

## Officer discovers stolen rig

Thanks to a Pampa police officer's familiarity with her beat, a stolen tractor trailer rig has been recovered and is waiting for its owners to reclaim it.

Officer Beverly Chace was doing a routine patrol of her beat at about 12:38 a.m. today when she noticed an unfamiliar tractor trailer rig parked in the 1300 block of McCullough.

The police department had been alerted about a rig being stolen in Greenville, and Chace decided to check the license tag on the rig.

The tractor trailer turned out to be the same one reported stolen, and police contacted the owners, who asked that the rig be impounded.

The tractor trailer is valued at about \$12,000. Its owners are The Pope Group, address not included in the police report.

Further legal action, including filing charges, warrants and arrests, must originate from the location where the rig was stolen. a police spokesperson said.

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## Credit card delinquencies fell in first quarter, survey says

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the economy clearly in recovery mode, the percentage of credit card payments that were past due in the first quarter of this year fell. sharply, an improvement after two previous quarters of record-high delinquency rates.

The seasonally adjusted percentage of credit card accounts that were 30 or more days past due dropped to 4.21 percent in the January-to-March quarter, the American Bankers Association reported in a quarterly survey released Tuesday.

"This may be the break in the clouds we've been looking for," said the association's chief economist James Chessen.

The decline came after the delinquency rate shot up to an all-time quarterly high of 4.43 percent in the final three months of 2003. That had surpassed the previous record high of 4.09 percent in the third quarter of last year.

The improvement in credit card delinquencies came as the economy grew at a respectable pace and companies finally began to step up hiring. The better econom-

ic climate removed pressure on some households' budgets, helping them to pay bills in a timely fashion, economists say.

The association's survey showed that the delinquency rate on a composite of other types of consumer loans, including auto loans and home equity loans, dipped to 1.86 percent in the first quarter, down from 1.89 percent in the previous quarter.

Looking ahead, Chessen expressed guarded optimism. "While job growth is much improved, high gas prices may continue to put consumers in a financial pinch," he said.

The impact on consumers would be minimal from a widely expected one-quarter percentage point increase in a key shortterm interest rate controlled by the Federal Reserve, he said. "The cost to consumers would be \$2.50 more per year on 1,000 of less than the cost of a latte,

The Fed was starting a two-day meeting Tuesday to discuss interest-rate policy.

Railroad worker Heath Pape, 23, of San Antonio died and 40 cars were derailed when two freight trains crashed Monday morning in a rural area southwest of San Antonio.

San Antonio Fire Department spokesman Randy Jenkins said as many as 50 people suffered minor respiratory irritation.

The bodies of the two women were found about a mile from the crash site by search and rescue crews outfitted in hazardous material gear, who went door to door after the crash.

The women were identified by medical examiner's investigator James Akers as Gene Hale, 85, and her 59year-old daughter Lois Koerber. It was unclear how the women died.



Congressional Budget Office's report that Social Security is in better financial shape than even its trustees are predicting.

Retiring baby boomers and those who will shortly follow them into their supposed golden years should remain concerned about the long-term soundness of the government retirement program, as should taxpayers. Social Security is in serious trouble.

The CBO's projection that payments to retirees will not exceed revenues until the

The Houston Chronicle year 2019, rather than 2018, and will remain solvent until 2052, rather than 2042, as Social Security trustees have predicted, is no cause for celebration.

Open-minded members of both parties in Congress should seriously explore President Bush's advocacy of a voluntary, partial privatization of some of the funds workers now contribute to Social Security. Privatization offers the prospect of more retirement dollars for future retirees.



## OSU keeping search secret

"I have had open discussions with the committee," Geiger said through an Ohio State spokesman on Monday. "The next step is visiting with people. When that's

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
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completed, we'll decide what to do and then take it forward to higher university administration for their approval."

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
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
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
