E-scam strikes

Pampa

Some Pampa residents have received e-mails which appear to be from Citibank, asking the recipients to go to a website to verify their account information.

Chief Trevlyn Pitner of Pampa Police Department urges anyone receiving such an e-mail to not reply to it in any way, and to contact Citibank by using a telephone number listed on their most recent statement or by going to www.citibank.com on the Internet for telephone contact instructions.

One such message was e-mailed at 5:04 a.m., Friday, Aug. 6. The "from" line stated it was from CITIBANK, and the start of the letter included the Citibank logo.

The letter states "there have been a large number of identity theft attempts targeting Citibank customers" and urges the recipient to

Productivity up in second quarter

WASHINGTON (AP) — The productivity of American workers rose at an annual rate of 2.9 percent in the spring, the slowest increase since late 2002, the government reported Tuesday.

The Labor Department said the increase in productivity, the output of workers for each hour worked, in the April-June quarter, followed a 3.7 percent rate of increase in the first quarter.

The 2.9 percent increase was the smallest gain since productivity rose at an annual rate of 1.6

Unit labor costs, which are being closely watched by the Federal Reserve for signs of inflationary pressures, were up at an annual rate of 1.9 percent in the second quarter, the biggest rise in two years, following a 0.3 percent advance in the first quarter.



Alleged smuggler dies in car crash

HIDALGO, Texas (AP) — Eight illegal immigrants and their alleged smuggler died after their car plunged into a South Texas irrigation canal and overturned near a crossing point along the Mexican border, state troopers said early Tuesday.

A ninth undocumented migrant survived the crash late Monday night. The victims were pulled from about six feet of water in the canal where the Ford LTD sedan came to rest upside-down, the Texas Department of Public Safety said.

"The Hidalgo police arrived and jumped into the water and started pulling people out of the vehicle and putting them onto the canal said Johnny Hernandez, safety education trooper for DPS McAllen, who investigated the one-car

The victims were pronounced dead by Justice of

the Peace Rosa Trevino, Five were from El Salvador, with two others from Honduras and three of unknown origin, said Donnie Pacheco, a DPS investigator in McAllen. The smuggler "may have been one of the John Does," he said.

Pacheco said the immigrants, seven men and three women, had crossed the Rio Grande into Texas at about 9 p.m. and were waiting at a designated point for their smuggler to pick them up and rush them out of the heavily patrolled area.

"They were told by this guy that they were to remain at this area and at a certain point in time a guy would honk his horn," said Pacheco.

One woman, 20-year-old Teresa Lopez of El Salvador. did not make it into the car in time and was left in the brush. The car sped away without her. Her husband died in the car.

click on an embedded link, generally in blue and underlined, to "securely confirm your Citibank account details.'

The letter also states "this process is mandatory, and if not completed within the nearest time your account may be subject to temporary suspension.

"Credible companies do not operate this way. They don't send out random emails with this type :

of urgency. They're after your password, PIN number, account numbers, Social Security numbers, and so on. They bait you by telling you it's something urgent to vour account," Pitner said of the suspicious e-mail.

Citibank's website includes detailed information on how to spot a "spoof" e-mail, which is a message that appears to be sent by a legitimate company or organization but is in. fact sent by an impostor. It also includes instructions on how to report the "spoof" and what to do in order to protect the individual's computer and account.

Both Pitner and the Citibank website urge persons receiving the suspi-

cious e-mail not to click on the link embedded in the message. It may take the person to a site where account and identity information is asked for, and it may also install computer viruses or other harmful or invasive items on the person's computer.

"Don't call any phone numbers or click on any links" in suspicious e-mails, Pitner said. Persons who call the numbers listed in these e-mails may wind up with a very expensive telephone bill, he said.

"It's really about the water," Phillips said. "Not the land."

Lewis said that he believed everything the state had advised concerning the dissolution of the PEDC called for selling the property and applying the money from the sale to debts the PEDC still owes.

In ancient Norse mythology, the beloved hero Balder was killed at a banquet when Loki, the Norse god of evil, crashed the banquet attended by 12, bringing the group total to 13.

year 1306, when King Philip of France had all the Knights Templar burned at the stake.

dangerous. Officials dealt with that threat by forcing cheaters to pay to erect bronze statues of Zeus on pillars engraved with their names, specific infringements and the fines they had to pay. Almost 23 feet of silt covered the sites here until they were excavated beginning in 1876. and the pillars in that hall of shame are once again visible.

Much else will be visible this month, as new names come to the tips of our tongues, only to be forgotten next month. Is it consolation or threat that, despite all our technological advances, the Olympics are

still the same old story, a fight for love and glory? The games do help us to recognize our human nature, for the fundamental things still apply, as time goes by.





Gymnastics search for the perfect 10

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — One of Nadia Comaneci's Background perfect 10s at the Montreal Olympics wasn't — well perfect.

The Code of Points is nothing new, but it is much more detailed than it was in the past, and calls for two or three "bonus" moves in each event simply to get to a routine that could be eligible for a 10. In the past, gymnasts used to strive for a perfect 10, they still do.


