## CIA's director **Tenet resigns**

WASHINGTON (AP) - With CIA Director George Tenet on the way out. the Bush administration faces crucial questions over how to improve America's intelligence gathering during a time of high terror threats and continued finger-pointing over past failures.

Tenet announced his resignation Thursday in an emotional address to CIA staff, ending seven years as the agency's head during two presidencies. President Bush named Tenet's deputy. John McLaughlin, to temporarily lead America's spy agency when Tenet steps down in mid-July

Tenet's decision comes just before the expected release of several long-awaited and highly critical reports on intelligence failures by the CIA and other agencies.

The presidential commission investigating the Sept. 11, 2001 attacks soon will make its findings and recommendations after already strongly condemning the CIA for pre-Sept. 11 failures.

And a Senate Intelligence Committee report on faulty prewar estimates of Iraq's weapons capabilities is "a very

#### **Power failure** continues in **North Texas**

DALLAS (AP) — More than 150,000 North Texas homes and businesses remained without power Friday morning following two nights of heavy storms this week, utility officials said.

"We anticipate having power restored by midday Saturday," TXU Electric Delivery spokeswoman Carol Peters said. Most of the 155,000 customers still without power are in the Fort-Worth Dallas area, she said.

"Crews have been working on rotation for more than 50 hours." Peters said. Workers now total 3,300 people, including nine crews from nine states, she said.

Severe weather Tuesday and Wednesday left 500,000 customers without electricity at the height of the storms and caused an estimated \$100 mil-

ing to the latest press release. The word "Yukon" is airbrushed in large letters on the tailgate, and it has a grill guard and American racing rims and tires, according to the press release.

"The persons in the vehicle are being sought in connection with the shooting of Mr. Galvan. They may be armed and should be considered dangerous," Courtney said in the release.

Witnesses at the scene said at least three persons entered Galvan's house before several shots were heard coming from the house. The three, all believed to be Hispanic, were seen leaving in the Yukon immediately after the shots were fired, according to the release.

Police are still investigating possible connections between Galvan's shooting and another incident involving shots fired which was reported by a caller. to Pampa Central Dispatch at 5:02 p.m. Wednesday. Several callers reported a green Chevrolet Suburban involved in shots which were fired on East Frederic Street.

As officers arrived on East Frederic, they saw the 1999 Chevrolet Suburban, bearing Kansas license tag RKS017, and attempted to stop it. The Suburban led city and county law enforcement officers on a

"taking officers into the county and back into the city," at both slow and fast speeds, according to the June 2 press release. Gray County Sheriff's 'deputies stopped the Suburban in the 500 block of Lowry, and the four persons inside it were

taken into custody. The 911 call concerning Galvan was received as the four were being arrested, according to the release. The two incidents may be connected, according to the police spokesperson, due in part to the timing of each inci-

A woman who did not identify herself, who arrived at the scene on Garland Street as emergency personnel responded to the call involving Galvan, told a reporter that she had witnessed the shootings on Frederic Street. She said she had seen a man she believed to be the victim riding in the back of a white pickup which was sitting in the driveway of Galvan's residence when officers responded to the calls involving the Garland Street house. She said she had seen people in an SUV shooting at and chasing the white pickup and Frederic and Barnes streets.

Darrell Moses Perry, 24; Armando Anaya, 29; and Rafael Estrada, 56, all of Oklahoma City, Okla., and Juan Anaya, 30, Wichita, Kan., were arrested in the 500 block of Lowry Street and booked into Gray County Jail after they were removed from the five- to seven-minute chase, Suburban. Each was charged

with evading with a vehicle, deadly conduct, and money laundering over \$3,000 and under \$20,000.

"The evading charge is a state jail felony, while the other two charges are third-degree felonies," Courtney said in the press release. "The money laundering charge stems from the fact that over \$10,000 was found in the green SUV. The deadly conduct charge was filed because at least one bullet entered a residence in the 1100 block of East Frederic."

Officers found ammunition in the Suburban for three different calibers of handguns. Two handguns were recovered by law enforcement officers from along the side of the road traveled by the green Suburban during the chase, according to the news release. The Suburban is registered to Juan Anaya.

Bond for each charge for each of the four was set at \$50,000 by Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace Kurt Curfman this morning, making total bond on each person \$150,000, Curfman said. All four remained in Gray County Jail as of press time today, according to a jail spokesperson.

Police investigation of each incident is continuing, and both cases are open, the police spokesperson said. Anyone with information concerning the Yukon or either of the incidents is asked by the police department to call 669-5700 or Crime Stoppers at 669-2222.



## Bush meets with pope at Vatican

ROME (AP) - Pope John Paul II. reminded President Bush on Friday of the Vatican's opposition to the war in Iraq and said the world has been troubled by recent "deplorable events," an apparent reference to the abuse of Iraqi prisoners by U.S. troops.

Sitting alongside the president, the pope called for a speedy return of the country's sovereignty and said the recent appointment of an interim Iraqi government was an "encouraging step."

"It is the evident desire of everyone that this situation now be normalized as quickly as possible with the active participation of the international community and, in particular, the United Nations Organization, in order to ensure a speedy return of Iraq's sovereignty, in conditions of security for all its people," the pope at a time.

In an indirect reference to U.S. troops' abuse of Iraqi prisoners, the pope said, "In the past few weeks, other deplorable events have come to light which have troubled the civic and religious conscience of all." He said those events "made more difficult a serene and resolute commitment to shared human values. In the absence of such a commitment, neither war nor terrorism will everbe overcome.

Pope's spokesman papal spokesman Joaquin Navarro-Valls declined to elaborate on the pope's remarks, but did not dispute reporters' characterization that the comments referred to abuse at Abu Ghraib prison in Iraq.

Bush did not feel stung by the pope's remarks. Rather, White House officials took the indirect reference to Abu Ghraib as an affirmation of their own statements that the abuses were "deplorable," the official said on condition of anonymity.

Calling the pontiff "a devoted servant of God," Bush presented him with the Presidential Medal of Freedom, America's highest civilian award. "We appreciate the strong symbol of freedoum that you have stood for and we recognize the power of freedom to change societies and to change the world." Bush

read his statement in a voice that was audible, but not easily understood. The hands of the 84-year-old pope, who suffers from Parkinson's disease, trembled as he addressed the president and first lady Laura Bush, slowly, often one word

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## Study finds 40 percent of Arkansas kids overweight, suggesting children heavier nationwide than thought

- Forty percent of public schoolchildren in Arkansas are overweight, and nearly one in four is obese, a sign that obesity among children nationwide is probably far worse than health officials had thought.

The findings are the broadest and most recent comprehensive look at children's weights, the result of a state law in Arkansas, where state officials have made obesity a top issue.

"I think we'll find as we go along that Arkansas is not that much more obese than other parts of the country," said Dr. Carden Johnston, president of the American Academy of Pediatrics. "(The) Arkansas data is the best that we have because it's cross-sectional."

The Arkansas numbers paint a more dire picture than previous national studies. from elementary school cam-

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) Those have indicated that about 30 percent of American children are overweight or obese. Those falling into the obese category account for about 15 percent.

In Arkansas, about 22 percent of the children are considered obese while 18 percent are merely overweight. Fifty-eight percent are normal weight, and 2 percent underweight.

Those results, released Thursday in Williamsburg, Va., at a Time-ABC News obesity summit, represent 276,000 of Arkansas' 450,000 public school students.

"This is a childhood issue now and it's sobering to see the number of children who have it." Johnston said. "The whole society will take obesity more seriously."

Studies show that childhood obesity can lead to diabetes and heart disease.

Nationwide, two-thirds of American adults are classified as either overweight or obese by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

And while some studies indicate a higher rate of people in the South are overweight than the national average, some researchers believe the Arkansas numbers are reflective of children across the country. "This is a trend we're see-

ing nationwide. 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## Kerry claims military stretched too thin by **Bush administration**

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) Democratic presidential challenger John Kerry says the Bush administration has stretched the U.S. military too thin, complicating the mission to create a stable Iraq.

Kerry said the country is in danger of returning to the low point of the Vietnam War in the late 1970s by creating "another hollow Army," with too few ready to fight.

"Despite all its talk of transforming our military, the Bush administration has done forces to the new missions they have to undertake," Kerry said in remarks prepared for delivery at the Truman Presidential Library in Independence, Mo.

To Kerry the problem startthe war.

"We went into Iraq with too few troops to prevent looting and crime, and we failed to secure nearly a million tons of conventional weapons now being used against our troops," Kerry said. "We failed to build alliances and squandered the opportunity to generate wider support inside Iraq, in the Arab world, and among the major powers. These mistakes have complicated our mission and complicated our objective — a stable Iraq with a representative government secure in its borders."

Kerry said the Bush administration has extended tours of duty, delayed retirements and prevented enlisted personnei

from leaving the service. He said it may increase the troop force, but it's "on the backs of the men and women who've already fulfilled their obligation to the armed forces and to our country, and it runs counter to the traditions of an allvolunteer military."

"They have effectively used a stop loss policy as a backdoor draft," he said.

Missouri Republican Sens. Kit Bond and Jim Talent, in a statement issued by the Bush campaign, said Kerry has a far too little to adapt our record of indecisiveness and defense budget cuts. They said Bush has led by confronting terrorist threats before they gathered.

## Flames one victory away from hockey's biggest prize

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — OK, Cup-clinching game. maybe the Calgary Flames aren't America's Team coach Darryl Sutter certainly doesn't think they are. That doesn't mean they can't be Stanley Cup champions.

The Flames, proving once again that will can overcome out skill, outworked and outshot the Tampa Bay Lightning before finally beating them 3-2 on Oleg Saprykin's overtime goal in Game 5 of the Stanley Cup finals Thursday.

Now, as improbable as it might seem, a small-market team that missed the playoffs for the previous seven seasons is one victory away from winning hockey's biggest prize. Game 6 is Saturday night in Calgary, which can become the first Canadian city since Montreal in 1993 to host a

Even if Sutter believes nobody south of the border, especially in the NHL's New York headquarters, wants the Flames to win the Stanley Cup in the last finals before a potentially lengthy labor lock-

"We know what our role in this is and we're going to fight through it, do everything we can," Sutter said, a day after alleging many in the league don't want Calgary to

Team captain Jarome Iginla, who scored his 13th goal before setting up Saprykin's winner, almost can't believe how close the Flames are to becoming the most improbable NHL champion since the 1991 Penguins. Pittsburgh made the playoffs

only once in 10 years before victory, were the dominant utive Stanley Cups

"But there's so much work to be done and we're not going to get ahead of ourselves. This is too close," Iginla said. "They are going to be more desperate than ever ... but we plan on being pretty desperate, too."

Lightning coach John Tortorella probably wishes his team had shown more of that desperation in Game 5. Tampa Bay rallied from 1-0 and 2-1 deficits on goals in the last minute of the first period (Martin St. Louis) and the first minute of the third (Fredrik Modin), but that was all goalie Miikka Kiprusoff allowed on 28 shots.

The Flames, tying a league record with their 10th road

> "If Martin Cibak, Chris Dingman and Ben Clymer is your best line, it's simply not going to happen to you, no offense to them." Tortorella, whose stars were again outplayed by Calgary's lesser-known players. "You always talk about your best players needing to be your best players ... (but) they weren't there, along with evervone else.

Still, the Lightning had plenty of chances to win — St. Louis nearly did just before the third period ended - before Saprykin gathered

Iginla's rebound and stuffed it past Nikolai Khabibulin at 14:40 of overtime.

The goal came just as the Lightning were making a badly needed line change amid a lengthy flurry in which Iginla lost his helmet while nearly scoring himself.

"The goal was a bit of a mistake," Dingman said. "We didn't have all of our guys out there. It's unfortunate to lose a game that way. It's pretty disheartening.'

However, Dingman can offer evidence to his teammates that a 3-2 advantage doesn't automatically guarantee the Stanley Cup. He played for the 2001 Colorado Avalanche, who lost Game 5 at home to New Jersey before winning two straight and the Cup — the only team in 33 years to rally from a 3-2 deficit during the finals.

"We said to ourselves we've got nothing to save it for and we're going to win and we ended up winning that game (Game 6)," he said. "You win one game and the momentum swings back in your favor.'

But while the Lightning won Game 4 Monday night in Calgary, winning Saturday night will be much more difficult, before the famed Sea of Red fans who desperately want their blue-collar team to win the Stanley Cup at home. The Flames' fans are so excited, they've jammed the Saddledome for the last two road games just to watch on the scoreboard's TV screens.

#### **Testaverde reunited with Parcells in Dallas**

IRVING, Texas (AP) Vinny Testaverde wants another chance at age 40 to be a starting quarterback. His former coach is giving it to him.

Testaverde and Bill Parcells were reunited Thursday when the quarterback signed a onevear, \$1 million contract with the Dallas Cowboys.

"The fire still burns within for me to be out on the field still playing. All I want is an opportunity." Testaverde said. "The opportunity to compete to be a starter excites me. I didn't have that opportunity in New York.

The Jets released Testaverde this week, ending a six-year run for his hometown team in an expected salary-cap move. His first two seasons there were with Parcells, but Testaverde had since become Chad Pennington's backup.

Testaverde's agent, Mike Azzarelli, said the quarterback could make as much as \$5 million this season, based on play-

ing time and performance.

Testaverde will get the chance to compete for the starting job. But the Cowboys didn't just give it to him.

Parcells has said Quincy Carter, the starter for most of the past three seasons and all 16 games last year, will go into training camp as the No. 1 quarterback. But the coach has always said that the best player will start.

Parcells didn't take part in Thursday's announcement, but Cowboys owner Jerry Jones said that would be the approach.

"We basically have an incumbent in Quincy, but we want to be better than we've been at quarterback, and competition creates that," Jones said. "Vinny came here to play. He came here to compete as a starter and he knows Bill well. He's knows that he's going to be given that kind of

Testaverde will take part in the team's minicamp that begins Saturday. Besides pushing Carter, the Cowboys want him to be a mentor to Drew Henson, who quit professional baseball and returned to football this spring.

In 1998, Testaverde made the Pro Bowl and guided the Jets to the AFC title game in Parcells' first season. But Testaverde tore his Achilles' tendon in the first game of 1999, Parcells' last as a coach until taking over the Cowboys

Testaverde said he didn't know the specifics of how he would be given a chance to compete for the starting job. That didn't concern him after talking to Parcells.

"I'm not too worried about how that's going to get done," he said. "Obviously, we have a relationship and I trust his word. I know he's going to play the guy that gives him the best chance to win.'



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# Colorado's GOP senate candidates target delegates before convention

DENVER (AP) — On the issues, it's been hard to tell the difference between the two Republican candidates vying for a shot at Colorado's open Senate seat.

Peter Coors and Bob Schaffer both support President Bush's stance on Iraq, oppose abortion under any circumstances and think school vouchers are a good idea.

They're also in agreement over a constitutional ban on gay marriage, although Coors had said earlier that he wasn't sure it was necessary.

But the similarities are likely to fade after the state GOP convention this weekend, political experts said. At that point, Coors, the brewery heir, will probably begin offering himself as a moderate alternative to Schaffer, a conservative former congressman.

And if Coors wins the primary, experts say another reinvention is likely against the Democratic nominee, either educator Mike Miles or Attorney General Ken Salazar.

"It's the classic problem in American politics. He has to appeal to his base, then flip to the center to get the moderate vote in the primary, then shift again for the general election," said John Straayer, a political science professor at Colorado State University.

The race has drawn national attention because a seat once considered a Republican lock was put into play with the retirement of GOP Sen. Ben Nighthorse Campbell. In the Senate. Republicans hold a slim 51-48 majority with one Democratic-leaning independent.

Observers say Coors has been forced to endear himself to the party's right wing to win a spot on the Aug. 10 primary ballot during Saturday's convention.

That became clear after the Coors Brewing Co. distanced itself from Coors the candidate, its former chairman, by saying his support for a constitutional ban on gay marriage does not reflect the company's position.

"We do not support discrimination against the gaylesbian-bisexual-transgender community, via legislation or otherwise," said CEO Leo Kiely.

Coors Brewing was once boycotted by gays because it required job applicants to take a polygraph test that included questions about sexual beliefs. The company is now considered a model for recruiting gay workers and offers same-sex partner benefits — something for which candidate Coors has taken credit.


Cinamon Watson, his campaign spokeswoman, said the issue changed when states began issuing marriage licenses to gays earlier this year.

"At some point you have to separate Peter Coors from the company and listen to how Peter Coors defines himself as a candidate," she said.

Schaffer and Coors are both expected to win support from at least 30 percent of the GOP delegates.

The support will get them on the primary ballot.

### Employers add 248,000 new jobs in May

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. employers added almost a quarter million workers in May, extending a nine-month hiring spree and accommodating enough new jobseekers to hold the unemployment rate steady at 5.6 percent.

Payrolls swelled by almost 1 million in the last three months alone, the Labor Department said Friday. Employment figures for March and April were revised up to reflect the addition of 353,000 and 346,000 jobs

respectively.

Because tens of thousands of jobless are renewing their search for work in the wake of an improving labor market seasonally adjusted civilian unemployment rate did not improve from April's 5.6 percent figure.

The snapshot of America's employment situation in May met the expectations of most private analysts and fueled anticipation of an increase in interest rates when the Federal Reserve meets at the end of this month. The Fed's main interest rate has been at a 46-year low of 1 percent, but analysts expect that to end with the jobs market steadily gaining steam.

Hiring last month was widespread, with businesses adding an overall 248,000 new jobs across the economy. Industries that posted the biggest gains included construction, health care, professional and business services and hotels and restaurants.

The struggling manufacturing sector also is reawakening, adding 32,000 new jobs last month. It was the fourth straight month of payroll increases after almost three years of continuous losses.

The payroll survey by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, reflecting the addition of those 248,000 new jobs to business payrolls, is separate from a survey of U.S. households. It is that survey which determines the unemployment rate.

Friday's report was good news for President Bush, who has been counting on continued employment growth to boost his re-election prospects. The economy was expected to be a major drag on his campaign, but that may prove otherwise.

Bush still is on track to be the first president since the Great Depression to have lost jobs during his watch. His administration was widely criticized for an overly optimistic forecast that 2.6 million new jobs would be created this year. Economists now say the chugging economy could approach that mark.

The economy is far from the booming 1990s. Last month, 8.2 million people remained unemployed. While the overall jobless rate stayed at 5.6 percent, it was much higher among blacks, at 9.9 percent and Hispanics, at 7 percent.

The average duration of unemployment rose to 20 weeks last month, up from 19.7 weeks in April. Almost 22 percent of all jobless workers have been without work for 27 weeks or more.

Construction employment rose by 32,000 in May, with 91,000 new jobs added since January.

In services, professional and business services added 64,000 new jobs, fueled by hiring increases in temporary employment firms.
