The ruling by the Massachusetts
Supreme Court giving gay couples the Supreme Court giving gay couples the
right to marry has proved what U.S. Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia predicted would be the result of the U.S. Supreme Court's striking down of Texas' here on out, anything goes
Last June, for example, in his dissent, Justice Scalia scoffed at the idea that the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling does not address same-sex marriage.
"Do not believe it," he advised.
"Today's opinion dismantles the structure of constitutional law that has permitted a distinction to be made between heterosexual and homosexual unions, insofar as formal recognition in marriage is con-
cerned." "The court has taken sides in the culture war, departing from its role of assur-
ing, as neutral observer, that the demoing, as neutral observer, that the demo-
cratic rules of engagement are observed," Scalia said.
In that ruling the High Court, led by Justice Anthony M. Kennedy flatly stated that government has no interest in regulating what two consenting adults do in their bedrooms.
But Scalia wrote that Court's ruling "effectively decrees the end of all morals legislation. If, as the court asserts, the promotion of a majoritarian sexual morality is not even a legitimate state interest," laws criminalizing "fornication, bigamy, adultery, adult incest, bestiality and obscenity" cannot survive future court rulings based on the Lawrence case ruling. In other words, anything goes.

"We declare that barring an individual from the protections, benefits, and obligations of civil marriage solely because that person would marry a person of the same sex violates the Massachusetts Constitution," Mrs. Justice Lewis said. "Certainly our decision today marks a significant change in the definition of marriage as it has been inherited from the common law and understood by many
societies for centuries," she wrote, and societies for centuries," she wrote, and
then added the deceptive statement: "But then added the deceptive statement: "But
it does not disturb the fundamental value of marriage in our society."

The decision showed that Justice The decision showed that Justice sodomy case would come back to bite us. It just did, and the teeth belonged to the Massachusetts Supreme Court.
Once again we see the courts making laws instead of interpreting them. That's exactly what this Massachusetts court did And the damage it will create will be national in scope.
A lot of that damage will come out of the "full faith and credit" clause of the U.S. Constitution, which says states must accept other states' judicial proceedings. In other words, if a gay couple marries in Massachusetts, the other 49 states will be forced to recognize their "marriage" as egally binding. As Gary Bauer, president
of American Values notes: "People in very short order will move back to very short order will move back to
Alabama and Tennessee and demand that [Massachusetts] marriages will be recog nized. At that point, you have got a constitutional crisis."
The real aim of the gay community's demands for legalization of gay marriage is government endorsement of their sexu al behavior. They do not want to be monogamous as has been proven in Canada. Now that Canadian gays can get married they say they want to eliminate monogamy as a requirement of marriage in other words, they want a stamp of approval on gay promiscuity.

Spiegel performs one of two breast reconstruction techniques that use a woman's own abdominal skin and tissue but spare the underlying muscle. The DIEP flap, or deep inferior epigastric perforator, transfers the skin and fat, with the blood supply coming from tiny ves-
sels. The abdominal muscle, not needed for sels. The abdominal muscle, not needed for the reconstruction, is left in place.

## "Many patients have an adequate lower

SIEAlar, less-invasive procedure called the SIEA flap, or the superficial epigastric artery flap; the blood supply travels in the fat layer of the abdominal area. The SIEA flap uses a more shallow incision. However, only 70 percent of patients have adequate superficial blood vessels.
The decision as to which flap is performed is made during the surgery. Both procedures ease recovery time and allow women to
resume an active lifestyle about four weeks after surgery Spiegel recently began doing the after surgery. Spiegel recently began doing the procedure immediately after lumpectomy, per-
formed by Dr. Anthony Lucci, an assistant professor of surgery.
While breast reconstruction has long been an option for women who have had mastec-
tomies for breast cancer, women with lumpec ed to have had fewer choices. Implants needed to be custom made to fill the space where
the lump and breast tissue were removed mak ing them an impractical solution. Traditional flaps would result in loss of the stomach muscle to reconstruct a small defect.
"The present day treatment options for breast cancer usually involve a choice between mastectomy and lumpectomy," Spiegel said. "We are offering partial reconstruction to allow more women to choose lumpectomy without having a deformity."

Thomas Barton named to Nurse Examiners Board

In a coup for the Pampa medical community, a local man, Thomas L. Barton, RN, MSN, has been selected to serve on the Texas State Board of Nurse Examiners in Austin.
According to its official web site, the board is currently taxed with "protect(ing) and promote(ing) the welfare of the people of Texas by ensuring that each person holding a license as a registered professional nurse in the State of Texas is competent to practice safely."

Barton has served as chief nursing officer at Pampa Regional Medical Center for the past 13 months.
"Each licensing body has a board in the State of Texas," Barton explained, "and I'm on the Board of Nurse Examiners which is for registered nurses for right now."
"Basically we are the governing body for the people who work to check licensure," he said. "Anything that has to do with the licensing of a registered nurse, that's what the Board of Nurse Examiners is responsible for "
Barton was appointed to the nine-member board by Gov. Rick Perry. He will serve a six-year term.
"It's kind of an exciting time to be on the board," Barton said, "because as of April they're combining the registered nurse board and the LVN board."
Barton anticipates the board will expand once the merger is complete and estimates the licensed vocational nurs ing board oversees something in the neighborhood of 250,000 licensees. "So its a big responsibility for them, and then we are the governing body over them."
His present board duties require him to travel to Austin bout once a month
"Once every quarter we have a board meeting," he
observed, "and that's in Austin for three days, and then we have and then we have other committee assigned." assigned."
"For example last month I went down for the eligibility disciplinary committee," he said.

During his 17 year career in nursing, Barton's primary focus has been emergency been emergency services. He is a member of Emergency Nurse Association, Texa Organization Nurse Executives

He obtained his diploma of nursing from Cabarrus Memorial School of Nursing in Concord, N.C., and his master's in nursing administration from Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tenn.

Barton has sat on the Board of Occupational Therapy for the State of New Mexico as well as the board of a rape/crisis trauma recovery center in Las Cruces, N.M.

He originally hails from upstate New York. He came to Pampa from Ocala, Fla., where he was director of the Emergency Department at a hospital there for four years. "I worked in one other hospital the same size as this (PRMC)," Barton said.
"I enjoy the size of the town," he continued, "the size of the staff - you can get to know all your staff - I enjoy the fact that we have a little girl, and we're real comfortable around Pampa. ... We're real comfortable here from a personal as well as a professional standpoint

At PRMC, all nursing units including Extended Care the surgery unit, all labs, X-Ray, Respiratory Therapy, and Rehab report to him, and he in turn reports to the hospital administrator.
