## 80 years ago, Pampa became bustling town

By KERRI SMITH Eighty years ago, in 1926, Pampa had a very prosperous and busy year. The first oil boom hit the town
after oil was discovered here the year before. The population that year increased from 1,000 in January to 10,000 in December. T.D. Hobart, the manager of the August saying, "Excitement is still running high here (Pampa). The town is growing by leaps and bounds." The organization of 110 separate corporations with a combined capital of $\$ 15$ million was in

Other buildings were being built as well. Building permits in the last few months of the year averaged 250,000 a month. Work was begun $n$ a new post office at the corner of Cuyler and Foster at a cost of $\$ 60,000$. This was to help facilitate the 8,000 people that were receiving mail in the town. Money order receipts from the post office were

middle class are a result of too much big government, too much taxes, too much
subsidies, too much corpo subsidies, too much corporate welfare, too many gov-
ernment regulations, protecernment regulations, protec-
tion of businesses and special interests - all that bad, big government, rent-seek-
ing stuff. Does any of that
ring true to you?
A: I think certainly some of that is absolutely true, but we come at it from quite different directions. Each of those is an outgrowth of the overwhelming $\begin{aligned} & \text { politica } \\ & \text { dominance of } \\ & \text { corporate }\end{aligned}$ dominance of corporate America - and excess.
Corporate America is in the same stage of excess that labor unions were in 30 years ago and I believe that as middle-class America

nowhere, and one of them began to roll on the ground as though she was in great pain. While Katherine hurried for turpentine and camphor, the squaws disappeared, and so did the hatchet. When W.T. heard of this, he went to the Comanche village and threatened to kill all of the inhabitants if the hatchet was not returned. The hatchet was returned.
Katherine, who became known as "Grandma La in Mobeetie, was an angel of mercy in pioneer homes as a midwife at childbirth or illness of any kind. She had a skill for nursing and always knew just what to do W.T. helped with civic affairs in Mobeetie. In 1886, he was one of five men appointed to view and lay out a road from Mobeetie to a point on the Canadian River
near the mouth of Red Deer Creek in Hemphill County Also in 1886, he was an election judge or foreman for precinct number one in Mobeetie.
In 1887, W.T. and Katherine moved to Chicken Creek in Roberts County. W.T. died there in 1888 after a horse kicked him in the stomach. After his death, Kather

## Testosterone, DHEA supplements no fountain of youth

studied 57 women and 87 men of them at least 60 years old. Th women were given standard daily doses of DHEA or identical fake pills. The men were given real or
fake DHEA, as well as a testos terone skin patch or a placebo terone skin patch or a placebo
patch.
Blood samples were taken every
three months. Participants also were examined for any changes in body fat, hormone levels, bone
density, and performance on treadmill, weightlifting and leg flexibility tests. The men and women also filled out questionnaires about how they felt and their quality of life. Although DHEA and testosand women who took the real treatments, there was no effect on physical performance, quality of life or the body's ability to lower levels of blood sugar

The testosterone treatments led in the amount of body weight free of fat, but that did not correspond to any improvements in strength. DHEA had no such effects. DHEA appeared to improve den-
sity in bones in the arm and neck, sity in bones in the arm and neck,
but not in the back and hip, Nair said. "That shows an inconsistent
or minor effect," he said
No harmful side effects were detected. That is good news, but it altogether safe, said Simon Yeun manager of the Web site on supple ments and integrative medicine at he Memorial Sloan-Kettering ancer Center in New York given in low doses. Higher levels might have more benefit, but docors worry testosterone may also raise the risk of prostate cancer, Yeung said.
