A BORDEN COUNTY TRADITION TO BE RELIVED CHRISTMAS EVE

Once again on this Christmas Eve. as they have done for more than eighty years, Borden County folk will gather to celebrate the birth of the Christ Child and to enjoy a community Christmas tree. This celebration held alternately at the Baptist and Methodist Churchs in Gail, will this Christmas Eve be held at the Methodist Church on Monday, December 24, at 6 P.M. As always, everyone is invited to attend.

denominations participated in and contributed to this Borden County tradition, a tradition which may be uniquely our own, for it is very possible that ours is the only community which still celebrates Christmas with this type of Christmas tree.

Why do we carry on this tradition of a community Christmas tree when there are Christmas trees in almost every home, in our school rooms, in

places of business and as decorations along our streets? Tradition is defined as

knowledge transmitted without writing from generation to generation." Six generations of some Borden County families have attended the Community Christmas tree at Gail. And it is difficult for fifth and sixth generations to visualize how it when their great-grandparents began this tradition in the frontier village which was Gail. In those days it was not the custom to have a Christmas tree in one's home; at least not in Gail. Most homes had little room to spare for a Christmas tree. A string of tinsel was probably the only ornament the DORWARD DRUG STORE or THE BLUE FRONT STORE had to offer. In the early 1900's the community Christmas tree was probably the only Christmas tree in Borden County. It was the big social event of the

Christmas season and everyone was there to receive their gift (usually singular) off of the tree.

And what a tree it was\$ Native cedar of course, from the Mountain." And to the wondering eyes of a child it seemed as tall as the lofty ceiling of that old Church. The tree had peen trimmed by the young people of the community at a tree trimming party, another important social event. They had created paper chains, strings of popcorn and cranberries, and ornaments and a star made of tinfoil saved all the year from chewing gum and plug tobacco wrappers. The tree was lighted with tiny twisted candles in small tin holders which clipped to the tree, always a major fire hazard. One year they set Santa Claus' bear afire. We didn't have so many government agencies to protect us from ourselves in those days. The most important

gifts which hung among the branches. Waves of anticipation stirred the crowd as they awaited the arrival of Santa Claus to pass our these gifts, so unpretentious by today's standards. There were small china headed dalls, their cloth bodies printed with the alphabet, and a few dolls with beautiful bisque faces. Horns, alphabet blocks, doll dishes and children's books hung there to delight a small boy or girl. Pieces of glassware or china were exchanged as friendship gifts among the ladies and carried home to become heirlooms of great grandchildren.



COYOTES CAPTURE LADY **BORDEN TOURNAMENT**

The Borden County Lady Coyotes evened the score with Highland as they avenged their only loss of the season by defeating the honrnets in the finals of the Borden Tournament. This made the second consecutive year the Lady Coyotes have won the Borden Tournament, and the fourth in the past six years, the other two years losing by one point in an overtikme and by one point in three overtimes.

In the first game of the tournament, Borden completely dominated Dawson 63-17, as all 11 players saw plenty of playing time with all scoring. Teri Billington led in scoring with 18 points, all coming in the first quarter and first two minutes of the second quarter. She was followed by Kelli Williams with 8 points, Samantha Porter with 6, Cindy Balague hit 5 points, Becky Massingill, Shawna Vaughn, Nancy Martinez, Kim Turner, Sherry Vaughn, and Lynn Sternadel all had 4 points each, and Jeanette Massingill had 2. Borden jumped out to a 26-5 first quarter lead and held a 42-9 halftime advantage in the tourney opener for the Lady Coyotes. Teri led nin field goal percentage as she hit a blazing 9 of 10 from the field for 90 percent, followed by Kelli with 4 of 6 for 67 percent. Bekcky and Sherry each had 100 percent in free throws as both made 2 of 2. Samantha led in rebounds with 7 followed by Lynn with 6. Nancy led in assists with 4 and Teri led in steals with 7.

Borden then played Sands in the semi-finals and nearly met disaster as Sands awas hitting everything they threw toward the basket and Borden was struggling way below average. The score remained close in the 46-33 win until the last quarter where Borden pulled away in

14-6 edge. Kelli Williams led in scoring with 20 points followed. by Shawna Vaughn and Teri Billington with 8, Becky Massingill had 6, and Jeanette Massingill had 2. Shawna led in field goal percentage with 57 percent followed by Kelli with 56 percent. Shawna also led in rebounds with 10. Teri led in steals with 5 and Becky led in assists with 4. Kelli and Teri both hit 100 percent from the free throw line as each connected on 2 Of 2.

HAPPY MEMORIES PORTRAYED OF BORDEN COUNTY'S CHRISTMAS

TRADITIONS BY OLD TIMERS

The Christmas season is here, with all of its rich traditions and happy memories of Christmas' past. In helping prepare for the Community Crhsitmas Tree to be held in the Dorward Methodist Church on Christmas eve, as it has been held for so many years, alternating with the Baptist Church, I could not help but wonder about the tradition of this most happy event. With the help of Van York researching the old copies of the Borden Citizen, published by the Borden County Historical Survey Committee, I found some of the most interesting articles of joyous past Christmas' as recalled by the citizens of this county; as one article by Arthur Prince of a Christmas back in the 1890's and of one of the first community Christmas tree celebrations.

Arthur Prince writes: "They had a Christmas tree on Christmas eve. I don't remember whether it was at the school house or at the Court House. Anyway I dimly remember the Cedar Christmas tree was covered all over with shiny things. I well remember that I was told that when it was over to get my presents (apple, orange, popcorn ball and firecrackers) and come straight home and not stop in town; that I coundn't go to town that night, for things are getting rowdy down there and going to get rowdier and before midnight was past there would be two armies of equal size armed with Roman Candles who would meet and battle it out to the last shot. It's a wonder some eyes were not lost. Pretty rough it was in town and I was forbidden to be there....In later years I remember some dances on Christmas Eve at the court room upstairs in the court house. Will Clark was doin' the callin'. I sure did love to listen to the shuffle of the feet and the callin' of Will Clark....One Christmas Eve, along in the evening, one of the drunk cowboys, whose name I won't mention here, got on his horse and was racing around the square. He came racing west past Chandler's store then turned south and was racing his horse past the buildings on the west side of the square. He was losing balance as he raced along

and was leaning to the right more and more all the time so that one of the gallery posts of the Kincaid Hotel drug him off his horse, but he didn' seem to be hurt very much.....'

Winnie Chandler Miller, whose father contributed fruit, candy and nuts for the early trees, according to Ethel Everett, also recalls the use of fireworks and how the children went home from "the Tree" with

excited anticipation to shoot their skyrockets and roman candles. She also reminds us that people walked to church in those days. Here are excerpts Our from her letter: Christmases were really something. I don't suppose anybody ever had a tree in their home - or I can't remember ever having one at home - always at the Church. Everyone came from far and near. The Church was always full and the tree loaded. We sould always take our little red wagon to bring our gifts home in. Of course Dove was a baby and rode in the wagon, too....When I think back to our Christmases in Gail, Miss Minnie and Mr. David (Dorward) stand out clearer than the others. They were always helping in every way with our programs, the arranging of tree decorating, and who should take gifts from Santa and give to the one whose name Santa called out - now that was such an honor to be chosen for this. Just thinking back, so many, many old timers come to life. Mr. Jack Rogers for one was always so jolly (children always remember the happy faces)....

CHRISTMAS IN GAIL

Our memories of Christmas in Gail - like, I suppose, those of all Christmases - are of two kinds. the public and the private, for Christmas in West Texas was a very public thing with all the community joining in to celebrate together. I remember the year 1907 was the last Christmas I spent in Gail, and it was one of the happiest. On Christmas Eve, school was let out a little early, and all the pupils would hurry down that one long street to the "Business district" to gaze longingly in the store windows at all the

tempting displays: the lamps

and vases, picture albums and dressing cases, jewelry and clothes, and of course the toys and "gee - gaws." Since early in the afternoon, the cowboys had been coming into town from outlying ranches. We loved to watch as they flooded into Mr. Dodson's and Mr. Chandler's, Mr. Dorwood's and millinery shop, their pockets fairly smoking with the money that was burning to be spent. We watched as they tied up at the court house and then hurried about, buying lovely gifts, and we wondered which local belle or taraway sweetheart would be the lucky recipient. Early in the week the men would have brought down a huge cedar from off the mountain and installed it in the church. All fall, every scrap of tinfoil, every bright bit of paper would have been saved, and everyone made decoration for the tree or contributed some treasured ornament. The paper streamers made by schoolchildren, popcorn and cranberry streings - every ingenious creation we could think of, and the tiny candles - all were festooned on the tree which seemed to us to reach the heavens like the Star of Bethlehem. A committee was appointed each year to do the actual decorating, but there were always plenty around to offer advice. They also arranged beneath the tree and through its branches the huge array of presents, for every one brought their gifts to "The Tree" to be distributed. The committee also had sacked popcorn, peanuts, truit and candy donated by Mr. Chandler, so each person would be sure to receive something.

On Christmas Eve night, everyone gathered in the church, and Mr. Dorwood took charge of the proceedings. A program of music and poetry by the barious grades had to be presented before we could get down to what we kids considered the real

business of the evening: the arrival of Santa Mr. Hale, in his big suit stuffed with pillows, didn't really fool any of us, but we went along with fun. Santa would call out the name on the tag, "Ethel Morrow" and the receiver would call, embarrassed and delighted, "here!" and one of the little girls selected for the honor would deliver the gift from Santa's own hand. There was a place called Lynn Bros. in New York where you could get all sorts of gimracks for 5 cents; this was very popular since getting your name called out a number of times was part of the fun. That year I remember that the Wristen clan had sent off for a great number of these and the committee went them one better by tying them all together in one long string on the tree. Everyone roared with laughter as Santa called out, "Dan Wristen, Rillie Wristen, Will Wristen, Dan Wristen, Rillie Wristen" and on and on. On the committee that year were Nell Hale and Harvey Everett and part of their duty was to hand down the gifts to Santa. Nell was wearing a beautiful white hat covered with feathers. As she reached out to take down a gift, she leaned too close to the tree, and the candle on one of the low boughs ignited the beautiful teathers. Everyone screamed in

horror but Harvey was quick to

act. He reached out and took

Nell's head in his arms

(something he had probably

been wanting to do a long time!)

and smothered the flames

against his jacket. Nell calmly

removed the charred hat,

smoothed her hair, and went right on handing out gifts! I guess I forgave Harvey for putting his arms around Nell, because we married the next year and moved away from Gail torever......


CHRISTMAS IN BORDEN COUNTY -- YEAR 1910



WOOL, UNSHORN LAMBS & MOHAIR INCENTIVE

Wool and mohair producers are reminded to submit their sales receipts to the office for incentive payments. Deadline to sign the forms is January 30, 1985.

1985 PROGRAM SIGN-UP

The enrollment period for the 1985 programs of wheat, corn, grain sorghum, and cotton will continue thru March 1, 1985.

Advance payments equal to one-half of the projected deficiency payment rate iacjigce-palfiof the diversion payment is offered to farmers during the sign-up period.

AGRICULTURAL CONSERVATION PROGRAM (ACP)

Funds are available for cost-share assistance to perform conservation work. Cost-share assistance is available for water conservation practices thru December 1. Practices to be considered during the sign-up period are tanks, waterways, terraces, diversion practices, and pipelines.

LONG-TERM AGREEMENTS (LTA)

In addition to our regular ACP, part farm long-term conservation agreements are being offered thru December 1. Some of the basic provisions

- 1. The LTA agreement will only be applicable to part farms. The agreement will cover only the portion of the farm needing conservation work.
- 2. The contract will cover a period of 3 to 5 years.
- 3. When an agreement is approved, the amount of cost-share funds needed for the agreement will be set-aside. Cost-sharing rates under the LTA program are the same as under ACP, approximately one half of the cost of the practice. The cost-share limitation is \$3500 per person per fiscal
- 4. Soil Conservation Service will have total responsibility in the technical design of the conservation work to be performed
- 5. A conservation practice must be designed and completed by September 30,

Grasses Benefit From Proper Grazing Use.

To remain in the ranching business, today's rancher has to be more efficient in utilizing the crop he raises each year. This crop is not measured in number of head of calves sold nor total pounds of beef produced. The ranchers crop is grass! Grass production is closely tied to yearly rainfall fluctuations but is more importantly bounded to grazing management during the previous years.

All green plants live and grow on food manufactured primarily in their own green leaves. 95 percent of a plants food is taken from the air through its leaves, and 5 percent is taken from the soil via the root system. Ranges can flourish and soil is conserved only if the individual plants have an opportunity to make food for their own growth.

What happens when plants repeatedly loose their green leaves by close grazing during the growing season? With no leaves, photosynthesis is stopped and the plants must use food stored in the roots and stem bases to grow more green If this process is leaves. repeated often enough, the supply of plant food becomes exhausted and the plant dies.

Excessive removal of herbage also stops root growth, removes seed producing stems, and removes top growth which protects the tender basal buds from temperature extremes.

The degree of safe use range plants can tolerate depends on such factors as kind of soil, condition of range, season of use, and degree of slope. Safe use of plants in good condition grazed during the growing season is about 50 percent by weight. The old rule of proper use in grazing has been "take half and leave half". However, if ranges are not in good condition, safe use is much lower and periodic rest is required. For assistance in evaluating your range condition and determining proper grazing use, contact the Soil Conservation Service at 573-0171 to set up a date we can meet and look at your grass




