Police chief finds escapee in doorway

A Pampa man was returned to Gray County Jail Monday afternoon after a two-hour manhunt resulted in his apprehension within a few blocks of his escape in front of the jail.

Jorge Enrique Sanchez,

20, 832 Scott, was being escorted back to the jail from Gray County Courthouse by sheriff's deputies when he allegedly broke free of the deputies and ran, according to Lt. Joe B. Hoard of the sheriff's department.

No one was injured during the escape, chase or capture, and Sanchez was taken into custody without offering resistance when he was found, Hoard said.

"Cooperation among departments has led to the arrest of an escaped felon. They helped us out tremendously," he said.

Sanchez had only one shoe and was not wearing his orange jail shirt at the time Pitner found him, Hoard said. He was still wearing the orange jail

Legislature to tackle school finance in special session

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Legislature on Tuesday began its latest attempt to find a solution to the school funding quagmire that has bedeviled lawmakers for years.

Republican Gov. Rick Perry will deliver a new plan to the Legislature that would give teachers a salary increase and homeowners a tax cut. Tuesday marks the first day lawmakers are back in Austin for a 30-day special session on the issue — their fourth attempt since 2003.

The House and Senate both began proceedings shortly after noon Tuesday.

"We need to act now," Perry said in an interview Monday with The Associated Press. "Tomorrow we're going to give them a clear message of where we're going and what we ought to be doing.'

Perry offered few details but said his proposal would also fund textbooks and new technology for Texas classrooms.

Solving the school funding

dilemma has stumped state leaders for the previous two regular sessions and a failed special session last year. It also threatens to become a political problem for Perry, who is seeking re-election to a second full term in 2006.

Perry said lawmakers should be willing to accept his plan, though state's top two legislative leaders were hesitant to offer support or agreement on the gov-

ernor's compromise offer. House Speaker Tom Craddick, who met with Perry earlier Monday, said he had not seen the plan in its entirety and couldn't comment until he sees the specifics.

"I met with Governor Perry this morning, and he told me he had another option for property tax relief that he will lay out tomorrow," Craddick said.

Republican Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, who leads the Senate, said the chamber would give the proposal fair consideration, though he had concerns about some of the specific aspects of the proposal.

The rate of a sales tax increase and applying the sales tax to additional items such as cosmetic surgery and automotive repairs were among Dewhurst's concerns.

"It shows (Perry's) interest in the House and Senate reaching an agreement," Dewhurst said, upon emerging from a closed-door meeting with Craddick. "It's something that we can both take a look at."

The sales tax rate would increase from 6.25 percent to 6.95 percent under the governor's plan, Dewhurst said. During the regular session, the Senate had proposed increasing the sales tax to 6.75 percent, while the House proposed a steeper 7.25 percent rate. Democratic senators balked at raising the rate more than a half cent.

Many lawmakers have campaigned on promises to lower school property taxes. They're under court pressure to fix the school funding system after a Travis County judge last year ruled the system unconstitutional. The state has appealed the ruling, and a July 6 date is set for

oral arguments. Perry cranked up the pressure Saturday when he vetoed the \$35.3 billion public education budget and called lawmakers back for another go at getting the job done.

While critics accused Perry of playing chicken with the children of Texas, the governor said he's confident lawmakers will reach a conclusion in time for schools to open their doors

"Schools will be open in the fall," Perry said. "The funding will be there, as sure as the sun comes up in the

tax reductions Perry proposed is significantly less than the one-third reduction lawmakers initially put forth. Cutting school property taxes by a third, would have cost the state about \$11 billion

The last time Perry made his own school funding proposal before calling a special session, the House, led by Craddick, rejected that plan by a symbolic 126-0 vote.

CHRONOLOGY

(AP) - Here's a look at major dates in Texas' school finance battle:

Supreme Court throws out the state's school funding law after finding "glaring disparities" between rich and poor school districts. The high court later rules two other Texas school funding plans unconstitutional in the early 1990s.

— 1993: Days before a court-imposed deadline threatened to close Texas schools, the Legislature forces property-rich school districts to share some wealth with poorer ones.

- 1995: The Texas Supreme Court upholds the share-the-wealth system, sometimes called "Robin Hood."

- 2001: Then-acting Lt. Gov. Bill Ratliff, who as a state senator authored the "Robin Hood" funding plan, says its needs review and possible change.

2003: Attorneys for property-wealthy school districts argue before the Texas Supreme Court that Robin Hood has created an illegal statewide property tax after many districts have pushed collections to the legal limit.

April 20, 2004: The Legislature meets in a special session called by Republican Gov. Rick Perry to address school finance. The session ends two days early when they fail to pass a new plan.

Sept. 15, 2004: After a trial brought by 300 districts, both rich and poor, a judge rules the education funding system is unconstitutional, threatening to order the state to halt school spending Oct. 1.

Jan. 11, 2005: Legislature convenes and Perry declares education funding an "emergency." Lawmakers fail to pass a new system before session

expires May 30. June 18: Perry vetoes \$35 billion in education spending, forcing lawmakers into special session starting Tuesday.

The investigation conducted as to why he was there led to his release, with no charges currently pending," Courtney said.

The warrant was served by the "knock and talk" method, as opposed to the "no-knock" method, Courtney said.

"Knock and talk" means that officers go to the door, make contact with the resident, and inform them of the warrant.

The "no-knock" method involves members of the special response team making a tactical and dynamic entry to the residence,

Courtney said.

Officers located the syringes and methamphetamine, and noted that one of the syringes had been prepared for use, according to the release.

"If convicted on the charge, Organ could face a sentence ranging from two to 10 years and a \$10,000 fine," Courtney said.


-Marilyn Powers, staff writer Microchip pioneer Jack Kilby dead at 81

DALLAS Microchip pioneer Jack Kilby, who won the 2000 Nobel Prize for his part in creating the microscopic brains powering many of today's digital devices, has died after a brief battle with cancer. He was 81.

In 1958, his first year working with Texas Instruments in Dallas, Kilby used borrowed equipment to build the first microchip. All the components were fabricated in a single piece of semiconductor material half the size of a paper clip.

"In my opinion, there are only a handful of people whose works have truly transformed the world and the way we live in it - Henry Ford, Thomas Edison, the Wright Brothers and Jack Kilby," TI chairman Tom Engibous said in a statement Tuesday.



desktop publishing, I would recommend upping your RAM to 512 megabytes or even 1

gigabyte. So, how do you know how much RAM your system can take? Well, unfortunately for you computer geeks, you'll have to read the manual. It will list the maximum memory configurations your system can accept. More importantly, it will tell you what kind of RAM to buy. Sadly, many "standards" exist, confusing the issue.

Let me reiterate: Upgrading your RAM can be the single-most important step in revitalizing an older system.



Second Senate rebuff leaves Bush with Bolton nomination quandary

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush faces a politically thorny situation now that Senate Democrats twice have blocked John Bolton's confirmation as U.N. ambassador.

The president could withdraw the nomination, authorize further concessions to Democrats over access to information they seek or bypass lawmakers altogether by appointing former Department official to the job temporarily without the Senate's OK.

Any of those options could leave the president appearing weak as he confronts sagging poll numbers and fights to stave off a lame-duck label just six months into his final term.

The White House on Tuesday issued a new call for a vote on Bolton's nomination and accused Democrats of being unwillcompromise. "They're only interested in blocking this nomination from moving forward," presidential spokesman Scott McCellan said.

At a White House news conference Monday, the president left open the pos-

sibility of circumventing the Senate when he sidestepped a question on whether he would appoint Bolton to the ambassador's post when Congress leaves Washington for a July 4

Democrats made clear they weren't budging and most stood together to defeat a GOP effort to force a final vote on Bolton. The Senate voted 54-38, six shy of the total needed to advance his nomination. The vote represented an erosion in support from last month's failed Republican

Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., said Tuesday the United States urgently needed a U.N. ambassador and that the prospects of Bolton's being confirmed weren't good.

"We are without a U.N. ambassador at a critical time in history," McCain said on NBC's "Today" show. "We need to move forward. I hope that we can get this worked out still, but it's looking pretty dim."

Sen. George Voinovich, R-Ohio, who voted in May to advance the nomination, switched positions and urged Bush to consider another candidate, while only three Democrats crossed party lines.

Democrats have demanded that the administration check a list of 36 U.S. officials against names in secret national security intercepts that Bolton requested and received. They also want documents related to the preparation of testimony that Bolton planned to deliver - but ultimately never gave - in the House in July 2003 about Syria's weapons capability.



week didn't "rev up" your computer, you may want to consider purchasing a new hard drive. Most people purchase new drives for the simple reason that they ran out of space on their old one. However, while today's drives have incredible capacities, they are also much faster. The key to purchasing the right hard drive is knowing what your system can take.

When shopping for hard drives, most people only look at two numbers on the box: Capacity and price. However, you may be short-changing yourself if you don't add "the ATA rating" to your criteria. Basically, the ATA rating is a measure of speed; or how fast information can be moved to/from the drive.

For example, hard drives labeled "ATA/66" transfer data at 66 megabits per second. Higher numbers are better. One caveat exists, though. Your motherboard also has an ATA rating. While you can mix different ATA numbers between mother boards and your hard drives, your information will only go as fast as the slowest-rated component.

So, if you have an ATA/100 hard drive, but an ATA/33 motherboard, your top data transfer speed will be 33 megabits per second. Once again, perusing your manual should shed some light on your current configuration.

Another statistic to look for on a hard drive's box is "spinning speed." Most hard drives spin at either 4200, 5400, or 7200 rpm (rotations per minute). Drives that spin faster can deliver data quicker.

Basically, if you're in the market for a hard drive, I would probably recommend an ATA/133 or ATA/150 - 7200rpm drive. Of course, that depends on your motherboard configuration I mentioned earlier.

Other Upgrades

Some people ask me about upgrading their CPUs. I'm not a big fan of this upgrade. Usually, when buying a system, the most expensive single component is the CPU. Remember, it is the brains of your system. And brain transplants are very errorprone... If your CPU is too slow, buy a new system and donate your old computer to a school for the tax deduction.

Keyboards and mice are a dime a dozen. Feel free to replace those as needed. Monitors, while not as

cheap, are inexpensive and plentiful. Sometimes a bigger monitor can make all the difference in the world. And if you hit the computer auctions just right, you can get a great deal on one of these devices.

Texas takes control, Baylor stays alive

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Playing at the end of the season the way they did at the start, the Texas Longhorns are one win away from the College World Series championship round.

The Longhorns won their record 75th CWS game Monday night with their first shutout in Omaha since 1983, 5-0 over Tulane

The unseeded Longhorns earned a day off and will await the winner of Tuesday night's elimination game between No. 1 Tulane and No. 4 Baylor. The Bears stayed alive with a 4-3, 10-inning victory over Oregon State earlier Monday.

Texas coach Augie Garrido said his team is hitting, pitching and playing defense as well as it did while getting off to a 21-1 start this season.

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
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
