




Air Force airman sentenced to life

WICHITA FALLS (AP) — A military judge on Monday sentenced a former airman at a New Mexico base to life in prison with the possibility of parole for killing a former girlfriend who was the mother of his child.

Staff Sgt. Jason Arindain, of Cannon Air Force Base in N.M., was found guilty Saturday of unpremeditated murder in the death of Senior Airman Shelby Orelup, 22, who was stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base.

Orelup, of Billings, Mont., was found dead in February 2003 in a ditch near the Wichita Falls base. She had been strangled.

Arindain was found innocent Saturday on charges of felony murder, rape and forcible sodomy. He faced a maximum penalty of life in prison without parole for the unpremeditated murder conviction.

The judge, Col. Mary E. Boone, said Monday that Arindain will have a chance for parole.

Roy Halladay faced Pedro Martinez for the third time this season and pitched his way to a hard-fought victory. The Toronto ace also earned the respect of his opponent.

"If he makes it tough for me. I like it, I enjoy it," Martinez said. "I enjoy seeing Halladay out there. I would pay my money to watch him pitch."

Halladay outpitched Martinez after losing their first two matchups, and the Blue Jays beat the visiting Boston Red Sox 3-1 on Sunday.

"You don't always walk away with wins against teams or pitchers like that, but when you do it's a great feeling." Halladay

Halladay (4-4) worked seven strong innings, allowing one run and six hits - all singles while striking out six and walking two. The reigning AL Cy Young Award winner lost to Martinez on April 10 and 20, though he pitched well both

"The results weren't there. but we still had close games we just couldn't pull it out." Halladay said. "It's exciting because you know it's going to be a close game. To be able to win close games like that, as a pitcher I think that's the most satisfying.'

Martinez (4-3), a three-time Cy Young winner, gave up three. runs and six hits in seven innings. He's won just one of his last four starts, but remains

"If I can continue to pitch like this, we're going to win a lot of games," Martinez said after losing in Toronto for the first time.
