

Plot targets open warily

WASHINGTON (AP) — Financial institutions identified as targets of a terrorist plot in three cities opened for business Monday under stepped-up security and defiant words from people who said they won't be cowed by the extraordinary intelligence pointing to a potential attack.

Police sealed off some streets in New York, put international-finance employees in Washington through extra security checks, and added barricades and a heavy armed presence Newark,

Treasury Secretary John Snow, quick to try to reassure investors and Americans

generally, said the nation's financial system operated normally in the first weekday hours of the code-orange alert.

"People around the world rightly have confidence in the U.S. financial markets," Snow said. "While we must always remain vigilant against terror, we will not be intimidated and prevented from enjoying our lives and exercising our freedoms.



Authorities were more visible, although not in large numbers, in a capital that has already fortified key buildings against terrorism. 



Washington wildfire labeled possible arson

THORP, Wash. (AP) — A wildfire that destroyed two homes and threatened dozens of others appears to be the work of an arsonist who has set 10 other fires in central Washington in the last two months, authorities said Saturday.

A state of emergency was declared in Kittitas County as a wind-swept blaze forced the evacuation of dozens of homes in the Cascade foothills. Helicopters dropped water and planes distributed retardant to prevent the fire's spread.

"We are investigating this fire as arson," Undersheriff Clayton Myers said Saturday. "We believe they are all linked."

Winds up to 25 mph fanned the flames, forcing the evacuation of about 200 mainly seasonal homes in the eastern Cascade foothills Saturday. Myers said the blaze destroyed

two homes and a shop as it raced across 300 acres. None of the previous 10 arsons in Kittitas County damaged buildings.


The fire began Friday near Interstate 90 between Cle Elum and Ellensburg. Some of the homes firefighters were able to save had flames lapping at the front door, Myers said.

"It's stressing our resources. In fact, we've moved beyond what our resources can handle," Myers said.

High winds posed a threat as firefighters hoped to channel the fire away from nearby timber, said Dave Johnson, incident commander for Washington state.

'There's a lot of fire still in the trees. Where the wind goes is where it's going to take it," Johnson said.

Most have the recent arsons have been set in the afternoon, in areas with plenty of fuel and near homes by the highway.



Families challenge home schooling oversight

PITTSBURGH (AP). On any given school day, the five Newborn children might be studying statistics at a local college, learning Spanish from a tutor or watching a procedure at a veterinarian's office.

It's part of a curriculum set by their parents, who home school their children because they consider it a calling from God. It all must be carefully documented in a report each year to their local school superintendent.

In cases being closely watched by home schooling advocates across the country, the Newborns and a second Pennsylvania family have filed lawsuits under the state Religious Freedom Protection Act challenging the state's home school reporting requirements.

U.S. military releases five Guantanamo prisoners

RABAT, Morocco (AP) Five Moroccans detained at the U.S. military prison at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, were turned over to Moroccan authorities, the country's official news agency reported Monday.

The men, who were arrested during the U.S.-led war that toppled Afghanistan's hard-line Taliban regime, arrived in the North African kingdom on Sunday, the MAP news agency said.

The five were handed to justice officials.

The prosecutor named the men as Mohamed Ouzar, 24; Mohamed Mazouz, 30; Radouane Chekkouri. 32: Abdellah Tabarak, 49, and Brahim Benchakroun, 24. They will be investigated by Moroccan police working under the prosecutor of the appeals court in Rabat, the capital.


Morocco, which has an active network of Islamic militants, is one of the United States' most important allies in the Muslim world in fighting terror.

Suicide bombings in Casablanca, Morocco's largest city, killed 33 bystanders and a dozen bombers in May 2003.

Most of the suspects charged in the March 11 train bombings that killed 191 people in Madrid were Moroccans.

The kingdom has led a tough crackdown on Islamic radicals since the Casablanca bombings, arresting hundreds of suspects and sending their cases quickly through the judicial system.

The United States has been gradually releasing some prisoners from the Cuban naval base.

Convicted collaborator killed in his hospital bed

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip (AP) — Five masked men broke into a hospital Monday and shot dead a convicted Palestinian collaborator who had been wounded in a grenade attack in his prison cell just hours earlier.

After the shooting, police questioned one of the suspected gunmen who claimed to be a relative of the victim avenging the shame the collaborator had brought to his family, police

It was not clear if the gunman was arrested, and the fate of his four accomplices was not known.

Assassinations like that of Mahmoud al Sharef, accused of helping Israel, are relatively common. But this one came amid growing lawlessness in the Palestinian territories that has highlighted police helplessness to rein in violence.

(AP) — Pakistani intelligence agents found plans for new attacks against the United States and Britain on a computer seized during the arrest of a senior al-Qaida suspect wanted for the 1998 twin U.S. embassy bombings in East Africa, the information minister said.

The plans were found in emails on the computer of Ahmed Khalfan Ghailani, a Tanzanian arrested July 25 Information Minister Sheikh Rashid Ahmed told The Press Associated Monday.

Ahmed would not confirm whether the information from Ghailani is what prompted U.S. Homeland Security Secretary Tom Ridge to issue a warning Sunday about a possible al-Qaida attack on financial institutions in New York, Washington and Newark, N.J. However, Ridge specifically thanked Pakistan for its help in the war on terror during his press conference.

"We got a few e-mails from Ghailani's computer about (plans for) attacks in the U.S. and U.K.," Ahmed said, adding that the information has been shared with Pakistan's allies — a reference to the United States.

Ahmed said authorities have also arrested another top suspect believed to be a computer and communications expert, and that that man was cooperating with investigators.

"He is a very wanted man, but I cannot say his name now," Ahmed said. He said the man was a militant, but refused to say if he was part of al-Qaida.

Interior Minister Faisal Saleh Hayyat confirmed that Ghailani was sharing "vital"

"He has given us vital information, but we cannot

share specifies," Hayyat said. An intelligence official said the information about a U.S. attack appeared to be centered on New York. He spoke on condition of anonymity.

Havyat said Ghailani remains in Pakistani custody.

The Home Office in London, which is responsible for policing and security after a 12-hour gunbattle in in Britain, had no immediate the eastern city of Gujrat, comment on the computer seizure.

Two AK-47 rifles, plastic chemicals, two computers, computer diskettes, and a "large amount" of foreign currency were recovered from the home in Gujrat where Ghailani was seized. More than a dozen others, including his wife and several children, were also arrest-

ed in that raid. Officials believe the group was making plans to flee Pakistan on false passports. Guirat is a center for document forgers and human smugglers in Pakistan.

The intelligence official also confirmed the arrest of a computer engineer who would send messages using code words to al-Qaida suspects. Pakistani television reported that his name was information, but he would Noor Mohammed, but the

official said that was just an alias.

Ahmed said that Pakistani forces are still acting on the information the computer expert is supplying, and that it is an ongoing investiga-

News of the break comes as police comb through evidence from an assassination attempt against Pakistan's prime minister-designate believed orchestrated by al-Qaida. Police were questioning a tailor they believe made the clothes for the suicide bomber who blew himself up Friday.

The bomber's target, Finance Minister Shaukat Aziz, was unharmed, but nine other people were killed. Aziz has been tapped to take over as prime minister later this year.

A Web site announcement over the weekend claimed responsibility on behalf of al-Qaida and promised more violence. Al-Qaida is also believed to be behind two attempts in December to assassinate President Gen. Pervez Musharraf, one of which killed 17 people.

Musharraf has been a top U.S. ally in the war on terror, infuriating Muslim radicals in Pakistan and elsewhere, and his security services have arrested a number of top al-Qaida-linked figures, most recently Ghailani.

Ahmed said the investigation into Ghailani had revealed that he was training terrorists in Pakistan to commit suicide attacks, though it was not clear if there was a direct connection between him and the attempt on Aziz.

"All these suicide attackers have some link with each other," Ahmed said Sunday.

The government has promised a reward of \$175,000 for information about the identity of the suicide bomber.







Kerry vies for independent vote with talks of faith, guns

(AP) — John Kerry is talk- Rendell, a Democrat, said ing more openly about his the gun vote could make the personal connection to God and guns as he kicks off the general election campaign asking for support from conservative-leaning independent voters.

As his post-convention bus tour rolls through blue collar and Republican-leaning districts, Kerry has repeatedly described how he began a lifetime of hunting and fishing as a young boy. And lately he's been speaking in more detail about a faith that he and running mate John Edwards share in God.

"We're running to be lay leaders, but there isn't any way that you're not affected by your fundamental values, the faith that brings you to the table," Kerry said Sunday to worshippers at Greater Grace Temple in the heart of the presidential campaign battleground in Ohio.

With his political enemies trying to portray Kerry as an aloof Boston Brahmin, Kerry's campaign is putting a bigger focus on common values that he shares with average Americans - fishing and hunting, family and

"I don't wear my own faith on my sleeve, but faith has given me values and hope to live by, from Vietnam to this day, from Sunday to Sunday," Kerry said as he accepted the Democratic presidential nomination Thursday.

Kerry didn't mention his interest in hunting in that speech, but he has been describing it on his post-convention bus tour through more conservative areas. In Greensburg, Pa., Saturday, Kerry pointed out a small group of men wearing bright orange shirts that said "Sportsmen 4 Kerry."

"I've been a fisherman since I was about three years old, four years old," Kerry said. "Flung my first line out with my dad. I've been a hunter since I was about 12 years old, and I went through the whole progression, you know, BB gun to .22s to .30-30, you name it."




