City Commission meets on Tuesday

Pampa Police Department wants an instant playbackrecording device for the communications center in order to make searching for critical information a much quicker process.

The subject will be discussed during Tuesday's 5 p.m. City Commission work session on the second floor of City Hall but no action on the request is scheduled.

Regular meeting of the Commission will follow the work session at 6 p.m. Both are open to the public.

In a memo to City Manager Bob Eskridge, Police Chief Charlie Morris said the equipment and installation will cost about \$21,000 with \$10,000 of it to be paid for by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

The current equipment requires the use of a code to search for the information which the chief said can delay accurate and timely direction of emergency response per sonnel.



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the facility will be located in the drainage area of the Canadian River below Lake Meredith in Segment No. 0101 of the Canadian River Basin.

Last January, State Rep. Warren Chisum of Pampa requested the TNRCC to hold a rare public meeting in Pampa on Jan. 8 to hear citizen comments on the issue.

Several members of TNRCC's staff traveled here to hear approximately 45 local residents give their reasons in an emotion-packed meeting why they were either for, or against, the project.

There is no deadline for the TNRCC response.

A written response to all formal comments will be prepared and considered by TNRCC Executive Director Jeff Saitas before a reaching a decision on the permit.

A copy of the response will then be sent to each person who submitted a formal comment or who requested to be on the mailing list for this application and provided a mailing

address.

Carter said he hopes to receive an answer from the TNRCC request in April.

"I wouldn't be surprised if it's not May, though," he said.

"We have definitely done everything we need to do," he said. "We're just sitting back waiting now."

He said if the facility is approved by the state agency the construction will probably take "most of 2003."

Yasser Arafat attend this week's crucial Arab summit, Israel will not lift the travel ban on the Palestinian leader unless he takes decisive steps against militants, an adviser to Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon said Monday.

Israel will make its decision by Tuesday, the day before the summit, said the adviser, Raanan Gissin. After another round of Israeli-Palestinian truce talks ended inconclusively Sunday night, Arafat's trip appeared increasingly in doubt; Palestinian Planning Minister Nabil Shaath said chances for Arafat's attendance were slim.

One of AG's child support offenders caught in Pampa

A man listed on the Top Ten list of child support payment offenders in Texas remained behind bars in the Gray County Jail this morning after he was arrested by city and county authorities.

William Alexander Warren, 35, 345 Tignor, owes \$81,024 for two children who live in Wichita Falls, according to the state attorney general's

Warren was arrested last week by Police Col. Terry Young and Sheriff's Deputy Beverly Chace.

After developing information that Warren was still in Pampa, Young said the man was put under surveillance before he and Chace arrested Warren outside the City Limits Club on McCullough

Judge Mary Ann Carpenter set Warren's cash bond at \$10,000, a spokesman in the jail said.

At the summit, which begins Wednesday in Beirut, Lebanon, Arab leaders are to discuss a Saudi plan that offers an end to the Israeli-Arab conflict, in exchange for Israel's withdrawal from the territories it occu-

pied in the 1967 Mideast war. The "end of conflict" formulation was used in a new draft obtained by The Associated Press. Earlier versions of the plan appeared to be more far-reaching, offering Israel normalization or comprehensive peace with the Arab world.

The United States wants Arafat to attend the sum-

President Bush "believes that Mr. Sharon and the Israeli government should give serious consideration to allowing Yasser Arafat to attend,' White House spokesman Ari Fleischer said Monday, and a U.S. official who spoke on condition of anonymity said the Bush administration has asked Israeli to lift the fourmonth travel ban.

Sharon has said he would only do so if a truce was reached first.

Gissin, the Sharon adviser, said Arafat would have to make a real effort in the coming days to rein in militants, "The Cabinet has made a decision that Arafat will be able ... to go any place he wants only when he takes action to fight terrorism," Gissin said. "That is something that one cannot give

A senior Palestinian official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Arafat is seeking U.S. guarantees that he will be able to return to the Palestinian areas after the summit.

Some Israeli Cabinet ministers have demanded that Sharon not allow Arafat to return. Sharon was to meet with key Cabinet ministers Monday evening to decide on Arafat's travel plans.

Thomas scored seven straight points in the final minutes as Houston held on after blowing most of a 16-point lead in the second half. The Rockets finished the game on an 11-2 run, clinching a much-needed victory after losing on the first three stops of a five-game trip by an average of 20 points.

Bob Sura had 19 points for Golden State, which dropped into a tie with Memphis for the worst record in the Western Conference at 17-52. Antawn Jamison added 17 points and seven rebounds as the Warriors lost their sixth straight home game.



Jayhawks join Final Four party

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — Even Dick Bennett, the master of the slowdown offense, enjoyed watching the Kansas Jayhawks.

The former Wisconsin coach had a front-row view of Kansas' 104-86 rout of the Oregon Ducks in the Midwest Regional final Sunday.

He was one of the few local fans who cheered as Kansas coach Roy Williams cut down the nets, which were probably still sizzling after the Jayhawks' record point production at the 5year-old Kohl Center.

Williams raised the ire of Wisconsin fans last season when he said after a highscoring game, "Don't you like this better than 19-17?" - a reference to the halftime score at the Badgers' Final

Four game in 2000.

Many Wisconsin fans felt that was an attack on the Badgers' physical style of play under Bennett, who retired 16 months ago.

"We buried the hatchet a long time ago," Bennett said Sunday. "I love the way Roy's team plays. This is high-level stuff."

Drew Gooden and Nick Collison each had doubledoubles early in the second half as the Jayhawks (33-3) reached their third Final Four under Williams, but their first as a top seed in five tries during his coaching tenure.

Kansas controlled the fast, end-to-end action and dominated the boards, outresecond-seeded bounding Oregon 63-34. Indeed, Gooden and Collison outrebounded the Ducks all by themselves — 35 to 34.

"It was tough because you block one out and the other one would come out of nowhere," Ducks forward Robert Johnson 'They're a great 1-2 punch."

The Jayhawks grabbed 26 offensive rebounds, leading to 31 second-chance points.

"We knew the way to beat them was to beat them on the boards and get extra shots," Gooden said. "I think it was contagious. We were relentless out there on the backboards."

Gooden had 18 points and 20 rebounds, and Collison added 25 points and 15 rebounds, putting Jayhawks in their first national semifinal since 1993.

Kansas faces Maryland, in Atlanta next Saturday. The Terrapins beat Connecticut 90-82 in the East Regional final.

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
