Family: Blast victim improving

A Pampa woman burned in an industrial explosion continues to improve at a Lubbock burn center, family members said today.

Merry Jenkins suffered third degree burns to 22 percent of her body on July 5 in an early morning blast at Titan Specialties perforating division, west of Pampa.

Immediately after the explosion, Jenkins was flown to Lubbock Burn Center for treatment of her injuries. Another Titan employee, Karen Standerfer, 41, died at the scene.

A third victim, Ron Hurst, suffered burns to his right hand.

"They took her off the respirator on Sunday," said Carol Dout, Jenkin's sister-in-law, this morning.

"Her first words were 'What happened?' and then she told her husband

she loved him."

"They started sitting her up and giving her ice to suck on Monday," she said, adding that Jenkins is still in the burn center's intensive care unit.

Jenkins was probably standing about two to three feet to Standerfer's right when the explosion occurred about 7:30 a.m.

"That's where she always stood,"

City mailing water report to customers

Pampa's annual water report began arriving this month at city homes and businesses.

The report is required by law to give citizens an idea of their city's water quality, according to Richard Morris, Pampa's director of public works.

"In 1999, the EPA passed a law that we were to do a consumer confidence report on the water," Morris said. "We started doing that. The first one came out in the year 2000 for 1999."

"This consumer confidence report is for the year 2003," Morris said. "It has to be mailed out in 2004. We didn't have any violations at all."

Morris said Pampa has a good water operation.

"We've had really, really good results since 2001, when we put the new water treatment facility online," he said. "In 2002, we started using chloramines to treat the water instead of straight chlorine. That's worked out better for us. It has a longer residual effect."

Man hurt when car hits store

A man sitting in a Pampa convenience store suffered injuries to an arm and a leg Monday afternoon after a car jumped a curb and ran through the front window of the store.

Salomon Banda Silva, 53, suffered minor injuries when a 1995 white Nissan Maxima driven by Kristen Susanne Holmes, 41, plowed through a window at the Taylor Food Mart shortly before 4 p.m. Monday, at the intersection of Frederic and Barnes.

Officers said Silva suffered cuts to one arm and complained of pain in his leg.

Silva walked to the Guardian Ambulance that took him to the Pampa Regional Medical Center.

Investigators said Holmes told them she was driving her husband's car and had difficulty finding the brake.

Although shaken, neither Holmes nor the two juveniles in her car were hurt, officers said.

While most of the front window of the convenience store caved in, the car appeared to have sustained little damage.

TxDOT officials to discuss funds for area airports

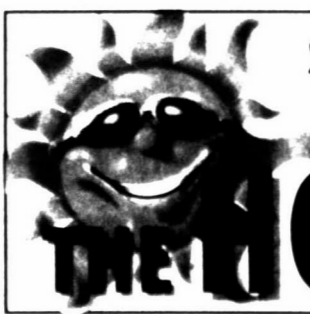

Texas Department of Transportation will conduct a planning meeting Wednesday for general aviation airports located in Pampa, McLean, Canadian, Follett, Higgins, Perryton and Miami.

The meeting will be from 9 to 11 a.m. Wednesday, July 21, in the M.K. Brown Room of Pampa Community Building, 200 N. Ballard.

This year, TxDOT expects to provide approximately \$60 million in funding for planning, constructing and maintaining general aviation airports, according to a news release from the Austin TxDOT office.

Dout said. "That's how they worked together."

Jenkins' burns are primarily on the left side of her upper body. She also suffered second degree burns to her legs, the family member said.

Skin grafts are beginning to take, Dout said, and Jenkins' hair has begun to grow back.

"They're using a new way to attach the grafts; it's experimental," she said. "They're not having to use staples like they used to do, except for on her left hand."

Family members have been told that it will be four to five weeks before Jenkins will be able to return to her home in Pampa.

While they're waiting for her return, family and friends are upgrading the plumbing and building a special shower for Jenkins.

"We're redoing the front yard and a friend has donated a pond. She's always wanted a pond," Dout said.

"We've got to get Merry home," she added.

The family is amazed by the

outpouring of help from the Pampa community and churches in Pampa, Lubbock and even as far away as Tennessee, she said.

During the first days after the explosion while the family gathered at the Lubbock hospital awaiting word on Jenkins' condition, churches from Lubbock took turns bringing food to the family as they waited, Dout said.

Officials of Gray County Sheriff's Office, the state fire marshal's office, and Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) investigators have all said the explosion was an accident which occurred as Standerfer was mixing a combination of chemicals.

Dout said Jenkins has not been told of Standerfer's death.

She said the two women had been best friends for 17 or 18 years. They met in New Port Richey, Fla., where Jenkins ran a day care center and had hired Standerfer to work for her.

Jenkins encouraged Standerfer to move to Pampa about two years ago, Dout said. The two friends lived close to each other and often traded furniture and household goods, she said.

A fund to help Jenkins' family has been set up at the Cabot & NOI Employees' Credit Union, 320 W. Francis.

The key to the operation, he said, is the city's water treatment plant on West Kentucky.

"The water treatment plant we have right now is state of the art," Morris said. "We were one of the first few in the United States that put the system that we have in place. It was an extremely economical system. It's highly mechanized but very economical as far as water treatment."

The water treatment plant will produce up to six million gallons per day.

"Our peak is about eight million," Morris said. "That only happens four to five days a year. We don't go over six million gallons very often."

The city's water comes from three different sources.

"The water that comes in from the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority," Morris said, "is about 50 percent Roberts County well water and 50 percent Lake Meredith water."

Normally, Morris said, the mix is 43 percent Roberts County well water and 57 percent lake water, but because of low lake levels and the higher salinity of the lake water, a higher rate of ground water is being used.

Once it reaches Pampa, it goes through the city's treatment plant and is mixed with water from Pampa's well field south of the city.

"There's 12 wells," Morris said.

Last year, Pampa used almost 1.2 billion gallons of water.

"Our water wells here in town supplied 313 million gallons," Morris said.

CRMWA provided about 885 million gallons of water.

This is the third year the city has done the report.

Everyone in the state, Morris said, that has base of at least 2,300 water customers has to meet certain guidelines. The report is mailed out if there are over 3,300 water customers.

"If you're less than that, you can do a direct delivery door-to-door," Morris said, "or post it at city hall, but that's not where we fall."

Pampa has more than 8,000 water users.

Morris said they mailed out Pampa's water report this month and posted it on the internet, but not on the city's website. Pampa's website is being redesigned so the city relied on a Pampa accountant and internet service provider that serves on the city's economic development corporation.

"Doug Locke was gracious enough to put this

water quality report on his internet website," Morris said. "It's under Pampa Water Quality."

When the report goes out, a public meeting must be scheduled, he said, so the public

can ask questions and make comments.

"We are going to have a public hearing," Morris said. He said the public will have an opportunity to ask questions about the report at 4 p.m., Tuesday, July 27, in conjunction with the regularly scheduled Pampa City Commission meeting in city hall.

Morris said he'll make a short presentation of the report, and then the public will be able to comment.

The city printed about 8,600 copies of the report. About 8,200 were mailed out. Extra copies are available at city hall.

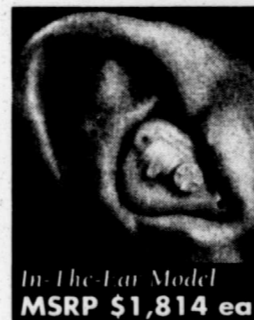
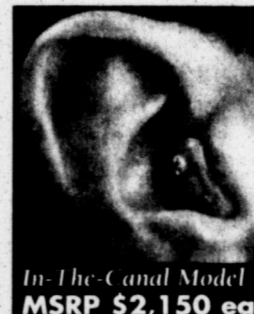

TxDOT can't see the forest for the trees

I would like to extend my heartfelt sympathy to anyone who has lost a friend or loved one in a motor vehicle accident involving a tree. Nothing can make up for such a loss.

It is always tragic when something happens to cause an unexpected, sudden death. Whenever a fatal illness is the cause of death, the person and their family and friends generally have time to prepare themselves. No such preparation is possible when an accident, act of terrorism or other outside cause is the reason for death.

It is the responsibility of government and public service agencies to maintain the "general welfare" of its citi-

zens. Measures to ensure the safety of the populace are enacted by government and enforced by federal, state and local agencies.

This is generally a good thing. Without laws and other safety measures, our world would be an even more dangerous place in which to live.

But sometimes, we go overboard in attempting to keep everyone safe. We focus on a few isolated events and let them grow in our minds until they overshadow all else, convincing us that the events represent a true menace to us all. These isolated events become, in some minds, a significant enough threat to justify drastic action.

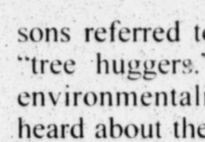
In other words, sometimes people can't see the forest for the trees.

The Texas Department of Transportation, hereafter called TxDOT, has launched a program to remove trees that are 30 feet or closer to U.S. Highways 60 and 83. This plan came about because from 1992 to 2001, seven fatalities and 11 injuries on those highways involved trees.

TxDOT did not develop this tree removal program just to be mean to trees or to incite some citizens' anger. I

believe they are sincerely trying to do their best to keep the public safe, as far as it is within their sphere of influence to do so.

In fact, I am surprised that TxDOT hasn't heard from The Sierra Club or any of the other environmentalists, those persons referred to by some as "tree huggers." Maybe the environmentalists haven't heard about the tree removal plans yet, or maybe TxDOT just hasn't mentioned any communication from those groups.

I searched the Internet for laws involving trees. I read existing and proposed laws from a variety of states,

On July 20, 1969, Apollo 11 astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin became the first men to walk on the moon as they stepped out of their lunar module.

Christian-Muslim clash inevitable

When President Bush was in Istanbul, Turkey, recently for the NATO summit, he steered away from talk about a "clash of civilizations" between Christianity and Islam. He is strategically shrewd and probably also factually accurate, as he explains our war on terror, to emphasize that most Muslims oppose homicidal bombers. But it's hard not to think in "clash" terms when you stand at one particular spot here in this city.

The spot is smack dab between two architectural wonders. Look one way from benches, and you'll see Hagia Sophia, the famous

domed cathedral that was a Christian wonder of the world for nearly a thousand years. Century after century the church added beautiful frescos and mosaics. A ramp ascending to the Sophia balcony even provided access for the disabled (or empresses too haughty to walk) before access was cool.

But Hagia Sophia became a mosque following the Muslim conquest of this city in 1453. The conquerors

ripped off crosses and destroyed or plastered over the magnificent art. They added huge (and tacky) medallions in Arabic and sayings from the Quran.

Today, the house of worship is a drab museum that shows off in desolation its huge slabs of marble, with scaffolding aggressively entering what should be open space. Hagia Sophia is one sad site, and maybe that's the way Muslim Turkey wants it to

be, because look the other way from those outside benches and you'll see the mother of all in-your-face building projects: the magnificently-domed Blue Mosque (aka the Sultan Ahmet).

Sixteenth-century Muslims were saying to Christians: "Anything you can do I can do better." The mosque, unlike the now-barricaded Hagia Sophia, is beautiful inside, with wall tiles in cobalt blue, aqua, red and white floral patterns. Advantage, Islam — but this architectural contest is

Intelligence report just name-calling

Because this country is so politically divided, its hard to tell what impact the Senate Intelligence Committee report will have on America.

We hope, of course, it will make a great deal of difference, but already there is name-calling and denial over the findings that reports of weapons of mass destruction were greatly exaggerated. Most troubling is that the report leaves many of us wondering who was and who is in charge of keeping our country safe from terrorism and protected against threats to world peace.

Perhaps we've watched

too many Steven Seagal or Bruce Willis movies where plots and counter plots take place in attempts to rule the world. We look for conspiracies against us and hope for the guys in the white hats to come along and make us safe and free.

Perhaps Sen. Jay Rockefeller, a member of the committee, summed up what our biggest concern should be as a result of this report: "Tragically, the intelligence failures set forth in this report will affect our nation-

al security for generations to come. Our credibility is diminished. Our standing in the world has never been lower ... As a direct consequence, our nation is more vulnerable today than ever before."

Now, what do we do about it? While the report mostly focused on the failing of intelligence, do we trust an administration under whose watch it happened? Do we believe any administration in the future when they want to take us to war over infor-

mation supplied by the intelligence community?

Certainly this is not the first time questions of such a serious nature have been raised. There are many who still think Franklin D. Roosevelt's advisors encouraged him to ignore rumors of an attack by the Japanese and let it happen so we would be able to justify entering World War II. Then, of course, military actions in both Korea and Vietnam have been held up as examples of misguided (some now argue they were uninformed) efforts to stop the

U.S. Marine who disappeared in Iraq says he did not desert

QUANTICO, Va. (AP) — The U.S. Marine who was once feared beheaded by Iraqi insurgents after disappearing from his unit has stepped forward to deny he was ever a deserter, insisting that "Once a Marine, always a Marine."

Cpl. Wassef Ali Hassoun has been under a cloud of suspicion since failing to report for duty June 20. Videotaped images later surfaced showing him apparently kidnapped; he emerged unharmed in Lebanon on July 8 and

was brought back to the United States last week.

"I did not desert my post," Hassoun told reporters outside Quantico Marine Corps Base on Monday. "I was captured and held against my will by anti-coalition forces for 19 days. This was a very difficult and challenging time for me."

Hassoun, 24, of West Jordan, Utah, disappeared from his base near the troubled Iraqi city of Fallujah and later turned up at the U.S.

Embassy in Beirut. It remains unclear how he traveled from Iraq to Lebanon, where he was born and still has some relatives.

On June 27, Arab television showed a videotape of a blindfolded Hassoun, a sword hanging over his head. At one point during his disappearance, a group claiming to represent his captors announced that he had been beheaded after being lured from the base by a love affair.

Hassoun did not answer any questions dur-

ing his brief appearance Monday. He is in the midst of what the Marines call a "repatriation process" in which he is debriefed and given time to decompress and avoid the media spotlight, officials said.

"I would like to tell all the Marines as well as all those others serving in Iraq to keep their heads up and spirits high. Once a Marine, always a Marine, Semper Paratus," Hassoun said, invoking the Marine Corps motto, Latin for "always faithful."

rigged. What about the larger confrontation? Will Muslim and Christian civilizations inevitably clash? They already are in Nigeria, but here in Turkey moderate Muslims hoping for peace are currently in charge.

Istanbul includes many reminders of past Christian-Muslim conflict, and other parts of Turkey have even more. The Cappadocia region east of here displays the remnants of conflict: When the armies of Caliph Omar invaded in 717-718, Christians turned cliff caves into worship and hiding places.

Christians used them again in that way after the

Seljuk Turk conquest in 1017. Frescoes in the cave churches have regular biblical scenes but also scenes of "warrior-saints" with swords. One church commemorates the counter-attacks of Nicephorus Phocas, who in the 900s took back Antioch and Tarsus from the Muslims. At the Karanlik (Dark) Church, where you can view by flashlight a wall covered with paintings, one fresco of a muscular Jesus — big biceps and pecs — is most prominent.

Those Christians saw a clash of civilization that went on for centuries, and

their paintings are very much in an Onward Christian Soldiers motif, with lots of red ochre, green, and cobalt blue. In places of Cappadocia without cliffs,

the Christians went underground: Thirty-two underground cities probably housed at times 20,000 or more, with multiple entrances and exits for escape.

I visited one underground city at Derinkuyu that went down eight levels and included a church, class-

room, baptistry, storerooms, bedrooms, dining rooms, wine cellars, stables on the first and second stories, wells, tombs, and 52 ventilations shafts to a depth of 75 to 90 yards. Christians apparently built the city by hollowing out airshafts and excavating from the sides of the shafts.

And talk about security: Christians built not bolt locks but bolt stones — two feet thick and weighing half a ton — that could be rolled across passageways in case of attack. Which leads to a question: What kind of bolt stones do we have today? We need to pray for peace and work to build honest Muslim-Christian friendship. But we must also be discerning, so that terrorists don't force us into a position of weakness where all we can do is hide.

spread of Communism. While the Korean effort did serve us well, no one on this side of the Evil Empire has ever been able to claim any type of victory in the

The report is not going to help our image abroad, but we are going to have to work diligently to convince other nations that ultimately each and every country is going to be impacted by the quality of security efforts do their duty to contribute to peaceful diplomacy.

It's also not going to be particularly helpful to the Bush re-election campaign. President Bush says he finds the intelligence report useful and that he wants to know how to make the agencies better. As someone hoping for four more years in the White House, we would have thought that process

would have already taken place. This report, albeit somewhat politically tainted as are all things out of Washington these days, needs to be taken quite seriously by the president, Congress and American citizens. There is nothing more comforting than to know someone is in control here.

Most state budgets may be on tail end of budget crises, but problems linger

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Most U.S. states appear to be emerging from the economic downturn, a new report measuring the health of their budgets shows. But that doesn't mean states will celebrate with wholesale spending sprees, experts say.

States wound up the fiscal year in June with a collective ending balance of more than \$6 billion more than this time last year, according to a survey by the National Conference of State Legislatures, released during its annual meeting Tuesday in Salt Lake City.

The report says it's not all good news since those balances are expected to fall at

the end of this fiscal year after a one-time gift from the federal government runs out.

"It's a mixed bag," said Corina Eckl, NCSL's senior fiscal analyst. She said that while 2004 was better than expected, there are "still some serious concerns."

The report is based on data compiled in July from 44 states, where year-end balances collectively went from \$12.2 billion to \$18.4 billion this year. The report found 26

states had balance increases, but 18 saw declines.

The six states not included in the report because they have not passed fiscal year 2005 budgets yet — California, Illinois, Kentucky, Michigan, New York and North Carolina —

account for about a third of the national state budget picture. Aided last year by a \$20 billion one-time infusion from the federal government

through the Jobs and Growth Tax Relief Reconciliation Act, states' general fund spending grew a collective 2.4 percent, the report says, and education was a prime benefactor.

Spending for K-12 education grew almost 5 percent, up 2 percent from two years ago. Higher education saw a 3.2 percent increase in spending; it fell 0.5 percent in fiscal year 2003, the report says.

Though the report cautioned that revenues were artificially inflated by the federal government's \$20 billion, "some of the growth is attributable to improved revenue performance," it said.
