

Officers find child asleep near hazard

A strong chemical odor led Pampa police officers to a suspected methamphetamine laboratory where a one-year-old child was sleeping at 1423 N. Russell in the early hours today.

For the second time in two weeks, Pampa police discovered a child sleeping near hazardous materials believed to be used in making illegal drugs. The first time occurred on Jan. 9 in the 1100 block of Lincoln. In this incident, according to police reports, a four-year-old boy was found sleeping in a bedroom. In a closet, several feet away from the child, stood a leaking tank of anhydrous ammonia.

Today, Officer Joey Williams smelled the odor in the 1400 block of North Russell at 4:45 a.m., according to a Pampa Police Department news release. Williams and Officer Seth Chittavong determined that the odor was coming from 1423 N. Russell. The odor appeared to be ether, commonly used in making methamphetamine.

Also responding to the address were Sgt. Keith Morris and Officer Casey Ingersoll, and Gray County Sheriff's deputies Dennis Elliot and Vincent Marasco.

Officers could see that someone was inside the house, and they tried to make contact with the residents. They also saw items associated with small children, and were concerned that child(ren) might be in danger, according to the news release by Pampa Police Lt. Fred Courtney.

Pampa Fire Department personnel were called to investigate the possible hazard. Officers and fire personnel entered the res-

Pampa ISD receives good grade on audit

Auditor Gary Brown Thursday gave Pampa Independent School District a clean bill of health on its accounting practices.

Pampa school board members heard the report at the regular meeting Thursday evening through the year," the auditor said. at the Pampa High School library.

The district was found to be in compliance with the "Government Auditing Standards," the report stated. The audit found no "material weaknesses," or serious problems, involving internal control over financial reporting and its

operation. - According to the audit the district holds approximately \$2.3 million in its total fund balance on Aug. 31, a net change of \$166,107 for the year, Brown told the board.

He said actual expenditures at \$20.074,046 were "pretty close" to the final budgeted expenditures of \$20,328,718. He said the variance between projected and actual totals were few and most differences were less than 10 per-



DEAR TRAPPED: Your boyfriend's mother has the hide of a rhino. She sees her son as an extension of herself, so according to her logic, why should she be shut out?

Your best bet would be to move to a security building where this woman will not have the kind of access to you that she does now. Make it "Larry's idea," because if his mother gets the impression that you're standing between her and her "cub," she'll try to devour you.

DEAR GRATEFUL: Please accept my deepest sympathy for the loss of your beloved grandmother.

I have long been a supporter of hospice care. It provides physician services, nurses, home health aides, social workers, clergy, specially trained volunteers and bereavement counselors. As long as a patient is eligible, hospice is covered by Medicare, most private insurers



approved the audit report. The board also approved the lease/ purchase of four buses for the district through the Texas Association of School Boards Buy Board, a purchasing agency for Texas school districts which has already conducted the bidding process.

Grandparents of the oneyear-old were called, as well as Rural/Metro Ambulance Service, which checked the child's condition. The grandparents took the child to the Pampa Regional Medical Center emergency

room for further examina-

tion, where the child was then released. Child Protective Services notified of the incident.

The Covalts were arrested and charged with endangering a child, possession of a controlled substance penalty group 1 over four grams but less than 200 grams with intent to deliver to a drug free zone, and possession of drug paraphernalia.

They remain in Gray County Jail, and bond for the pair has not been set, as of press time today.
