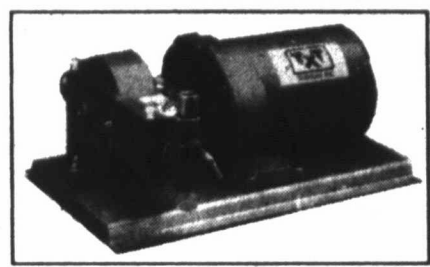

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Officers find child asleep near hazard

A strong chemical odor led Pampa police officers to a suspected methamphetamine laboratory where a one-year-old child was sleeping at 1423 N. Russell in the early hours today.

For the second time in two weeks, Pampa police discovered a child sleeping near hazardous materials believed to be used in making illegal drugs. The first time occurred on Jan. 9 in the 1100 block of Lincoln. In this incident, according to police reports, a four-year-old boy was found sleeping in a bedroom. In a closet, several feet away from the child, stood a leaking tank of anhydrous ammonia.

Today, Officer Joey Williams smelled the odor in the 1400 block of North Russell at 4:45 a.m., according to a Pampa Police Department news release. Williams and Officer Seth Chittavong determined that the odor was coming from 1423 N. Russell. The odor appeared to be ether, commonly used in making methamphetamine.

Also responding to the address were Sgt. Keith Morris and Officer Casey Ingersoll, and Gray County Sheriff's deputies Dennis Elliot and Vincent Marasco.

Officers could see that someone was inside the house, and they tried to make contact with the residents. They also saw items associated with small children, and were concerned that child(ren) might be in danger, according to the news release by Pampa Police Lt. Fred Courtney.

Pampa Fire Department personnel were called to investigate the possible hazard. Officers and fire personnel entered the res-

Girl Scouts warn of cookie impostor

An impostor may be selling Girl Scout cookies at an inflated rate in Pampa, according to Letha Anderson, product sales manager for the Pampa area Girl Scouts.

Anderson said that at a local Scout meeting Thursday evening, she learned that a woman who apparently has no affiliation with the Girl Scouts is selling the cookies in Pampa for \$4 per box. The correct price per box is \$3, Anderson

said. The woman's main sales targets are reported to be businesses along Hobart Street, she said.

"She may be taking orders and returning a day or so later with the cookies," Anderson said.

Anderson suggests that anyone who is suspicious of a person trying to sell them Girl Scout cookies should ask the person their troop number and council name, and note whether a Girl Scout troop price per box is \$3, Anderson

Pampa ISD receives good grade on audit

Auditor Gary Brown Thursday gave Pampa Independent School District a clean bill of health on its accounting practices.

Pampa school board members heard the report at the regular meeting Thursday evening at the Pampa High School library.

"Overall, it looked like a pretty clean audit this year," said Brown, of Brown, Graham and Company accounting firm, contracted by the school district to conduct the annual financial report for the 2002-2003 fiscal year.

The district was found to be in compliance with the "Government Auditing Standards," the report stated. The audit found no "material weaknesses," or serious problems, involving internal control over financial reporting and its operation.

According to the audit the district holds approximately \$2.3 million in its total fund balance on Aug. 31, a net change of \$166,107 for the year, Brown told the board.

He said actual expenditures at \$20,074,046 were "pretty close" to the final budgeted expenditures of \$20,328,718. He said the variance between projected and actual totals were few and most differences were less than 10 percent.

"The board was good to amend the budget through the year," the auditor said.

Delinquent tax collections for the year came in at slightly less than 97 percent by Aug. 31, he said.

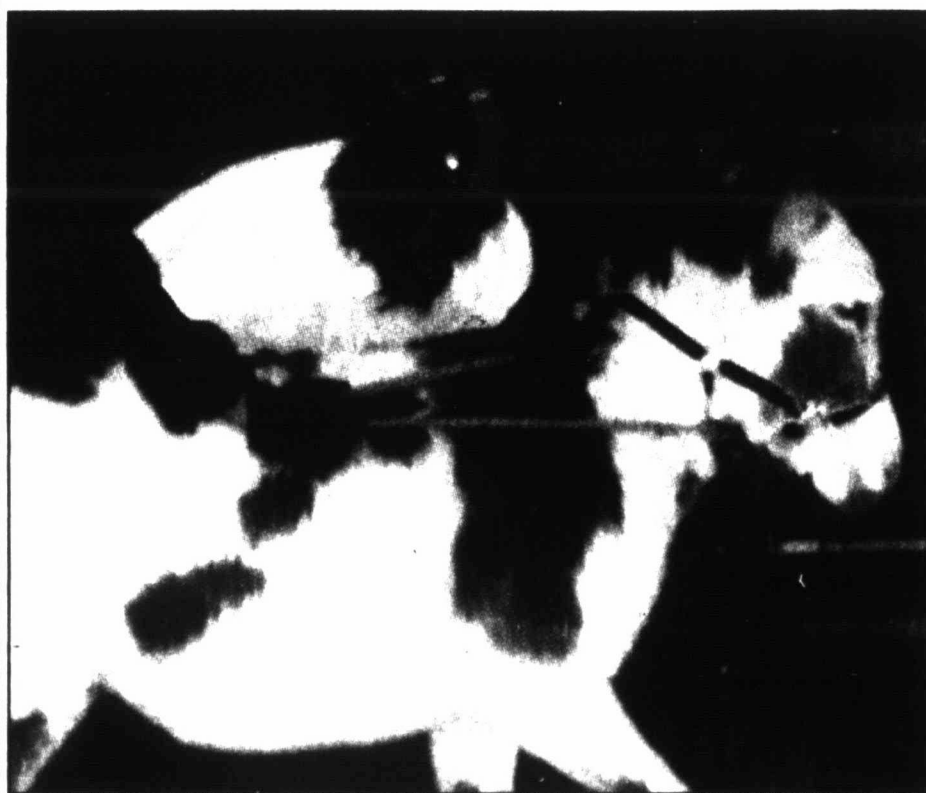
As required by law, the auditing firm tested the teacher and principal expense fund and the food service fund and found no violations.

"I want to say thanks to Carol Fields (Pampa ISD business manager)," Brown added. "She took over for Mark (McVay) and did a really good job."

McVay, PISD assistant superintendent for finance, resigned from the position last year and Fields was named business manager for the school district.

School board members unanimously (See AUDIT, Page 8)

Early voting begins in water board race

Early voting in the election of two to the board of directors of Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District continues through Feb. 3, with the election scheduled for Feb. 7.

As of press time today, 79 ballots had been cast in early voting on the two board positions. Early voting began Wednesday, Jan. 21.

On the ballot are positions for water board precincts 3 and 7. Five of the nine board of directors are up for re-election, but since three are unopposed, no vote will be taken on those positions.

Precinct 3 covers the northern third of Gray County, the southwest quarter of Roberts County, and about one-eighth of Wheeler County in the northwest section. Candidates in that race are incumbent John R. Spearman Jr. and Stephen Smith, both of Pampa.

Precinct 7 is located in Roberts

County. In that race, incumbent Robert Clark is challenged by Kim Smith, both of the county.

Unopposed incumbents who are not included on the ballot are Phillip Smith in Precinct 1, Carson and part of Potter County; Jason Green, Precinct 5, Donley County; and John McKissick, Precinct 9, part of Potter County. Directors serve four-year terms.

Early voting for Precinct 3 candidates is located in the non-jury courtroom of Gray County Courthouse, 205 N. Russell, for Gray and Wheeler county residents, and at the Roberts County Clerk's office, U.S. Highway 60 at Kiowa in Miami, for Roberts County residents.

Early voting for Precinct 7 candidates is at the Roberts County Clerk's office.

On Feb. 7, Precinct 3 voters living in Gray and Wheeler Counties will cast their ballots at the Gray County (See VOTING, Page 8)

Ministers, marathoners clash in city of clustered spires

FREDERICK, Md. (AP) — Peeling bells are at odds with pounding feet in the city of clustered spires.

Supporters say the Frederick Marathon showcases this picturesque community, which features five downtown steeples on its seal. Some churches say street closures during last year's inaugural race reduced attendance at Sunday morning services by up to 25 percent. Their opposition to a repeat performance has grown so heated that one pastor likened it to a war.

The marathon is scheduled for a Sunday morning, May 2. As organizers prepare for it, and for two other Sunday events this year that will bring thousands of visitors downtown, the ministers are using their ecumenical clout to force compromises.

"I don't want to be crass

about it, but we have a business, too," said the Rev. John Morehouse, president of the Frederick Area Ministerial Association. "Frederick wouldn't have the ambiance it has if it didn't have its churches."

Since the association raised its voice in a letter to Mayor Jennifer P. Dougherty in November, the city and volunteer marathon committee have announced changes to the race time and route, along with plans for staggered street closures and other measures to reduce driver backups.

Morehouse, a Unitarian Universalist minister, said the changes are recognition that churches foster "a strong sense of community and a strong sense of meaning in people's lives."

Some ministers aren't comforted by the concessions. The Rev. Robert Manthey, pastor of the downtown Calvary United Methodist Church, said the marathon still will disrupt traf-

fic to and from church. Furthermore, the annual Frederick Festival of the Arts, scheduled for the first weekend in June, aims to move next year from a downtown park to the downtown streets.

And then there's July 4, perhaps the biggest annual downtown event. It falls on a Sunday this year and is sure to involve street closures.

"It grows," Manthey said. "First it's one Sunday, now two Sundays, now three Sundays. Unless we do something about it, we're going to feel that impact more and more."

The churches are undeniably important to the city's image. There are 15 houses of worship downtown, averaging one every other block in the historic district. Poet John Greenleaf Whittier described "the clustered spires of Frederick" in his 1863 ballad, "Barbara Fritchie."

For more than 200 years, the city 45 miles from Washington

served mainly as the Frederick County seat, the center of government, commerce and worship for conservative farm families.

But an influx of commuters and high-tech industry in recent decades have brought the coffee-fueled, time-crunched, fun-seeking realities of modern life to the town of 53,000.

"I think the city reflects the changing character of our nation," Manthey said. "We're a microcosm of what's happening, where faith issues — the sacred — don't have the priority they had at one time."

The Rev. Paul Munday, senior pastor of the Frederick Church of the Brethren, lamented the repealing of "blue laws," which prohibited commerce on Sundays. He said he was disappointed that city officials recently attended a Sunday grand opening of a new Boscov's department store.

"The overarching issue is the feeling of being marginalized," Munday said. "The impression or the inference is that we're pushovers."

Munday said Frederick ministers historically have avoided confrontation and politics: "We normally are trying to advocate a non-antagonistic approach, but we're being kind of forced into this role."

The Rev. Ginger Memmott, fiery pastor of Frederick Presbyterian Church, said ministers are crippled by their conciliatory mentality. She was incensed by the marathon committee's request for a preacher to lead the expected 2,000 runners in prayer before the race.

"I remember Vietnam, when we were asked to bless the bombs before they went on the airplanes," she said.

The prayer will be led by the Rev. Joseph R. Foster of Grace

United Church of Christ, the ministers' liaison to the marathon committee.

"I've always been one to move away from confrontation to cooperation as much as possible," he said.

Businessman Eric Fairbanks, a practicing Roman Catholic and long-distance runner who chairs the marathon committee, said the dispute has opened a dialogue about the community's evolution, "and it took an event this size for everyone to start to notice its impact."

Mayor Dougherty acknowledged the churches' essential role in the community.

"Nobody's trying to take away the importance of Sunday morning, but there is a level of cooperation and flexibility that is required in this day and age," she said. "There aren't blue laws any more. People work on Sundays."

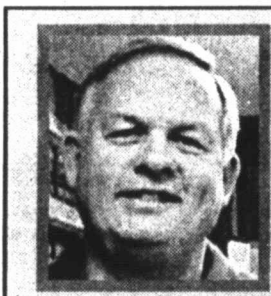
Volunteer work holds the best payback

doing volunteer work for an organization called CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates). It is a volunteer organization that tries to help neglected or abused children. That volunteer work led me to Ryan.

Ryan lives in a nearby town and was 11 years old when I first met him over seven years ago. He had spent his entire life with his grandparents. I came on the scene when there ended up being a court battle concerning Ryan's future home and lifestyle. My job was to interview a bunch of people who knew and dealt with Ryan and to write a report about what was "in his best interests." I interviewed almost 20 different people who knew and loved Ryan. I wrote my report and said that Ryan should stay with his grandparents.

I can still remember that day in the courtroom. I offered my testimony and so did other family members. When court was over that day I felt like my heart was going to break. You see, it looked like Ryan was going to be taken from the only home that he had ever known and it didn't look like anything could stop it.

The next day I got a phone call from the happiest little boy in Texas. A judge, some caring adults and a whole lot of prayer had been used by God to bless Ryan's life. I wasn't as happy as he was, but pretty doggone happy.

A few days later there was a knock at my front door. It was Ryan with a gift and a card. Yep, you guessed it, that picture with the scripture and the pot of flowers. He just wanted to say "thank you." Now, I wouldn't

take a million dollars for it. Is that the end of the story? Nope. Day before yesterday I got something else in the mail. Ryan is graduating from high school this year. It was an announcement and picture of a grown-up young man. It also contained a letter from his grandmother. She just wanted me to know how things had turned out. I was so happy that I thought I would pop.

There are so many organizations right here in Pampa that really try to make a difference in people's lives, but they can't without volunteers. That is where you come in. Go volunteer. Get out there and touch another life. Lives of children are depending on you. Struggling adults are crying out for help. Families in a bind need some encouragement.

Don't wait any longer. You see, one of these days you just might get a card in the mail that will make you feel like you really made a difference in someone's life. You just might get that knock on the door that will make you feel like \$10,000,000.

Now, go. Please.

Massachusetts Catholic bishops announce gay marriage initiative

BOSTON (AP) — The four Roman Catholic bishops of Massachusetts are taking their fight against same-sex marriage directly to parishioners, with a direct-mail campaign targeting nearly 1 million families.

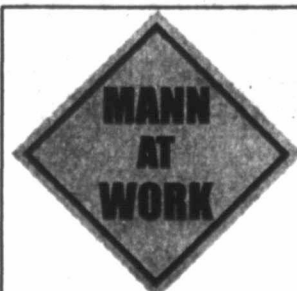
Frustrated by what they say is a public misperception

about their opposition to gay marriage, the bishops are sending a four-page flier to Catholic households asking them to lobby for a proposed amendment to the state constitution that would ban same-sex marriages. The Legislature is expected to take up the amendment next month.

In November, the state Supreme Judicial Court ruled that it was unconstitutional to bar gay couples from civil marriage and gave the Legislature until May to rewrite the state marriage laws

to provide benefits for gay couples.

At a news conference last Friday, Boston Archbishop Sean O'Malley said the high court ruling "ratifies a trend that will only harm children."

approved the audit report. The board also approved the lease/purchase of four buses for the district through the Texas Association of School Boards Buy Board, a purchasing agency for Texas school districts which has already conducted the bidding process.

Included in the agreement is the purchase of a cab-over-bus for use in co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Approximately \$2,500 was added to the cost of the \$112,000 bus for it to be painted in Harvester colors with Harvester decals and

extra lighting. Also included in the lease/purchase will be a regular bus with safety straps will to meet Head Start federal requirements and two 14-passenger buses. Estimated cost of the buses is \$267,500 to be paid over four years.

Board members discussed, but took no action on, a proposed agreement with Pampa Youth and Community Center for use by high school and middle school swimming and tennis teams.

PHS Athletic Director Dick Dunham said he discovered that the district had not paid for use of the PYCC for a year and that there had been
