

Is baseball still the game it once was

Baseball is held to a higher standard than any other professional sport in America. Baseball is part of the American fabric. Baseball is that one special tradition that is handed down to your children for them to carry on. These and comments like them were made, and will continue to be made today by the media and others as they observe the 10th anniversary of the Major League Baseball strike of 1994.

Since the strike, many fans have refused to return to the game while others feel the game was made stronger by the strike.

Where do you fall? As I listen to the debate,

I can't help wonder if baseball is really the icon of childhood sport dreams that it obviously once was. Do kids today really hope to one day grow up and play big league ball? If so, shouldn't interest, if not attendance at the high school level be more than what it is today? It's interesting to watch the Little League World Series, currently taking place, and see the number of parents and fans that support the pint-size players. Yet, take a look at high school attendance. It seems to wane. So too minor league attendance. In the past couple years, the Amarillo Dillas, struggling or not, only seem to manage little more than 1,300 fans at home. The only time that number seems to grow is if The Chicken is on hand. By contrast, the new football team, the Amarillo Dusters, draws around 3,000. Route 66 Motor Speedway entertains roughly 3,000 or more every Saturday night.

Baseball is held to a higher standard than any other professional sport in America. I cannot bring myself to believe that statement, made by journalist and baseball aficionado George Will during the Mike & Mike show on ESPN just this morning. If

this is true, why is it I have never received anything from a professional, college, minor league or even high school concerning their team, its schedule, players, hopes, dreams...anything? The only thing I have seen with frequency are results from little league teams. However, in the past two weeks alone, I have received books from Texas A&M, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State

and others. Magazines from statisticians and record keepers. I bet I have 40 pounds worth of reading and research material on my desk for the upcoming college and professional football season. These are thick, well put togeth-

er, laminated books.

There is a change on the sporting horizon. The pool from which talent is drawn for any sport is far different than it was in 1994. All one needs to do is watch an X Games event. This is where your player and fan of tomorrow is coming from. I think football and basketball have overtaken baseball as a desired sport to either participate in or watch. They are fast-paced for the most part. They are certainly physical. Baseball is interesting in September and October for many people because by then you have eliminated the pretenders and narrowed the field down to those teams that should offer up good, heated competition.

Is baseball still the sport it was even ten short years ago? Not at all. No sport is. However, while others are adjusting to the changing times, it appears baseball, or at least many fans of the game, continue to hold on to the notion that their sport's nostalgia is enough to maintain interest. Again, I would suggest a visit to a high school or minor league game might tell you other-

And unless it changes soon, baseball's fan base will start to die off, literally.

Griffey Jr. tears hamstring

CINCINNATI (AP) — Ken Griffey Jr.'s season-ending injury hit Barry Larkin hard.

"He's my buddy. I hate to see it happen to him, both personally and professionally," Larkin said Wednesday.

"He was doing well. He seemed to be getting his stroke back. And he was happy again. In years past, I don't think he had as much fun as this year."

Griffey will miss the rest of the season because of a torn right hamstring, the latest setback in a long line of injuries for Cincinnati's All-Star outfielder.

Team medical director Dr. Timothy Kremchek said an MRI exam showed Griffey ruptured his right hamstring last week in San Francisco. He will have surgery Monday

Griffey, who hit his 500th career home run earlier this season, could be fully recovered in time for spring training, Kremchek

The Reds said Griffey was hurt while making a sliding catch in right field. He had moved over from his usual spot in center field for the game, his first action in nearly four weeks since tearing his hamstring in Milwaukee:

"He had a complete rupture of the hamstring off the bone," Kremchek said. "He knew it wasn't right, and that's why he hadn't really played since he injured it in San Francisco.

Adams stands out for Cowboys

OXNARD, Calif. (AP) — Flozell Adams is an imposing figure, standing a head above the crowd even as massive lines of bodies collide after the ball is snapped.

During another practice drill, the Dallas Cowboys' 6-foot-7, 345-pound left tackle frustrates defensive end Eric Ogbogu in his futile attempt to get even a hand on the quarterback.

"Hotel Flozell" is the largest Dallas player and an almost impenetrable force. And of the NFL's best players, more than just the first-time Pro Bowl starter he was last season, when he allowed just one sack.





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In new chaos, angry Palestinians occupy Gaza office

RAFAH, Gaza Strip (AP) Dozens of Palestinians, some of them armed, occupied local government offices in a Gaza refugee camp Thursday, demanding assistance after a series of home demolitions by the Israeli army.

No injuries were reported, but the standoff was the latest sign of growing lawlessness in the Gaza Strip ahead of Israel's planned withdrawal from the area next year.

testers' homes destroyed by Israeli troops about a week ago. "Our houses have been

demolished. We have no homes, no beds, no clothes and nobody from the Palestinian Authority comes to see us," he said.

The group demanded that the Palestinian Authority rebuild their homes or give them compensation. The governor was not in the office at the time and could not be reached for comment. Employees said they believed he was on vacation in Egypt.

Shaat said Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat telephoned Thursday morning and promised to send an envoy to hear the demonstrators' grievances, but he insisted they leave the govforces, severely weakened ernment building. Shaat

> said the protesters would stay until they met with Arafat's envoy.

Israel frequently operates in Rafah, which is the on border with Egypt, searching for cross-

border tunnels used by weapons smugglers. On Thursday, an Israeli soldier was critically wounded in the head by a Palestinian sniper in Rafah, the army said.

Since the latest wave of violence started September 2000, Israel has destroyed hundreds of homes in Rafah, leaving more than 10,000 people homeless. Israel says the buildings are used for cover by militants.

Israeli troops demolished eight homes in Rafah the militant Al Aqsa overnight, five of which were inhabited, Palestinian residents said.

Amira Ayyash, a 51-yearold mother of six, said she fled to a relative's house overnight when she heard Israeli bulldozers operating near her home in the strip.

"Today we came to see what happened to our house, and we found it in rubble," she said as her children cried in the background.

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Afghan volunteers fight uphill battle against opium

JALALABAD, Afghanistan (AP) — They are the fighters in Afghanistan's new drug war - a small team of specially trained Afghan warriors working with British advisers to attack opium smuggling, which has flourished anew since the fall of the Taliban.

Everyone from visiting U.S. Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld to the United Nations says they face a very uphill battle, with opium production expected to reach a record high this year.

Rumsfeld and Gen. Richard Myers, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, reviewed about 20 members of the unit Wednesday at a U.S. base in Jalalabad. At a news conference later in Kabul, Rumsfeld spoke of the importance of addressing the drug trade.

"It is a very dangerous thing," he said. "To deal with it will require close cooperation among the government of Afghanistan and the international community and certainly the United States."

The Jalalabad unit's commander, Ahmad Khalid; says the group's first operation took out a drug lab guarded by 15 armed men. He said they have eliminated 18

more labs.

Neither Khalid nor the unit's adviser, a British army major who requested anonymity, would say how large the unit is.

Asked what motivates his team, Khalid spoke of "human feelings" that trump greed, including hatred of a drug trade that enriches criminals and warlords.

Khalid said he hasn't had a man desert, even though they could expect to do exceedingly well in the narcotics trade.

"They are ready to confront drug dealers," he said. They are all volunteers.
