## Bush takes issue with finding 'no credible' proof of Saddam link

WASHINGTON (AP) — Disputing the findings of the commission investigating the Sept. 11 terror attacks, President Bush continues to insist there was a link between Saddam Hussein and al-Oaida.

"This administration never said that the 9-11 attacks were orchestrated between Saddam and al-Oaida," Bush said Thursday after meeting with his Cabinet at the White House.

numerous contacts between the two," he said. Saddam's alleged link with terrorists was a central justification the Bush administration had for toppling the former Iraqi regime. Bush also argued that Saddam had weapons of mass destruction, which have not been found, and that Saddam ruled his country with an iron fist and tortured his opponents, claims that no one has disputed.

"The reason I keep insisting that there was a relationship between Iraq and Saddam and al-Qaida is because there was a relationship between Iraq and al-Qaida," Bush said.

The Sept. 11 panel reported this week that while there were contacts between al-Qaida and Iraq they did not appear to have produced "a





and insured in the winner's name. The winner was reportedly selected from 25,000 names from "Asia, Australia, New Zealand, tact from El Gordo Loteria Europe, America and North America."

The winner is instructed to contact a claims agent, Juan Gomez, the foreign service manager of Santa Lucia Security Company S.A. in order to process and receive their prize money. A telephone and fax number are given.

The other page inside the envelope is a lottery payment processing form with the security company's name across the top. The winner is to complete the form and fax it to the security company. The form asks for the person's name, address, telephone number, occupation, date of birth and marital status. It also asks for the person's bank name, account number, routing number, address, telephone and fax numbers. A third section on the page asks for information on the winner's next of kin, including name, address, telephone and profession.

Rushing said the person who received the mailing had not entered any foreign lottery drawings and had not sought any type of con-Primitiva or the security company.

He cautions anyone receiving such a mailing to not call any of the telephone numbers, as they may be numbers with very high calling costs incurred by the person initiating the call. He also cautions against filling out the form and returning it or otherwise responding in any way to such unsolicited mail.

Rushing said it is never a good idea to provide bank account information such as that asked for on the processing form, because possession of that information could enable others to access the individual's bankaccount and steal funds from it.

No British soldiers were hurt in the fighting in Amarah, 180 miles southeast of Baghdad, a British military spokesman said.

The insurgents used small arms, mortars and rocketpropelled grenades in clashes that lasted about two hours, witnesses said.

Insurgents also launched attacks against British soldiers in Amarah on Wednesday after they detained militia leader Ahmed Hachi.

Al-Sadr's forces are skirmishing regularly with U.S. troops in Baghdad's Sadr City district, but they were routed by the 1st Armored Division in Karbala and their ranks were significantly reduced in Najaf and Kufa, coalition forces say.

Crews are completing repairs on a major pipeline system in the south that was sabotaged by insurgents a weeks ago. Full crude oil exports are expected by end of next week, but could come as early as Wednesday, coalition officials said Friday.

The smaller of the two lines damaged in the attack is nearly fixed, and could be tested as early as Saturday, said Dominic d'Angelo, a spokesman for the U.S.-led coalition in the southern city of Basra.

The damage to the larger pipeline is still being assessed, he said.

The resumption of full exports is expected "for the end of next week. They could come by the middle. Wednesday is a possibility," he said.

The attacks against the pipeline appear part of an insurgent campaign to undermine public support for the interim government which takes power June 30, marking the end of the American-run occupation.

In the boldest attack in months, a car bomber smashed into a crowd seeking jobs at a military recruitment center Thursday in Baghdad, killing at least 35

collaborative relationship."

Vice President Dick Cheney vehemently disagreed with that conclusion, saying on CNBC's "Capital" Report" that "the notion that there is no relationship between Iraq and al-Oaida just simply is not true."

Senior members of the commission seemed eager to minimize any disagreement with the White House.

"What we have found is, Were there contacts between al-Qaida and Iraq? Yes. Some of them were shadowy but they were there," said Tom Kean, the Republican Musab al-Zarqawi, considformer governor of New Jersey, who is chairman.

Like Bush, he said there was no evidence that Iraq aided in the attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

Former Rep. Lee Hamilton of Indiana, the Democratic vice chairman of the panel, said media reports has increased in recent of a conflict between the administration and the commission were "not that apparent to me."

Although bin Laden asked for help from Iraq in the mid-1990s, Saddam's government never responded, according to a report by the commission staff based on interviews with government intelligence and law enforcement officials.

"There have been reports that contacts between Iraq and al-Qaida also occurred after bin Laden had returned to Afghanistan, but they do not appear to have resulted in a collaborative relation-

ship," the commission's report said. "Two senior bin Laden associates have adamantly denied that any ties existed between al-Qaida and Iraq.'

Bush said Saddam had ties to other terrorist networks as well.

"He (Saddam) was a threat because he was a sworn enemy to the United States of America, just like al-Qaida," Bush said. "He ·was a threat because he had terrorist connections — not only al-Qaida connections, but other connections to terrorist organizations."

The president Saddam had links, for example, to the Abu Nidal Palestinian terror organization and sheltered Abu ered the most dangerous foreign fighter in Iraq and one of the world's top terrorists.

"He was a threat because he provided safe haven for a terrorist like al-Zarqawi, who is still killing innocents inside Iraq," Bush said.





The cottonwoods and other indigenous trees along Highway 60 are an ecological gem. The trees are playing an active role in ecotourism to our region - a growing business that will help feed the regional economy. The trees have been there for hundreds of years. The trees provide nesting for raptors like the Mississippi Kite and Swainson's Hawk.

Did you know it is a federal offense to cut down a tree with an active raptor nest in it? Raptors come

back to the same nest in the same tree year after year. TxDOT knows this little fact; but a biologist only has to report the tree is in the way of progress, and chop, chop.

Transportation's proposed removal of 1,185 trees over 180 miles of highway in Carson, Gray, Roberts, Hemphill, Lipscomb and Ochiltree counties.

Statistics do not prove the necessity of this plan. In all fixed object accidents in the last 10 years in this area, trees were least involved in both injuries and deaths. In the few tree accidents, alcohol, drugs or icy conditions were involved.

## NASCAR in Michigan; Tony Stewart to work on patience

BROOKLYN, Mich. (AP) - Tony Stewart, of all people, called for patience in the wake of chaotic races at Dover and Pocono

Most of the problems grew out of the changing rules governing freezing the field when the caution flag flies and when the pit lane will be open to the competitors.

"In NASCAR's defense, the first time we were told as drivers about freezing the field, they said it would be a work in progress," said Stewart, perhaps NASCAR's most impatient driver.

"As frustrating as it's been for everybody, I think we have to be realistic about making rule changes.

"This wasn't just whacking a quarter-inch off a spoiler or changing the size of a restrictor plate. It was a pretty drastic change. And any time you change a rule like that you're going to run into a situation that somebody didn't think of, because there's only so many different scenarios you can think of."

Former series champion Rusty Wallace said he hopes racing Sunday at Michigan International Speedway will have a calming effect on the place where all the

"I really think things will calm down a whole lot this week at Michigan and I'll be totally shocked if they don't," said Wallace, the leader among active drivers with five wins and 15 top-five finishes at

MIS. "The last two weeks have produced enough weirdness, controversy and torn-up race cars for a quarter of a season, let alone just the two races.

"I'll tell you, it must be a situation where the moon is aligned with some of the evil stars or something weird like that. Man, with

all the crashes, controversial calls and unusual stuff going on, you just wonder what could happen next."

Wallace himself had some misadventures over the past two weeks.

At Dover, he was able to avoid serious damage in the Rusty Wallace crashes but a stop-and-go NASCAR Driver penalty late in the race relegated Wallace to 13th when he appeared headed for a top five

finish.

Then, at Pocono, he had a brake failure and crashed hard into Michael Waltrip, finishing 32nd.

"I can't believe that happened and I hate it for him and us," Wallace said. "We've had some brake problems in the past at places like Watkins Glen and at Martinsville, but never at Pocono. It just shows you how weird things have gotten.

Wallace figures, though, that Michigan's wide, high-banked track should be the cure for what has been ailing the Nextel Cup series.

"Michigan has always been a pretty calm place, with all the excitement centered around fuel mileage, pit strategy and track position," Wallace said. "It's just not a place where all the crazy stuff happens.'

In the 10 races run at MIS beginning with Dale Jarrett's victory in a caution-free event in 1999, only 269 of 1,956 laps have been run under yellow.

## Armstrong strongly denies claims

PARIS (AP) — Lance Armstrong wants the publisher of a new book filled with doping allegations against him to include his denial, and a Paris court will rule on the request next week

The five-time Tour de France winner has strongly denied claims made by a former assistant in the book, "L.A. Confidential, the Secrets of Lance Armstrong." The assistant says Armstrong once asked her to dispose of used syringes and to give him makeup to conceal needle marks on his arms.

Armstrong wants a notice denying the allegations inserted into the French-language book, published here by La Martiniere. The court said Friday it will issue its decision Monday.

The book, which went on sale in France on Tuesday, was written by David Walsh and Pierre Ballester and relies heavily on allegations by former assistant Emma O'Reilly. Armstrong's lawyers have said they were starting libel proceedings in France and Britain against the authors and their publisher.



## **Authorities search Riyadh** for info about U.S. hostage

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — With helicopters flying overhead, thousands of Saudi police searched for American hostage Paul M. Johnson Jr. on Friday as a 72-hour deadline loomed for the kingdom to release al-Qaida prisoners or see him killed.

Police went through several Riyadh neighborhoods from Thursday night through Friday morning, but authorities gave no indication they were any closer to Johnson, an Lockheed Martin employee who was kidnapped Saturday by a group calling itself al-

Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula. The organization is believed to be headed by Abdulaziz Issa Abdul-Mohsin al-Mogrin, the top al-Qaida figure in Saudi Arabia.

In Johnson's hometown of Eagleswood Township, N.J., relatives held a vigil Thursday night to pray for his

safe return. The kidnappers released a

It is not known exactly when the deadline expires as the time of the video tape's release to an Islamic Web site was not clear. But it is presumed the deadline runs out Friday evening Saudi time or Friday afternoon eastern U.S. time.

People living in the districts, which lie in western and southern Rivadh, suggested that

the kidnappers enjoy popular support, partly because of U.S. policy in Iraq and its perceived backing for Israel.

"How can we inform on our brothers when we see all these pictures coming from Abu Ghraib and Rafah," Muklas Nawaf, a resident of Dhahar al-Budaih, said as he ate meat grilled on a spit at a restaurant called Jihad, Arabic for holy war. He was referring to the pictures of Iraqis abused by U.S. soldiers at the Abu Ghraib prison in Baghdad and Israeli military incursions and killings in the Gaza refugee camp of Rafah.

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## Iran: Diplomats say photos may suggest new cover-up

The U.N. nuclear watchdog agency censured Iran for past cover-ups in a resolution adopted Friday, and warned Tehran to be more forthcoming if it wants an investigation of suspect activities to end.

Tehran warned it might retaliate by reconsidering plans to suspend its uranium enrichment.

The resolution submitted by three European powers France, Germany and

Britain — was a product of days of diplomatic maneuvering at a meeting of the 35-member board of governors of the International Atomic Energy Agency. It did not hand down sanctions against the country.

The document, passed by consensus, "deplores" that "Iran's cooperation has not been as full, timely and proactive as it should have been. It notes "with concern that after almost two years"

> Hours before the resolution was adopted, the United States accused Tehran of bulldozing sites to prevent discovery of evidence of a nuclear weapons

> Agreement on the text came despite Iranian efforts to substantially tone it down, including tactics that forced IEAE head Mohamed ElBaradei on Thursday to acknowledge mistakenly accusing Tehran in one instance of holding back information.

> The IAEA is investigating nearly two decades of covert nuclear activity by Iran. Tehran says its nuclear program is for generating electricity, but the United States claims it is for making weapons.

Iranian delegate Amir Zamaninia told the meeting

was affected by "wild and illusionary allegations of a secret Iranian nuclear weapons program."

And he warned that his country was reviewing its "voluntary confidence building measures," an indication that Iran might rethink the suspension of its uranium enrichment activities. Enrichment can lead to fuel for electricity or weapons-grade uranium for warheads.

ElBaradei admitted he incorrectly stated in a report to the board that Iran did not report the purchase of 150 magnets for centrifuges it was building secretly.

His admission came after Iran submitted an audiotape recording an IAEA inspector being informed about the purchase.

The report also said Iran inquired about buying thousands of such magnets on the black market.
