

Thelma's Texas roots are deep. Her grandmother, Sam Houston Ross, was named for the famous Texas general, Sam Houston, with whom her family fought the war for independence.

Thelma was born in Lavernia, Texas, on Dec. 20, 1903. As a young girl, she made a 1,200-mile trek from San Antonio to eastern New Mexico where her father homesteaded 30 miles from the nearest town. The family later returned to Lavernia where she lived until she moved to San Antonio and attended Draughon's Business College. Until she married, she worked as a secretary for an oil com-

In November, 1929, she married J.C. McWilliams with whom three sons and one daughter were born. For nearly 50 years, Thelma and "Mack" carved out a wonderfully active life in Pampa, Texas.

They were extremely involved with their children, their church, their schools, their business, and community. They made the First Methodist Church their church home.

A visionary extraordinaire, Thelma devoted her life to raising her children to be welleducated, good citizens. She was a woman of great determination, dignity, grace, and

Mr. Grider was born July 8, 1914, in Cooper, Texas, to Robert Cornelius Grider and Audrey McClanahan Grider. His father was killed by a horse a few months before he was born and his mother later remarried. He had three half brothers, all of whom are deceased.

Mr. Grider came to Pampa from Lubbock in the early 1930s, seeking work in the oil. law, Mr. and Mrs. Robert C. Grider, III, of fields during the Depression. British Prime Minister Tony Blair said economic reform efforts by European countries such as France and Germany were on the agenda.

"There is a general recognition that if we don't change and reform our economies quickly we are not going to be able to survive with the same living standards in the modern world," Blair said.

All leaders at the annual Group of Eight summit composed of the world's seven wealthiest nations and Russia - asserted they were putting divisions over Iraq behind

Bush, with a smiling Chirac sitting next to him, praised the French president as a "man who knows a lot about the Middle East" and said he wanted to seek his advice before heading to the region for talks with the leaders of Israel and various Arab countries.

Bush left the summit a day early for a round of talks aimed at getting stalled peace talks back on track.

A senior U.S. official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said that in their private meeting Bush told Chirac, "The Iraq situation was difficult but it is time to move

Chirac's spokeswoman Colonna told reporters that the French and U.S. presidents sought in their

prisoner to the past. ... The question now is to see how peace can succeed in Iraq."

Bernd Mueztelburg, foreign policy adviser to German Chancellor Gerhard Schroeder, said the talks among the leaders over Iraq demonstrated "a common will not just to look ahead, but also to politically stabilize the country and rebuild the economy."

None of the G-8 nations made new offers at the Evian summit to support the rebuilding effort financially. The United States is planning to hold a pledging conference among rich nations later this

While four of the G-8 countries — France, Germany, Russia and Canada — opposed the Iraq war, Chirac said that private discussions to ensure there was common agreement "that French-U.S. ties are not a now that the new United

Nation's Security Council resolution would serve as the basis for rebuilding Iraq.

The Bush administration won a victory when those countries dropped their opposition to giving the United States and Britain a broad mandate in a U.N. resolution, overwhelmingly approved last month, to rebuild Iraq with only minimal U.N. input.

The opening day of the G-8 summit Sunday had been devoted to discussions among a much larger group of 11 of the world's major developing countries including China, Brazil, India, Mexico and Malaysia joining a number of

African nations.

The African countries won commitments from the United States and Europe to greatly increase the money they will provide to fight AIDS in poor countries with European countries saying they would match America's tripling of resources contained in a new \$15 billion, five-year AIDS law Congress passed at Bush's urging.

Speaking from Rome, Secretary of State Colin Powell said U.S. officials working on the text of final statements planned for after the Agaba meetings were "encouraged by what they have been able to achieve so far."

"We expect that positive statements will be forthcoming," Powell said. "But you know, statement writing always goes down to the last

minute as people try to present one position or another."

Recent statements by Sharon acknowledging that Israeli forces' "occupation" of Palestinian territories showed that "whichever interpretation you put on that ... it's a situation that is unsustainable over time," Powell said.

Asked if the United States would apply sanctions for countries that fail to comply, a senior administration official said, "The United States is going to be in a position to assess where progress is being made and where it isn't. And to assess where the roadblocks to progress are and where they are

Abbas said the Palestinian

leadership "is committed to implementing its part of the road map and calls on Israel to do the same." His comments, reported by the official Jordanian news agency, Petra, came during talks Monday in Jordan with King Abdullah II.

Bush also will underscore to Sharon at their meeting Wednesday that Israel has responsibilities to make the peace process work.

"My expectations on the Middle East are to call all the respective parties to their responsibilities to achieve peace," Bush said. "My country and I will put in as much time as necessary to achieve the vision of two states, living side by side in peace.'







Baylor advances to super regionals with win over Southern Miss

HATTIESBURG, Miss. (AP) — Faced with the prospect of playing an elimination game on its opponent's field, Baylor rallied and got to go home early.

David Murphy hit a tworun, game-tying double and Josh Ford followed with an RBI single as the Bears scored three runs in the eighth to beat Southern Mississippi 3-2 and win the NCAA regional on Sunday.

"We managed to hang around long enough to have something good happen," Baylor coach Steve Smith said.

The top-seeded Bears (44-21) advanced to a super regional for the second time, and did it without losing a game in the regionals. They will play LSU in a best-of-three series beginning Friday.

Miss (47-16) led 2-0 going into the eighth inning. With starter Anthony DeWitt dominating the Bears, the Golden Eagles were on their way to forcing a second game Sunday in the double elimination tournament.

The Orioles surged to the .500 mark last Aug. 23, then stumbled to a 4-32 finseason.
