



the robbery last week of the First State Bank of Mobeetie.

After checking the vehicle and its contents, Walden said he did not find anything that would link the couple to the Mobeetie bank robbery.

"I went to the scene and looked through the vehicle," the sheriff said. "I wanted to look to see if there was anything that might be connected with our robbery. There was

not." Walden said he did not interview the suspects, adding "I let the FBI do that."

Some similarities exist between the Mobeetie and Amarillo bank robberies. Both happened in broad daylight in the early afternoon on a Wednesday. The Mobeetie bank robbery occurred at about 1:49 p.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 14.

The suspect in the Mobeetie robbery, however, was described as being a tall,

slender white male, about 6 feet, 2 inches in height, with dark hair and dark eyes. He wore a dark blue ball cap, a blue jacket, and carried a blue gym-type bag.

The getaway vehicle in the Mobeetie robbery is believed to be a dark extended cab GM

"We're still getting lots of phone calls and tips," Walden said. "We're checking them all out. Right now we're a little behind, but we're going to get to all of them."

This is not the first time Duncan has served on the State Affairs Committee, according to a release from his office. While working for former state Sen. John Montford, Duncan served as general counsel to the committee in 1989.

"Some of the issues that were facing our state more than a decade ago are still with us," Duncan said. "Worker's compensation, tort reform and providing good government remain important to Texans."

Dewhurst announced interim charges for the Senate to study before it convenes for the 2005 regular session, including tuition and enrollment policies at the state's public colleges and universities, the state budget, homeland security and electric power grid reliability.

# Qualities of best education

What needs to be done to improve black education? Whether it's civil rights organizations, politicians or the education establishment, you'll get answers that cover the gamut from more money for teachers and smaller class sizes to school desegregation and racial preferences in higher education. Despite these claims, there's no evidence whatsoever that these are absolutely necessary requirements for black academic excellence. Let's look at

I don't believe anyone in his right mind would believe that what the "experts" say is necessary to improve black education were available in, say, 1899. But at Dunbar High School, a black public school in Washington, D.C., its students scored higher in citywide tests than any of the city's white schools. In fact, from its founding in 1870 to 1955, most of its graduates went off to college. According to Dr. Thomas Sowell's study "Patterns of Black Excellence" in the Spring 1976 issue of Public Interest, 40-student classes were the norm, Dunbar never received equal financial support and during its first 40 years of existence it didn't even have a lunch room.

Sowell's study points to other islands of black academic excellence in earlier times, such as Atlanta's Booker T. Washington High School, Baltimore's Frederick Douglass High School and a few others. Like Paul Lawrence Dunbar High School of today, these schools with far greater resources, modern



facilities, smaller class sizes and more highly paid teachers are not even shadows of their former selves in terms of black academic achievement.

What about during the 1940s? Did black schools have all that the "experts" say is necessary for academic excellence? In "Assumptions Versus History in Ethnic Education," in Teachers College Record (1981), Sowell reports on academic achievement in some of New York city's public schools. He compares test scores for sixth-graders in Harlem schools with those in the predominantly white Lower East Side for April 1941 and December 1941. In paragraph and word meaning, Harlem students, compared to Lower East Side students, scored equally or higher. In 1947 and 1951, Harlem third-graders in paragraph and word meaning and arithmetic reasoning and computation scored about the same -- in some cases slightly higher and in others slightly lower -- than their Lower East Side counterparts.

Today, there are a few predominantly black public schools with fine achievement records, such as New York's Frederick Douglass Academy and private schools such as Marva Collins


Preparatory School in Cincinnati, Marcus Garvey School in Los Angeles and Ivy Leaf School in Philadelphia.

If you simply walked around a failing school and then walked around one of these achieving schools, what would be some of the most notable characteristics? First, you wouldn't see students entering through metal detectors. You wouldn't see loitering in the hallways. You wouldn't hear foul language being spoken among the students and to the teachers and staff.

Upon further investigation, you'd learn that parents are supportive of the teachers and involved in their children's schooling - making sure they do homework, get to school on time and behave once there. The teachers are competent and demanding. None of these ingredients are budget-busters, but if they're not present, no matter how high the budget, education won't occur.

The cruelest hoax of it all is the fraud perpetrated on black students and their parents. This was forcefully brought home to me over the holidays in a conversation with an in-law who boasted about how his son, a senior, was on his school's honor roll at one of Philadelphia's inner-city high schools.

While it was not thrilling, honesty compelled me to inform him that the average black high school graduate has an academic achievement level on par with that of an average white seventhgrader. His son's A's and B's would probably translate into C's, D's and F's at most other high schools.

# Lessons from the Iowa primary

Iowa voters taught some Democrat candidates a few lessons (Jan. 19) they should have learned a long time ago. And they took those who hadn't learned them to the woodshed.

Lesson number one is that arrogance doesn't pay. I saw that in action back in 1980 when my father ran and lost in the Iowa GOP caucuses. After spending a lot of time there I realized that my dad was in trouble, thanks to his top campaign handlers who were running as if he were already president rather than as a man who wanted to be president. To put it plainly, they were arrogant, and that arrogance rubbed off on their candidate, a man to whom arrogance was a complete

My dad fired his staff the day of the Iowa caucuses with my approval, and went into the New Hampshire primary with a new staff and won.

Last night Howard Dean, whose arrogance leaked out of every pore in his body, learned that lesson the hard way. Coming in third, the man the pundits all said was probably unstoppable, got stopped. Coming in behind John Kerry was bad enough, but trailing behind newcomer John Edwards was a disaster. But the wound inflicted on his presidential hopes by Iowa voters probably wasn't fatal. He still had some chance to recov-

But the wound he inflicted on himself was fatal. Unlike other defeated candidates, Dick Gephardt for example, he refused to accept defeat gracefully and instead went into a ranting, raving armwaving tirade that proved beyond the shadow of a doubt that he cannot control himself. The man we saw last night who could not bow out gracefully was not the man Americans want with his finger on the nuclear trigger.

As a GOP pollster told the New York Post after watching Dean's bizarre performance, "He's crazy. This is everything



that voters don't want to hear from him. He's just lost the Democratic nomination for president. He's too hot."

Arrogance doesn't pay.

The next lesson was a cruel one for Dick Gephardt, a man who learned last night that his politics are relics of a dead past. The last time he ran in Iowa in 1988 he talked about NAFTA, trade and unions. This time he talked about NAFTA, trade and unions. He had nothing new to say. Time had passed him by. He was a voice from the past and Iowa voters are living in a very different pres-

Lesson number three is that what happened to Gephardt also happened to the labor unions he relied on to cram the caucuses full of his supporters and overwhelm his opponents by the sheer force of numbers. They failed because they too are no longer relevant. While the media portrayed Gephardt's union supporters as working men giving their time to help their champion, the fact is that the majority are skilled political operatives who do nothing else but work in politics. Long considered to be among the most skilled political professionals, they got their ears pinned back in Iowa last night. Like their candidate, they are relics of the past. They may have the money, but they don't have the muscle.

Iowa voters showed that they were not infatuated by the politics of anger - the politics that motivated that allegedly vast army of Deaniacs. In comparison with their candidate, Kerry and Edwards came across as sane and sober statesmen. For the Deaniacs, it was all over but the

shouting. And last night Howard Dean supplied that in spades. He also supplied his opponents with a video of him at his very worst - one they are sure to use against him as long as he's a candidate.

As the primary campaign season rolls on, it will be interesting to see if what the Iowa voters displayed last night represents the opinions of Democrat voters across the nation. Iowa chose traditional politics; they chose to support candidates they believed could win in November. They may not like George W. Bush but they showed that it takes more than dislike of a President to defeat him. Even a majority of the antiwar voters turned their back on Howard Dean, the high priest of the antiwar movement.

Lesson number four: Opposition to the Iraq war is no longer an issue in the 2004 presidential campaign. It died along with the presidential hopes of Howard Dean.







# Together We Can" Harvesters honored

PAMPA — The Pampa High football team more than lived up to its Together We Can motto, which was coined by Dennis Cavalier, the late Harvesters' head coach.

The Harvesters won tri-district, bi-district and area titles on the way to a record-breaking 11-






