moving from Bridgeport. He was a roughneck in the oilfield.

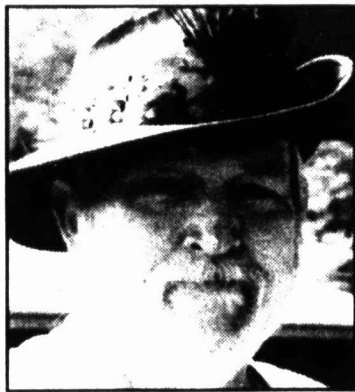

### Judge allows preacher to speak at public schools in Marion, Ill.

MARION, Ill. (AP) — A federal judge has allowed a Texas evangelist to address public school students in this southern Illinois town.

U.S. District Judge James Foreman issued an order Monday allowing Texas-based evangelist Ronnie Hill to speak at local schools, said Robert Marsh, who fought the assemblies in court.

However, the judge's order blocked Hill's followers from distributing invitations to the church revival where Hill is speaking.

Hill is based in Fort Worth, Texas.

The first of Hill's anti-drug, secular speeches was held Monday morning at a Marion elementary school. Other assemblies were planned Tuesday at local

junior and senior high schools.

School district officials and their lawyers did not return repeated telephone messages left Monday by The Associated Press.

In Marion, a town of about 15,000 about 15 miles from Carbondale, public schools regularly pass out flyers with students' homework advertising Christian youth groups, and high school students sometimes pray around the school's flag pole.

Marsh said he has filed a motion for a permanent injunction that would ban religious figures from addressing Marion students and limit students from distributing religious material in school.

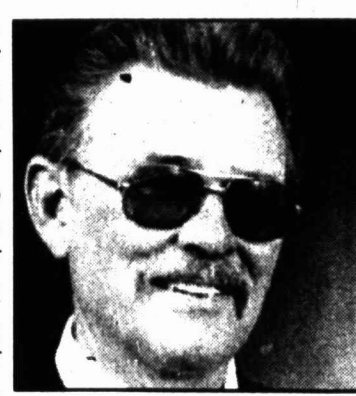

## Ex-attorney general to serve time in Texarkana

AUSTIN (AP) — Former Texas Attorney General Dan Morales, sentenced to prison last month after pleading guilty to mail and tax fraud, has been transferred to a federal prison in Texarkana to begin serving four years.

Morales had been held in the Caldwell County Jail in Lockhart since his sentencing Oct. 31. He was moved late last week.

Carla Wilson, a spokeswoman for the federal Bureau of Prisons, said Morales was taken to the low-security Texarkana prison unit housing 1,378 convicts. The prison has an adjacent work camp housing another 251 inmates.

Meanwhile, Morales' wife, Christi Morales, told the Austin American-Statesman in Tuesday's editions that she is pregnant with the couple's first child and that she's trying to figure out a day-to-day plan for her life.

"This is the first time in my life that I don't know what's next," she said. "It almost feels like I can't process what to do because there is so much."

She has two other children, a 12-year-old son and a 10-year-old daughter, from a previous marriage. She married Morales in 1997.

San Antonio lawyer Luis Escarano, who is helping the family, said he saw Dan Morales late last week.

"It's beginning to wear (on Morales), and it's difficult. His main concern is Christi and the children," Escarano told the American-Statesman.

Dan Morales, the state's attorney general from 1991 to 1999, ran unsuccessfully for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination last year.

He was sentenced to four years in prison in connection with charges that stemmed from his handling of legal fees from the state lawsuit against the tobacco industry.

That tobacco lawsuit, which was settled, was to have been tried in Texarkana.

Dan Morales also pleaded guilty to failure to pay income tax on campaign money he converted to personal use.

As attorney general, Dan Morales hired private lawyers to pursue the case that produced a \$17.3 billion settlement from big tobacco companies. A federal indictment later alleged he tried to steer \$520 million in legal fees to a Houston attorney who did little to no work on the case.

Storms, flooding sweep across Texas, injuring 20

HOUSTON (AP) — Residents along the upper Gulf Coast began cleaning up Tuesday under clear, sunny skies after a string of tornadoes and flooding rain battered the region a day earlier.

On Monday, storms moving ahead of a cold front injured at least 20 people and forced numerous rescues as motorists became stranded in rising floodwaters.

Tornadoes swirled across the region, shattering windows at office buildings and a day care center in Houston, and peeling the roof off several units at an apartment complex. Tornado watches had been canceled by Tuesday.

Parts of Harris County received as much as 10 inches of rain in 24 hours, with runoff flooding highways, submerging vehicles and stranding motorists during rush hour. East of Houston, at least three homes were destroyed and others were damaged.

High water stranded many motorists on Houston's Sam Houston Tollway. Firefighters used boats to rescue them in a

scene reminiscent of Tropical Storm Allison in June 2001. Houston police used a helicopter and hoist to evacuate stalled motorists from the flooded Katy Freeway.

The flooding snarled traffic on the Eastex Freeway at Farm-to-Market Road 1960 and for a time blocked Texas 288, a major ambulance route to the Texas Medical Center in Houston. One ambulance crew could not reach a patient because of high water.

Emergency crews rescued students from stranded school buses. Revere Middle School students were rescued from a bus Monday evening by Houston firefighters, said Terry Abbott, an HISD spokesman. No injuries were reported.

Flooding also affected the Dallas area Monday. Two children who became trapped in a drainage ditch in McKinney, north of Dallas, had to be rescued by emergency crews using ropes. The children were treated at an area hospital for minor injuries.

In the town of Meadows Place near Houston, about 60

small children were evacuated from the Teeter Totter Day Care when strong winds shattered windows. The children and staff suffered only minor cuts and scrapes, owner Ann Fatima said.

"We heard a big noise and we immediately moved the kids out of the classroom," Fatima told the Houston Chronicle in Tuesday's editions.

At White Elementary, Principal Julie Dimmit said the roof was blown off the basketball pavilion and trees were toppled.

"I think it passed right over us," Dimmit said.

Houston's St. James Episcopal Church lost its sanctuary to strong winds, and nearby trees were uprooted.

Strong winds also peeled the roofs off of several units at a southwest Houston apartment complex. No injuries were reported, authorities said.

A possible tornado west of Jasper on Texas 190 toppled electrical lines onto the highway and felled trees, damaging homes.

Organizers of a march expect to draw as many as 60,000 people Thursday, and they scored a victory Monday when police said protesters could pass by the Houses of Parliament and Blair's office. Earlier, police had refused to allow the march to go through London's main government district.

Bush made plain in a series of interviews with British journalists that he is not backing down, and he will try to remind the British that they have a stake in the war. As part of the effort to court British public opinion, Bush gave a personal guided tour of the Oval Office to British journalists last week.

"I intend to lead our nation, along with others like our close friends in Great Britain, to win this war on terror," Bush told the BBC.

Bush is trying to tap into the outpouring of empathy and support that the British displayed after the terror attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

A military band played the U.S. national anthem at an unprecedented changing of the guard ceremony at Buckingham Palace two days after the attacks, ordered by the queen. Thousands of British supporters stood eight deep at Buckingham Palace's front gates and lined the road to the queen's main residence.

A different scene awaits Bush this week, one that sug-

gests a dramatic shift in the tide of public opinion.

Demonstrators plan to pull down a statue of Bush made of papier mache and chicken wire, to parody the toppling of Saddam Hussein's statue in Baghdad.

The demonstrations began well ahead of Bush's visit. A woman scaled a gate at Buckingham Palace Monday, unfurling an upside-down American flag in protest, while Ron Kovic, an

American veteran of the Vietnam War and peace activist, delivered an 85,000-signature petition asking Blair to cancel Bush's visit.

Blair addressed a joint session of Congress in July and gave an impassioned defense of the Iraq war. Bush will not address Parliament during his visit. Such a speech could invite the kind of heckling the president received when he spoke to the Australian Parliament last month.

One auditor, Sandy Jansen, said Butler refused to cooperate.

Butler's practice of drafting two contracts for drug trials, which paid half of the money to the HSC and half to himself, amounts to fraud, prosecutors say.

## Afghani women test freedoms

From the San Antonio Express-News:  
 Women trading burqas for microphones and radio transmitters are an encouraging sign for Afghanistan's future.

Three radio stations in Afghanistan are run by and for women. They broadcast Afghan pop music, news and advice, offering an alternative to state-controlled radio and television.

American and Canadian groups financially support the stations.

It's heartening to see female voices taking to the airwaves in a nation that once muzzled women.

But Afghan women still don't enjoy fully free speech. The Washington Post reports Islamic clerics are riled by what they consider provocative programming.

One station had to stop airing a series on women's divorce rights when senior clergy demanded it.

Yet the station manager didn't lose heart. She said, "If we make direct criticisms, it is turned into a religious issue. So we just make indirect criticisms, in jokes and satires."

As an Afghan government is pieced together, its leaders should tune in to the courageous women on the radio and guarantee free speech to all their people.

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## Free citizens must be vigilant

Just when you thought blind Justice had developed an acute sense of astigmatism, a New Orleans federal appeals court ruled recently, in a heartening decision, to allow a Ten Commandments monument to remain on the grounds of the Texas State Capitol in Austin, this after 40-plus years in that location!

Christians, it seems, can take nothing for granted, not even the tenure of a long-standing granite statue dedicated to promoting 10 basic virtues.

The six-foot red obelisk was given to the state in 1961 by the Fraternal Order of Eagles to assist in efforts to combat juvenile delinquency as well as, according to a news release from the office of the Texas attorney general, "promote a personal code of conduct for youths, resulting in 'liberty, peace and justice.'"

In a clear-cut case of semantics, the court ruled against the statue's demise. Why? Because, though resting on Capital grounds, the statue is not housed in an official government building.

The news release from the Texas attorney general quotes the appeals court: "... in upholding lower court decisions, the appellate court ruled that the state's placement of this monument 'on a direct line between the legislative chambers, the executive office of the governor and the (Texas) Supreme Court building' links it with those houses of law 'while

standing apart and not physically connected to any of them. (The Commandments monument) is presented as relevant to these law-giving instruments of state government, but from a distance.'"

Somehow, the logic escapes me. State land/property is state land/property, after all. Nonetheless, I am relieved that the court ruled appropriately.

This verdict is to be celebrated by those who still believe this nation was founded on Christian values and principles, who, furthermore, believe that the motto "In God We Trust" did not somehow serendipitously appear on all U.S. coinage and money.

Meanwhile, in a much more publicized case, the fate of another replica of the Ten Commandments, placed in the rotunda of the Alabama courthouse in 2001, did not fare so well. Placed there by former Alabama Chief Justice Roy Moore, this 2 1/2 ton granite monument was removed in August of this year.

Moore fought to keep the statue in the

rotunda, risking his job and his career by refusing to bow to forces calling for its removal.

For his temerity, Moore was relieved of his job as chief justice this past week by a state judicial ethics panel and opponents want him permanently disbarred. Moore, however, vows to continue to fight.

According to The Associated Press, Moore's attorneys are considering taking the matter up with the Alabama Supreme Court. The deadline to appeal, the AP said, is 30 days.

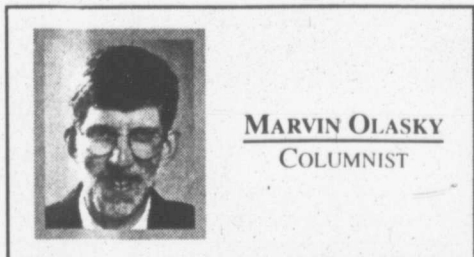
The AP quotes Bob Riley, governor of Alabama, as saying, "(I am) disappointed and concerned that the federal courts continue to attempt to remove references to God and faith from public arenas. All of us must, however, respect the workings of our legal system and trust that it remains the best in the world."

Wrong! We must not naively "trust" our leaders to always do the right thing. We must vigilantly guard our freedoms or they will slowly disappear. Tyranny is achieved by relying on those in power to decide important moral and societal issues instead of depending upon our own capacity to think and to make our voices heard. The minority will rule if the majority does not stand up and speak out, for, to arrive at "the best," takes constant effort and hard work.



## Ways to restrain federal spending

The classic poem speaks of children nestled in beds on Christmas Eve, but this year sugar plums began dancing in GOP heads following last week's Kentucky and Mississippi gubernatorial victories. "Don't blow it," the whispering began. "If only we're careful, we can win big in 2004."

This is all a far cry from 1994, when Republicans took chances and indeed won big. The GOP won by pushing hard for less government -- but now, almost a decade after the Gingrich-Army Contract With America helped Republicans grab control of Congress from the Dems after spending 40 years in the political wilderness, little seems to have changed in Washington.

Look, for example, at the spending stats published this week. During the fiscal year that ended on Sept. 30, military spending jumped by nearly 17 percent, which makes sense during wartime. But non-military discretionary spending rose 8.7 percent, giving legislators the opportunity to brag to constituents about new porkbarrel projects. President Bush had talked of holding the line at 4 percent.

I spoke last week with Tom Coburn, the Oklahoma obstetrician elected to the House in 1994 who kept his promise to leave after three terms. "Compare campaign promises with what people actually do," he said. Many roll into Washington speaking of change and end up logrolling for loose dollars.

Coburn's new book, "Breach of Trust," refers to C.S. Lewis's critique of "the quest for the Inner Ring," and writes, "The sensation of stepping inside the Inner Ring of Congress is exhilarating," (but) soon the thrill of being in the Inner

job, and push for an up-or-down vote on the commission proposal.

Fourth, don't become overly impatient: Remember in a fallen world that only by the sweat of our brow do we accomplish even small things politically. Fifth, push President Bush to veto some spending programs to show that the administration is serious about restraining federal discretionary spending. Rudolph Penner, a Republican and former budget office director, said, "One wonders how serious the White House is about holding the line." Three years into the administration, it's time to stop wondering.

Finally, as Coburn writes, "The devolution of federal power I am advocating must be accompanied by a much more determined effort on the part of the church, in particular, to care for the needs of the poor and the elderly. ... The best way to drive out the culture of dependence and entitlement in America is through the relentless love and compassion of caring neighbors."

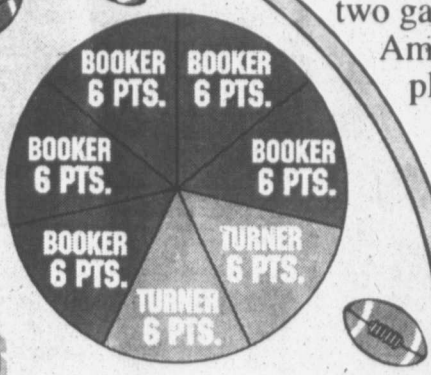

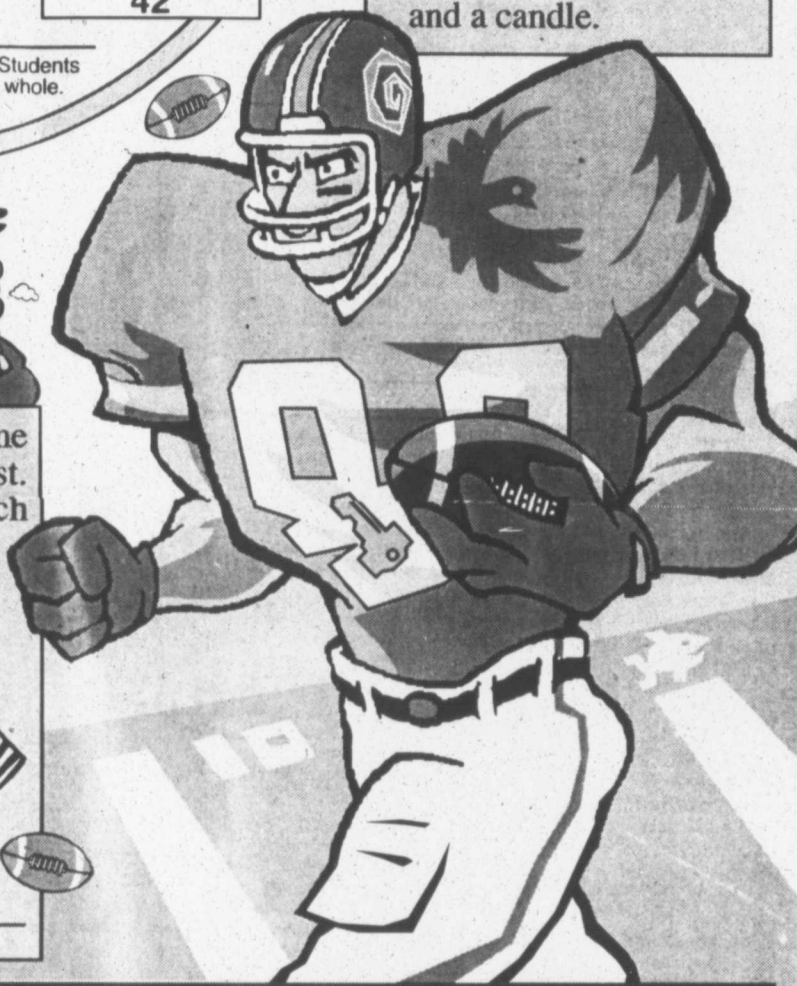

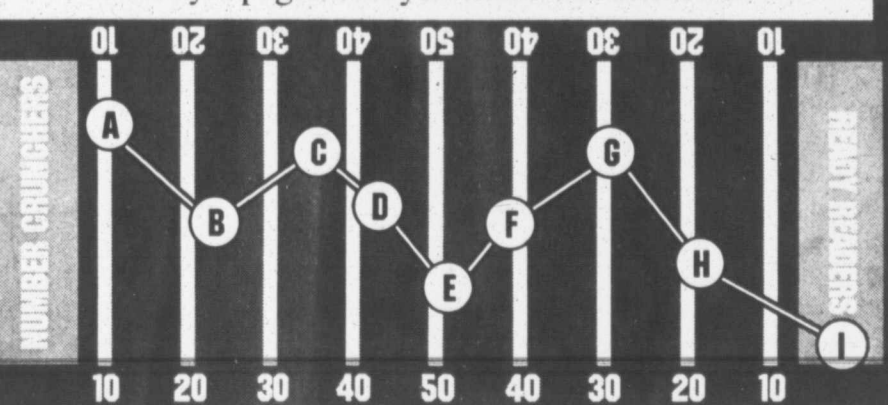

### Man Out To Win Sweepstakes Had Lost His Good Judgment

DEAR ABBY: "Going Broke in Maryland" described her 85-year-old husband as a cash cow for charities. She said they live on a fixed income, and he keeps insisting they "don't really need the money."

In my father's case, what she described was the first sign of Alzheimer's disease. It started several years before the usual signs such as confusion or getting lost occurred. He, too, spent a fortune trying to "win" a million dollars from sweepstakes companies.

Since "Going Broke's" husband has clearly lost his good judgment, it's unlikely that legal counsel will bring it back to him. (My dad seemed to understand our advice, but continued sending money to sweepstakes, humane societies, etc.) What "Going Broke" needs is an attorney to protect herself and her husband financially. She should also try to get a medical exam for him. If they have children, they need to help her with this now.

"Going Broke's" local Alzheimer's Association can offer assistance and advice. The Maryland attorney general's office will have a consumer protection or ombudsman's office that may be able to advise her. There is probably a Council on Aging in her county. Also, please make sure she has the address of the Direct Marketing Association to stop the junk mail. She may need to block phone calls, too, if telemarketers are a problem at her house.

If she has to take away his control of the family finances, she should try to do it in a way that allows him to put the blame on someone else, not her.

My father never did win the shiny new car or the million dollars he was promised, even though the sweepstakes companies called to get directions to his home and had him fill out official forms requesting color and style of the automobile. He is now in the dementia ward of an assisted-living facility, and my mother wishes she had those thousands of dollars he spent on sweepstakes entries and charities to help pay for his care.

## OU has one more before Big 12 championship

One more game for Oklahoma, and then the second season begins.

The top-ranked Sooners, having clinched the South Division of the Big 12, play their regular-season finale Saturday at Texas Tech (7-4, 4-3 Big 12). Coach Bob Stoops doesn't think it'll be difficult to hold his players' attention, considering what lies ahead.

"I believe to remain undefeated and to pursue a national championship is strong motivation," Stoops said Monday on the Big 12 coaches teleconfer-

ence. "I know it's also a strong challenge to take on a team that has put up a lot of points and yards."

Another factor that could help the Sooners (11-0, 7-0) hold their focus: they have next weekend off before taking on the North Division winner in the conference championship Dec. 6 in Kansas City.

"What's good is they have a week off after the game, so they can really invest in it," Stoops said.

In retrospect, Stoops was not disappointed in the Sooners' less than overwhelming 41-3 victory over Baylor. Oklahoma basically sat on a 24-0 first-quarter lead,

and scored only seven points in the second half.

"I would have liked to have done some things better in the second half, but Baylor is to be credited too," Stoops said. "In the end, it was a good, solid win."

Baylor coach Guy Morris came off less than impressed. He stopped well short of picking Oklahoma to win the national championship.

"It's not an easy road, by any means," Morris said. "I wouldn't say I'd bet the ranch on it, no, and that's no disrespect to them."

Baylor (3-8, 1-6) frustrated Oklahoma somewhat with frequent blitzes and by crowding

the line, during the Sooners to throw. Oklahoma State (8-3, 4-3) got its attention with those tactics this week.

"They have the ability and the willingness to take risks and play a lot of people in the box," Oklahoma State coach Les Miles said. "I think it's a good percentage move at times."

Oklahoma was able to take advantage throwing the football and really scored enough with deep throws that would not allow Baylor to get in the game.

Kansas State (9-3, 5-2) is a 15-point favorite over Missouri (7-3, 3-3) Saturday to win the North Division and advance to the conference championship

## Offensive miscues cost Cowboys

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Bill Parcells and his Dallas Cowboys are no longer alone atop the NFC East despite another solid defensive performance.

"It's crystal clear what happened. We just didn't give ourselves a chance to do anything," an exhausted and disappointed Parcells said late Monday afternoon.

He still hadn't slept since losing 12-0 to New England the night before.

"Eleven mental errors, four dropped balls, five offensive penalties, three turnovers and a sack. This is all on offense. What's that add up to?"

It was the second shutout loss in four games for the Cowboys (7-3), who still share the division lead with Philadelphia. The Eagles have won five straight since their 23-21 loss at Dallas on Oct. 12.

The Cowboys' next two games come against difficult teams in a five-day span. They play Sunday against Carolina (8-2), which has

the best record in the NFC, and then remain home against Miami (6-4) on Thanksgiving Day.

"Sure, we're in a good position, but we're going to have to change some things around or that position won't be good for long," Parcells said. "I told them (players) I don't want them to get down on themselves, and that we don't have that luxury now of doing that. It remains to be seen if we can get back on track soon enough."

While the players had Monday off after getting home just before dawn, Parcells went straight to the office and started breaking down film.

He's usually in the office by 4 a.m. Monday anyway.

The Cowboys had just 291 yards, the third time in four games they were under 300

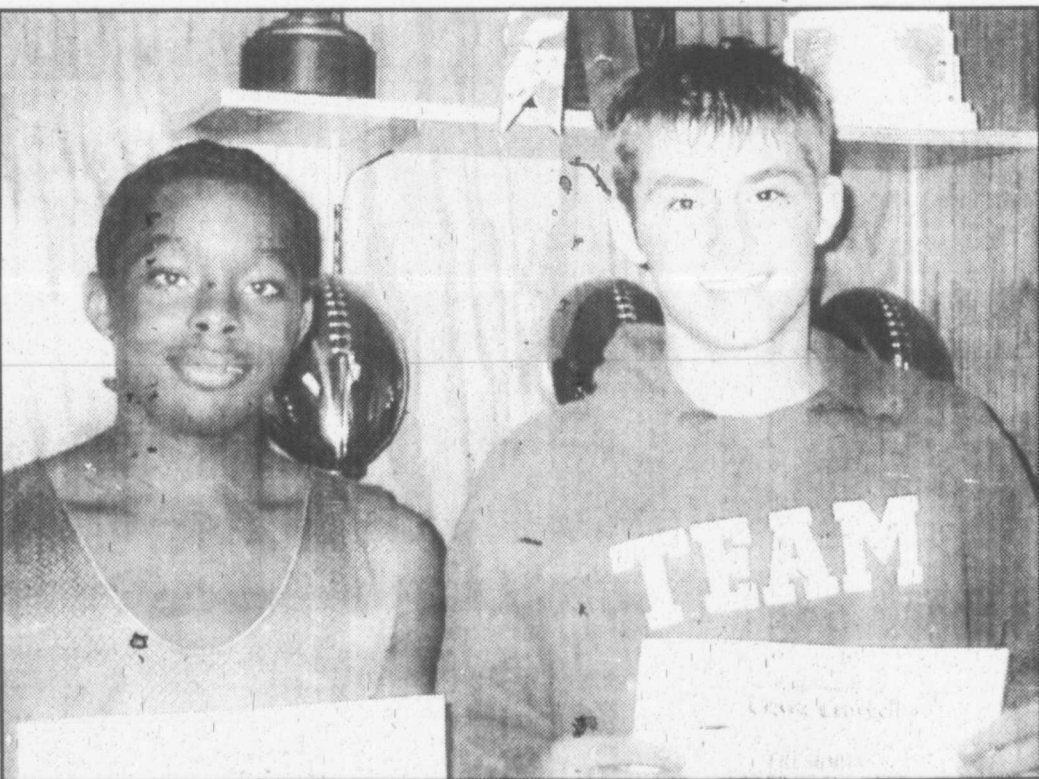
yards. They had to overcome four first-half turnovers to win in a 400-yard effort against Washington.

Quincy Carter had 210 yards passing, his first 200-yard game in six weeks, but threw three interceptions in the second half.

Still, Parcells disputed the notion that Carter is regressing.

"I think what happened to him last night, you don't have a real good chance to be successful," Parcells said. "You've got that kind of penalties, that kind of yardage to overcome, we had some no hitters in there in the backfield, coming right in on him quickly three or four times."

## Tucker has starring role in Texas opener

AUSTIN (AP) — With seniors and experience all over the lineup, freshman P.J. Tucker starred for No. 11 Texas in the Longhorns' season opener.

Tucker had 18 points and 13 rebounds in his Texas debut Monday night, leading the Longhorns to an 89-51 victory over Brown.

"I didn't think I was going to do that good," Tucker said. "I just expected to play hard, that's all I can control. I think I did all right for my first game. My teammates just gave me the ball a lot."

Brandon Mouton scored 16 points, Kenny Taylor and Brian Boddicker each added 12, and James Thomas had 19 rebounds for the Longhorns.

But it was Tucker who had the home crowd excited. The Longhorns' only freshman on scholarship used his bruising 6-foot-5, 220-pound frame to muscle over and through Brown (0-1) for points and rebounds.

He is just the third Texas freshman to post a double-double in his debut. He set the school first-game record for rebounds and tied the points mark.

"With the addition of P.J. we go a long way because he knows how to score and rebound down low," said Thomas, a senior who has 905 career boards. Texas outrebounded Brown 62-33.

The season opener was supposed to be all about how Texas replaces former All-American guard T.J. Ford, who led Texas to its first Final Four since 1947 but left school for the NBA after last season. The Longhorns return four starters and four seniors from their Final Four team.

But Ford's absence led to a predictably sloppy first outing for the Longhorns, who committed nine turnovers in the first half and generally looked out of sync.

Senior Royal Ivey is handling the point guard spot where he started 26 games as

a freshman before Ford arrived.

"We were a little jumpy, which surprised me a little bit," Texas coach Rick Barnes said. "I don't know why we were, maybe that's just the way we're supposed to be this time of year."

Ivey showed some flashes of what he learned from Ford but finished with just two assists and six points. On one play in the first half he stripped the ball from Brown guard Jason Forte, blew past a defender with a behind-the-back dribble and threw a no-look pass to Tucker.

Like Ford's teammates in the past, Tucker wasn't expecting the ball and missed the layup. It was one of the few mistakes he made on the night as he finished with 7-of-11 shooting and went 4-of-6 from the foul line.

Once Texas settled down, the Longhorns used runs of 13-0 and 16-7 in the first

half to take a 38-21 lead into halftime.

Mouton went 5-of-8 from the floor in the first half for 12 points.

"Obviously, we were overmatched," said Brown coach Glen Miller, whose team plays in the Ivy League and went to the NIT last season.

"This game is going to help us down the road when we get back down to our level of competition," he said.

Jaime Kilburn led Brown with 16 points.

Tucker and Taylor, the Big 12's leading 3-point shooter last season who transferred from Baylor to Texas during the summer, took over in the second half.

Taylor hit four 3-pointers, three in the second half as the Longhorns pulled away. He also had a team-high three assists, two of them to Tucker on fast breaks.

"It's like he's got some point guard skills," Brown said.

## Owens, Rattay spark 49ers to 30-14 victory over Steelers

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Before Terrell Owens disappeared down the stairs to the locker room, he thrilled the San Francisco 49ers' fans one more time by raising his arms in the signal for a touchdown.

Owens kept his celebrations simple this time — and his play was simply beautiful.

Owens had a 61-yard touchdown catch among his eight receptions for 155 yards, and Tim Rattay went 21-of-27 for 254 yards in the 49ers' 30-14 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers on Monday night.

Perhaps it was the prime-time spotlight. Perhaps it was a growing comfort with Rattay, who loves to throw deep.

Perhaps Owens simply got comfortable enough in this stressful season to let loose with his formidable talents — but whatever sparked it, Owens' performance set up nearly every good thing in the 49ers' fourth straight home victory.

"He's so big and strong that when they have to single him, it's a mismatch," Rattay said. "We did a good job calling plays for him. There's a good relationship there. We connect well."

After Owens accelerated past Chad Scott to catch

Rattay's perfect pass on the 49ers' second drive of the night, he didn't produce a pen from his sock or grab a cheerleader's pompoms. He simply did a pirouette and broke into a rather conservative dance.

"They're giving me the opportunity to make some plays," Owens said. "The first half of the season, I was really putting pressure on myself. I dropped some passes and I wasn't playing T.O.-like. That was when we went on a losing skid, and I was just trying to do too much."

In the third quarter, Kevan Barlow broke through the line on a 78-yard touchdown run — but Owens paved the way by blocking two Pittsburgh defensive backs in the final yards.

While Barlow's teammates mobbed him in the end zone, Owens strutted back to the sideline with a swagger that's growing as quickly as the 49ers' playoff hopes.

"If T.O. wasn't there, I would have been down at the 5," Barlow said. "He can be our leader out there when he's making plays like he did. He's a great player. He's got that something extra."

In the teams' first meeting since a rain-soaked game at Candlestick Park in 1999, San Francisco (5-5) dominated the matchup of defending

division champions who have struggled this season. After Pittsburgh pulled within 10-7 in the third quarter, San Francisco scored two touchdowns in 14 seconds — helped by Antwaan Randle El's fumbled kickoff return.

Fullback Fred Beasley capped the rally by catching a 28-yard touchdown pass from Rattay, who stirred the 49ers' quarterback controversy with a second straight near-flawless performance in place of injured Jeff Garcia.

"It ultimately comes down to Jeff's health," Rattay said. "If he's healthy, he'll go. I love to play. I love to be out there, but right now, my role is the backup."

Tommy Maddox was 25-of-44 for 327 yards for Pittsburgh (3-7), which lost its sixth in seven games thanks to everything from dropped passes to key penalties.

"We're in a situation where we can't lose any more," linebacker Joey Porter said. "We have to win out. There's always something to play for. We just have to keep fighting."

Randle El had a 32-yard TD catch in the fourth. Though Pittsburgh is in one of the most dismal stretches of coach Bill Cowher's 12

seasons, the Steelers still are just two games out of first place in the AFC North.

"All night, we were an inch away here and an inch away there from converting some real big plays," Maddox said. "It's frustrat-

## AL MVP may not stay in Texas

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Alex Rodriguez won the AL MVP award, even though the Texas Rangers didn't win many games.

Yet, the Rangers are willing to listen to offers from other teams for the All-Star shortstop — not that many could afford the seven seasons and \$179 million left on his record contract.

After becoming only the second player from a last-place team to win a Most Valuable Player award, Rodriguez confirmed Monday that the Rangers talked to him about a possible trade.

"They presented me with a situation," Rodriguez said. "Whatever they want to do, I'll want to cross that bridge when the time is right. I'm not closing or opening any doors right now."

General manager John Hart said Texas was contacted by several clubs about Rodriguez, but that there was never a specific deal during those conversations several weeks ago.

"We've made it very clear that we think Alex is going to be

Rodriguez finished second in the MVP ballot twice, to Oakland's Miguel Tejada last year and the Rangers' Juan Gonzalez in 1996. This time, he received 242 points in voting by the Baseball Writers' Association and was the only player listed on every ballot.

"I felt like I was driving myself crazy over this award. It was painful to come in second place," Rodriguez said during a conference call from his vacation in Mexico. "There's nothing like winning it. I couldn't be happier."

The only other player from a last-place team to be MVP was Andre Dawson of the Chicago Cubs in 1987.

The 28 first-place votes were split among 10 players, one short of the record set in the 1977 AL vote and matching the total in the 1947 NL vote. Rodriguez got six, the fewest for an MVP winner since the New York Yankees' Yogi Berra in 1951.

Toronto first baseman Carlos Delgado was second with 213 points, followed by Yankees catcher Jorge Posada with 194. Delgado and Posada both got five first-place votes.

Rodriguez said he thought there had been talks about a possible trade with "three of four teams" but didn't elaborate. Hart, speaking on a separate conference call, refused to elaborate.

Only a handful of large-market teams, such as the Mets, Yankees, Red Sox, Orioles and Dodgers, could take on the rest of his \$252 million, 10-year contract, the richest in baseball history.

Rodriguez hasn't been able to turn around the fortunes of the Rangers, who have finished last in the AL West in all three of his seasons while he led the league in home runs.

This year, A-Rod hit .298 with 47 homers and also led the league in runs (124) and slugging percentage (.600), along with 118 RBIs that were second in the AL to Delgado's 145. The Rangers were 71-91.

## Buckeyes move into second place in BCS

Ohio State moved past USC into second place in the BCS standings Monday. Even so, the Buckeyes might need more than a win at Michigan to defend their championship.

The Buckeyes edged ahead of Southern California by 0.19 points following their 16-13 overtime win over Purdue. The Trojans lost ground in the computers and strength of schedule after winning 45-0 at Arizona (2-9).

"That's great, I guess, but it doesn't really mean anything until we go up and play Michigan," Ohio State defensive end Will Smith said. "After we play Michigan and hopefully come out with a win, then we can see where we're ranked then."

Oklahoma (10-0) remained the runaway leader in the standings that will determine which two teams will play for the national championship in the Sugar Bowl.

The Sooners have a 1.0 for poll average, 1.0 for computer-rank average, 0.40 for strength of schedule, zero for losses and 0.6 bonus points for beating fifth-

place Texas for a 1.8. Ohio State was second with 7.52 points, followed by USC at 7.71 and LSU at 12.21.

"I wasn't concerned about it last week and I am not concerned about it this week," USC coach Pete Carroll said. "We have a big game coming up against UCLA. We're just trying to take care of business this week."

TCU, the only undefeated team in Division I-A along with Oklahoma, fell from sixth to eighth. The Horned Frogs need to be in the top six to guarantee an at-large berth in a BCS bowl.

The biggest development this week was Ohio State's move to second, although it might just be temporary.

Even with a win against a quality opponent like Michigan, the Buckeyes can't improve their computer ranking unless Oklahoma loses. They are second in six of the computers and third in the other, but the lowest ranking is dropped.

Also, Ohio State's strength of schedule will only improve marginally after this week's game.

USC, which ends the season against UCLA (6-5) and Oregon State (7-3), could edge up a bit in the strength of schedule and the

computers. The Trojans also could benefit with a bigger quality-win bonus if Washington State moves up from 10th in the BCS.

"You can't look at the numbers without looking ahead," BCS expert Jerry Palm said. "The big misconception about the BCS is people think it works like the polls do where if you win you won't drop. It doesn't."

Palm did say that the Buckeyes will be almost impossible to catch if LSU loses, which would allow Ohio State to move from fourth place to third in the polls.

"What is most important at this time is the Ohio State-Michigan rivalry and the Big Ten championship," Ohio State coach Jim Tressel said. "Right now, the BCS rankings are secondary."

Texas remained fifth this week, followed by Tennessee, Georgia, TCU, Michigan and Washington State.

Georgia remained in the best position to win the SEC East. If there is a three-way tie with the Bulldogs, Tennessee and Florida, the winner will be determined by the BCS standings.

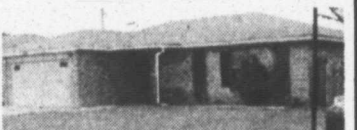
