie

MOBEETIE — A unique, traveling exhibit that illustrates the importance of playa lakes to the Texas Panhandle and High Plains is coming to Mobeetie June 1. "Playas ... Gems of the Plains" is a traveling exhibit project of Northwest Texas Museum Association.

The exhibit, which debuted at Amarillo Botanical Gardens earlier this year, is touring the Panhandle for the next three years, visiting museums and other exhibit venues. "Playas" will be on view at Old Mobeetie Jail Museum through July 30.

"'Playas ... Gems of the Plains' features 20 separate 80-inch tall and 40-inch wide panels which illustrate a wide range of topics about playa lakes," said co-creator Paul Katz. "Visitors will walk around the panels, each of which presents information on the function of playa lakes, their history, geography, ecology and art."

According to information provided by Playa Lakes Joint Venture, playa lakes are the most numerous wetlands in the region, totaling more than 40,000 in eastern New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming, western Kansas, Nebraska and Oklahoma, and the Texas Panhandle. More than 95 percent of the world's playa lakes are located in the Southern Great Plains — they are a unique, nearly endemic, resource.

Playa lakes are shallow, usually round, wetlands with clay floors that lie in the lowest point of a generally large, closed watershed and collect runoff from surrounding uplands.

Their average size is 17 acres, and combined, they make up about 2 percent of the total shortgrass prairie landscape. Seasonal in nature, they hold water only after rainfall or runoff events. Since rainfall is scarce in the region, the playa lakes are dry most of the time. The resulting wet-dry cycle generates a diverse plant community which produces large amounts of nutritious seeds essential for waterfowl and other birds that migrate and winter in the region.

"Many people don't realize that they have playas on their land. This exhibit really brings home the idea that everyone has a role in protecting them," said Mike Carter, coordinator of PLJV, a conservation partnership dedicated to maintaining playa lakes.

Putin celebrates St. Petersburg birthday

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia (AP) — Russian President Vladimir Putin joined his native city's tricentennial celebration Friday, attending the inauguration of a new square before meeting with the leaders of other former Soviet republics aboard a cruise ship.

He also kicked off three days of high-level talks linked to the anniversary, which the city has been celebrating for a week, with a meeting and visit to a martial arts school with Japanese Prime Minister Junichiro Koizumi. Putin was to host a summit with 15 current EU member states' leaders and those of 10 EU candidate states Saturday, and meet with President Bush on Sunday.

Before heading Friday to the shipboard meeting of the Commonwealth of Independent States, Putin

opened a St. Petersburg square that had been renovated and renamed after Peter the Great, the czar who founded the city in 1703. He also visited a children's art exhibit and spoke with the young artists.

Russian Foreign Ministry spokesman Alexander Yakovenko said Thursday that the summit of the CIS, a loose grouping of 12 former Soviet republics, was likely to focus on plans to continue a CIS peacekeeping mission in Georgia's breakaway Abkhazia province and the situation in Iraq.

He said Russia, Belarus, Ukraine and Kazakhstan would inform other members about their plans to form a free-trade zone by September and the mechanism for joining.

Meanwhile, foreign dignitaries continued to stream into the city, some bearing gifts in

honor of its anniversary. Canadian Prime Minister Jean Chretien was to unveil a monument to Canadian poet Emile Nelligan, a gift to St. Petersburg from the city of Quebec.

German Chancellor Gerhard Schroeder was expected to open a sculpture of a nose by German artist Joerg Immendorff in a courtyard of the Russian Museum. The statue was inspired by a surreal story by 19th-century Russian writer Nikolai Gogol in which a civil servant's nose detaches itself and takes on a life of its own.

After their arrival late Thursday, Putin and his wife, Lyudmila, visited an international youth festival. The festival is part of a series of exchanges among Russia, Germany, Finland and Sweden, the ITAR-Tass news agency said.

Last Air France Concorde flight to New York leaves Paris

PARIS (AP) — Flying into blue skies and history, the last Air France Concorde commercial flight for New York left Paris on Friday, closing a pioneering chapter in aviation.

The white needle-nosed supersonic plane took off with a roar from Paris' Charles de Gaulle airport at 10:38 a.m. (4:38 a.m. EDT).

On Saturday, in its last ever commercial flight for Air France, Concorde will fly back to Paris from New York and then go into retirement.

"It's very emotional. Concorde is a story of joy, of emotion, of technical prowess," said Jean-Pierre Lefebvre, a Concorde staffer,

before the flight departed with 58 passengers, three pilots and eight cabin crew.

Air France and British Airways, the only carriers to operate the aircraft, are both retiring their Concorde fleets. The last British Airways flights are scheduled for October.

Concorde's demise will end an era of Champagne and caviar at twice the speed of sound.

The luxury aircraft began regular service in 1976. With a cruising speed of 1,350 miles per hour, it crosses the Atlantic in about three hours; because of the time change, westbound passengers arrive an hour before they left.
