# Pampa ISD eyes bus contract

Pampa Independent School District officials want to know if contracting out for student transportation would be more cost effective for the district.

Tom Johnson of Southwest Student Transportation in McKinney, sat down with school board members at last week's meeting to discuss what a contract with his company would mean to Pampa ISD.

SST offers a turn-key operation, he said, including full service management, benefits for staff, liability insurance, and maintenance of the district's student transportation fleet for set fee. At the same time, Johnson explained, the district retains ownership of the vehicles, so that if the contract ends, the district is not left without a bus fleet.

"The first question everyone asks is, or breakdowns," he said. 'what happens to the existing staff," Johnson said.

TYLER (AP) — East Texas officials are urging an investigation into whereabouts of at least \$1 million worth of surplus federal property given to Smith County as part of a deal to house federal prisoners in the jail.

County Commissioner Sharon Emmert and County Judge Becky Dempsey made the announcement Monday after examining more than 500 pages of documents delivered by Sheriff J.B. Smith at the commissioners court's weekly meeting.

In the sheriff's response, he said he was asking the U.S. Marshal's office in Washington for a "full and complete" inquiry into the contractual agreement and into disposal of

"What I'm asking for is for them to make sure we're disposing of it properly," Smith said.

Documents obtained by the Tyler Morning Telegraph showed that directives were sometimes contradictory.

# My early Christmas present

I opened an early Christmas present this year. It came to me by airmail from halfway around the world on Saturday, Dec. 13.

Vic and I had to fly to Baltimore, Maryland, to receive this gift that came to us in tan and brown wrapping. I don't believe any Christmas present could have been more precious.

That wonderful gift - wrapped in desert camouflage uniform - contained my son Dave, back on American soil after almost a year in Iraq.

We spent six whirlwind days with him and his girlfriend Amy who lives in Newport News, Va. We traveled up the east coast to Pennsylvania to meet Amy's parents who live in a lovely area of the Poconos.

So much happened in that short time, I'm still trying to assimilate it all. Some things are beyond describing.

For all those who have asked about Dave: He's physically in great condition. He's emotionally stressed and extremely tired mentally. The day before he flew

out of Iraq he had to remove the body of one of his buddies from a humvee destroyed by an explosive device, just outside of their compound in Mosul.

His sense of humor remains alive and well. He understands that he will have to go through a readjustment period when he returns and he knows that he will have to learn to live with some of the things he has experienced.

Dave's reaction to Saddam's capture wasn't what I expected. He seemed almost angry. Later he said he woke up early that morning, sweaty, with his heart racing. "I knew they had him," he told me. "Somehow I knew it."

As he talked about what happened, he realized he felt fear for his fellow soldiers, the "Band of Brothers" he's worked with for the past few months. He knew that a coup of this magnitude would draw strong retaliation.

Yes, Dave's different, but he's also the same. If it's possible, I think seeing how he's matured into a responsible man makes me love him even more.

After Vic and I returned last week, I learned that my emotional reaction to seeing Dave apparently had already traversed the family network. When Dave related the homecoming to his sister Angel, he told her, "You could hear Mom all the way down the hall!"

I'm not ashamed. Moms can't help but cry. It's part of the job description.

If you feel the hustle and bustle of the holidays are getting you down this year, you might consider a different Christmas story than the traditional tale told in the Book of Matthew. Read Luke 10:38-42. It will give you a whole new perspective.

# Stranger things have happened

Especially now that the capture of Saddam Hussein could turn the Iraq war into a positive for George Bush, Howard Dean may turn to Hillary Rodham Clinton to be his vice presidential candidate. And, especially now that Al Gore has un-retired, Hillary might just accept.


If Dean wins the Democratic nomination, his biggest problem will be watching his back. Even if he wins most of the delegates at the Boston convention, it is still Bill and Hillary's party.

The Clintons have done everything they can to stop Dean's momentum. At the race's start, they sent their A Team - pollster Mark Penn and media guru Mandy Grumwald - to work for Sen. Joe Lieberman in hopes of putting one of their faithful in the winners circle.

When Lieberman sputtered, they did their best to get Gen. Wesley Clark into the fray. President Clinton even said that Clark and Hillary were the two stars of the Democratic Party. Clinton moviemaker Harry Thomasson is doing an ad for Clark and Bill's buddy Bruce Lindsay signed up for the campaign.

When John Kerry began to fizzle, the Clintons sent in advisers to try to shore

The Clintons' policy has been A.B.D. -Anybody But Dean. They don't want Dean, or anyone else they can't control, getting control of the Democratic apparatus. The party machinery, now firmly run



by Terry McAuliffe. directs funds to favored candidates and pays for much of the Clintons' political operation.

So if Dean is the candidate, how can he avoid the McGovern problem - getting knifed in the back by his own party leaders? Take a hostage, Hillary, and put her on the ticket.

She would bring him a cachet he now lacks, give him support from the party's center and guarantee the full and enthusiastic support of the popular ex-president and his backers. And putting a woman on the ticket would, by itself, make a big dif-

Dean will remember how Reagan united his fractured party by putting his defeated primary opponent, George W. Bush on his ticket in 1980. While Dean's nominal opponents are named Gephardt, Kerry, Clark, and Lieberman, his real adversary all along has been Clinton. He might find the Reagan prescription the right one to follow.

Why might Hillary accept? She suddenly has a new potential rival for the 2008 nomination - Al Gore.

The former vice president's un-retirement, signaled by his endorsement of Howard Dean, makes him a potent possible rival for Hillary. With his bold support of the peace movement's darling, Dean, Gore may get an edge among the party's new masters - its left wing.

Hillary may also worry that Dean might choose someone like Gen. Clark as VP. Such a choice would immediately lift Clark into contention for the 2008 nomination, making it a tough three-way race where it had once appeared a cakewalk for the former first lady. If Hillary ran with Dean, she'd elimi-

nate Clark from contention and would overshadow Gore in her support for Dean, regaining ascendancy on the party's left. The national exposure would acclimate people to her running for national office and their defeat would be chalked up to Dean, not to her.

Hillary thrives in the spotlight and wilts outside it. What better stage would there be than the podium in Boston and the campaign to follow? She could tour America attacking Bush while showcasing her candidacy for four years hence.

So a Dean/Clinton ticket makes a lot of sense for both sides. It's too early to predict the events of the next eight months, but certainly the advisers of both campaigns will look closely at the possibility.

Dean/Clinton in '04? Stranger things have happened.

# Alford is 0-3 against Knight Overtime win

DALLAS (AP) - Steve Alford still hasn't beaten his former coach.

That doesn't mean Texas Tech's Bob Knight is satisfied with being undefeated against the best player from the last of his three national championship teams at Indiana.

"There's never been a time that I've played these kids that played for me or coached with me that I haven't wanted our kids to win," Knight said. "I don't like to see our guys lose, and I don't like to see Steve lose this game."

But Andre Emmett, Knight's current star player at Tech, scored 23 points — including the last six in a 10-0 first-half run that snapped an early tie and the Red Raiders beat Iowa 65-59 Monday night.

Alford was part of 92 of Knight's wins at Indiana. including the 1987 national championship. They also shared an Olympic gold medal in 1984. But as a coach, Alford is 0-3

against Knight. "If I have to lose a game, I'd want to lose it to him," Alford

said.

Texas Tech (10-2) has won six straight games since losing 62-59 in another Dallas appearance three weeks ago at SMU. Pierre Pierce had 18 points for the Hawkeyes (6-2), who have

for each other, Alford didn't speak at length with Knight after taking the Iowa job in 1999 until calling his former coach in January when his own team was struggling and he needed to talk to somebody about it.

Still, both coaches insisted in the week leading up to the game that there are no problems with their relationship.

"This is somebody that since I was in the third grade I've been following and watching and dreaming about playing for," Alford said. "And then all that takes place and I end up getting into coaching and coaching against him. It's always tough to go up against him."

Before Monday night's game, their first against each other since Alford's first year at Iowa, the former player walked over to meet Knight. The two embraced lightly near midcourt and had an extended conversation, Alford smiling widely while Knight talked with his arm draped over the shoulder of his former player.

Once the game started, Emmett took over and Alford's smile was gone.

Darryl Dora's tip-in broke a

6-6 tie five minutes in to put the Red Raiders ahead to stay. He then followed an Iowa turnover with a jumper.



Iowa didn't get closer than eight points before halftime, when Emmett already had 16 points and the Red Raiders led

The Hawkeyes opened the second half with a 8-2 run, getting to 41-35 after 3-pointers by Jeff Horner and Pierce.

But even when Texas Tech went more than six minutes without scoring midway through the second half, Iowa scored just nine points to make it 52-48. With a chance to cut the deficit to two, the Hawkeyes missed three shots on the same possession and then made just two of their last six free throw attempts.

Josh Washington's two free throws with 5:35 left broke Tech's scoring drought and Iowa never got closer.



# Eight Palestinians die in refugee camp raid

An Israeli raid on a Gaza refugee camp killed eight Palestinians on Tuesday in a flare-up of violence that came just mission to Israel.

The one-day visit Monday by Egyptian Foreign Minister Ahmed Maher was marred by a confrontation with Palestinian extremists at the Al site, that landed him briefly in the hospital.

Early Tuesday, about 40 Israeli tanks and armored vehicles entered the Rafah refugee camp on the Gaza-Egypt border, Palestinians said.

Eight Palestinians — five militants said. and three civilians - were killed and at least 41 other people, including nine children, were wounded by Israeli gunfire, hospital officials said. The violence marked the bloodiest day in Gaza in two months.

One of those killed, Ahmed Majar, 32, was a Palestinian police officer from. heading to his job at the Rafah border crossing. He was shot in the head, his family said.

At funerals held hours later, the sounds of mourning mixed with those incursion continued.

The army, which has raided Rafah repeatedly in recent weeks, said the operation was a part of its ongoing efforts to expose weapons smuggling tunnels and that troops fired in
