



Tulia drug case Wrongly-accused Tulia defendants share \$6 million settlement checks

By BETSY BLANEY Associated Press Writer

Tulia residents wrongly charged and jailed in falsified drug cases five years ago began getting checks Friday from a \$6 million settlement stemming from a lawsuit claiming the arrests were racially motivated.

Retired Judge Ron Chapman, who decided how the settlement would be divided among the 45 defendants, said distribution of the checks began Thursday night. The defendants will share \$4 million, while some of the attorneys who represented them will receive \$2 million.

Civil rights groups claimed the drug cases were racially motivated because 39 of the 46 arrested or charged in the 18-month drug operation were black. Tom Coleman, the former undercover agent who made the arrests, is white.

Coleman, 44, testified at trials that he bought cocaine from dealers in Tulia, though he had no audio or video surveillance to back up his claims. He faces aggravated perjury charges in connection with post-conviction hearings for a few of those imprisoned.

Along with their checks, each claimant will get a letter from the judge. The letter addresses the defendants' futures. Chapman said.



LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Nebraska asked Texas Gov. Rick Perry about storing nuclear the U.S. Supreme Court on Friday to overturn the \$151 million judgment it has been ordered to pay for blocking efforts to build a nuclear dump within its borders.

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

Nebraska doesn't have the money to pay the court judgment because of an ongoing budget crunch and has been trying to negotiate a settlement with the compact.

The compact earlier rejected a settlement offer and said it would offer a counterproposal. Compact officials are scheduled to discuss negotiations at a meeting next week.

Attorney General Jon Bruning was not overly optimistic on the chances that the high court would agree to hear the case, let alone rule in Nebraska's favor.

"Look at the track record in this litigation we haven't won anything yet," Bruning said. "That's not to say we have no chance. But let's be realistic — it's a long shot."

The Associated Press reported last week that Gov. Mike Johanns had approached

U.S. District Judge Richard Kopf of Lincoln ruled in 2002 that former Nebraska Gov. Ben Nelson, now a U.S. senator, engaged in a politically motivated and orchestrated plot to keep the regional dump from being built in Nebraska.

The 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals has upheld that ruling.

With interest, the judgment now stands at \$156 million.

The compact, however, is arguing in court that Nebraska should pay a higher interest rate, which would put the total at \$202 million

The compact also argues that Nebraska is still obligated to host a site and wants to bar Nebraska generators of low-level waste from using the facility.

Current events have 2001 consumed me. I was eaten by the up close and personal journalism of that chaos.







In many cities, Taser use has reduced or eliminated police shootings. According to an account in the April 29 Amarillo Globe, police officers used Tasers on an unarmed, 24year-old man they were arresting on suspicion of inciting a riot. Witnesses said multiple officers had the man pinned down, but instead of handcuffing him, they zapped him repeatedly with their Tasers.

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

Report: Kids healthy, smart but too heavy

WASHINGTON (AP) America's children are less likely to commit a violent crime or become a victim of one, but more of them are living in poverty, according to the government's broadest measure of children's wellbeing.

A report released Friday by the Federal Interagency Forum on Child and Family Statistics paints a mostly upbeat picture of how children are doing. The teen birth rate has declined steadily since 1991, hitting a record low in 2002. And the death rate has gone down for young people.

Still, it's not all positive news. America's children are more likely to be overweight than they were before and child poverty has inched up after several years of decline, according to the report that draws together findings from many federal agencies.

The reduction in teen births is one gain that should not be overlooked, said Duane Alexander, director of the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development at the National Institutes of Health.

Now, it will be Bryant along with incoming coach Rudy Tomjanovich and Miami imports Lamar Odom, Caron Butler and Brian Grant - who will lead the Lakers.

When asked if the Lakers could win without O'Neal, Bryant replied: "I don't know. We don't have the most dominant player in the game, so things are going to change drastically for us. It's going to be a struggle. It's an uphill battle for us. (But) I'm not sitting in front of you guys believing we're not going to win."

One significant obstacle remains for Bryant before next season. He has pleaded not guilty to felony sexual assault and faces an Aug. 27 trial in Eagle, Colo. He claims he had consensual sex with an employee, now 20, at the Vail-area resort where she worked.

If convicted, Bryant faces four years to life in prison or 20 years to life on probation, and a fine of up to \$750,000. The trial figures to take several weeks.

rules in favor of the Tour, either one or both riders will be excluded, Clerc said.

Tour organizers learned Thursday that both riders have been called to appear in October in a case involving suspected drug use during the 2001 Tour of Italy, Clerc said.

Tour organizers said before this year's race that any riders involved or implicated in police or judicial doping investigations would be barred. Following that line, they asked the UCI, cycling's governing body, to exclude the riders, Clerc said.

But the UCI did not agree to the request, saying that Zanini's case had already been dealt with and that Padrnos' was not a problem with doping.

"There is a disagreement over this problem," Clerc said.

Tour organizers have

approached another cycling organization for a ruling, expected by the end of the day. If that body concurs with Tour organizers, then either one or both riders could be excluded. But if the UCI decision is backed, the riders will stay in the race.

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
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House curbs loans for U.S. companies moving offshore

WASHINGTON (AP) -The House is taking an election-year swipe at U.S. companies that have lowered their tax bills by moving offshore, voting to bar them from receiving some lower-cost federal loans.

The Republican-led chamber voted 270-132 to add the provision to a \$19.4 billion foreign aid bill. In a long day of voting, the chamber also added provisions to the measure trimming aid to Saudi Arabia and penalizing countries that would hand over Americans to a permanent international court for war crimes.

The foreign aid bill passed easily, 365-41. But the votes blocking Export-Import Bank loans to companies that moved their offices to other countries and cutting Saudi aid were setbacks to the Bush administration and the House's country" who produce those GOP leaders.

The tallies, however, were not the final word on the issues, with the Senate yet to craft its version of the 287-131 to derail a bipartioverall legislation and the administration still to decide how much muscle to flex before signing the package into law.

Rep. Bernard Sanders, I-Vt., chief sponsor of the victory for Secretary of proposal to block loans to departed U.S. businesses, personally wrote lawmakers

said Americans are "outraged by companies that come begging to Washington for corporate welfare and taxpayer dollars while they move to tax haven countries."

At a time of voter outrage over companies that ship U.S. jobs abroad, that argument outweighed those of opponents, who said loans by the bank — a federal agency — go only to American exporting companies

"It hurts workers in this exports, said Rep. Jim Kolbe, R-Ariz. "It hurts the economy of this country."

Earlier, the House voted san effort to slice Egypt's \$1.3 billion in military aid by nearly half and give the funds to that country as economic assistance instead.

That vote represented a State Colin Powell, who

Powell wrote that failure to do so could imperil the U.S. relationship with Egypt just as that country prepares to keep the peace

in Gaza should Israel, as promised, withdraw from there. He also warned the military aid cut would jeopardize \$2.2 billion in Egyptian defense contracts with U.S. companies — an argument that congressional aides said helped tip the balance.

But in a slap at another American ally in the Middle East — and over White House objections the Republican-run chamber voted to erase the token amount of aid in the bill for Saudi Arabia. U.S. officials have alternated between praising the desert kingdom for its efforts against terrorism and chiding it for not doing enough.

The 217-191 vote - in which 60 Republicans broke with the White House - also means Saudi Arabia won't qualify for millions of dollars in price breaks for some American military equipment and U.S. training of its defense forces, said the sponsor of the effort, Rep. Anthony Weiner, D-N.Y. He said the bill had \$25,000 for Saudi Arabia, aid that by law triggered lower costs for military aid.



John Kerry wooing educators

WASHINGTON (AP) Democrat John Kerry is giving teachers a promise he claims President Bush has left behind: to put as much money behind the nation's edu-

"We value education as the path to opportunity in America, and we value the teachers who dedicate their lives to giving our young people the best possible

cation reforms as allowed under law.

"No broken promises on funding, and no more empty rhetoric on reform," Kerry said in prepared remarks to the American Federation of

Teachers. "As president, I will meet our responsibilities. We're going to get this done right because we know that empty rhetoric and empty promises lead to empty dreams, and we won't let that happen in our America.'

Kerry was taking his message Friday to 3,000 delegates at the AFT convention, where he was also expected to pick up their endorsement.

He took on the topic dominating debate in education --- No Child Left Behind, the law that was Bush's first domestic priority and that won overwhelming support in 2001 from Congress, including Kerry.

Despite record spending by the Republican-led Congress, critics ranging from legislatures to educators say the law is underfunded by billions of dollars, in turn limiting schools' ability to improve.

Kerry has embraced the theme, saying he will fully fund the law, meaning the maximum amount authorized by Congress. That would cost an extra \$27 billion alone based

Republicans say schools have enough money to

meet the law's requirements, and that parents have become exasperated watching tax money pumped into an education system that isn't producing results for kids.

Schools that get federal poverty aid but don't make enough progress are supposed to get extra help under the law, but they also face sanctions that grow more severe yearly.

Kerry had other messages sure to resonate with the teachers: improving student graduation rates, reforming testing, lowering health care costs.

The 1.3-million member AFT is composed primarily of public school teachers but also includes health care workers, college faculty and government workers from the local to federal level. The largest teachers union, the National Education Association, has already endorsed Kerry.

OPEC to make increase in oil output ceiling

hopes to put a lid on stubbornly high crude prices by adding 500,000 barrels a day to its targeted output, but high worldwide demand for oil and a dearth of spare production capacity could spoil its plans.

With most members of the cartel already pumping all they can, analysts worry that a disruption in crude shipments from a major producer could raise prices to damaging new heights.

Indeed, some observers estimate that the world has little more than 1 million barrels in spare capacity remaining - a small cushion if shipments stop suddeniy from places like Iraq.

"I think these are dangerous times. The danger is that a supply disruption at this stage would create unprecedented problems and unprecedented prices," said Peter Gignoux, a London-

> Already the price of crude has been hovering around an uncomfortable \$40 a barrel for more than two months. Thursday, On the Organization of Petroleum **Exporting Countries decided** to raise its daily production target by 2 percent, or 500,000 barrels, in an effort to keep prices from spiraling higher still. The cartel pumps more than a third of the world's oil.

> OPEC made the increase automatic by mutual agreement, and canceled a formal meeting it had planned for its members on July 21 at its headquarters in Vienna, Austria, said Purnomo Yusgiantoro, the group's president. The increase will take effect Aug. 1.

Although oil-exporting countries are happy to maximize profits, OPEC and its de facto leader Saudi Arabia

worry that global economic growth and the long-term demand for crude could suffer if prices soar higher.

Contracts of U.S. light crude for August delivery fell 20 cents to settle at \$40.77 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

But few analysts expect lower prices to last, noting production is already above quota and oil markets had already factored the output increase into prices.

"The increase itself has been telegraphed in the same fashion that dropping a brick on someone's toe gives a hint," said Jan Stuart of New York brokerage FIMAT USA.

OPEC agreed last month to make a two-step increase in its output ceiling to try to calm oil markets, which are jittery over pipeline attacks in Iraq and terrorism in Saudi Arabia.
