AUSTIN (AP) — A draft proposal on how to replace the state's ailing school finance system could be in place by next week, a key lawmaker said Wednesday.

Monday is the self-imposed dead- taxes. line of the Joint Select Committee on Public School Finance to have an alternative drafted and ready to present to the full Legislature during an expected special session on school finance, said Sen. Florence Shapiro, co-chairwoman of the panel.

Shapiro said she hopes the draft will include a statewide property tax that offers immediate relief to homeowners, many of whom are now paying as much as \$1.50 per \$100 of property.

Shapiro said she hoped to reduce that by 50- to-75 cents. But, she noted, any proposal would be for the full Legislature to decide.

Republican Gov. Rick Perry, who

has said he will call a special legislative session as soon as April, is expected to announce his property tax relief proposals around the state on Thursday, said spokeswoman Kathy Walt.

Currently, the state's share-thewealth system of funding public education depends heavily on local property

Most lawmakers want to eliminate the so-called Robin Hood school finance system. They say it is unfair for property wealthy districts to have to give money to poorer districts.

Alternatives being considered to offset reduced property taxes include expanding sales taxes to include consumer services, a broader business tax, video lottery terminals at racetracks and a \$1-per-pack cigarette tax increase.

Most officials perusing the options, including Perry, want to maintain a tax environment that is business friendly and will help foster economic develop-



Nichols' attorneys saying the defense lacked receiving some 13 documents

WASHINGTON (AP) -Setting up a possible murder trial defense, Terry Nichols' lawyers say state and federal prosecutors did not provide them more than a dozen FBI documents that raise the possibility of additional accomplices in the 1995 Oklahoma City bombing.

The documents, which were cited in a recent series of Associated Press stories, include two 1990s teletypes from then-FBI Director Louis Freeh's office citing possible connec-Timothy tions between McVeigh and a gang of white supremacist bank robbers, the lawyers said.

Nichols, already in federal prison for the bombing, began trial this month on Oklahoma state murder charges alleging he assisted McVeigh in building the deadly bomb. The judge has said he will dismiss the charges with prejudice - making it very hard for prosecutors to resurrect the case — if Nichols' lawyers can prove documents that could have aided their defense were withheld.

Under a Supreme Court ruling, prosecutors and the government are obligated to turn over to defense lawyers all materials that could help clear a defendant, such as evidence that points to other suspects or casts doubt on prosecution witnesses.

Nichols' attorneys agreed to review the materials cited in the AP story and identify which they could not find among the massive files prosecutors and the government provided them. In all, they identified 13 FBI documents and a handful of other materials.

"To our knowledge, we have not received these documents from the state or federal government," lead Nichols' attorney Hermanson Brian said Wednesday.

In addition, the lawyers said they did not receive any information from prosecutors concerning the FBI's unsuccessful efforts to get permission to interview McVeigh in 2001 to resolve lingering questions before his execution.

The prosecutor, Oklahoma County District Attorney Wes Lane, said, "Everything the federal government has provided to us has either been given or made available to the Nichols' defense team."

FBI officials declined comment, citing the trial and an ongoing internal investigation into issues raised by AP's sto-

McVeigh was executed in 2001. Nichols, 48, is serving a life prison sentence for the April 19, 1995, bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building, which killed 168 people. He was convicted in 1997 on federal conspiracy and involuntary manslaughter charges involving eight federal employees. The state charges, which carry the death penalty, are for the 160 other victims and one victim's fetus.

Last month, the former chief of the FBI's Oklahoma City investigation, Dan Defenbaugh, said a small number of documents and evidence cited in the stories had not been sent to him to pursue possible links between McVeigh and the robbers, and he called for the bureau to reopen the investigation.

House moves to ban lawsuits blaming obesity crisis on the fast food industry

WASHINGTON (AP) -House Republicans seeking to curb another potential source of money for trial lawyers decided that eaters hankering for "biggie" portions shouldn't be allowed to blame their weight on fast-food chains and restaurants.

The House voted 276-139 on Wednesday to ban class action lawsuits that contend food companies and their offerings are responsible for Americans' putting on the pounds and lurching toward obesity.

Those who overeat should blame themselves, not the fast food industry that employs almost 12 million people and is the nation's second largest employer behind the government, Republicans said.

"We as Americans need to realize that suing your way to better health is not the answer," said House Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-III. "Trial lawyers need to stop encouraging consumers to blame others for the consequences of their actions just so they can profit from frivolous lawsuits against restaurants."

But Democrats say the GOP is just playing partisan politics in an election, slapping at trial lawyers who normally support Democrats. The bill is unlikely to pass the closely divided Senate, and most obesity claims have been dismissed in court anyway, they said.

Last year, a federal judge in New York dismissed two class-action suits blaming McDonald's for making people fat.

"It protects an industry that doesn't need to be protected at this particular point and we're dealing with a problem that doesn't exist," said Rep. James McGovern, D-Mass. "The problem that

does exist is that we have an obesity problem in this country."

The federal government on Tuesday said overeating could soon replace smoking as the No. 1 preventable cause of death. Two out of three adults and 9 million children are overweight or obese, the report said.

"The food industry strongly believes that more energy must be put into solving the problem of obesity, and less into assigning blame for the purpose of collecting legal fees," said John R. Cady, president of the National Food Processors Association.

The bill, sponsored by Rep. Ric Keller, R-Fla., would prohibit many obesity or weightrelated claims against the food industry. It would still allow claims to go forward if state or federal laws had been broken and as a result a person gained weight.

Democrats accused Republicans of a political ploy intended to hurt trial lawyers while helping a leading industry that can fend for itself.

House Republicans have in recent years approved similar bills barring suits against the gun industry for gun crimes and against businesses for asbestos-related health problems.

The White House endorsed the bill. "Food manufacturers and sellers should not be held liable for injury because of a person's consumption of legal, unadulterated food and a person's weight gain or obesity," the White House said in a statement.

Sen. Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., introduced similar legislation in the Senate. "I recognize that obesity is a serious problem in America, but suing the people who produce and sell food is not going to solve this problem," he said "Americans need to take greater care in what and how much --- they eat."



Ineptitude, not enlightenment

What passes for educational enlightenment these days boggles the mind. Matt Gouras, of The Associated Press, writing in the Jan. 5 Seattle Times tells a story about Tennessee schools. The success of some students has made other students feel badly about themselves.

What're the schools' responses? Public schools in Nashville have stopped posting honor rolls. Some are considering a ban on posting exemplary schoolwork on bulletin boards. Others have canceled academic pep rallies, while others might eliminate spelling bees. Nashville's Julia Green Elementary School principal, Steven Baum, agrees, thinking that spelling bees and publicly graded events are leftovers from the days of ranking and sorting students. He says: "I discourage competitive games at school. They just don't fit my worldview of what a school should be." This is a vision all too common among today's educationists, but there's a good reason for it: too large a percentage of teachers represent the very bottom of the academic achievement barrel and as such fall easy prey to mindless and destructive fads.

Retired Indiana University (of Pennsylvania) physics professor Donald E. Simanek has assembled considerable data on just who becomes a teacher. Freshman college students who choose education as a major "are on the average, one of the academically weakest groups. Those choosing non-teaching physics and math are one of the academically strongest groups. Some of the more capable who initially chose teach-



ing will find the teacher-preparation curriculum to be boring and intellectually empty, and shift to curricula that are academically more challenging and rewarding." Simanek adds: "On tests such as the Wessman Personnel Classification Test of verbal analogy and elementary arithmetical computations, the teachers scored, on average, only slightly better than clerical workers. A rather low score was enough to pass. Yet half the teachers failed.'

There are other causes for the sorry state of today's primary and secondary education. There's been the politicizing of education. Teachers have recruited students to write letters to the president protesting the war and participate in demonstrations against school budget cuts. Very often, good teachers and principal are faced with the impossible task of having to deal with administrators and school boards who are intellectual inferiors and motivated by political considerations rather than what's best for children.

One of the very best things that can be done for education is to eliminate schools of education. There's little in the curriculum that contributes directly to the development of the mind. Simanek says that "most

teachers have learned 'methods and skills' of teaching, but don't have a solid understanding of the subject they teach. So they end up 'teaching' trivia, misinformation and intellectual garbage, but doing it with 'professional' polish. Most do not display love of learning, nor the ability to do intense intellectual activity of any kind. Lacking these qualities, they cannot possibly inspire and nourish these qualities in their students."

According to a recent study by the North Central Regional Education Laboratory titled, "Effective Teacher Recruitment and Retention Strategies in the Midwest," 75 percent to 100 percent of the teachers that leave the profession are ranked as either "effective" or "very effective.

To improve teaching, we must attract people of higher intellectual ability and we must make teacher salaries related to ability and effectiveness. We must ensure that teachers have more academic freedom, better working conditions and a suitable environment for teaching. An important component of that environment is the capacity to remove students who are alien and hostile to the education process. Finally, we should consider curriculum changes that eliminate courses that have little, if anything, to do with reading, writing and arithmetic.

The low academic quality of many of our teachers is neither flattering nor comfortable to confront, but confront it we must if we're to do anything about our sorry state of education.

Kerry's 'flip-flops' may prove fatal

It is increasingly clear that President Bush's line of attack against Kerry will be to describe him as a flip-flopping politician, changing his positions constantly to suit the political needs of the moment. One negative ad, previewed on "Meet the Press," showed an animation of two John Kerry boxers battling one another. The winner? George W. Bush.

The obvious goal of the Bush attack is to discredit Kerry and make it hard for anyone to believe in him or anything he says. But this round of flip-flop attacks is just the precursor of the main Bush offensive. Attacking Kerry for reversing himself on many key issues will weaken the Democrat, but the real point is to soften him up for two more deadly attacks likely to follow.

First, the flip-flop ads are designed to make Kerry appear too weak to lead America through the tough challenges of terrorism at home and abroad. Attacking a candidate for reversing himself on key political issues is the best way to make him appear weak, indecisive and vacillating.

When I worked for President Bill Clinton, the Republicans tried the same tactic, constantly citing his frequent reversals on issues to demonstrate weakness. Their barbs were very effective and led to a White House policy of never, never, never reversing a stand on anything.

(Sometimes, White House staff liberals took advantage of this axiom to leak word that Clinton was about to take a liberal



prevent Kerry from responding to the other key line of Bush attack - that Kerry is too liberal for mainstream America.

By criticizing Kerry for changing his position constantly, the Bush campaign hopes to stop their opponent from wriggling out of his previous liberal votes and views. Once the public is alert to the chance that Kerry will change his mind, it becomes harder for the Democrat to explain away his votes and to move to the center under Bush's fire.

Now, when Bush moves in for the kill and accuses Kerry of opposing the Defense of Marriage Act or appropriations to fund the Iraq War, the Democratic candidate will find it harder to spin his positions and to move to the middle on these issues. When he tries, voters will repeat to themselves the Ronald Reagan criticism of Jimmy Carter: "There you go again."

By showing Kerry to flip-flop, Bush sets him up for the real charges - that he is too weak and too liberal to be president.

Conventional wisdom says that this election is going to be close, a replay of 2000. It need not be so. If Bush runs aggressive national advertisements, hammering at these themes, he can put this race away by the end of the spring.

We must remember that Bush's father trailed Mike Dukakis by 17 points in the months before the conventions. Until Bush Sr. ran negative ads, it seemed that the Massachusetts governor would be Reagan's successor. Kerry's bubble may prove to be just that fragile.

Regular Reassessment Helps Patients in Therapy Succeed

DEAR ABBY: A reader asked how a person can tell if psychiatry is "working." We would like to offer some suggestions.

The patient or client should have a specific plan for recovery. The therapist -- a clinical social worker, psychologist, psychiatrist, or marriage and family therapist -- should teach coping skills so the person can assemble a "coping toolbox." Patients should expect to do behavioral homework between counseling sessions.

Sometimes medication is needed; often it is not. Most uncomplicated depression and anxiety problems respond favorably within 10 to 20 sessions. Additional complicating factors may extend the number of sessions, but by the 20th session the person should see definite improvement.

Just "talking about" problems is helpful, but not usually enough to make and maintain changes. It is also not generally helpful to focus ONLY on the past/childhood when the problems are occurring today. Therapists and clients can be sure that goals are being met by assessing behavior and emotional changes at regular intervals.

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

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

Lawmakers: Baseball must toughen steroids policy

Baseball must institute a more stringent drug-testing policy, such as the one in place by the NFL, or Congress will step in and make changes.

"Your failure to commit to addressing this issue straight on and immediately will motivate this committee to search for legislative remedies," Sen. John McCain warned the baseball players' association Wednesday.

McCain, the Senate Commerce Committee chairman, challenged union head Donald Fehr to make changes. Fehr said he couldn't agree to changes in the collective bargaining agreement.

"I can tell you, and the players you represent, the status quo is not acceptable," said McCain, Arizona Republican. "And we will have to act in some way unless the major league players' union acts in the affirmative and rapid fashion."

MADRID, Spain (AP) — Powerful explosions rocked three Madrid train stations Thursday just days before Spain's general elections, killing more than 170 rush-hour commuters and wounding more than 500 in Spain's worst terrorist attack ever.

Foreign Minister Ana Palacio said there were indications the armed Basque separatist group ETA was to blame. "Right now we have to wait until we have an official statement. We don't have this official statement, so we just can say there are some hints and indications that point toward ETA," Palacio told the BBC.

Arnold Otegi, leader of Batasuna, an outlawed Basque party linked to the armed separatist group, denied it was behind the blasts and suggested "Arab resistance" elements were responsible

Otegi told Radio Popular in San Sebastian that ETA always phones in warnings before it attacks. The interior minister said there was no warning before Thursday's attack.

"The modus operandi, the high number of victims and the way it was carried out make me think, and I have a hypothesis in mind, that yes it may have been an operative cell from the Arab resistance," Otegi said. Otegi noted that Spain's government backed the Iraq war.

The Spanish national police said more than 170 people were killed and more than 500 were injured.

At Atocha station, people in tears streamed away from the station as rescue workers carried bodies covered in sheets of gold fabric. People with bloodied faces sat on curbs, using cellphones to tell loved ones they were alive. Hospitals appealed for blood donations. Buses had to be pressed into service as ambulances.

Rescue workers were overwhelmed, said Enrique Sanchez, an ambulance driver who went to Santa Eugenia station, about six miles southeast of Atocha station.

"There was one carriage totally blown apart. People were scattered all over the platforms. I saw legs and arms. I won't forget this ever. I've seen horror."

Shards of twisted metal were scattered by rails in the Atocha station at the spot where an explosion severed a train in two.

"I saw many things explode in the air, I don't know, it was horrible," said Juani Fernandez, 50, a civil servant who was on the platform waiting to go to work.

"People started to scream and run, some bumping into each other and as we ran there was another explosion. I saw people with blood pouring from them, people on the ground," Fernandez said.

No arrests were reported Thursday.

"Those responsible for this tragedy will be arrested and they will pay very dearly for it," Acebes said at Atocha.

The government convened anti-ETA rallies nationwide for Friday evening and announced three days of mourning.

"What a horror," said the Basque regional president, Juan Jose Ibarretxe, who insisted ETA does not represent the Basque people. "When ETA attacks, the Basque heart breaks into a thousand pieces," he said in the Basque capital Vitoria.

"This is one of those days that you don't want to live through," said opposition Socialist party spokesman Jesus Caldera. "ETA must be defeated," referring to the group as "those terrorists, those animals."

In London, British Foreign Secretary Jack Straw called the attacks terrorist atrocities and a "disgusting assault on the very principle of European democracy."

Straw said that Britain stood "shoulder to shoulder" with Spain and was ready to send any kind of material help needed.

European Parliament President Pat Cox said the bomb attacks amounted to "a declaration of war on democracy."

"No more bombs, no more dead," Cox said in Spanish before a hushed legislature in Strasbourg, France. "It is an outrageous, unjustified and unjustifiable attack on the Spanish people and Spanish democracy."

Police had been on high alert for Basque separatist violence ahead of general elections Sunday. Mariano Rajoy, the candidate for prime minister of the ruling conservative Popular Party, said he was calling off the rest of his campaign.

Mother charged with slaying two newborns five years apart

CANADICE, N.Y. (AP) days," said Wayne Ciluffo, - Stacy DeBeer told relatives she was pregnant. But when a baby failed to materialize months later, a suspicious relative snooping around DeBeers' basement found a newborn's body ---entombed in concrete.

DeBeer, 30, was arraigned Tuesday on charges of killing two of her infants - in June 1998 and May 2003 - and hiding them in pails filled with concrete that investigators had to break apart with hammers.

Her 32-year-old husband, Brian DeBeers, was charged with hindering prosecution by helping hide the first infant, a girl, in a garden shed.

The couple, who have children ages 8 and 6, were arrested in January after their unidentified relative discovered the body of the baby born in 2003 at their home in Farmington in rural northwestern New York, said an investigator who spoke on condition of anonymity.

"It's creepy. I guess you just don't know people nowa50, an unemployed truck driver who lived next door to the DeBeers in Canadice in the late 1990s.

Grand jury indictments accused DeBeer of delivering a girl without medical help in June 1998 and killing her by stuffing paper in her mouth, wrapping her in cloth andplacing her in a plastic bag.

Police suspect she kept the dead infant for nearly five years before disposing of it at her house in Canadice, where the couple lived until a fire burned down their house in June and they moved to Farmington.

Last May 11, a few weeks before the fire, she gave birth again, killed the child and took the body with her when she moved to Farmington, police say. The sex of that child was not revealed.

DeBeer gave birth to a fifth child in 2001 and gave her up for adoption, police said. Asked if she might have disposed of any other newborns, prosecutor R. Michael Tantillo said, "We can't be blind to that possibility."
