With a presidential campaign only months away, Republicans picked up two governorships in the South, ousting Mississippi's Democratic incumbent and seizing Kentucky's top job for the first time in 32 years.
GOP Washington lobbyist Haley Barbour unseated one term Democratic Gov. Ronnie Musgrove, while in Kentucky, three-term Republican Rep. Ernie Fletcher defeated Democratic Attorney General Ben Chandler.
President Bush loomed large in both campaigns, and he's sure to claim a boost from the victories. He stumped for both GOP candidates, while Democrats in Kentucky tied their opponent to Bush's economic policies and Musgrove dismissed his challengér as a "Washington insid-
Barbour, a former head of the Republican National Committee who said his connections would help Mississippi, told a crowd of supporters: "Get ready to accentuate the positive
With 95 percent of precincts reporting, Barbour got 53 percent, or 449,041 votes, to Musgrove's 45 percent, or

## Trial on missing vials of plague continues

| By BETSY BLANEY <br> ASS()CIATEI) PRESS WRITI:R <br> LUBBOCK (AP) - A Texas Tech University department chairman testified Tuesday that he was "flabbergasted" when researcher Thomas Butler told him that 30 vials of the deadly plague virus were missing, possibly stolen, from his laboratory, but he did n't want authorities notified. <br> "What he had told me had so many implications," said Donald Wesson. chairman of Tech's internal medicine department. "All sorts of things were going through my mind as to what we needed to do. I was very alarmed. <br> Butler, 62. is on trial for 69 felony charges in connection with an incident that created a bioterrotism scare carlier this year. <br> Butler reported on Jan. 14 that vials of the bacteria responsible for the deadly bubonic plague were mising | from a university lab. The FBI said Butler later admitted in a statement that he had accidentally destroyed them. <br> Among the charges. Butler is accused of smuggling the bacteria from Tansamia. Jying to federal agents about it and filing a false income tas return. <br> Werson said Butler made an appointment to see him Jan. It. In court evidence. Wesson: calendar showed Butler wanted to talk about "lah research." but Butleris calendar noted the meeting was about a "lab break-in." <br> Wesson said after Butler told him about the mising vials. he urged him to conduct an interaal investigation and not to call authorities. <br> The university did contact authorities and within hours scores of federal agents descended on the city and began a frantic seanch for the vials. <br> Lab safety officer Michael Jones testified that he had immediate doubs. | when Butler told him the vials were missing. <br> 'He was fairly calm and didn't seem particularly upset," Jones said. <br> There were no signs of forced entry into Butler $\rightarrow$ lah and nothing appeared out of place, he said. <br> I said, basically. You need to be sure in fact they are mising because it would be a big deal.' '.
