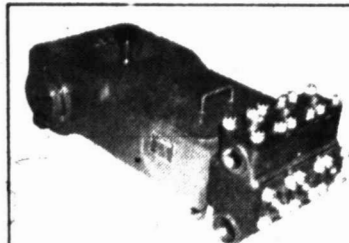

## Brown, Curry win local elections

Greg Brown was elected Saturday to Bill Jones' Place 7 seat on the Pampa Independent School District board of education, and Faustina Curry will maintain her Ward 4 seat on the Pampa City Commission.

Two positions each were listed on the city and school board ballots.

Ray Boring ran unopposed for re-election as Ward 2 city commissioner, a post to which he was appointed by city commissioners after Jeff

Andrews resigned the position earlier this year. Boring had filed as candidate prior to Andrews' resignation. He received 558 votes in the election. Curry garnered 427 votes, while

challenger Shirley Nicholson received 290 votes.

Joe Martinez, school board president, ran unopposed for re-election to Place 6 on the board. He received

522 votes in the election.

Brown earned 296 votes. His opponents were Ken Cargill, who received 250 votes, and Willie E. Nickleberry, who garnered 141 votes.

No runoff election is necessary, according to a PISD administration spokesperson. Jones did not file for re-election to the school board.

The election was held Saturday in the auditorium of Lovett Memorial Library at 111 N. Houston.

Early voting totals were 217 in city races and 193 school board votes.

## Seal coating bid on city's agenda

Seal coating city streets will be the subject of a special Pampa City Commission meeting Tuesday afternoon.

Scheduled for 4 p.m. Tuesday, in the city commission chambers of Pampa City Hall, the mayor and commissioners will hear an Emergency Medical Services Task Force report on ambulance service prior to awarding a bid for the 2004 seal coat project.

They will consider a bid of about \$107,000 by G.W. James, Inc., a Pampa company, for seal coating slightly more than six miles of the city's 108 miles of streets this summer. They will also consider an alternate bid of about \$199,000 to seal coat a little more than 13 miles of city streets.

The commission has twice postponed awarding the bid until they could determine how much a new ambulance service might cost.

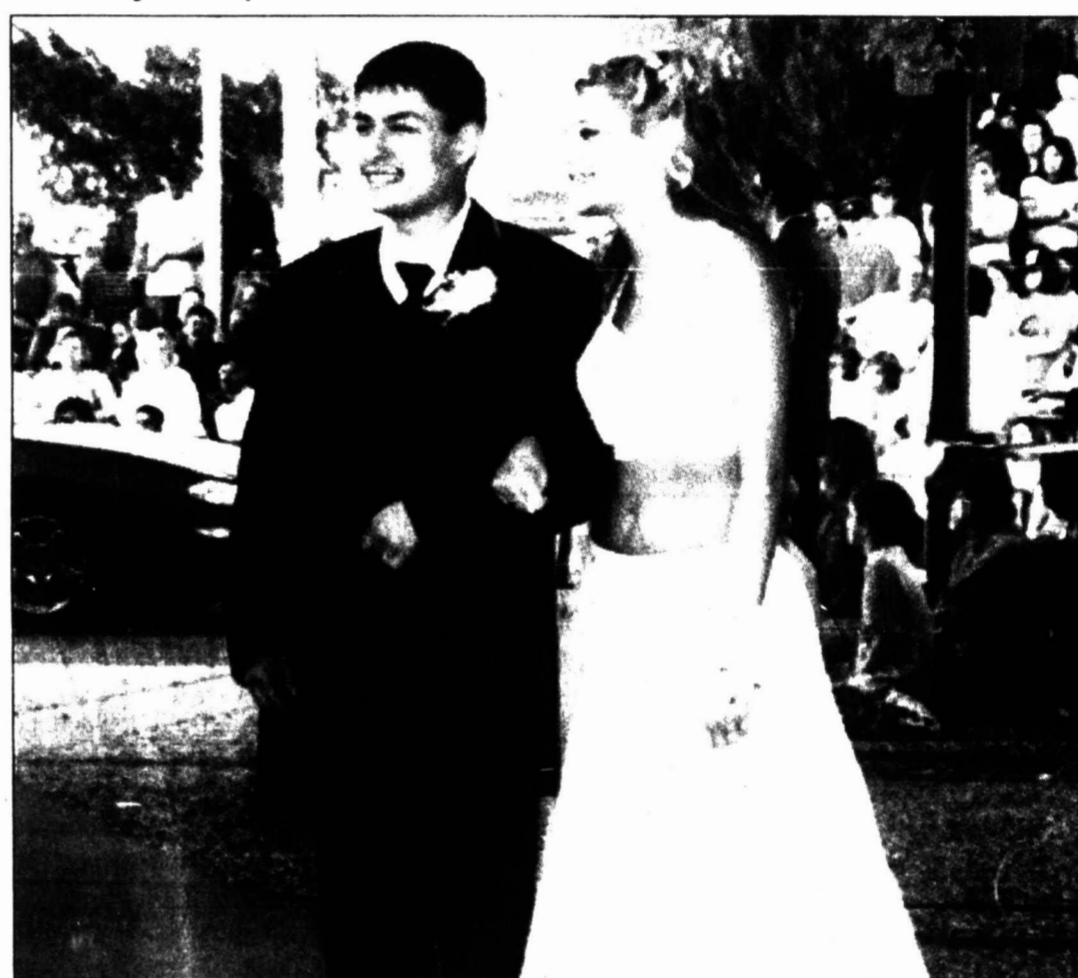
Rural/Metro Ambulance

announced earlier this year that it would be leaving Pampa. A task force of officials from the City of Pampa and Gray County was formed to explore options for ambulance service.

At their last meeting on May 11, commissioners indicated they would approve the seal coating of six miles of streets and, depending upon the costs involved concerning an ambulance service, would likely expand on the seal coating project, but would still cover less than the 13 miles in the alternative bid.

The commission is also expected to go into executive session to discuss a lease agreement with McCarty-Hull. The company has the old U.S. Bus building at 822 E. Foster for warehousing. The city wants to lease part of the building that's not being used for a business incubator to be run by the West Texas A&M University Small Business Center.

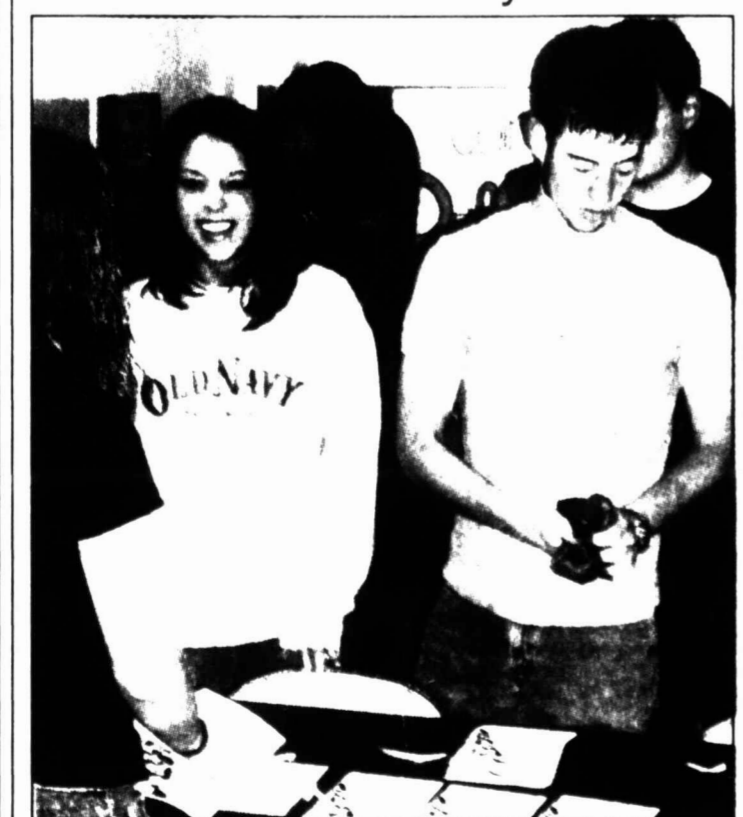

## PGCD invites public to comment on rules

Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District is inviting public comment on a proposed 1.25 percent annual decline limit for the Ogallala Aquifer.

The limit is designed to strengthen PGCD rules intended to preserve 50 percent of the groundwater in 50 years' time, according to a news release by C.E. Williams, general manager of the conservation district. The 50/50 standard was adopted in 1998.

Public comment, both written and by telephone, will be received on the proposed new Rule 16 and other revisions through May 21, and a public hearing will precede

the next board meeting on May 26.

"These revisions will give us the tools needed to enforce our 50/50 management standard. The 1.25 percent limit serves as a trigger mechanism for the standard," Williams said in the release.

Another proposed rule revision would define a depletion study area, an area where the aquifer decline exceeds the limit. The proposed Rule 16 defines such an area as nine square miles or larger where the aquifer drops more than 1.25 percent a year for two consecutive years. The outer boundary will be the 0.5 percent decline line.

Water well producers seeking additional capacity may be required to show that a majority of their water is used

by those with conservation and drought plans, if another proposed rule is adopted. Chapter 36 of the Texas Water Code requires well permit holders seeking additional production under emergency conditions to demonstrate that conservation and drought plans are in place, Williams said in the news release.

Another new requirement will obligate well drillers to verify that permits are valid before drilling starts.

**Halladay pitches Blue Jays past visiting Red Sox, 3-1**

Roy Halladay faced Pedro Martinez for the third time this season and pitched his way to a hard-fought victory. The Toronto ace also earned the respect of his opponent.

"If he makes it tough for me, I like it. I enjoy it," Martinez said. "I enjoy seeing Halladay out there. I would pay my money to watch him pitch."

Halladay outpitched Martinez after losing their first two matchups, and the Blue Jays beat the visiting Boston Red Sox 3-1 on Sunday.

"You don't always walk away with wins against teams or pitchers like that, but when you do it's a great feeling," Halladay said.

Halladay (4-4) worked seven strong innings, allowing one run and six hits — all singles — while striking out six and walking two. The reigning AL Cy Young Award winner lost to Martinez on April 10 and 20, though he pitched well both times.

"The results weren't there, but we still had close games — we just couldn't pull it out," Halladay said. "It's exciting because you know it's going to be a close game. To be able to win close games like that, as a pitcher I think that's the most satisfying."

Martinez (4-3), a three-time Cy Young winner, gave up three runs and six hits in seven innings. He's won just one of his last four starts, but remains upbeat.

"If I can continue to pitch like this, we're going to win a lot of games," Martinez said after losing in Toronto for the first time

in his career.

In other American League games, it was: New York 2, Seattle 1; Cleveland 10, Tampa Bay 0; Chicago 11, Minnesota 0; Baltimore 4, Anaheim 0; Detroit 3, Texas 1; and Oakland 6, Kansas City 2.

At Toronto, Carlos Delgado hit a two-run homer for the Blue Jays, who gained a split of the four-game series.

"If I could take that pitch back and throw it again, I'd try to throw it where I wanted to," Martinez said. "But I'm only human and I can only do so much."

Halladay threw a season-high 124 pitches, but said he took a little off his fastball so he could stay strong late.

# Powell: We will atone for prison abuse

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Colin Powell conceded Monday the Iraq prisoner abuse scandal has had a "terrible impact" on America's international image after assuring foreign leaders that "America will do the right thing."

Powell said in a commencement address at Wake Forest University in Winston-Salem, N.C. that the furor over American abuse of Iraqi prisoners was a recurring theme at an international economic conference he attended in Jordan over the weekend.

He said to the foreign leaders: "Watch America. Watch how we deal with this. Watch how America will do

the right thing." He said the Defense Department will launch "multiple investigations to get the facts." Above all, Powell said, President Bush is "determined to find out where accountability and responsibility lie."

Powell said Sunday there were high-level discussions within the Bush administration last fall about information from the International Committee of the Red Cross alleging inmate abuse at the U.S.-run Abu Ghraib prison in Iraq.

His comments came as the scandal shifted to the question of whether the administration erected a legal foundation that opened the door for the mis-

treatment. Regarding Red Cross complaints last fall of abuse at Abu Ghraib, "we knew that the ICRC had concerns, and in accordance with the matter in which the ICRC does its work, it presented those concerns directly to the command in Baghdad," Powell said on "Fox News Sunday." "And I know that some corrective action was taken with respect to those concerns."

Powell added, "All of the reports we received from ICRC having to do with the situation in Guantanamo, the situation in Afghanistan or the situation in Iraq was the subject of discussion within the administration, at our princi-

pals' committee meetings" and at National Security Council meetings. "We were aware of them," he said.

Congressional critics suggested the administration may have unwisely imported to Iraq techniques for prisoner interrogation used in the war on al-Qaida.

In early 2002, the White House announced that Taliban and al-Qaida detainees would not be afforded prisoner-of-war status, but that the United States would apply the Geneva Conventions to the war in Afghanistan.

"There is a sort of morphing of the rules of treatment," said Sen. Joe Biden, D-Del.

## House adjourns special session; still no plan for school funding

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas House adjourned its special session on school finance Monday without any new funding plan and two days before the session legally had to end.

The Senate was still meeting late Monday morning.

The legislative session officially fizzled Friday as Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst announced the Senate wouldn't be able to pass an education funding bill before the session ended. Legislators could have met for up to 30 days, finishing on Wednesday.

Republican Gov. Rick Perry called lawmakers to Austin to deliver property tax relief and replace the state's share-the-wealth school funding system, known to some as Robin Hood. The system relies heavily on property taxes and requires property wealthy districts to give money away to property poor districts.

A House school funding plan was derailed nearly two weeks ago when some Republican legislators said they wouldn't vote for legalizing video slot machines and Perry said he wouldn't support

a payroll tax on businesses.

The Senate then took over and spent several days listening to public testimony and holding small private meetings before deciding no plan could be agreed upon.

The lawmakers said they would still keep working on a plan, however, with the goal of passing legislation in a future special session. Perry hasn't said when he will call another one.
