Former soldier gets 60 years for murder

BELTON. (AP) - Aformer Fort Hood soldier has been sentenced to 60 vears in prison after being found guilty in the death of his wife, who was strangled, drowned, stabbed and cut in their Killeen apartment in 2001.

Edmond Demond Waites, 22, who was sentenced Tuesday, will be eligible for parole after serving half of his sentence. He was found guilty Friday by the same jury, the Killeen Daily Herald reports in its Wednesday editions.

Records show that Waites had called 911, confessing to "killing my wife," and asked the dispatcher to send police to "pick him up." Killeen police Det. Karl Ortiz said that the of body of Terri Waites was found in the doorway of the couple's Killeen apartment on the evening of Oct. 21, 2001, with a plastic trash bag around her head and feet.

PJH mascot: Green Team Divided board nixes Harvesters

Pampa Independent School District's Board of Education passed the 2004 tax rate and 2004-2005 budget after receiving no response from the community during a public hearing Tuesday evening.

Choosing Pampa Junior High School's mascot, however, drew numerous comments from students, educators, board members and administrators.

The board unanimously voted for a 2004 tax rate of \$1.556 per \$100 valuation and approved the 2004-2005 budget for \$20,422,494 in revenues and \$20,172,494 in expenditures leaving a surplus of \$250,000. The surplus will

be applied to a reserve fund required by the Texas Education Agency, school officials say.

After all was said and done, a divided board voted to name the PJH mascot "Green Team." Board members Greg Brown and Charles Smith voted against the decision. "Green Team" was the second choice of the junior high staff and students for a mascot name.

Texas shows disunity at national convention

NEW YORK (AP) Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison took a rare swipe at Texas Gov. Rick Perry on Tuesday, saying he was "trigger happy" for lambasting her for telling a reporter the state had failed to do enough to provide health insurance for more children.

Hutchison said in a television news talk show interview Sunday that Texas has left hundreds of millions in federal funds in Washington that could have been used to provide health insurance for children in families too poor to buy private coverage and too well off to get Medicaid.

Hutchison's comments in the interview with Weslaco's Valley Newsline led Perry's office to accuse the senator of attacking President Bush's record while he was governor.

Kathy Walt, Perry's spokeswoman, said in a statement to Valley Newsline that Bush was in office when the Children's Health Insurance Program was created and some money went unspent. Hutchison said Texas could have provided matching funds needed to get federal dollars made available during Perry's term.





A&M re-evaluates interest in nuke lab

COLLEGE STATION (AP) The Texas A&M University System's interest in managing the Los Alamos National Laboratory is being re-evaluated after defense contractor Lockheed Martin Corp. backed out, a school official said.


Lee Peddicord, vice chancellor for research and federal relations for A&M, said the exit by Lockheed Martin could mean managing the troubled lab could prove challenging. He said it is unclear if the system will bid on the \$2.2 billion annual contract in the coming months.

"It's a clear message that one needs to think carefully about this," he said. "I wouldn't say we've lost interest, but it has made us more deliberate in our approach."

The lab, which has been managed by the University of California since World War II, is the nation's largest. It was established to build the first atomic bomb during the Manhattan Project.



"In essence, war has been declared on us, where the enemy is unseen and there is no front," Russian Defense Minister Sergei Ivanov said.

President Vladimir Putin interrupted his working holiday Wednesday in the Black Sea resort of Sochi for a second time and returned to the capital. On arrival at the airport, he held an immediate meeting with the heads of

Russia's Interior Ministry and Federal Security Service, the Interfax news agency said. The standoff began after a ceremony marking the first day of the Russian school year, when it was likely that many parents had accompa-

nied their children. About 17 militants, men and women, stormed the three-story building and herded captives into the gymnasium. They forced children to stand at the windows and warned they would blow up the school if police intervened, said Alexei police Polyansky, a spokesman for southern Russia.

"I was standing near the gates, music was playing, when I saw three armed peo-

Dzgoyev said a girl was also lying near the building, presumably wounded, but officials said the area could not be approached because it was coming under fire.







Philadelphia joins list of cities mulling wireless Internet for all

officials believe they can turn all 135 square miles of Philadelphia into the world's largest wireless Internet hot spot.

The ambitious plan, now in the works, would involve placing hundreds, or maybe thousands of small transmitters around the city - probably atop lampposts.

Each would be capable of communicating with the wireless networking cards that now come standard with many computers.

Once complete, the network would deliver broadband Internet almost anywhere radio waves can travel - including poor neighborhoods where high-speed Internet access is now rare.

And the city would likely offer the service either for free, or at costs far lower than the \$35 to \$60 a month charged by

PHILADI LPHIA (AP) — For about \$10 million, city commercial providers, said the city's chief information officer, Dianah Neff.

> "If you're out on your front porch with a laptop, you could dial in, register at no charge, and be able to access a high speed connection," Neff said. "It's a technology whose time is here."

If the plan becomes a reality, Philadelphia could leap to the forefront of a growing number of cities that have contemplated offering wireless Internet service to residents, workers and guests.

Chaska, Minn., a suburb of Minneapolis, began offering citywide wireless Internet access this year for \$16 a month. The signal covers about 13 square miles.

Corpus Christi, Texas, has been experimenting with a system covering 20 square miles that would be used (for now) only by government employees.

Expert: Laci's scent caught by dog at marina

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. Costa County Search and (AP) — Prosecutors are trying to prove Scott Peterson took his wife's body by truck to a marina, where they say he ferried her out onto San Francisco Bay and dumped her weighted body.

A search dog handler testified Tuesday that her canine picked up Laci Peterson's scent at the marina where her husband launched what he says was a solo fishing trip the day his wife vanished.

Rescue team, said the Labrador named Trimble came to the Berkeley Marina on Dec. 28, 2002, four days after Peterson reported his pregnant wife missing.

Anderson said Trimble found Laci's scent and followed it from the parking area, along a tree line and down a pier, where the dog stopped at a pylon at the water's edge.

The dog then "stopped, checked out over the water. Eloise Anderson, a dog the wind was coming into

Prosecutors allege Peterson killed his wife in their Modesto home on or around Dec. 24, 2002, then drove to the marina and dumped her body in San Francisco Bay. Her remains and those of the couple's fetus washed ashore in April 2003, not far from where Peterson launched his fishing trip.

Defense lawyers contend someone else abducted and killed Laci, then framed their client after learning his

Judge Alfred A. Delucchi ruled during pretrial hearings that jurors would hear some, but not all, details gathered by the scent-sniffing police dogs.

Calling the details "iffy, at best," Delucchi in March tossed out prosecution claims that other dogs had detected a broken trail of Laci Peterson's scents leading from the Petersons' home to the warehouse where Scott Peterson kept his boat and along the boat's rim.

Protestors stage sit-in against church closings

WEYMOUTH, Mass. (AP) — John Hammel is spending his summer vacation in church.

The 55-year-old has been home just three times in as many days and has spent much of the rest of his time praying, eating and sleeping at St. Albert the Great church, where he has been a parishioner for almost 30 years.

Hammel, with help from fellow parishioners, is staging a sit-in prayer vigil, hoping to save the church from being closed as part of a massive reconfiguration by the Roman Catholic Boston Archdiocese.

"If the bank was trying to come take my home, I wouldn't walk away from it. I'd do everything in my power to keep it," Hammel said. "Well, this is my spiritual home, and I'm not going to let it go."

Although the archdiocese had planned to close St. Albert's at noon Wednesday, officials have decided to hold off to avoid a confrontation with the parishioners who have stationed themselves there.

"We don't have any plan right now other than to be patient," said the Rev. Christopher Coyne, a spokesman for Archbishop Sean O'Malley. "We're certainly not going to do anything to escalate the situation. As time goes on, we hope to reach a resolution."

After the last Mass was celebrated at the church Sunday evening, Hammel and a determined group of about 10 parishioners stayed put. They remained overnight, and since then, others have come by to help.

Signup sheets at the back of the church are filled with the names of more than 200 who have offered to do shifts during the occupation. A hearty few have offered to spend the night, and many others have offered to spend two, three or four hours at a time.

At lunchtime on Tuesday, more than two dozen were gathered in the church. Some prayed, some ranted about the closing and still others wanted to share stories about their church.
