## City, PEDC agree to disagree

A tangible tension could be felt as city commissioners and Pampa Economic Development Board members sat down for a round-table meeting this week - the first time the two groups had met jointly to discuss the PEDC's dissolution.

An hour later, at the meeting's end, the group shook hands and patted each other on the back.

Basically, after all was said and done, they agreed to disagree on how

to handle the Section 53 land donated to the PEDC by Celanese and the interpretation of a Texas Attorney General's opinion on whether or not the City of Pampa had authority to hold back the valuable land from the dissolution process.

In July, city commissioners passed a resolution to keep the land which contains valuable water rights needed for the prison units and, potentially, for the city in the future.

The remainder of the PEDC assets are to be sold and the profits used to pay off the corporation's \$2 million debt and obligations.

For almost two years, the PEDC board and city officials have worked to close down the PEDC after a majority of citizens voted for the action in November 2001.

Often the two agencies seemed at odds about the proper way to do this, seeking advice from local lawyers and the Attorney General Office.

Both those who want to keep possession of the property and those who want to sell it to pay off PEDC debts interpret the AG's opinion in favor of their beliefs.

Dalton Lewis, PEDC board member, said that the city commission based their decision to keep the land on incomplete information.

"A certain city father told you what could be done, but didn't tell you all of it," Lewis said.

"Section 53 is the most valuable property we have," said Gary Sutherland, PEDC board member. "I agree with Dalton. It is my personal feeling that the land ought to be sold. But I'm not going to fuss with you about it."

## Grand jury indicts two

Gray County grand jurors Thursday handed up two indictments in 223rd District Court here, including one that levels an assault charge against a Pampan exonerated in a controversial Tulia drug case.

Grand jurors indicted Christopher Eugene Jackson, 31, 512 Harlem, for assault on a public servant - enhanced, a first degree felony. The charge was enhanced due to two prior convictions for burglary of a motor vehicle and for delivery of a controlled substance, both in Swisher County, according to the indictment.

Jackson is charged with punching Pampa Police Officer Jarrett Parsons on June 20 when Parsons attempted to detain him for questioning. Police Chief Trevlyn Pitner said at the time that city officers had responded to a report of a suspicious male "possibly intoxicated" who was standing in the roadway of U.S. Highway 60, yelling at passing cars.

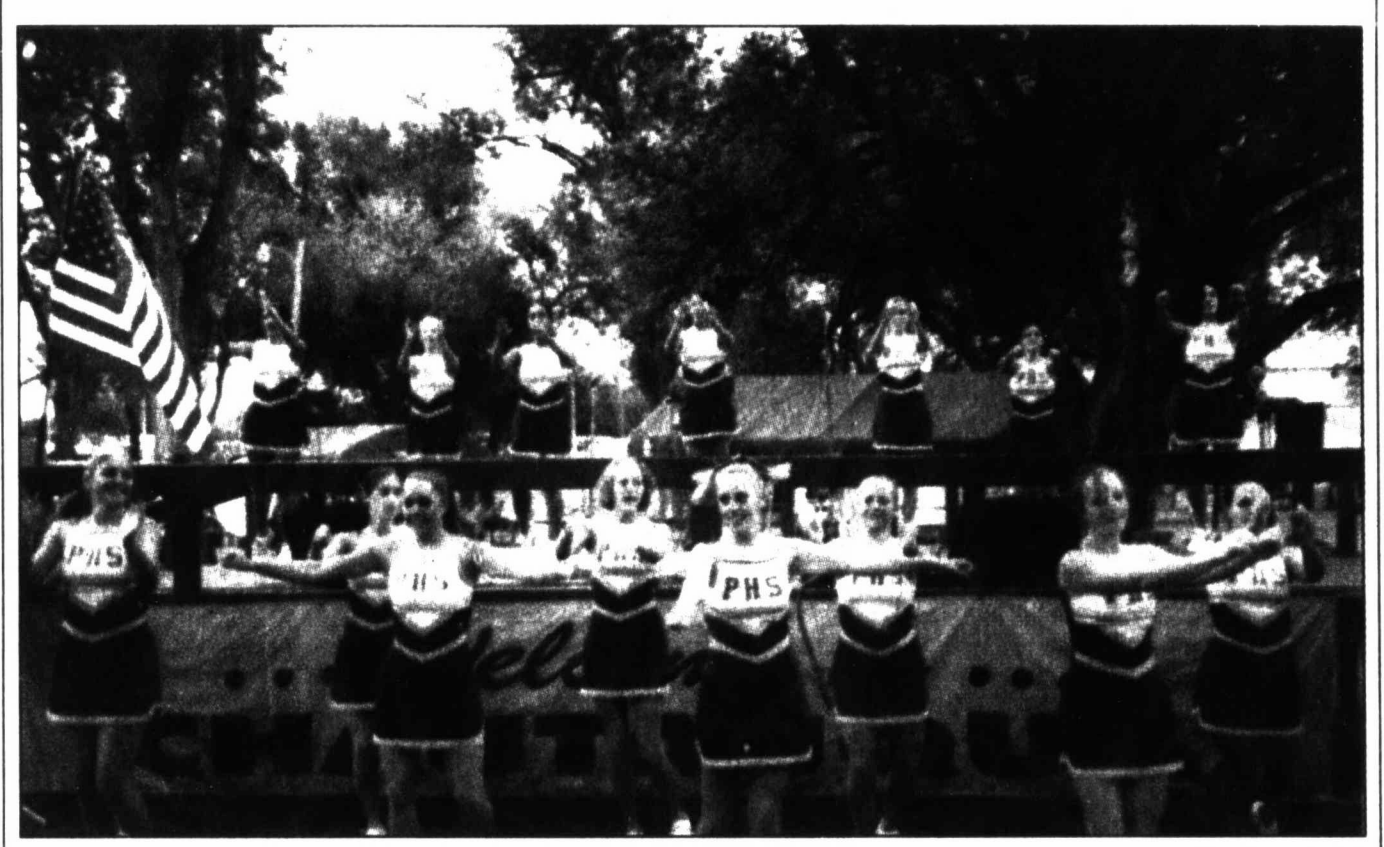
The man reportedly ran from officers when they approached and when Parsons attempted to stop him, he was struck in the face and head, Pitner said. The police officer was treated and released for minor injuries, he said.

Bond for Jackson has been set at \$5,000. He was released on bond earlier this week.

The incident occurred four days after Jackson was released on bond, along with 11 others, in connection with a controversial Tulia drug case from a July 1999 drug sting that led to 46 arrests. The testimony of the undercover officer - which had led to Jackson's conviction in the case was later proven to be tainted. Recently, Jackson and a number of others convicted in the case, were exonerated.

Ellis Lee Fondren, Jr., 44, of Teague, was named in an indictment for possession of a controlled substance, a second degree felony. Fondren is alleged to have been arrested on April 2 for having more than four grams and less than 200 grams of methamphetamine at the time of his arrest. Bond was set at \$25,000. He is presently free on bond.

## Reactions differ to Iraq resolution

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The 15 Security Council nations had widely differing reactions to a new U.N. resolution proposed by the United States to attract more money and troops for Iraq. France, Germany and Syria criticized it while supporters of the Iraq war welcomed it as a positive step.

France and Germany called the U.S. proposal a basis for negotiations, and U.S. Secretary of State Colin Powell said he was ready to listen to their suggestions and consider any other "constructive input."

As council members digested the U.S. draft it was clear that the United States faced tough negotiations on several key issues.

The draft, in Powell's words, puts "the Security Council into the game." It doesn't relinquish U.S. political and military control of the country.

France, Germany, Russia and other council members want the U.S.-led coalition to transfer political responsibility to an Iraqi government as quick-

ly as possible. Many council nations are also demanding a much stronger U.N. role. France would like to see the United Nations replace the United States as Iraq's interim administrator. Syria also wants the United Nations to command the U.N.-authorized multinational force envisioned in the resolution.

The five veto-wielding permanent council members — the United States, France, Britain, Russia and China — met for 1 1/2 hours Thursday afternoon to discuss the draft.

"We are going to negotiate the text," said France's U.N. Ambassador Jean-Marc de La Sabliere. Russia's U.N. Ambassador called the session a "friendly discussion."

Britain hosted an informal meeting of all 15 council ambassadors Friday morning to discuss the U.S. draft and suggested changes.

Powell said Wednesday he would assess where negotiations were early next week "and push it as aggressively as we can."

Deputy Defense Secretary Paul Wolfowitz said the bombing of the U.N. headquarters in Baghdad changed attitudes at the United Nations and was allowing the Bush administration to seek more support.

"I think we had a breakthrough, a sad one, but the bombing of the U.N. headquarters I think changed the atmosphere," he said.

The U.S. draft resolution invites the U.S.-appointed Iraqi Governing Council to cooperate with the United Nations and U.S. officials in Baghdad to produce "a timetable and program for the drafting of a new constitution for Iraq and for the holding of democratic elections."

It contains no timeframe of when this should happen and leaves the key decision in the hands of the Governing Council, which took months just to form a Cabinet. The United States believes the Iraqis must remain in charge of this process.

## Hurricane Fabian thunders toward Bermuda

HAMILTON, Bermuda (AP) — Offices closed and islanders boarded up their homes as Hurricane Fabian thundered toward Bermuda on Friday with 120 mph winds, the worst storm to take aim at the British territory in years.

Picking up speed, the Category 3 hurricane was expected to slam into Bermuda by late Friday afternoon.

Bermuda's famous beaches were pounded with waves topping 10 feet.

All of Friday's flights into Bermuda were canceled. Cruise ships left port days earlier, while those still at sea steered different routes to avoid the storm.

"There's no escaping," said Ian Currie of Bermuda's weather service. Although it is one of the wealthiest

island chains with hurricane-resistant homes and a sturdy infrastructure, Bermuda hasn't seen a Category 3 hurricane since 1963, when Arlene destroyed crops and homes.

The last powerful hurricane to hit the British mid-Atlantic islands was Hurricane Emily in 1987, a Category 1 storm that tore off roofs, left homes without power for weeks and caused

more than \$50 million damage.

The government closed all of its offices Thursday, other businesses sent workers home and islanders withdrew money from banks and formed long lines at gas stations.

At 11 a.m. Friday, Fabian's center was about 110 miles south of Bermuda, according to the National Hurricane (See FABIAN, Page 3)

"I think we're making headway on the other stuff and some day, I hope we can get another EDC," he added.

"I appreciate all your work," said Commissioner Faustina Curry said the PEDC board. "You're volunteers in unpaid, chew-your-butts situations. I appreciate what you do and I appreciate how difficult it is.

"Sometimes we get to the point where we realize there is no reconciliation," she added. "Where do we go from here?"

"I strongly believe the water rights are so valuable the City of Pampa, we must keep that land," she said.

Commissioner Jeff McCormick said he didn't think the PEDC needed to be paying for an attorney.

"My position is to have the responsibility of two or three million dollars in assets, not to have legal advice and assistance is negligent," said PEDC President Doug Locke.

"We need an attorney for

Crall, we need an attorney for American Energy," said Steve Phillips of the PEDC, adding that they are trying to control legal costs as much as possible.

PEDC board members updated commissioners on the dissolution progress including their plan to accept a lease/purchase agreement with Frac Services Inc., to lease the American Energy Building for \$2,000 a month for three years for a total payment of \$150,000.

Locke said attorney Vanessa Buzzard is proceeding with foreclosure on the Crall property. Oct. 9 has been set as the foreclosure sale date, he said, adding that Curtis Heard, Crall's owner, could stave off the process by filing bankruptcy up to the moment the sale starts.

He said although the board could legally do so, it has no plans to shut down Crall. "We're not in the business of economic development, and for lack of a better term, we're not in the business of economic disaster," said Sutherland.

The PEDC's loan to Rhoden Dairy has been transferred to the new owners, the board reported, and will be forgiven at a rate of \$50,000 per year. The dairy is expected to be in full operation by October.

Phillips reported that the board has paid off many of the high interest notes and are now working on the other debt. He said approximately \$1 million of the debt has now been paid.

Commissioner Bob Dixon commended them for doing this. He also spoke of the success of the United Medical Corporation.

He said after the current EDC is dissolved, "We should get something better. People say you learn from your mistakes. Well, we should learn a lot," he said.

"I think this has been a good time for all of us to sit down and talk," said Mayor Lonny Robbins. "We need to encourage our people about starting another EDC."

"Maybe that's what we need to do in 2005," Locke said.

in the most positive manner," French President Jacques Chirac said after meeting German Chancellor Gerhard Schroeder. "But we are quite far removed from what we believe is the priority objective, which is the transfer of political responsibility to an Iraqi government as quickly as possible."

As for the U.N. role, besides helping with the timeline, the resolution asks the U.N. representative in Iraq to facilitate a "national dialogue and consensus building" to promote the political transition. It doesn't provide for an expanded U.N. role in the security or economic areas, except for reports at least every six months to the Security Council on the efforts of the multinational force.

"We have always asked for a central role of the United Nations in all fields," Germany's U.N. Ambassador Gunter Pleuger noted. "It's a good working basis but it certainly can be improved."

Russian Foreign Minister Igor Ivanov on Thursday reaffirmed Russia's push for a quick restoration of Iraq's sovereignty and said the U.S.

draft "outlines movement toward those principles."

"Preliminarily speaking, I can say that this initiative deserves attention since the content of the proposed resolution reflects those principles which Russia has consistently championed," Ivanov said. "Naturally, very serious work needs to be done so that they are fully reflected" in the final version.

In a strong signal that Moscow was edging closer to Washington than to France and Germany, Defense Minister Sergei Ivanov said Thursday that Russia may send peacekeepers to Iraq as part of an international force.

The U.S.-Russian tilt was bolstered by Security Council diplomats who said Moscow was working closely with Washington on the U.S. draft.

China was also against the war. In Beijing, Foreign Ministry spokesman Kong Quan said Thursday that the U.S. offer to share Iraq's post-war reconstruction was in line with the objectives of China, which has "actively participated in the endeavor."

Center in Miami. Forecasters said Fabian could knock some buildings off their foundations, damage crops and cause widespread flooding and erosion.

"It's a powerful hurricane, and there's no indication it's going to fall apart," said Lixion Avila, a meteorologist at the U.S. National Hurricane Center.

Forecasters worried the storm could produce powerful tornadoes, and Gary Madeiros of the Bermuda Electric Light Co., said the islands could lose power for days or weeks.

"Secure your residences, boats, and any moveable objects that may place you or your family in danger," Bermuda Premier Alex Scott said.

The government opened

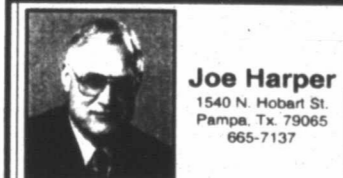

schools as evacuation shelters and urged people to leave 2,000 homes in flood-vulnerable areas. Those living on the exposed South Shore were also urged to flee.

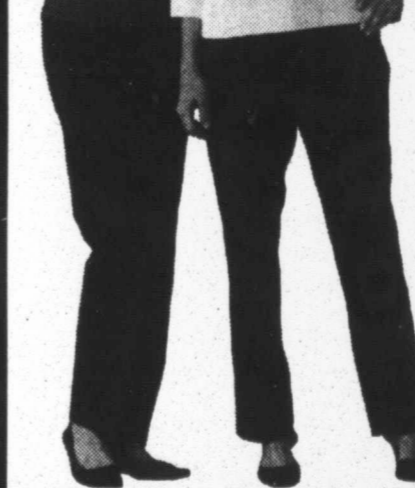

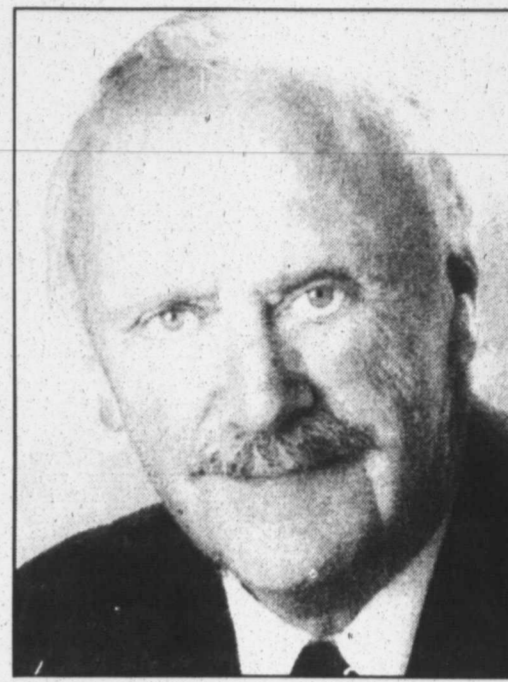
## Missionary to Eurasia to speak at Briarwood

**DEAR ABBY:** My sister-in-law is pregnant (a baby girl) and has decided to name her "Haley." That's not the problem, though.

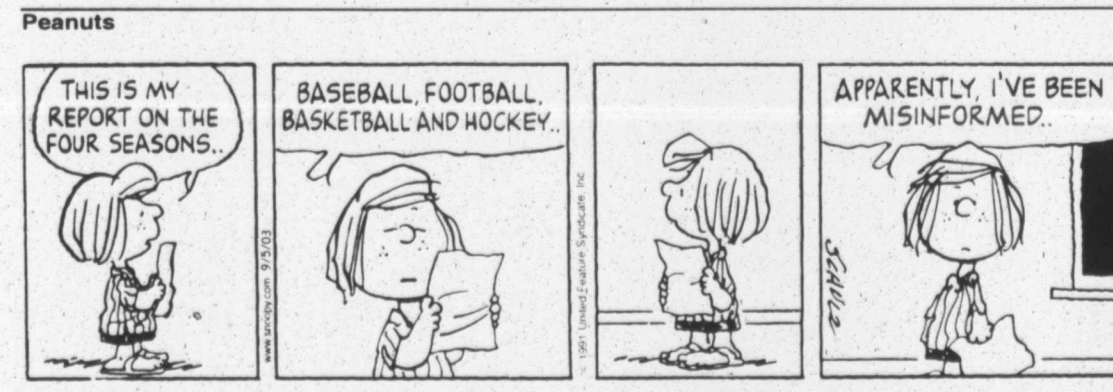
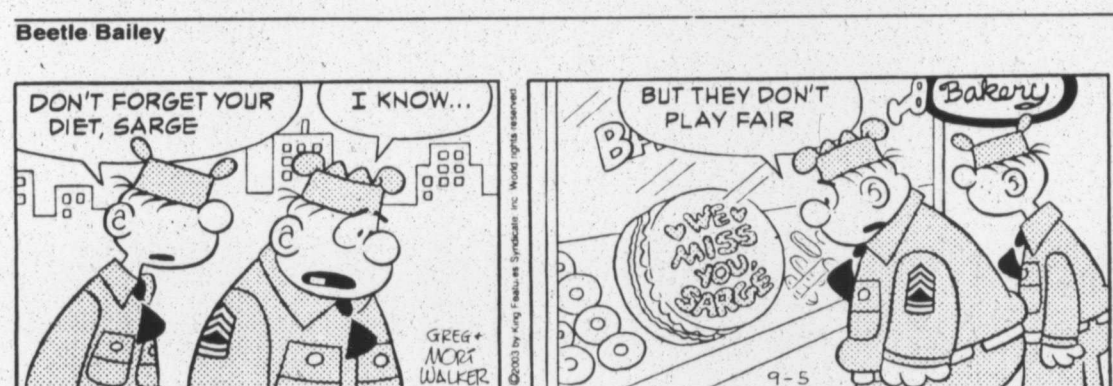

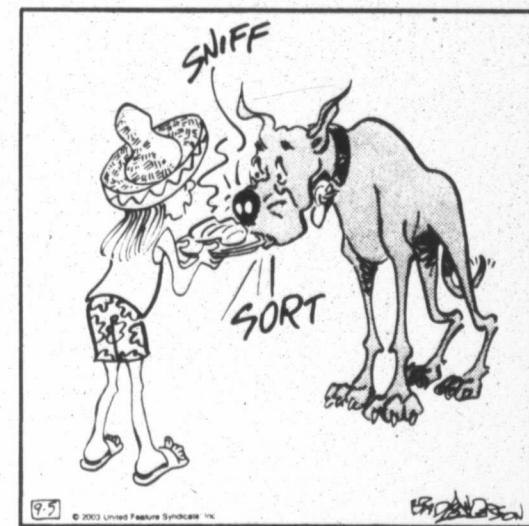

## Cubs vs. Cards: As good as it gets in regular season

CHICAGO (AP) — Tony La Russa and Dusty Baker have managed in the World Series, so they're accustomed to roaring crowds, spirited play and emotional performances.

But for early September, with both teams shooting for the playoffs, a five-game series between La Russa's Cardinals and Baker's Cubs was about as good as it gets in the regular season.

Especially for the Cubs, who won four times.

"I talked to a lot of people and they said this is the best five-game series they've ever seen, especially this late," Baker said after Thursday's 7-6 win.

"But it's too early to say if it is a turning point."

The Cubs, a half-game behind Houston in the NL Central and a half-game ahead of the Cardinals, have 22 games left. Chicago and St. Louis, with 21 games to go, don't meet again in the regular season.

"Every game could have gone either way and it went their way except one," La Russa said. "There's a difference between a play, a pitch or an at-bat and they had it. They had the edge over us."

In other NL games, it was: Florida 5, Pittsburgh 1; and Philadelphia 6, New York 5.

In an interleague game, Arizona beat Kansas City 6-5 in 10 innings.

The series featured a little bit of everything: a rain delay of more than four hours Monday; a day-night doubleheader that included a 15-inning opener; the ejections of three Cubs players, including Sammy Sosa on Thursday, and pitching coach Larry Rothschild; a shouting

match between Baker and La Russa; and a stunning comeback by the Cubs to win Wednesday after trailing 6-0.

Baker and La Russa, whose blowup centered about pitching inside and hitting batters, met for several minutes behind the cage during batting practice Thursday, expressed their views to one another and shook hands.

Tony Womack, who entered in a double switch in the top of the seventh, hit a go-ahead single in the bottom half off Mike DeJean (5-8), who had walked Moises Alou and hit Aramis Ramirez with a pitch.

DeJean then got out of a bases-loaded jam by slipping a third strike past Randall Simon called by plate umpire Bill Hohn, the center of numerous complaints all day by the Cubs.

He ejected Sosa as he was walking back to the dugout after Sosa apparently made a comment about a third strike call.

"I was cursing myself and he threw me out of the game," Sosa said. "He heard me when I was cursing myself."

In the fifth inning, Hohn ejected Rothschild, who was in the dugout. Moments earlier, Hohn called a ball on a close pitch that Cubs starter Shawn Estes apparently thought was a strike.

The umpires were not available for comment after the game.

Sosa was the third Cubs player to be ejected during the heated series.

In the second game Tuesday, pitcher Antonio Alfonseca and Alou were ejected by Justin Klemm after he called Alou's line drive down the left-field line foul.

New Mexico quarterback Casey Kelly left the game in the first quarter with a fractured bone in

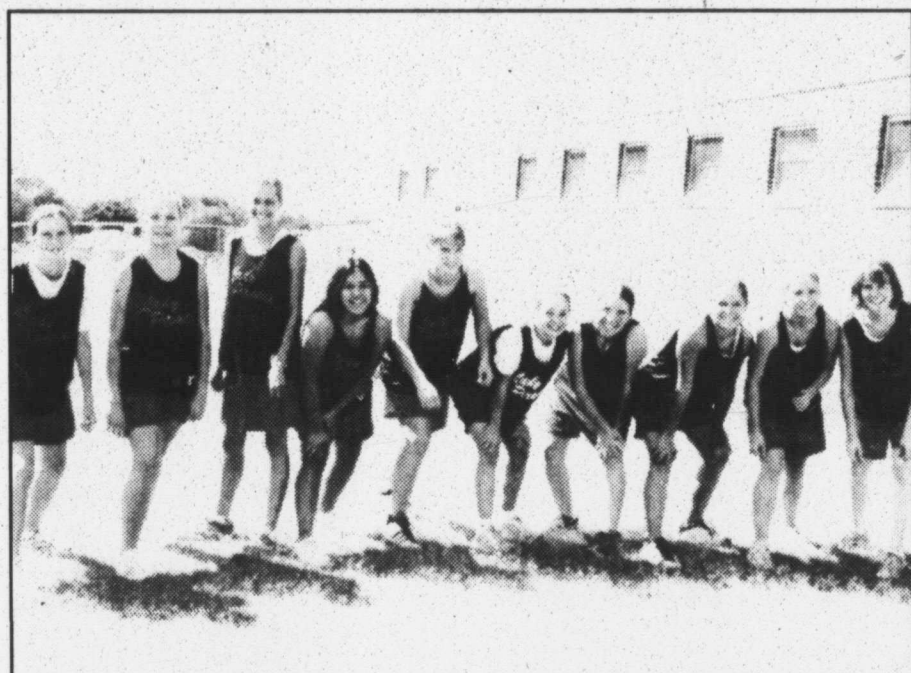
his left arm.

## Smith ready for Cardinal debut

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — Old No. 22 — or is it new No. 22 — will make his debut for the Arizona Cardinals in Detroit on Sunday, and he's bemused by the attention he's bound to receive.

"What are they looking for?" Emmitt Smith said after a workout in triple-digit heat on Thursday. "They've already said I ain't worth nothing anyway."

The comment, although said in half-jest, was a rare glimpse into the motivation that drives the NFL's career rushing leader as he enters his 14th pro season as a member of one of the sport's least successful franchises.

Although he downplays it most of the time, Smith is out to prove that, at age 34, he still can be a highly effective running back after Dallas let him go following 13 seasons, and three Super Bowl titles, with the Cowboys.

He certainly will get his chances.

"We're going to try to put the ball in his hands as much as possible," quarterback Jeff Blake said. "We've got all kinds of ways of doing it. You'll see screens, draws, him coming out of the backfield, straight runs, him lining up in receiver spots."

Smith was in on only a handful of plays as Arizona went 4-0 in the preseason. He had four carries for 11 yards

and two catches for 5 yards.

"But he practiced every day, and he practiced very hard," Blake said. "A guy like Emmitt has played long enough to know how to turn it on and off."

Smith said he doesn't need extensive preseason work to be ready to go in Sunday's opener.

"You got a bike? You know how to pedal?" Smith said. "Ain't nothing changed, has it? That's just the way football is. I've played a little bit in preseason, and we're getting a lot of inside run work here in practice, getting used to players being around me and reading the blocks."

The Cardinals' receiving corps is the least experienced in the NFL, so defenses are bound to try shut down Smith and backup Marcel Shipp and force Blake to throw.

That will leave a heavy burden on Arizona's big offensive line, bolstered by the return of 6-foot-6, 384-pound guard Leonard Davis. Davis will be playing with his broken right hand, the result of a fight during training camp, in a heavily wrapped 13-pound cast.

Smith emphasized he is no savior for this franchise, only someone who hopes to contribute to a turnaround for a team that went 5-11 a year ago.

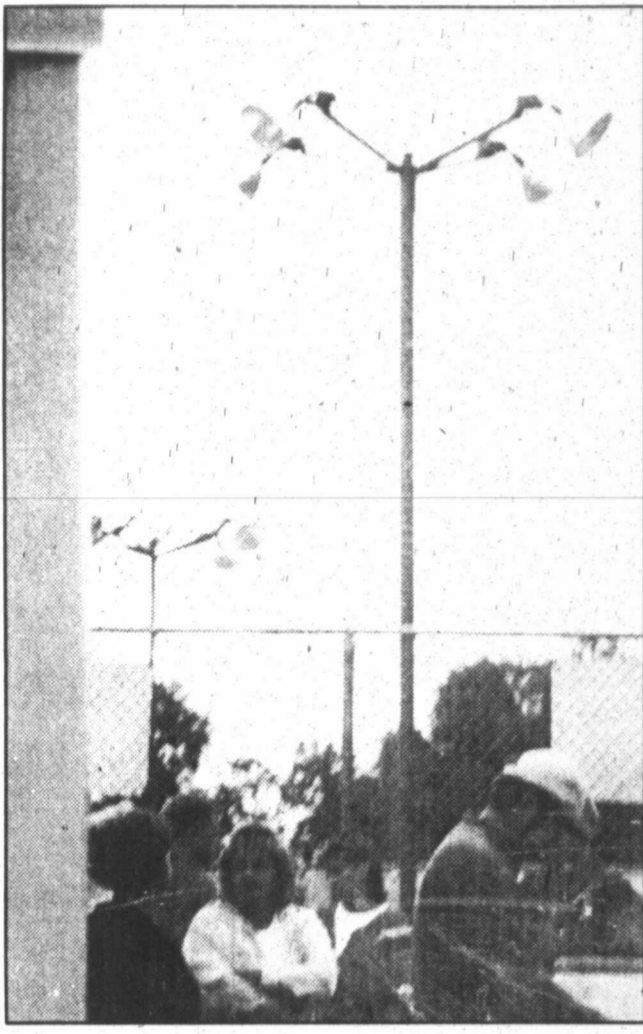

## Cosby 'pep rally' for Baylor draws 20,000

WACO, Texas (AP) — Baylor University's marching band and a crowd of an estimated 20,000 greeted comedian Bill Cosby with loud cheers Thursday night at a "pep rally" designed to boost morale at a university shaken by heartache and scandal.

Cosby aimed to replace beleaguered Baylor's tears with laughs — its glum with glee — during a free performance at Floyd Casey Stadium, home of the university's football team.

"Tonight, it's about you," Cosby told the crowd, which filled the west side of the stadium facing the stage.

"It's about the fact that you were left out of all this. It's about how tragedy came, but nobody really remembered that you were coming and you were a part of this as well."

Cosby, sporting a yellow "Baylor Track & Field" T-shirt, said he wanted to "build up" Baylor's students following basketball player Patrick Dennehy's

death. Since Dennehy's death and the arrest of former teammate Carlton Dotson on murder charges, revelations of secretly paid players, failed drug tests and a tape-recorded plot by former coach Dave Bliss to cover up wrongdoing have shaken the world's largest Baptist university.

"We're going to have fun," Cosby promised, drawing huge applause.

He didn't disappoint, keeping

the audience laughing throughout a 90-minute comedy routine that made light of his "C average" daughter's college experience. He told of calling a college president in an attempt to gain his daughter's admission.

"Mr. President, I was just wondering if your college needed a hospital," Cosby said he asked. "He said, 'How low is the SAT score?' I said, 'Oh, it's in the high 840s.' He said, 'We're going to need housing for the doctors.'"

## Redskins edge Jets in NFL opener

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — John Hall wanted the chance to kick a game-winning field goal against his former team.

He thought about it for months, envisioning different scenarios. They all ended the same way: in victory.

Hall got the opportunity he craved in the NFL season opener Thursday night and came through. He kicked a 33-yarder with 5 seconds remaining to lift the Washington Redskins past the New York Jets 16-13.

The win meant vindication for Hall, Laveranues Coles, Chad Morton and Randy Thomas. They finally could brag about jumping from the Jets to the Redskins in the offseason.

"It's pretty much one of those stupid things you do when you're done practicing," Hall said. "You make up those situations where you have this or that — and I'm sure you know which team it was against."

Hall also had kicks of 50 and 22 yards to help the JetSkinks

take bragging rights.

Coles also contributed in a big way, with five receptions for 106 yards — though they all came in the first half. The former Jets-turned-Redskins story line dominated talk throughout the week leading up to the game.

How fitting, then, that Hall won it.

Coach Steve Spurrier handed a game ball to Hall and owner Daniel Snyder, whose offseason spending made the acquisition of Coles, Morton, Hall and Thomas possible.

Thomas could not resist looking at his former teammates after the kick sailed through.

"To see those guys with their faces down when the kick went in, it was a lovely feeling," Thomas said.

Surprisingly, the game turned into a defensive struggle. Washington led 13-7 at halftime and looked far superior offensively. Coles was wide open throughout the half, and Patrick Ramsey went 12-of-13 for 156

yards.

But in the second half, the Jets tightened their coverage on Coles and limited Ramsey, who finished 17-of-23 for 185 yards. Donnie Abraham had an interception and John Abraham caused a fumble that Jason Ferguson recovered to put the Jets back in the game.

Unfortunately for the Jets, they were only able to get field goals by Doug Brien to tie the game at 13. Then the defining offensive series. With four minutes remaining, the Jets had a chance to go down the field and set up the winning score.

On third-and-1 at their own 27, LaMont Jordan and Vinny Testaverde had a miscommunication on the handoff, and Jordan lost 4 yards. The Jets punted, and Washington had the opportunity to win it.

"I take full responsibility for that," Testaverde said. "It's my job to get him the ball and make sure he gets it clean."
