American, Brit win Nöbel Prize for medicine
for advances in magnetic resonance imaging

surgeons a roadmap for oper surgeons a roadmap for operations, revealing the limits of a tumor. And since MRI itsel does not require physically entering the body, it can

## Kremlin-appointed leader wins Chechen election

With more than 77 percent of the votes counted, acting President Akhmad Kadyrov had 81.1 percent, regional election commission chairman Abdul-Kerim Arsakhanov told reporters in Grozny on Monday
In the war-shattered capital of Grozny, where ruined hulks of buildings rise like broken teeth, and in impoverished villages, many Chechens turned out in suits and fine dresses to vote Sunday. But others disdained the proceedings as a farce.
"In my view all of Russia is far from democracy, and not just Chechnya," said Liza Vishayeva, passing a polling station that was the only building on her Grozny block without holes chewed into it by artillery. She said she
ffered to rebels during the summer and ballots were dropped into taped-up cardboar expired in September. He said 171 fighters had surrendered under the amnesty and that many of them were now serving in his security service, headed by his son Ramzan, according to the ITAR-Tass news agency
Kadyrov's security service is widely feared and accused of kidnappings and killings. Some voters said they shared the Kremlin's conviction that the election - held as the war enters its fifth year - was a sign of civil order retuming to Chechnya.
"It's the road to life, the road to justice," said Said Ami Saidov, 65, who voted in a crowded schoolhouse in the hamlet of Bachi-Yurt. More than .86 percent of Chechnya's 561,000 eligible voters cast ballots, Arsakhanov said. Some 30,000 Russian servicemen permanently stationed in Chechnya had the right to vote. No Western observers were present for the
cartons.
Human rights advocates questioned the fair ness of a vote held during a war and said the election was heavily tilted in favor of Kadyro Major Western governments including the United States have been cautious about criticism, expressing hope that the vote can help foster a political solution of the conflict.
The election was widely criticized after two candidates who rated higher than Kadyrov in early opinion polls disappeared from the ballo - one withdrawing to become an adviser to Russian President Vladimir Putin and the other barred from running by the Chechen Supreme Court. Six virtually unknown candidates ran against Kadyrov, who was once allied with the rebels.
Kadyrov had promised that if elected, he would create a commission to investigate "all the crimes" committed in Chechnya since the 1991 Soviet collapse.

ing about seat belt laws are leading to higher death rates. As the U.S. Latino population grows, federal officials are work ing to teach Hispanics about tu benefits of child safety seats. A program, "Corazon de mi
vida," or "You are the center of my life," has distributed child my life," has distributed child safters seas in in the program, a collabora-
niter tion between the federal National Highway Traffic Safery Administration and the San Antonio-based National Latino Children's Institute, is a start in breaking down the cultural barriers that have led to more deaths among Hispanic children than non-Hispanic white children.
"We're having to totaly educate this community, totally
change this behavior not just because you're going to get a your child's life," said program director Irene Rodriguez. Hulio Rios, who supervises Hispanic programs for Child and
Family Services - Michigan, Inc., said immigrants are often surprised to learn every
state requires infants to be placed in child seats. Many come from countries with no such requirement. Even those that do require
seat belts, such as Ecuador and Honduras, rarely enforce the law, Rios said.
"They are new to the area and
they don't know the law here" hey don't know the law here,"
said Rios, who is counseling a Hispanic family involved in a severe car accident.

were the leading cause of death for Hispanics ages 1-44 in 2000 It said the number of Hispanic

the National Hurricane Center in Miami warned that the path of the two storms could change as they interacted south of Cabo San Lucas. Resort cities up and down Mexico's popular Pacific coast braced for high winds
and rain. and rain.

bands were expected to lash bands were expected to lash
Puerto Vallarta on Monday as therto storm moved north up the coast. Officials canceled classes and turned schools into makeshift shelters, urging residents to leave lowlying homes.
Hurricane Olaf churned Sunday 110 miles southwest of Manzanillo and had slowed to 7 mph . It packed winds of 75 mph . Hurricane Nora was far off the southern tip of the Baja
California peninsula, but California peninsula, but

Cabo San Lucas, a resort known for its golf, courses and deep-sea fishing. Tropical Storm Larry, meanwhile, hit land at the bottom of the Gulf of Mexico early Sunday and faded to a tropical depression as it crept south over the low-lying state
