Dallas may open site of Oswald shooting

DALLAS (AP) — The city may eventually make the site where Lee Harvey Oswald was shot to death in the basement of the former Dallas police headquarters open to the public.

In the famous photo taken of the shooting, the accused assassin President John F. Kennedy is seen buckling against a bullet fired by Dallas nightclub owner Jack Ruby. But the site has been closed to the public for decades.

With plans in the works to redevelop the old City Hall complex, visitors may be able to go to the gloomy basement sally port in two or three years. They also may be able to visit the fifth-floor jail cell where Oswald and later Ruby were held in 1963.

Assistant City Manager Ryan Evans said the city hopes to work with the Sixth Floor Museum which has exhibits and records related Kennedy's assassination to design exhibits for the basement and, hopefully, for the upstairs cell as well.

Mr. Hawkins was an avid ham radio oper-



in the Senate that's not very distinguished." Edwards, referring to Cheney's long record of public service, asserted: "One thing that's very clear is that a long resume does not equal good judgment. I mean, we've seen over and over and over the misjudgments made by this administration."

The Democrat also said that as a member of Congress representing Wyoming more than a decade ago, Cheney voted against Head Start and banning plastic guns that can escape detection in metal detectors.

Edwards quickly put Cheney on the defensive by suggesting the administration had botched Iraq and is still misleading the nation about the situation there.

"The American people don't need us to explain this to them. They see it on their tele-

vision every single day," Edwards said. The vice presidential debate helped set the stage for Friday's second debate between Bush and Kerry, a town-hall style meeting at Washington University in St. Louis.

As to what Bush has to do Friday night, Bush adviser Mary Matalin said the debates are "separate and equal events," but that Cheney had built on what Bush said on foreign policy in the first debate and that, "the president in his Friday debate will build upon what the vice president said tonight on the economy.'

She said Cheney's performance will make it easier for Bush. "We got the job done tonight," she said.

But Kerry strategist Tad Devine said the vice presidential debate makes the job harder for Bush, not easier. "Cheney needed to stop our momentum, and he didn't. Now Bush has

got to stop the momentum."

The debate between Cheney, an experienced debator, and Edwards, a freshman senator from North Carolina who made millions of dollars as a successful trial lawyer, encouraged give-and-take — and both gave and

"You're not credible on Iraq because of the enormous inconsistencies that John Kerry and you have cited time after time after time dufing the course of the campaign. Whatever the. political pressures of the moment requires, that's where you're at," Cheney said at one

Edwards responded: "What the vice president has just said is just a complete distortion.

The American people saw John Kerry on Thursday night. They don't need the vice president or the president to tell them what they saw."

On domestic issues, Edwards said more Americans are in poverty and living without health insurance than when the president took office in 2001.

But Cheney said that since the summer of 2003, jobs have been created again, and that a Kerry-Edwards administration would seek to raise taxes.

Cheney, whose daughter Mary is a lesbian, spoke supportively about gay relationships and said that "people ought to be free to choose any arrangement they want." As to Bush's support for a constitutional amendment to ban gay marriage, "He sets policy for this administration, and I support him," Cheney said.

Edwards said it was obvious that the Cheneys loved their daughter and that "you can't have anything but respect" for them. "I believe marriage is between a man and a woman and so does John Kerry," Edwards said. But, he added, "We should not use the Constitution to divide this country."

"Woody Guthrie and Pampa are important," he said. "He was one of the greatest song writers of all time, and he lived in our town. I think people need to know that."

Born and reared in Pampa, Paulson moved to Amarillo about four and a half years ago, when he was 18.

"I'm coming back to do this," Paulson said.

His parents still live in Pampa.

"I've seen what other music festivals have done," he said. "Music festivals can be great things. They can be great for the community. They can bring in a lot of people. They can benefit the community, the restaurants and everything

A lot music festivals don't have the historical connection to American music like Pampa has, Paulson said.

"I'm just trying to get the word out about Pampa and there's plenty of things there that can benefit them,' Paulson said.

He said he would like to make the

Reflections Festival an annual event. "That's the goal," Paulson said.

Despite the number of bands that Paulson has lined up, he said that this year is going to be on a smaller scale than he would like to see, but he thinks

"I'm real proud of the bands that are coming," he said.

There will be a variety of music during the two-day fes-

tival, Paulson said. "Everything from Texas Country, rock, alternative and folk." he said. "There are quite a few. Texas Country bands, actually. There are going to be some of the best Texas Country

that I've heard." Most of them, he said are going to be

bands and entertainers that have been influenced by Woody Guthrie's songwriting style.

Paulson will be performing a set Saturday night, but he will also team up with another solo act, Moses Morin, for

Morin, Paulson said, has a Spanish Flamenco and jazz background.

Paulson credits his father for getting

him interested in music.

"I got involved in music with my Dad," Paulson said.

His father, David Paulson, is a singer in their church, Paulson said.

"He got me singing really young, probably five or six," Paulson said. "When I was 17 I decided I was going to learn to play guitar."

There were others, Paulson said, who were instrumental in moving his musical career along.

"My first time to ever play in front of other people was in church," Paulson said. "The youth minister said, 'We need a worship leader. You can sing. Do you play a guitar?"

In the next six months, Paulson learned to play a guitar for the church's worship services.

From there his interest in music grew and expanded.

This weekend, Paulson's musical journey will take another step as the Reflections Festival gets under way at M.K. Brown Civic Auditorium. In the future, perhaps the weather will allow the outdoor event he originally envi-

So-called "527 groups," such as Swift Boat Veterans for Truth and MoveOn.org have been much in the news lately because of the millions of unregulated dollars in "soft money" they are spending to defeat, respectively, U.S. Sen. John Kerry and President Bush.

Although the Federal Election Commission has not set limits on how much money 527s can raise from individual donors, federal law at least does require that these groups disclose who funds their activities.

Another category of organizations spending big bucks to influence voters, however, is exempt from even that much regulation.

They range from Project Vote, a group run by former Ohio Democratic Party chairman David J. Leland, and the NAACP Voter Education Fund to the National Rifle Association and the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

The Post estimates that 501c organizations will spend from \$70 million to \$100 million this election cycle. That is significantly less than each of the presidential campaigns raised and spent, but it is considerably more than spare change.

9th Grade football team may have been exposed to Hepatitis A

The 9th grade football team has been exposed Hepatitis A, according to Evan Smith, principal of Pampa High School.

The exposure is believed to have occurred during the team's visit to Hereford, Sept. 23. Following the game, the team stopped at the local McDonald's restaurant to eat.

According to a report sent to the high school from the Texas Department of State Health Services, anyone who ate at the restaurant, located at 1112 West 1st Street in Hereford after 4 p.m. either Sept. 20, 21 or 23, may have been exposed to Hepatitis A and should consider getting an immune globulin shot to prevent the viral illness.

The Hepatitis A immune globulin clinic will be at the Pampa High School in Conference Room A and B, Thursday, Oct. 7, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. A parent or guardian must be physically present on campus with their child to give parental or written consent.

If you love him and care about his children's feelings, you can enroll your daughter in French language and literature classes, and send her to visit her French-speaking grandmother, and -- if it's affordable -- take her someplace where French is the dominant language for a vacation. This, in addition to spending one-on-one time with vour daughter, would keep her French from getting rusty, without sacrificing a relationship with someone you care about.

P.S. Even if you end the relationship, there is no guarantee that your daughter would continue to pass her French along to her own children.




