

Local D-Day historian shares knowledge **By DAVID BOWSER**


He joined the Army after World War II, but he is perhaps one of the most knowledgeable people in the world about the D-Day invasion of Normandy that led to freeing France, and Europe, from Hitler's iron fist. Col. Charles Johnson, USA retired,

said he is one of only three Americans that the French government recognizes as an authority on Omaha Beach.

"I also sit on the board of the Cannes (France) Museum," Johnson said. "I'm also on the board of the Bastogne Museum (the site of the Battle of the Bulge during World War II)."

It was the morning of June 6, 1944, 59 years ago this Friday, that the greatest armada ever assembled crossed the English Channel and began landing Allied troops on the beaches of France at Normandy.

Chuck Johnson joined the Army in 1946, but he had always been a history buff, and the significance of the the bluffs overlooking Omaha Beach, where he spent six years as a POW, fighting of the battle.

Astros rip Orioles to sweep three-game series

HOUSTON (AP) - When Brian Hunter was in Colorado three years ago, then manager Buddy Bell had some advice for him -- just have fun.

Hunter heeded that advice Thursday night as he tied his career highs with four hits and four RBI to help lead the Houston Astros to an 11-1 victory over the Baltimore Orioles.

It was the ninth time in his career that Hunter had collected four hits, the last coming July 26, 2000 against Colorado shortly after he was traded to the Cincinnati Reds. It also was the second time he had driven in four runs in a game, the other time coming July 4, 1997

against these same Orioles. For Hunter, it was just a matter of relaxing and enjoying himself.

"It's like Buddy Bell used to tell me, you're a better player when you're having fun out there," Hunter said. "Tonight was a lot of fun for me. I was hitting sixth and had three of the best hitters in the league (Jeff Bagwell, Jeff Kent and Lance Berkman) in front of me, so all I had to do was put the ball in play to score some runs."

Hunter certainly did that. He hit a sharp single to right in the first to drive in Bagwell, then doubled to left in the third. In the fourth, he singled through the hole at shortstop to drive in

Morgan Ensberg, then topped it off in the sixth with a two-run single up the middle.

"He had a four-hit night and drove in some runs and he made a nice play in right field," manager Jimy Williams said. "He had a good game. A lot of them had good games."

Hunter has been playing more lately because Richard Hidalgo has been on the disabled list since May 23 with a viral infection. In a game last Saturday against the Cubs, Hunter had his first multi-RBI and multi-hit game of the season with two apiece, but Thursday was the best he has felt this year.

"It was exciting," Hunter

said. "It was good to contribute. Roy (Oswalt) did a great job of keeping us in the game.

"Right now, with Richard out, all of us are pulling for each other and it could be any guy on any given night who comes in and contributes. That's what is going to make us different in the end.'

Sosa is expected to be suspended for using a corked bat this week, with a decision coming as early as Friday.

Bob Watson, baseball's vice president in charge of discipline, met with Chicago Cubs manager Dusty Baker and general manager Jim Hendry at Wrigley Field on Thursday morning, then returned to New York. Watson did not talk to Sosa.

"I don't know what's going to happen," Sosa said. "But I'm" prepared for anything."

Other players who have used corked bats have been a bad decision."

suspended for up to 10 games, and that precedent is expected to play a part in Watson's decision. But the Cubs are hoping that Sosa's cooperation, as well as the fact that no cork was found in any of his 81 bats that were checked, will work in his favor.

The Hall of Fame said Thursday that X-rays or CT scans of its five Sosa bats showed no cork or anything else that would violate baseball rules. Baseball officials didn't find anything in 76 bats confiscated from Sosa's locker after he was ejected from Tuesday night's game, either.

"The sad part about the whole thing is that he had 70some bats and it's like you still don't believe it. That's what's unfair," Baker said. "He was wrong with that one bat. It was

Johnson and LeBell have extensively researched the gun positions and bunkers overlooking Omaha Beach.

"A lot of people don't realize how fortified that area tually returned to the museum was," Johnson said.

Much of the fortifications were not large cannons, but mortars and machine guns that laid down a deadly fire across the beach.

"The morning of June 6, 1944, there were only 750 Germans that were in place," Johnson said. "They held off 54,500 Americans.

That June morning, 2,552 U.S. soldiers were killed.

"To this day," he said. "the trench lines are still there." Over the years, veterans

from both sides have returned there

Franz Gorckel and John Chapman shot at each other at 4:15 p.m. June 6, 1944.

"John Chapman was in a

tank, the first tank to breach the wall," Johnson said. "Gorckel was firing a machine gun at the tank, when Chapman fired a single round and hit Gorckel in the leg."

Each of the two men evenat the beach years later, where Johnson met them and later introduced them to each other.

"It's interesting because the battle was still raging that late in the afternoon," Johnson said. "It was not by any means a secure position. We were supposed to have been 20 miles inland by that time, and we were less than a mile off the beach."

Johnson spent 33 years, six month and four days in the Army, then worked for the Defense Intelligence Agency for 10 more years.

Sent to Vietnam. in 1960, he was captured in 1963 and spent six years as a prisoner of war.

But many here don't buy that explanation.

"We could sleep in comfort, with our legs stretched, because of those American soldiers between us and North Korea," said Park Joong-kwon, 65, who attended a recent rally in Seoul supporting U.S. military presence.

With the troops farther south, he said, "I will feel more vulnerable.'
