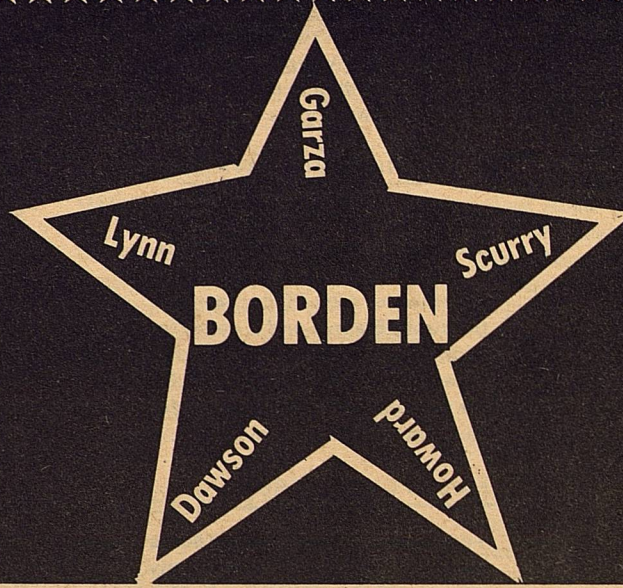

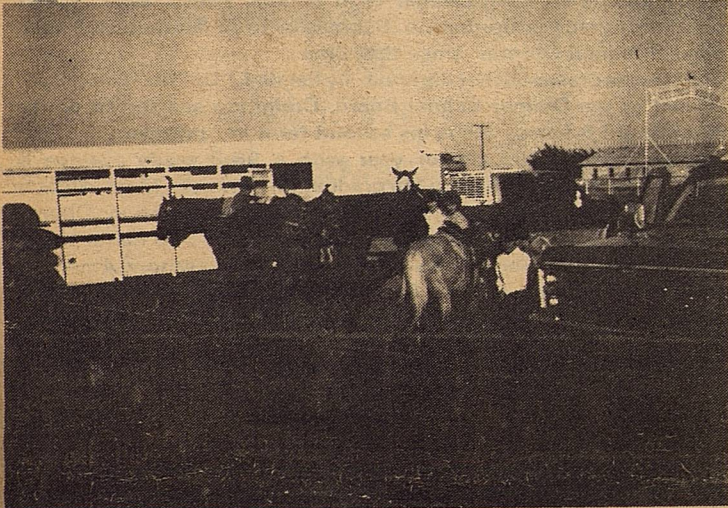

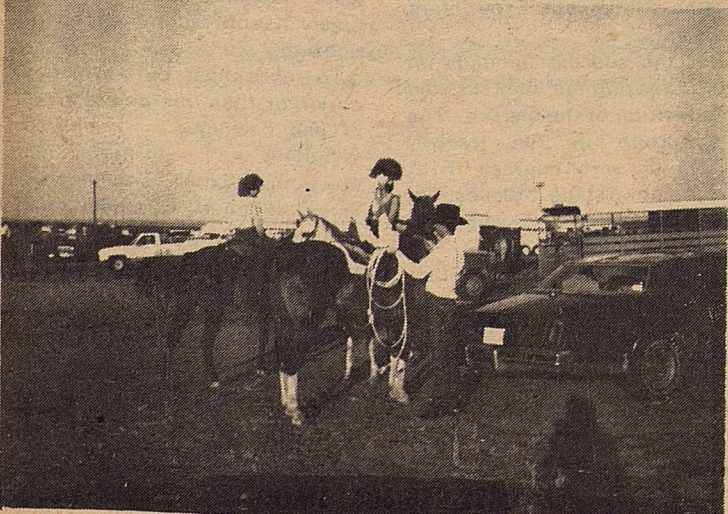
1985 BORDEN COUNTY JUNIOR RODEO

BORDEN COUNTY ASCS NEWS

ACREAGE CONSERVATION RESERVE

Producers will be required to certify that their ACR is on eligible land. Eligible land must be cropland that was devoted to a small grain or row crop in 2 of the last 3 years. Land designated as setaside in a previous year is considered as having a crop on it.

ACR land must be 1 chain wide and contain at least 5.0 acres. An exception to this is land planted to an acceptable skip-row pattern which has at least 4 rows of normal width or 160 inches from planted row to planted row of ACR acreage alternating with rows of a crop. A farm is allowed to have one area less than the minimum size requirements.

PAID DIVERSION

Land designated as paid diversion also has to be cropland that was devoted to a small grain or row crop in 2 of the last 3 years and must have been planted to cotton in 1 of the past 3 years.

We are required to check county office records to determine if your ACR acres for diversion purposes meet the 1 of 3 years actually planted to cotton. This will prolong the certification

process. Please measure your acres for ACR after you are through planting and come into the office now.

WEEDS ON ACR

Failure to control weeds and erosion on your ACR will cause you to lose program benefits and be assessed liquidated damages. ACR must be maintained thru December 31, 1985.

HAYING AND GRAZING ACR

Don't forget to come in and certify your Spring planted cover crops on your ACR prior to grazing or haying. You will be required to pay \$10.00 for the cost of a farm visit. This applies because the nongrazing period is April 1 through August 31, 1985.

FINAL PLANTING DATE

The final planting date for cotton in Borden County is June 20th. Request for Prevented planting must be filed by Friday July 5th.

CROP CERTIFICATION

ACR, cotton, corn, and grain sorghum must be certified by July 15. Take time and measure your acres. don't GUESS. GUESSING could result in loss of program benefits. YOU are required to certify your crop acres if you are a program participant; and also report the exact acreage of the crop.

If you are not sure of your acreage, request measurement service. The tolerance for error on the certification of 1985 crops and ACR is the larger of 1 acre or 5 percent of the reported acreage, not to exceed 50 acres.

If you did not sign up in the 1985 farm program, you should certify your crop acres to have a

history of crop plantings recorded for your farm. Also, this establishes Federal Crop Insurance history.

MEASUREMENT SERVICE

If you are unsure of your crop acreage, measurement service is available from aerial slides at the rate of \$20.00 per farm for the first 25 acres and 2 cents for each acre thereafter. Ground measurement rates are \$40.00 for the first plot plus \$25.00 for each additional plot over one.

FAILED CROP ACRES

You must certify your crop acres prior to the destruction of any crop. If you sign up for measurement service and then your crop fails, your measurements service will be cancelled.

You will have to CERTIFY your cotton and file a "574" (tail out your cotton) before you replant to grain sorghum. Failure in doing this will affect your deficiency payment and base.

WHEAT LOAN RATE

The wheat loan rate in Borden County is \$3.30 per bushel.

INTEREST RATE

The loan interest rate for the month of June is 8.75 percent.

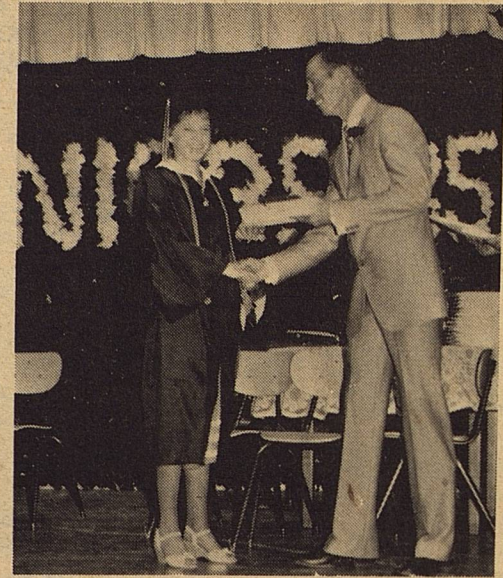
Survivors include a son, Bill of Snyder; a brother, Sam Livingston of Temple; and two grandsons.

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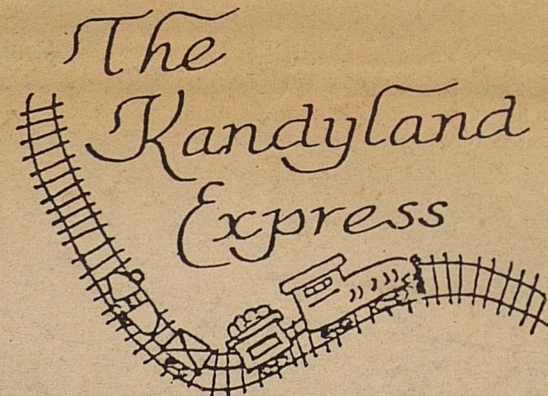

CHEESE YOU CAN FREEZE

Recent tests on freezing cheese should be good news for those who would like the convenience of having a stock of their favorite cheeses on hand.

Ten different varieties of cheese proved successful for home freezing in tests reported by the Minnesota Experiment Station.

But the success depends on rapid freezing as well as the composition of the cheese. The temperature in the freezer should be zero degrees F or lower, and the pieces or packages should weigh no more than one pound.

The varieties of cheese that were successfully frozen and kept in freezer storage for six months in the Minnesota tests were: Cheddar, Brick, Port du Salut, Swiss, Provoloni, Mozzarella, Liederkranz, Camembert, Parmesan and

Romano.

The three brands of Blue Cheese tested all became crumbly and mealy after freezing. But if Blue cheese is to be used for salad or dressings, this would not be a disadvantage and might make the cheese handier to use.

Since the cream cheese in the tests became watery and mealy, it is not recommended for freezing.

To freeze cheese, cut it in pieces no larger than one-pound size or use packaged cheese weighing no more than one pound. Small size cheeses like Camembert and Liederkranz may be left in their original package or you can use an overwrap for extra protection.

Any cut cheese, such as wedges of Cheddar, should be closely wrapped in freezer-foil. Press the foil tight with the hands to keep out air. Freeze at zero degrees F or lower. Thaw in the refrigerator.

SNAKE FENCE CONTROLS PEST

Looking for a way to keep snakes out of your yard? Then Build a snake fence. This was the idea developed on the Flat Top Ranch at Walnut Springs, Texas.

The fence is constructed by mounting a wire one or two inches off the ground and connected to a 110-volt continuous charge fence charger.

Before building the fence there are several things to remember. First, a clean level bed must be prepared upon which to the fence is built. This may involve grading a strip around your yard to assure a smooth bed. If you fencing area is fairly level, a close mowing will suffice. A soil sterilant is then used to get a weed free band eight-inches wide on which to build the fence.

Electric fencing wire, plastic insulators, T-bolts, earth anchors, or whatever material you have available can be use. The insulator can be spaced far apart as possible yet maintain a tight wire not more than two

inches off the ground. Good corners are extremely important because they help keep the fence tight. A block of wood such as a 2X6 about six-inches square makes a good spacer to keep the fence a uniform height off the ground.

Two screen-door springs keep the wire tight over a cattle guard. When a car crosses the cattle guard, the springs allow the wire to give, then pulls it back into place after the car has passed.

During real dry weather, keep some moisture in the soil so a snake passing under the fence will ground out the fence.

Another point to remember is to check the fence every morning and remove any snakes or small animals that tried to cross it during the night.

The fence works because as the snake crawls under it, he gets enough of a charge to make him mad. He then begins to tight and strike at the fence. The continuous charge he receives as he comes in contact with the wire quickly kills him.

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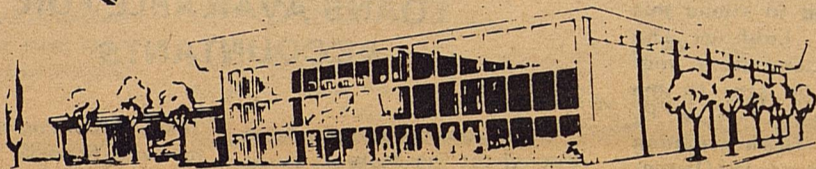
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
