Over 400 4-H members participated in the 1985 State 4-H Trap and Skeet Shoot conducted at the National Shooting Center, in San Antonio, August 7th through 10th. Fifteen competative events in American and International Trap and Skeet were sponsored by the State 4-H Office in cooperations with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, according to Dennis Poole County Extension Agent, Borden County. Local 4-H'ers from Borden County participated in the American Trap and Skeet & International Trap events. They were accompanied by Kent & Ollie Holmes, Barbara & Tom Edd Vestal, Ronnie & Debbie Barnes, and Mrs. Pat Porter. Shooting S-ports 4-H Leaders from Borden County. 15 trophies were brought home from the State Shoot. The results are as follows:



CLOTHING COSTS AND CAREFUL SHOPPING

In spite of the heat wave outside, shoppers will be blocking into air-conditioned stores this month to buy back -to-school wardrobes, dress-for -success suits and other fall clothing.

What they will find in the stores is high prices.

Clothing prices increased at a lower rate than prices for other items over the last few years.

But when the effect of inflation is removed, U. S. Department of Agriculture figures show the percentage of personal expenditures for clothing and shoes is ata 25-year high.

Annual spending for clothing and shoes is now extimated at \$588 per person.

Part of the increased spending for clothing is due to higher prices and part is because we are buying mroe clothes than in the past.

figures Clothing industry also show that the number of small children who are outfitted for school is growing at a fast place. This is probably due to the increasing numbers of working mothers who enroll their children in nursery schools and more money available for two incomes.

While many shoppers are interested in cutting their clothing costs, they also want

-Try on every item of clothing you plan to buy. This is important both for children and adults. Sizes are often little more than a guidline since they vary too much from manufacturer to manufacturer to be entirely reliable.





HAYING & GRAZING ACR LAND

Before you hay or graze ACR, you need to come by the county office, pay a \$10.00 fee, and sign a register. The \$10.00 fee is to cover the cost of a farm visit

Failure to control the weeds and wind erosion on the farm will make it ineligible for program benefits.


