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## Officers investigate man's stabbing

*Police arrest woman suspect; victim transferred to Amarillo hospital*

A Pampa woman remained in Gray County Jail this morning in lieu of \$7,500 bond on a charge of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

Jamie Smith, aka Jamie Crossman, 35, 1105

Starkweather, was arrested by Gray County Sheriff's Deputy Chad Brooks at about 11:09 p.m., Thursday, after a man entered the lobby of the sheriff's office and said he had been stabbed.

"He had what appeared to be cuts to both arms, and appeared to have a puncture wound to the left side of the

torso," said Chief Deputy Kelly Rushing.

Deputies placed the victim, Jerry Don Little, 41, 1105 N. Duncan, in a sheriff's car and took him to Pampa Regional Medical Center, Rushing said. He was later transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo at about 12:30 a.m.

to 1 a.m. today, Rushing said. His current condition is unknown as of press time today.

"He said he'd been in an argument with Jamie Smith, aka Jamie Crossman, in the area of Somerville and Buckler," Rushing said. Little had walked to the sheriff's office from that

location, he said.

"We don't know the cause of the argument. We're not sure what prompted it," Rushing said.

Pampa Police Officer Casey Ingersoll found Smith a short time later.

She was walking in the

### Texas Today

#### FAA tried to suspend license before crash

**OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)** — The Federal Aviation Administration was trying to suspend the license of a pilot when the man died in a plane crash with five other Oklahomans near Austin, Texas, a published report says.

Federal regulations allowed Richard Allen Fisher to continue flying while he was appealing the FAA order, FAA spokesman John Clabes told The Oklahoman.

"Our records indicate that we filed an order suspending his pilots certificate for 240 days. He appealed this order to the National Transportation and Safety Board, and we were awaiting a hearing date with that board," Clabes said.

Fisher was piloting a twin-engine Aerostar PA-60-601P when it crashed into a luxury home in Lakeway, Texas, Aug. 3.

Also killed were Jason Kyle Jones, 34, Arcadia; Edmond residents Curtis and Jennifer Treadwell, both 32; the Treadwells' 3-year-old son, Patrick, and their 2-year-old daughter, Hunter. Three people in the house escaped injury.

#### Campus voting site denied by county

**HEMPSTEAD (AP)** — Waller County commissioners have denied the designation of a central campus voting site at Prairie View A&M University, rekindling a dispute about student voting there.

The 3-to-2 vote Thursday surprised minority leaders who thought county Judge Owen Ralston, a white Republican, would be willing to join with the court's two Democrats, both black, to approve the voting location on the historically black campus.

The Commissioners Court recently approved the use of the county's community center at the south edge of the campus to serve as the lone polling place for both the university and the small town that adjoins it.

Proponents of the central campus site said the community building — five minutes by foot from the center of campus — is inconvenient and intimidating to student voters.

## Drink & drive, go to jail

Texas Department of Public Safety, Gray County Sheriff's Office and Pampa Police Department are participating in a nationwide Labor Day holiday campaign titled "Drink, Drive, Go to Jail."

"All available deputies will be out to ensure motor vehicle safety by monitoring drinking and driving, and seat belt use," said Sheriff Don Copeland.

"We plan to have extra officers on patrol today, Saturday, Sunday and Monday," said Police Chief Trelyn Pitner.

"We're trying to send a strong message that drinking and driving will not be tolerated," Pitner said.

In 2002, there were 17,419 deaths in alcohol-related accidents nationwide, or 41 percent of all accident fatalities for that year, Pitner said.

"That averages one in every 30 minutes," he said.

## Bush hits campaign trail

**NEW YORK (AP)** — President Bush returned to the campaign trail Friday, echoing the themes from the just-ended Republican convention, pledge to grow the economy, shrink government and protect America from another terrorist attack.

After four days of sharp attacks on Democratic presidential nominee John Kerry, the Bush campaign hoped for a post-convention bounce and scheduled rallies in three states the president lost four years ago

Pennsylvania, Wisconsin and Iowa.

At a morning appearance in the Scranton area, Bush said the country needs continuity as it wages a war on terrorists.

"If America shows uncertainty and weakness in this decade the world will drift toward tragedy," he said. "This will not happen on my watch."

Elvis, and the Chapel Choir will entertain with gospel songs.

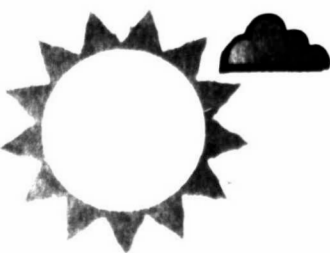

### Man found guilty in cattle deaths

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — One of two men accused in the killing of 12 cattle in July 2003 in North Texas has been convicted and sentenced to jail.

Brian Douglas Barnstein, 33, of Watauga, was convicted Wednesday in Hood County court in Granbury of criminal mischief over \$1,500 and under \$20,000 and was sentenced to 180 days in jail and a \$1,500 fine. It was the first of several pending cases against him.

He was released Thursday from Hood County jail on a \$25,000 appeal bond, Hood County District Attorney Robert Christian said.

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# Young held in shooting

A Borger man is in Gray County Jail on a grand jury indictment for manslaughter, enhanced, in the death of Tracy Williams of Pampa.

Jimmy Gawan Young, 23, was transported yesterday by Gray County Deputy Morse Burroughs from a Texas Department of Criminal Justice facility to Gray County Jail. He remained in jail as of press time today in lieu of \$25,000 bond on the first-degree felony charge.

Pampa police officers were dispatched to 1040 S. Huff Road at about 6 p.m. Thursday, April 3, 2003 on a call that a person had suffered a gunshot wound.

Tracy Rena Williams, 32, 1140 Varnon Dr., was found lying in the driveway of the Huff Road residence, police said at the time.

Williams was transported by ambulance to Pampa Regional Medical Center's emergency room, where she was pronounced dead.

a telephone interview today.

"Every two weeks, I find out how much, to the penny, we're going to owe to payroll, and move the funds from the general fund," he said.

The internal audit report had been on the commissioners' agenda each meeting beginning with the July 15 meeting. Morris had asked that action on the report be deferred due to her workload in preparing the county's 2004-2005 budget.

Morris also said that the accounting firm of Doshier, Pickens & Francis PC had been contracted to assist in the implementation of

GASB #34.

"They will be consulting with us prior to the audit for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30," Morris said.

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) has instituted changes, under the heading of #34, in how state and local governments report financial information.

"It requires the county to start keeping an inventory," Cornelison said. Value and depreciation of all county property must also be recorded and reported, he said.

In other action, commissioners voted to enter into an interlocal agreement with Panhandle Regional Planning Commission for services related to adoption of official county road maps. The official maps are

required by state House Bill 1117, Gray County Judge Richard Peet said.

"Every county has to do it," he said of the maps.

In the Aug. 16 regular meeting, commissioners were told by PRPC representative Greg Green that Gray County would be charged \$700 for the maps. The maps, by precinct, include one linear and one aerial view.

Property tax payers in the county will receive a letter in their tax notices, Peet said, notifying them of a public hearing scheduled for 1:30 p.m., May 2, 2005, concerning any and all county road changes. This will be the public's chance to speak about any concerns they may have concerning designation of county roads.

Two representatives of

Cabot Corporation addressed commissioners Wednesday concerning fire department coverage of Cabot. Peet said the two "asked to stay with city coverage by Pampa Fire Department, with Hoover Volunteer Fire Department as backup. We're not cutting them out of city coverage," Peet said.

Action was deferred on sheriff's and constables' fees for 2005, Peet said.

Clarifications were made to the Employee Policy Manual regarding budgeted items.

showed the nation's jobless rate dipping slightly to 5.4 percent as the economy added 144,000 jobs in August, slightly less than economists were forecasting but still the biggest gain since May.

Bush and Kerry had dramatically different takes on the numbers. Bush said they showed his economic policies are working while Kerry said the figures mean Bush remains on pace to be the first president since the Great Depression to have no net gain in jobs during his term.

Other "presidents have faced wars and recessions, but not one of them has failed to create a single job," Kerry said.

In a statement released ahead of an appearance in Newark, Ohio, Kerry said "we can create jobs again, get health care costs under control, and make ourselves independent of Mideast oil, but George Bush's policies won't get us there. And I believe we can be more respected in the world but it won't happen with George Bush's go-it-alone foreign policy."

At the GOP convention, Bush stood a few miles from where two hijacked planes destroyed the World Trade Center on Sept. 11, 2001, to make a nationally broadcast appeal to Americans for another term.

"In the last four years, you and I have come to know each other. Even when we don't agree, at least you know what I believe and where I stand," he said.

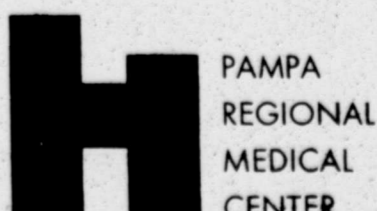

### City relies on complacency

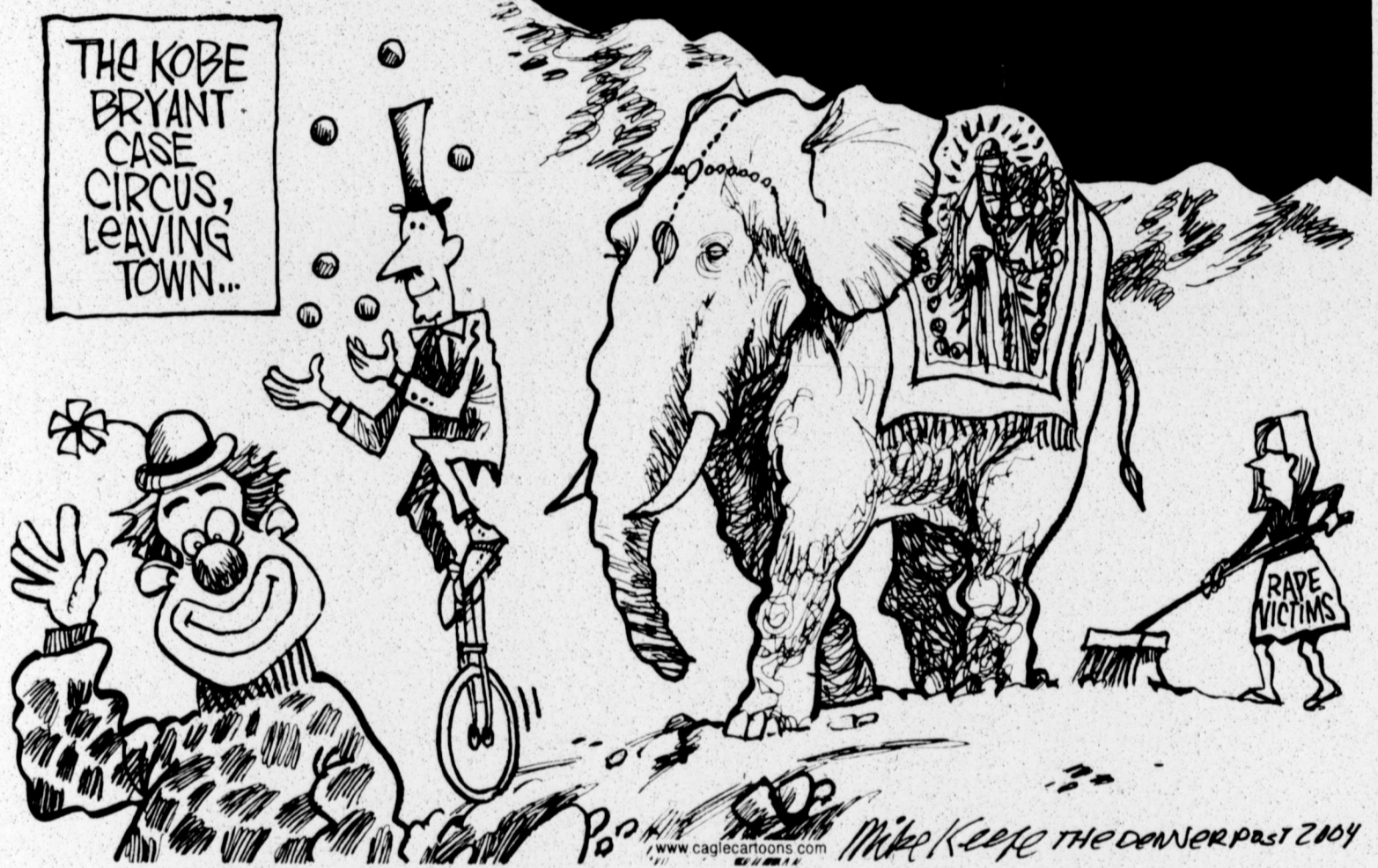
To the Editor:  
The taxpayers of Pampa have been paying approximately \$50,000 per month for about three years to close down the Pampa Economic Development Corporation (PEDC) that was voted out by the majority of voters in the city. Instead of holding an auction to sell the assets to the highest bidder, the dissolution board has sold most of the assets for pennies on the dollar of their value under the guidance of the commissioners, mayor and city attorney. The most valuable asset is the section of land

east of town known as Section 53. The city refused to allow the dissolution board to sell the land. The Attorney General's Opinion states that the land is to be sold and the proceeds applied to the debt of the PEDC to relieve the taxpayers of the tax burden.

Instead of filing a criminal complaint against the city for impeding the dissolution of the PEDC, the dissolution board chose to go along with the city at the taxpayer's expense.

When I spoke with the Attorney General's office, I was told that the state will not intervene on behalf of the citizens and enforce the rules for dissolution unless

## Politicians profaning the pulpit

## War on terror can't be conventional

The Dallas Morning News on Bush's "war without end":

The war against terror won't be won in any traditional sense, and President Bush was right to say so (Aug. 30) in his interview with NBC's Matt Lauer. Unlike previous wars, this one has no sovereign enemies to vanquish, no fronts to pierce and defend.

The threat is essentially permanent. Americans need to grasp that truth so that they may fully mobilize against it.

As Stephen Flynn of the Council on Foreign Relations writes in "America the Vulnerable," "The means to conduct ter-

rorist acts are too cheap, too available and too tempting ever to be completely eradicated.

Terrorism is a threat that we must constantly combat if we are to reduce it to manageable levels so that we can live normal lives free of fear."

Mr. Bush should consider taking another step: frame the threat in a way other than a war against terror. You don't war against a tactic.

As Walter Russell Mead, also of the Council on Foreign Relations, points out

in Power, Terror, Peace and War: America's Grand Strategy in a World at Risk, the term is "clumsy and misleading" because it ignores that Islamic militants are the only people "with both the will and the means to attack the United States on a 1/8a catastrophic 3/8 scale."

It's understandable that Mr. Bush is vague. He doesn't want anyone to mistake that the United States considers itself at war with Islam as a whole.

But he's already taken great and effective pains to

emphasize that. Furthermore, the 9-11 commission, in its recent report, rightly concluded that evoking "terrorism" as if the enemy were "some generic evil" "blurs the strategy."

As the commission states, "The catastrophic threat at this moment in history is more specific.

It is the threat posed by Islamist terrorism especially the al-Qaeda network, its affiliates and its ideology."

Just as Mr. Bush served Americans by educating them about the permanence of the threat, so should he unabashedly show the enemy's face.

The enemy isn't Islam but a perversion of the same.

18 as "Together We Prepare Day," she said.

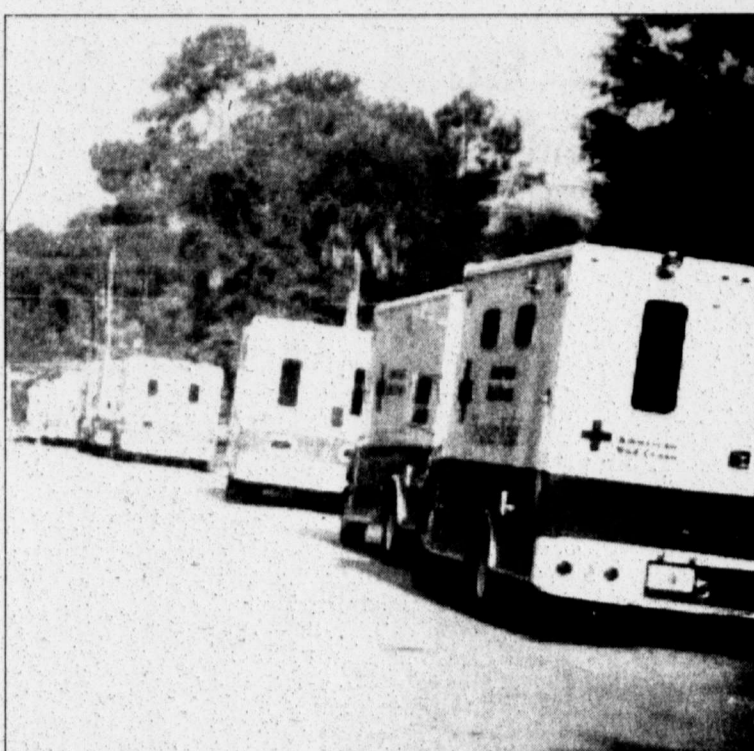

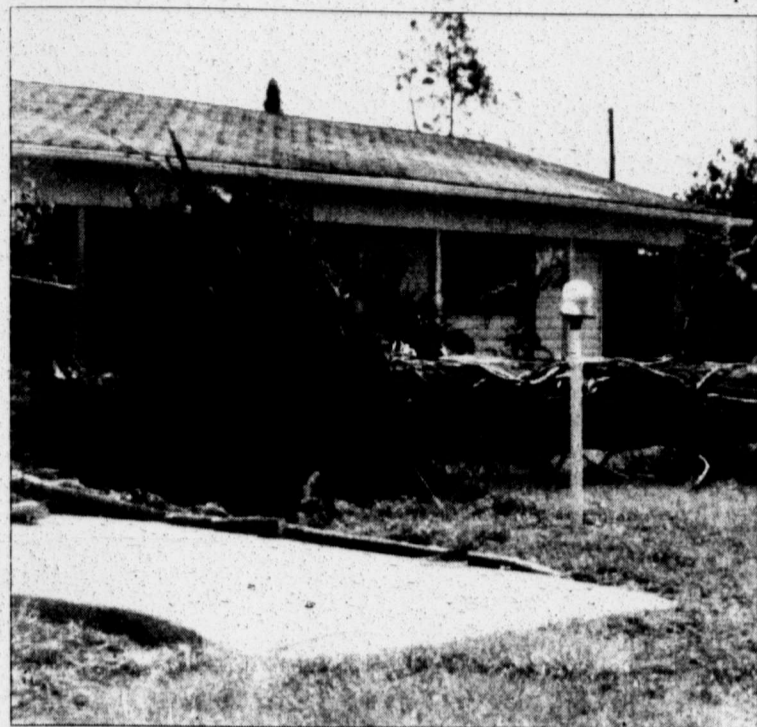
"With Hurricane Charley gone but the destruction still remaining it is fast becoming the most expensive in our nation's history," said Gregory.

The Rev. ## Seventeen magazine, girls' fashion bible, gets religion

NEW YORK (AP) — Faiza worships five times a day, while Rhianna is as likely to believe in God as in the Easter Bunny. Kristin prays too, but to the God and the Goddess.

This teenage religion debate can be found on the pages of a magazine better known for explaining how to match lipstick to blush — not exploring the concept of a higher power.

But under editor-in-chief Atoosa Rubenstein, the venerable girls' publication Seventeen has added a faith section that includes inspirational messages, personal stories of spiritual struggle and testimonials on issues ranging from prayer to gay teens who attend church.

The content is serious. Verses from the New Testament are printed beside sayings from the Prophet Muhammad. The teachings of Pope John Paul II and the Dalai Lama are also featured.

Rubenstein said she started the section not to spread a religious message, but to provide a forum on an issue she believes is important to this generation of girls.

"I feel, and had sensed that my readers felt, that there was an entire magazine that wasn't speaking to a part of them," Rubenstein said. "I just noticed more and more our readers were talking about their faith."

Experts on religion and youth trends agree. They theorize that teens are rebelling against the broad, undefined spirituality of their baby-boomer parents, and are seeking out environments — like those in church — with clearer rules that help them cope with day-to-day problems.

In a recent study by Teenage Research Unlimited, a market research firm in Northbrook, Ill., 58 percent of teens ranked faith as among the most important parts of their life, said Michael Wood, the company's vice president. Still, he knew of no other teen fashion magazine with a religion section.

Rubenstein, who was the founding editor of CosmoGirl!, said she first proposed a faith section several years ago when she was just starting out in magazine publishing. The response from the other editors, she said, was that a fashion magazine was no place for God.

A year ago, she took over at Seventeen with a mandate to revamp the publication and she revived the religion idea. For guidance, she formed an interfaith advisory board that includes an evangelical Christian preacher, a priest from the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of New York, a Reform Jewish rabbi, a Buddhist teacher, an Episcopal youth minister and two Muslims.

The only nationally known member is Irshad Manji, author of "The Trouble with Islam: A Muslim's Call for Reform in her Faith," who has won several awards for her popular book, but has also become a target for criticism by some conservative Muslim leaders.

Rubenstein, whose mostly beige office is punctuated with bright pink chairs and zebra pillows, said she considers herself spiritual. She was raised Muslim, the daughter of Iranian immigrants, and said she prays for help and

inspiration in difficult times.

"It's a part of my life that is important," she said. "Yes, I'm into fashion. Yes, I'm into makeup, but at the same time my faith is very important to me."

The section debuted in August, and Rubenstein said the reader response has been mostly positive so far, with a few of the more religious readers complaining about some testimonials from skeptics. In the first issue, the section came just after a detailed article on contraception, which Rubenstein called "a very modern and realistic" presentation.

A companion Web site, [seventeen.com/reallife/bigquestion](http://seventeen.com/reallife/bigquestion), lets teens post comments on whether they pray. More than 1,800 people have responded so far.

Wood said the broad approach fits with the direction of Seventeen. While other teen fashion magazines have a niche, Seventeen wants to appeal to all girls, he said. The August edition had articles on the presidential election, health and facing hardships, along with fashion advice.

"It's not necessarily taking a strong position but raising lots of questions that girls are probably wrestling with themselves and sharing different points of view," Wood said. "I think it plays well into this whole theme of diversity."

But the Rev. Christopher Robinson, a DePaul University professor who researches religion in the media, said the section was less interesting than some other pop-culture treatment of faith, such as the hit CBS show "Joan of Arcadia," about a teenage girl who talks to a God who takes the form of random people.

"My impression is it gives you a nice feeling to ask these questions, but it makes no demands on you at all," Robinson said of the magazine.

## New quarterbacks ready for Big 12 debuts

DALLAS (AP) — Rashaun Woods is gone, but Oklahoma State still has the record-setting receiver's two younger brothers: D'Juan, the team's top returning receiver, and Donovan, the new starting quarterback.

Donovan Woods, a redshirt freshman replacing Josh Fields, gets his first Cowboys start Saturday at UCLA.

"I think his development is really good," Cowboys coach Les Miles said. "He's got character. He will play competitively and he will want to make the play. It will be exciting for all of us to see how he plays."

Kansas State, Nebraska, Texas Tech, Kansas and Baylor also will have new starting quarterbacks when the Big 12 season gets started this weekend.

Texas A&M got a head start on the rest of the conference. The Aggies lost their season opener 41-21 Thursday night at No. 20 Utah.

No. 2 Oklahoma, still with Heisman Trophy winner Jason White at quarterback, plays Bowling Green in its opener. Brad Smith, who missed by 23 passing yards becoming the first NCAA quarterback to throw for 2,000 yards and rush for 1,000 in a season, begins his junior year in No. 18 Missouri's game against Arkansas State.

Sophomore Vince Young, pulled from the second half of Texas' loss in the Holiday Bowl after leading Texas to six straight wins, is back as the No. 7 Longhorns' starter against North Texas.

Defending Big 12 champion Kansas State takes the first step without Eli Roberson, with Dylan Meier taking over at quarterback. Coach Bill Snyder, whose No. 12 Wildcats open against Western Kentucky, doesn't anticipate big offensive changes.

"We'll see as we get into games if there is necessity to do that," Snyder said. "But there has been no indication we'll

alter our offense from what it has been."

In other Big 12 openers, Nebraska begins the Bill Callahan era against Western Illinois, coach Dan McCarney begins his 10th season at Iowa State against Northern Iowa, Texas Tech goes to SMU, Baylor plays at Alabama-Birmingham. Colorado is home against Colorado State, and Kansas hosts Tulsa.

Oklahoma State, which has won 16 of its last 20 games, is on the road to start the season for the fifth straight year. D'Juan Woods had 31 catches for 479 yards and a touchdown last season; Donovan Woods is the sixth freshman quarterback for the Cowboys since 1986.

The Sooners have won all 16 September games for Bob Stoops. They open the coach's sixth season against Bowling Green, coming off an 11-win season that including two wins over Big Ten teams.

"Like everybody, we're just anxious to get back on the field and look at somebody different than ourselves," Stoops said. "We recognize it as a big challenge right off the bat to be ready to play. We're aware of their potential."

Not only does Nebraska have a new coach, the Cornhuskers have a new offense and quarterback. Sophomore Joe Dailey will lead the pass-intensive West Coast offense that replaces the long-used deliberate, power running game.

Nebraska will be without All-Big 12 center Richie Incognito, suspended indefinitely by Callahan for repeated violations of team policy.

At Texas Tech, senior quarterback Sonny Cumbie gets his chance in coach Mike Leach's high-octane passing offense. B.J. Symons threw for 449 yards per game and 52 touchdowns last season.

## Texas A&M falls to #20 Utah, 41-21

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Alex Smith threw for three touchdowns, rushed for two more and finished with 435 yards of offense, and No. 20 Utah backed up its first preseason ranking with a 41-21 win over Texas A&M on Thursday night.

Smith threw for a personal-best 359 yards in the opener for both teams, in a game that had the look of a Utah rout from early-on.

The Utes led 7-0 barely a minute into the game and celebrated "Utah Day" — as Thursday was dubbed by

local officials — by avenging their only non-conference loss of last season.

Smith had trouble with his accuracy early, but adjusted and completed 21 of 29 passes and topped his 340-yard passing performance last year against Oregon. He also ran 13 times for 76 yards.

The Aggies, who last season lost their last three games and five of their last six, continued to struggle on defense. Utah finished with 582 yards of offense and scored five touchdowns

on defensive blunders in which the Utes were all but untouched on their way into the end zone.

A&M's Reggie McNeal ran for two touchdowns, including a 59-yarder late in the second quarter, but he struggled with his passing.

The Aggies used 14 freshman in their first season-opening loss in four years. The last time A&M opened with a loss was also the last time they started the season on the road, a 24-10 loss at Notre Dame in 2000.

## Cowboy starters unimpressive in win over Chiefs

IRVING, Texas (AP) — As much as Bill Parcells liked what his backups did, his starters left plenty to be desired in the Dallas Cowboys' preseason finale Thursday night.

Vinny Testaverde could've had as many interceptions as completions and Eddie George had more carries than yards. Then Tony Romo led the Cowboys on

three straight scoring drives and the defense made it hold up in the fourth quarter, giving Dallas a 24-20 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs.

Even in defeat, Chiefs coach Dick Vermeil had to feel good because his starters and their top backups performed well. It was the players lower on the depth chart who let Dallas (3-1) rally and failed to do

the same for Kansas City (1-3).

Trent Green completed 7-of-9 passes for 72 yards and a touchdown, then second-stringer Todd Collins went 5-for-5 for 104 yards with a 53-yard TD pass.

Pro Bowl safety Jerome Woods had an interception in his return from a hamstring injury and Lawrence Tynes continued his bid to

beat out Morten Andersen by making fourth-quarter field goals of 46 and 27 yards.

Kansas City's third-string quarterback Damon Huard played nearly the entire second half, but managed only the two field goals. A failure to convert third-and-4 from the 9 led to Tynes' second field goal.

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## Twins blank slumping Rangers

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Brad Radke had a season-high nine strikeouts in eight shutout innings to give the Minnesota Twins a three-game sweep of the Texas Rangers with a 2-0 victory Thursday night.

Radke (10-7) had the Rangers off balance all night, striking out the side in the fourth and retiring eight straight during one stretch. He allowed five hits and walked one in Minnesota's seventh shutout.

Joe Nathan threw a perfect ninth for his 37th save, completing the combined five-hitter as the Twins extended their lead in the AL Central to a season-high nine games.

Kenny Rogers (15-7) allowed just one run in six-plus innings, but Texas tied a season high with its fourth straight loss and fell 5 1/2 games behind Oakland in the West.

The Twins took a 1-0 lead in the fourth. Lew Ford led off with a single, Cristian Guzman walked and both moved up on Michael Cuddyer's sacri-

ifice. Rookie Terry Lincecum followed with an RBI groundout, giving him three RBIs in his first two big league games.

Frank Francisco's wild pitch in the eighth scored Guzman to make it 2-0.

Rogers allowed four hits, struck out three and tied a career high with seven walks. Rogers, who went 13-8 with Minnesota last season, made his first trip back to the Metrodome and received a warm ovation when he left in the seventh.

The Rangers haven't won in the Metrodome since July 13, 2002. Part of the reason may be bad luck — Hank Blalock hit a foulball off a speaker in the eighth that bounced back into play and was caught by Guzman for an out.

The Rangers had a great chance in the fifth when Kevin Mench and Gary Matthews Jr. led off with consecutive infield singles to put runners on the corners. But Radke struck out Gerald Laird, got Dave Dellucci to line out and Michael Young to fly out.

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


