Clarendon College-Pampa **Grand jury** offering a certified nurse's aide indicts two

Gray County grand jurors Thursday handed up two indictments in 223rd District Court here, including one that levels an assault charge against a Pampan exonerated in a controversial Tulia drug case.

Grand jurors indicted Christopher Eugene Jackson, 31, 512 Harlem, for assault on a public servant - enhanced, a first degree felony. The charge was enhanced due to two prior convictions for burglary of a motor vehicle and for delivery of a controlled substance, both in Swisher County, according to the

Jackson is charged with punching Pampa Police Officer Jarrett Parsons on June 20 when Parsons attempted to detain him for questioning. Police Chief Trevlyn Pitner said at the time that city officers had responded to a report of a suspicious male "possibly intoxicated" who was standing in the oadway of U.S. Highway 60, yelling at passing cars.


The man reportedly ran from officers when they approached and when Parsons attempted to stop him, he was struck in the face and head, Pitner said. The police officer was treated and released for minor injuries, he said.

in the most positive manner," French President Jacques Chirac said after meeting German Chancellor Gerhard Schroeder. "But we are quite far removed from what we believe is the priority objective, which is the transfer of political responsibility to an Iraqi government as quickly as pos-

As for the U.N. role, besides helping with the timeline, the resolution asks the U.N. representative in Iraq to facilitate a "national dialogue and consensus building" to promote the political transition. It doesn't provide for an expanded U.N. role in the security or economic areas, except for reports at least every six months to the Security Council on the efforts of the multinational force.

"We have always asked for a central role of the United Nations in all fields," Germany's U.N. Ambassador Gunter Pleuger noted. "It's a good working basis but it certainly can be improved."

Russian Foreign Minister Igor Ivanov on Thursday reaffirmed Russia's push for a quick restoration of Iraq's sovereignty and said the U.S. draft "outlines movement toward those princi-

"Preliminarily speaking, I can say that this initiative deserves attention since the content of the proposed resolution reflects those principles which Russia has consistently championed," Ivanov said. "Naturally, very serious work needs to be done so that they are fully reflected" in the final version.

In a strong signal that Moscow was edging closer to Washington than to France and Germany, Defense Minister Sergei Ivanov said Thursday that Russia may send peacekeepers to Iraq as part of an international force.

The U.S.-Russian tilt was bolstered by Security Council diplomats who said Moscow was working closely with Washington on the U.S.

China was also against the war. In Beijing, Foreign Ministry spokesman Kong Quan said Thursday that the U.S. offer to share Iraq's postwar reconstruction was in line with the objectives of China, which has "actively participated in the endeavor."


Missionary to Eurasia to speak at Briarwood

Pope condemns hatred in Middle East, Africa

CASTEL GANDOLFO, Italy (AP) - Pope John Paul II decried hatred and violence in the Middle East and Africa, and prayed for pardon and reconciliation among peoples.

Greeting pilgrims at his summer residence in Castel Gandolfo, a hill town near Rome, John Paul prayed to the Virgin Mary so that she would "look upon those who have more need of pardon and reconciliation, bring harmony in families and peace among peoples.'

The pontiff expressed hope that Mary would "dry the tears that hatred and violence provoke in many regions of the Earth, especially in the Middle East and on the African continent."

John Paul did not cite a particular incident Sunday, but the day's news was filled with bloodshed.

In Iraq, hundreds of thousands of Muslims mourned a Shiite leader who was assassinated in a car bombing before that killed at least 125 people.

Israel has killed several militants in missile strikes in Gaza since a suicide bomber killed 21 people in Jerusalem on Aug. 19.

In Liberia, one of several violent conflicts in Africa, widespread hunger and scattered clashes persisted despite an Aug. 18 peace accord among government and rebel forces.

Cubs vs. Cards: As good as it gets in regular season

CHICAGO (AP) — Tony La Russa and Dusty Baker have managed in the World Series, so they're accustomed to roaring crowds, spirited play and emotional performances.

But for early September, with both teams shooting for the playoffs, a five-game series between La Russa's Cardinals and Baker's Cubs was about as good as it gets in the regular season.

Especially for the Cubs, who won four times.

"I talked to a lot of people and they said this is the best fivegame series they've ever seen, especially this late," Baker said after Thursday's 7-6 win.

"But it's too early to say if it is a turning point."

The Cubs, a half-game behind Houston in the NL Central and a half-game ahead of the Cardinals, have 22 games left. Chicago and St. Louis, with 21 games to go, don't meet again in the regular season.

"Every game could have gone either way and it went their way except one," La Russa said. "There's a difference between a play, a pitch or an at-bat and they had it. They had the edge over

In other NL games, it was: Florida 5, Pittsburgh 1; and Philadelphia 6, New York 5.

In an interleague game, Arizona beat Kansas City 6-5 in 10 innings.

The series featured a little bit of everything: a rain delay of more than four hours Monday; a day-night doubleheader that included a 15-inning opener; the ejections of three Cubs players, including Sammy Sosa on Thursday, and pitching coach Larry Rothschild; a shouting

match between Baker and La Russa; and a stunning comeback by the Cubs to win Wednesday after trailing 6-0.

Baker and La Russa, whose blowup centered about pitching inside and hitting batters, met for several minutes behind the cage during batting practice Thursday, expressed their views to one another and shook hands.

Tony Womack, who entered in a double switch in the top of the seventh, hit a go-ahead single in the bottom half off Mike DeJean (5-8), who had walked Moises Alou and hit Aramis Ramirez with a pitch.

DeJean then got out of a bases-loaded jam by slipping a third strike past Randall Simon called by plate umpire Bill Hohn, the center of numerous complaints all day by the Cubs.

He ejected Sosa as he was walking back to the dugout after Sosa apparently made a comment about a third strike call.

"I was cursing myself and he threw me out of the game," Sosa said. "He heard me when I was cursing myself."

In the fifth inning, Hohn ejected Rothschild, who was in the dugout. Moments earlier, Hohn called a ball on a close pitch that Cubs starter Shawn Estes apparently thought was a

The umpires were not available for comment after the game.


his left arm.

The comment, although said in halfjest, was a rare glimpse into the motivation that drives the NFL's career rushing leader as he enters his 14th pro season as a member of one of the sport's least successful franchises.

Although he downplays it most of the time, Smith is out to prove that, at age 34, he still can be a highly effective running back after Dallas let him go following 13 seasons, and three Super Bowl titles, with the Cowboys.

He certainly will get his chances.

"We're going to try to put the ball in his hands as much as possible," quarterback Jeff Blake said. "We've got all kinds of ways of doing it. You'll see screens, draws, him coming out of the backfield, straight runs, him lining up in receiver spots.

Smith was in on only a handful of plays as Arizona went 4-0 in the preseason. He had four carries for 11 yards

"But he practiced every day, and he practiced very hard," Blake said. "A guy like Emmitt has played long enough to know how to turn it on and

Smith said he doesn't need extensive preseason work to be ready to go in

"You got a bike? You know how to pedal?" Smith said. "Ain't nothing changed, has it? That's just the way football is. I've played a little bit in preseason, and we're getting a lot of inside run work here in practice, getting used to players being around me and reading the blocks."

The Cardinals' receiving corps is the least experienced in the NFL, so defenses are bound to try shut down Smith and backup Marcel Shipp and force Blake to throw.

That will leave a heavy burden on Arizona's big offensive line, bolstered by the return of 6-foot-6, 384-pound guard Leonard Davis. Davis will be playing with his broken right hand, the result of a fight during training camp, in a heavily wrapped 13-pound cast.



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
