PUTTING TOGETHER A WINNING WARDROBER

If there has been a change in your lifestyle lately, you've probably come to realizeyour wardrobe no longer meets your needs. A new job, new activities, retirement, or simply an image you want to achieve can make your wardrobe look like a "closet full of nothings" to wear.

With a little planning and resourcefulness, you can economically coordinate a wardrobe that will help achieve the "look" you want. Although it may be hard to pinpoint the type of clothing most needed, one way to start is to list all the activites you recently participated in during a typical 2-4 week period or longer, and what you wore.

You will also want to consider the special ac tivities on your calendar throughout the year. The list can help determine the type of garments worn most otten and where some changes are needed.

Any general inventory begins by assessing your present wardrobe. You may begin by sorting the clothing into four

categories: discards, repair or recycle; wearable as is; or items to build on.

Once you have a complete picture of your needs and of the wearable clothing in your present belongins, you can begin wardrobe planning.

Decide first on what you can attord to spend on new clothing. Also consider your personal preterences in colors, lines, textures and styles.

Adding to your present wardrobe requires a plan. And a good way to begin is to build around a few basic garments. The life expectancy of a garment can help you determine how much you want to invest. You may want to buy the best you can afford in such basic garments as coats and suits which can be worn through several seasons. However, you may not want to invest much money in "fun" garments that may be the latest fad this season, but gone the next.

Classics are always good investments, because they do not vary with seasonal fashin changes. For example, shirtwaist dresses and blazer jackets are popular through many tashion seasons. A good plan also builds around a few key becoming colors with which you re comfortable. Key colors do not have to be dark, but can be in any color range you like.



CERTIFICATION OF SPRING SEEDED CROPS

Those that certified wheat will remember that it requires more time to certify this year. It takes more time to check the eligibility of ACR. ACR for the cotton program must meet both of the following: (1) acreage was planted to cotton one of the last three years and (2) was planted to a row crop, small grain or ACR in two of the last three years. Let me encourage you to bring your sketches of your planted acreages and come on in to certify or request measurement service. July 15 is the last day to complete this important job. If you have completed planting, you can beat the rush by completing this job now.

MEASUREMENT SERVICE

An accurate certification is a very important requirement. The tolerance is the larger of 1.0 acre or 5 percent of the reported acreage tor program crops. This is plus or minus for total cotton wheat and grain sorghum. ACR can not be less than the larger of 1.0 acre or 5 percent of

It you certify a farm out of these tolerances, you will be ineligible for program benefits and liquidated damages required if participating in the program. Measurement service is offered for those needing some help. It you have completed planting, you can beat the rush by making this request now. Your sketches will be helpful.

FAILED CROP ACRES

Remember to report any crop acreage that fails before destroying evidence by planting an alternate crop. June 20 is the last date you are required to replant cotton in Borden County. You may replant after this

Any deficiency payments that are due are paid on planted acreage only. Failure to report acreage failed before destruction of evidence will mean loss of history for payments this year and future years. Certification of total acreage of that crop on that farm is required before tailing of acreage can begin.

As you complete the planting of crops, now is a good time to check your ACR. A weed problem may be developing that can be corrected with the smallest cost to you. If you wait until its too late, program benefits can be lost. Remember that no matter what cover or practices has been established weeds and wind erosion must be controlled.

Wheat harvest will be getting into full swing as soon as the ground will hold up a combine in many parts of the county. Wheat farms that are participating in the 1985 wheat program will be eligible to place your wheat in the 1985 wheat loan program. The loan rate for wheat in Borden County is \$ 3.30. The producer will be responsible for approximately nine months of storage that the wheat would remain in loan. In most cases, you will net approximately \$ 3.08 per bushel depending on where you carry your wheat to be stored.

Regulations will require that the owner's and operator's and operator's names must be on the warehouse receipt and endorsed by both it both share in the crop. Individual warehouse receipts may be used for each producer, if you had rather do it that way.

Production evidence whould be submitted if you wish to prove your yield or it you intend to take out Federal Crop Insurance in future years. Acceptable evidence include settlement sheets (specifying farm number, commodity, weight, date of sale, name of buyer or storer), warehouse storage receipts or bin measurements.

DISASTER AFFECTED CROPS

Reports of scattered hail across the county have been received. If you received enough damage so that your wheat, barley or oats will not pay to harvest or you will make below your farm yield, you should come in and tile a disaster claim for yield purposes. This should be done before you plow up or graze the crop evidence.

GRAZING-BALING ACR

Anyone having haygrazer, sudan, or other cover on their ACR (setaside) acres should first come in and certify these acres, sign a request and pay a \$10.00 inspection fee before these acres are baled or grazed. Failure to do this could result in loss of program benefits.

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BIG PLANS BEING MADE FOR RODEO

Big plans are being made for the annual Borden County Rodeo this year. The event will kick off in mid June with the first performance beginning at 8:00 p.m. on June 14th. The second performance will follow at 8:00 p.m. on June 15th. There are several exciting events scheduled to take place during the performances, such as bull riding, bronc riding, calf and steer roping, barrel racing, and many more. 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
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
