The City of Pampa passed their audit with flying colors.

Gary Brown of Brown and Graham, who performed the audit, told the Pampa City Commission at their Tuesday afternoon meeting that auditors from his firm had reviewed the city's finances and gave them a glowing report.

In addition to their regular audit, Brown said the auditors had delved deeply into the city's finances and expected the city to once again be awarded the Certification of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting.

Pampa City Manager John Horst said the certification was a prestigious award.

The commission also appointed Wyatt Earp as presiding judge and Raynetta Earp as the alternate judge for the May 13, city election.

The city commission also passed on second and final reading an ordinance correcting typographical errors in the city's International Residential Code.

Dan Redd with the West Texas A&M Incubator project presented the city with a check for \$25,000, the final payment of the \$50,000 promised for the business incubator being established in the old U.S. Bus

Building.

City passes audit; barbecue planned for firefighters

"We have great hopes and expectations for our city," Mayor Lonny Robbins told Redd with regard to the business incubator.

The commission approved disbursements of \$2,263,764.42 for February. The amount of the city's balance sheet and income accounts after the disbursements is \$669,947.22.

Neil Fulton asked the commission for use of the M.K. Brown Civic Center and Auditorium for a benefit to raise funds for area firefighters who battled wildfires earlier this month that threatened Pampa.

The newly organized Top O' Texas

Wildfire Benefit plans to have a barbecue party April 22 to raise money for area firefighters to repair or replace equipment damaged in the wildfires.

Fulton said the group was formed over the last two weeks by various civic groups.

"We have an ordinance that allows that," Horst said.





## **Primary runoff election mail-in** ballot deadline is 5 p.m. Tuesday

The deadline for applications for mail-in ballots for the April 11 primary runoff elections is 5 p.m. Tuesday, according to Gray County Clerk Susan Winborne.

Persons who may request mail-in ballots are registered Gray County voters who are handicapped, over age 65 and/or will be outside the county at the time of the election.

Voters may request an application be mailed to them by calling the county clerk's office at 669-8004, Winborne said. Mail-in paper ballots will be sent to all voters whose completed applications are received by the end of the day Tuesday.

Mail-in ballots are the only ones which will be paper, Winborne said.

"For this election, I am just going to use the voting machines because I expect a low turnout," she said.

The runoff election includes a Republican Party race between incumbent Lee Cornelison and challenger Scott Hahn for the office of Gray County Treasurer.

Early voting in the runoff election begins Monday. Hours will be 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays through April 7. The non-jury courtroom on the ground floor of Gray County Courthouse will be the location for early voting.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. April 11 at each of the seven precinct polling places: Precinct 1, Lefors community building; Precinct 2, Lovett Memorial Library in Pampa; Precinct 3, Grandview-Hopkins School; Precinct 4, Lovett Memorial Library in McLean; Precinct 5, Travis Elementary School; Precinct 6, Austin Elementary School; and Precinct 7, M.K. Brown Civic Auditorium.

John Horst said that \$125,000 had been budgeted for water line replacement this year. He said a similar amount would be needed for next year.

Horst said that he was working with the Panhandle Planning Regional Commission to get grants that might offset some of the costs. He said there were block grants available for water and sewage projects but not for beautification. Horst also said that he had



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## handlers of Japan-bound beef

TOKYO (AP) - The United States has agreed to require further training of American workers handling beef exports to Japan, U.S. agriculture officials said Wednesday.

The U.S. delegation, led by Chuck Lambert, undersecretary for marketing and regulatory programs, finished two days of talks in Japan in hopes of lifting Tokyo's ban on U.S. beef.

Lambert told reporters the U.S. would provide additional training to beef workers and follow up to make sure they know what meat products are prohibited in Japan and which are allowed.

"From our viewpoint, this is another step on the path to lifting the barrier," he said. "We had a very thorough and complete discussion, and reached an agreement over further measures."

Hirofumi Kugita, chief of the Animal Health Division at the Agriculture Ministry, said the two countries reached a degree of understanding but cautioned that differences remained.


"We discussed our concerns in a positive manner and were able to hold meaningful talks," Kugita said. "However, there are numerous issues that remain to be discussed. We have yet to solve all of our problems."

Going into the talks, the U.S. knew Japan would have more questions, U.S. Agriculture Secretary Mike Johanns said Wednesday.

"That's not unexpected - we anticipate that there are going to be some additional things that we have to put in place," Johanns told reporters at the Agriculture Department in Washington.

'My hope is that it's not a stalling tactic," he added. "There'll probably be some additional questions. We'll respond to those very quickly. But there's a point where this needs to be resolved, and we have really reached that point now."

uation," she said.

Powell said that one of the reserve units that was brought into use was a 1979 Chevrolet, She said the fire department would like to have a grass attack rig, which would cost less than a booster truck.

She said a grass attack rig was essentially a four-wheel-drive one-ton truck with water tank and high-pressure pumper. She said she was applying for grants similar to ones used by the city to buy new fire trucks the past two years.

Powell said that the last new booster unit the city bought was in 1998 and cost \$175,000. She said a grass rig should cost appreciably less.

To offset that cost, she said she had a consultant coming in June to help determine if upgrading the fire department's equipment would lower the city's fire insurance costs.

The insurance rating for Pampa and the surrounding area protected by the Pampa Fire Department was presently a 4. She said she hoped that could be lowered to a 3 or even a 2, thereby lowering the cost of insurance for homeowners and businesses.

Pampa Police Chief Trevlyn Pittner told the Pampa City Commission that land had been donated for a new communication tower near the city's water plant and Emergency Coordinator Ken Hall was preparing a request for bids to build the tower.

The tower is expected to cost about \$150,000, which is already budgeted. Pittner said the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission had come up with state and federal grants that are expected to pay some \$30,000 for a building at the site, another \$100,000 for radio repeaters to go on the tower and three dispatch stations.

Pittner said the PRPC is also exploring getting grants for emergency generators for the city.

He said that the emergency generator now located on the lawn on the north side of City Hall, while well kept, does not generate enough power to run the emergency management office in the building. He said the city needs a generator that's big enough to supply power to all of City Hall.

Pittner said he hopes to be able to find a generator for less than \$100,000.

"We want to make sure that we get more than what we need," Pittner said. Fire Chief Powell said the city has outgrown the capacity of the generator

that the city now has. The present generator is a 10 KW unit, Pittner said. He said the city needs one that provides 250 to 350 KW.

Pittner also told commissioners that

pay continues to be an issue within his department despite recent increases. "When we went 'up," Pittner said,

"everybody else did, too." City staff members said they were losing employees to the oil field.

Two years ago, the city had to cut the number of city employees due to budgetary problems. Now, they have job openings that they can't fill.

Pittner noted that while Pampa was the second largest city in the Texas Panhandle, it paid the least.

The police chief said he would like to proceed with in-car computers, saying it would make the force he had more efficient.

The equipment could replace people he might need to hire and would be less expensive in the long run.

Pampa City Secretary Phyllis Jeffers said that for every dollar increase in salaries, the city paid 22 cents in benefits not including health insurance. In-car computers are expected to

cost about \$125,000 in a one-time purchase plus about \$22,000 a year in maintenance and \$60 per car per month for connection.

Pittner said patrol officers are now spending about 50 percent of their time at the police department offices working on paperwork. With the in-car computers, the officers could stay in the field and enter their reports from a patrol car, allowing them to spend more time on the street.

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About a quarter of them arrive in the United States legally and simply overstay their visas, Passel said.

"We have about 30 million people per year come here on temporary visas, either tourists or visitors for business," he said. "With 30 million folks coming here a year, a very small percent who stay adds up over the years." Members of the Georgia

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



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## **Consequences of a war state are high indeed**

War consists of killing people and destroying property. That's all there is to war. Any honest soldier will tell you the same thing: His job is to kill people and destroy property. That's true of all branches of the service.

The difficult question is, When is a nation justified in making the decision to kill other people and destroy their property? I think the rule is the same as it is for individuals. You are justified in killing only in defense of your own life or the lives of others for whom you are responsible.

By that definition, the U.S. has fought only one justified war in this and the past century. That was World War II. Putting aside the fact that the U.S. government provoked Japan into attacking, attack it did, and the U.S. had a right to respond. We were not attacked, however, in Korea, Vietnam, Libya,

Q: You say as many as 60,000 of the country's 617,000 professors are radicals. What's the worst damage they are doing?

A: I estimate that maybe 3 million students a year will go through their classes, where they will hear anti-American propaganda, or libels, as I would call them. ... It's mainly that they are indoctrinating students and recruiting them to radical causes.

Q: You say you are exposthese professors not ing because they have biases but because they have decided to preach and not teach.

A: The indictment in the book is of professors who abuse the university system for political agendas. In some of the profiles, the book does take on some of their misrepresentations. Grover Furr, of Montclair State, thinks that Stalin was a democrat and the collapse of the Soviet Union was a moral catastrophe. He's a medievalist, but he's managed to get a course - and this is part of what I call the consumer fraud that is going on – in which he can teach his ridiculous opinions. I do think that when you see the professors strung 100 together, it makes a deep impression on you with the problem we have in this country with a Fifth Column.

Q: Are non-liberals being discriminated against?

shots, your career comes to an end. So you have a large group of people on university faculties who are just intimidated.

You won't find many Joe Lieberman supporters among university faculty, so I don't really know what groups they would join. 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
