Many feel raises crucial to education

AUSTIN (AP) — Long after the last school bell rings, first-grade teacher Kim Thonhoff is buying trinkets for her students.

Stephanie Reed is shopping, too, spending \$40 on math books, posters and other supplies for her first-grade classroom.

They aren't alone.

Public school educators in Texas frequently spend their own money at education supply stores — even

Some of those teachers are critical of lawmakers, saying they need to pay teachers more or lose them to more lucrative fields.

"I really do think that the Legislature needs to put some money into teacher salaries, and they need to upgrade the professional status of the teacher," Thonhoff said. "People really don't appreciate much of what a teacher does."

Teacher salaries are part of the equation as lawmakers wrestle with public school funding, contemplat-

though many of them can't afford it. ing putting billions more dollars into the education system. Some teachers' groups are pushing for a raise for all teachers. Republican legislative leaders are steering toward incentive pay based on performance or local needs.

> A survey by the American Federation of Teachers shows that Texas salaries were \$5,799 less than the national average for the 2002-03 school year, the most recent year for which data is available. That put Texas 30th in the nation, at an average of \$39,972.

California led the nation. South Dakota was last.


In Texas, state-mandated minimum pay starts at \$24,240 for a 10month contract for beginning teachers. It goes up to \$33,730 for 10 years of experience and \$40,800 for 20 years or more. Some districts pay higher. The statewide average for beginning teachers in 2002-03 was \$31,874, slightly above the national average, according to the federation survey.



Historic Texas church near collapse

RUIDOSA, Texas (AP) - Time, neglect and the unforgiving desert environment are threatening to devour a nearly centuryold piece of Texas history. The Mission del Sagrado Corazon, the Sacred Heart Mission, notable because of its three large adobe arches, is crumbling in the remote desolation along the Rio Grande about 200 miles southeast of El Paso.

The deterioration accelerates each time a rare rainstorm hits the normally parched region, washing away mud bricks used to make the building. The threat has prompted historical groups to save the Catholic abandoned church where services last were held decades ago. "It's been getting worse and worse," said Larry Oaks, executive director of the Texas Historical Commission. "At this stage of the game, probably a third of the building has literally melted into the landscape.

How important is it to know cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR)?

Jana Gregory, executive director of the Gray County Area chapter of the American Red Cross, will say that from her first-hand experience, she knows CPR saves lives.

"Every person should have the knowledge of CPR," Gregory said. "Hopefully you will never have to use it, but being prepared is very important."

Gregory believes her knowledge of infant CPR helped save the life of her

five-day-old grandson, Braley Frank Long, three years ago.

"We were sitting in the living room having a family get-together when my then-five-day-old grandson stopped breathing," she remembered.

Gregory immediately began CPR on the baby, continuing to breathe for him until they were able to get to medical help.

"Because I had the training, we had a happy ending to what could have been a tragic family loss," she said.

The America Red Cross is celebrat-

ing Red Cross Month in March and is offering a community-wide CPR class from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m., Saturday, March 5, at the local Red Cross office,

108 N. Russell. Cost of the class has been reduced from \$35 to \$10 for this special occasion.

Case involving miscarriage plot tests fairness of state law

LUFKIN, Texas (AP) arrived by ambulance last Basoria can't be charged. May, her womb empty, belly bruised and lips tightly sealed.

The twin fetuses that 16year-old Erica Basoria carried for five months had slipped into the bathroom toilet while her boyfriend and his family slept. They awoke to her cries and called 911.

Basoria had bruises on her eye, arm and wrist, so authorities assumed she had been beaten. Her boyfriend, 18-year-old Gerardo "Jerry" Flores, was charged with murder under the state's new law protecting the unborn.

But it wasn't that simple. Basoria eventually told authorities she had been trying to kill her unborn sons for weeks and finally asked Flores to step on her stomach.

"When I was four months pregnant, I began to show, and at that time I decided that I should have gotten an abortion," Basoria wrote in an affidavit.

"How can two people conspire to do something like this and only one of them be punished? How can that be fair?" defense attornev Rvan Deaton said.

is asking lawmakers for a \$3,000 across-the-board raise as part of a school finance package, although that still wouldn't put teachers at the national salary average, said federation president John Cole.

Republican Rep. Kent Grusendorf of Arlington, who wrote a sweeping House education proposal now under consideration, scoffs at the idea of an across-the-board raise.

"We'd be paying the absolutely worst teachers the same as the very best teachers," he said.

Raises should be linked to cost-of-living differences throughout Texas and should address teacher shortages in certain areas, he added.

His plan would restore a \$1,000 teacher health care stipend that was cut in half in 2003 and would pay it as salary. It also would provide money for teacher mentor programs and allow for district-designed "performance pay" incentives.

Friday, Rep. Dianne Delisi, R-Temple, proposed

would reward teachers at schools where at least half the children are economically disadvantaged. Up to \$7,500 more would be paid to teachers of "at-risk" students who improve academically.

The Texas teachers' federation says it would support some incentives, including extra pay for experienced teachers who move to hardto-staff schools or for specialists in fields without enough teachers.

But the Texas federation opposes linking raises to student scores on standardized tests. Not all grade levels or subject areas are covered in state-required tests, Cole noted, adding that a teacher's work may not immediately show itself in student performance.

hardest-working "The teachers are the teachers that are in the schools where the test scores really aren't showing the achievement," said Reed, a teacher at Kocurek Elementary in Austin who once taught at a school where test scores were lagging.

Incentives could motivate and enhance performance, but finding an accurate measure of performance is adding a provision that difficult, said Mel Fugate, a

professor of management organizations and Methodist Southern University who teaches classes on rewards and motivation.

Tying test scores to pay is inaccurate because there are so many factors outside the teacher's control, such as poverty levels at different campuses, he said.

"It's not apples to apples," Fugate said. "It's not even apples to oranges. It's an apples to rocks comparison."

Teachers should help devise any performance measurement system, he said.

Overall, he said, pay for Texas teachers is low, and a base raise for all teachers would help recruit and retain talented people.

Jessica Crane, 24, who earned a degree in education from the University of Texas two years ago, saw a number of her classmates reject teaching.

"They decided that they could do something and make more," she said.

Crane also decided not to teach, but not because of the pay. She found a good job in management at Teacher Heaven, a chain of Texas stores that sells education materials.

"We have to make assumptions, second-guess what is liable.'

That's exactly what PBS did recently with "A Company of Soldiers," a documentary on Iraq that contained foul language.

Besides offering a version of the film that had questionable parts bleeped out, the network sent out the raw version to stations that were willing to sign a waiver that acknowledged they were not protected by the probeing ducer from FCC penalties. "We were trying to protect stations from any liability," Mitchell said, adding that some stations could go bankrupt if a hefty fine was placed on them. "We agreed some stations would want to take the chance anyway." Next week, another documentary on Iraq which has some strong language will be offered to stations. They've been told that if they air "The Soldier's Heart," they must do so after 10 p.m. A toned-down version will be offered as well. In a wide-ranging interview, Mitchell, 62, discussed her decision to step down as PBS chief in June 2006, the network's financial challenges, her feelings about the "Buster" controversy and her goals during her final year in the job. "I'm completely passionate about a stronger and better resourced broadcasting service," she said. "I want this to be my legacy. That would be the best thing any leader can hope for — to leave an organization stronger than when you

came in." Mitchell has her work cut out for her. When PBS launched there were only three other TV networks. Now there are scores.

Cuts in corporate underwriting and the fact that production and other costs have outpaced the small increases in government funding have also made things difficult.

PBS operates on a \$319 million annual budget. Less than 20 percent of PBS funding comes from Congress. The rest comes from fund raising, corporate underwriting and station member dues.



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

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Updating FOI legislation long overdue

The U.S. Senate hasn't held hearings on federal agencies' compliance with the Freedom of Information Act of 1966 in 13 years. Congress last updated the law almost a decade ago.

Since then, information technology has dramatically changed, and some federal agencies have gotten into the bad habit of unnecessarily limiting responses to requests for information submitted under the act.

That worries U.S. Sen. John Cornyn, R-Texas. Before winning election to the Senate in 2002, Cornyn was Texas attorney general, where he championed enforcement of the state's Public Information and **Open Meetings statutes.**

One of the most popular methods is the 'rule of thumb' measurement, believing that if there is a thumb's width between the end of the long toe to the tip of the shoe, the foot has adequate growing room. As not everyone's thumb is the same width, some claim you should have 1/2 inch toe room. we feel neither of these methods are adequate. There is one best way to be sure of adequate toe room in a shoe - that is to use the ball of the foot arch measurement. No fans for Greek soccer leader

ATHENS, Greece (AP) - Greek league leader Olympiakos was ordered to play two more home games before no fans as punishment for crowd violence.

A sports tribunal punished the soccer team a second time this year following weekend violence on the island of Crete, where lowly Ergotelis upset the visitors 2-1. The tribunal also fined Olympiakos nearly \$40,000 on Thursday.

Last month, Olympiakos and Panionios Athens were ordered to play four home games behind closed doors, again following crowd trouble. Panathinaikos also must play one home game before empty seats because of violence at a Greek Cup game.

On Thursday, Panathinaikos lost at Sevilla 2-0 and was eliminated from the UEFA Cup. Olympiakos beat Sochaux 1-0 in France and advanced to the last 16 of the competition.

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Fewer veterinarians enter large-animal practice

BEAR CREEK TOWNSHIP, Mich. (AP) - Dr. Colleen Thorp examined a black-and-white cow struggling to give birth, finally deciding that the calf was too large and needed to be helped along.

Looping chains around the calf's front legs for a better grip, Thorp tugged and twisted until the newborn bull plopped onto the barn floor.

"He couldn't have lived much longer," said Thorp, who gently massaged the calf's slimy chest and tickled its nose. "He's just exhausted. But he'll be fine."

The calf survived because Thorp was in the right place.

at the right time. But in rural areas nationwide, the availability of veterinarians to treat large farm animals is increasingly uncertain.

As older practitioners retire, younger vets are showing less interest in large-animal care. The trend is =

"alarming," according to Ray Stock, a lobbyist for the

American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA).

Of 71,116 AVMA-member vets in the United States last year, only about 22 percent treated large farm animal such as cattle, pigs and sheep at least part-time. More than 45 percent of the organization's 32,338 members did so in 1986, the earliest year for which statistics are available.

An AVMA survey of graduates from the nation's veterinary schools last year found about 25 percent willing to devote at least part time to large animals - down from 36 percent a decade earlier.

The trend is a problem for South Dakota, where "we have five cows for every man, woman and child," says Dr. Sam Holland, the state veterinarian.

"What do you do when your ranch is 70 miles from town and there's only one vet in town, and during the calving season the vet may be called to go three different directions at the same time?" Holland asked.

Thorp has practiced for 17 years since graduating from the Michigan State University vet school, and she tries to stay within 35 miles of her office. But she

The shortfall reflects the decline of the traditional rural lifestyle. As the number of farms shrinks, so does the pool of veterinarians who grew up in the country around cows and pigs.

Thorp says few young people today will put up with the hassles of large animal medicine: long hours, middle-of-the-night emergencies and dirty and physically demanding labor.

She's also been kicked a few times, and suffered a cracked rib a couple of years ago in a run-in with a cow.

But vets with a mixed clientele, a common arrangement in rural areas, earned about \$11,000 less.

Dr. Dennis Paull, who has a mixed practice in northern Michigan, said the disparity is one reason he may abandon large-animal care.

In the time it takes to drive 40 miles and treat a sick cow, he could handle several household pet cases.

beloved dog is more likely to spend \$600 to fix its blown-out knee than a farmer to invest in surgery for a hog destined for slaughter.

Congress in 2003 approved legislation to provide college loan forgiveness for newer veterinarians and students willing to work in underserved places and disciplines such as large-animal care. The typical vet school graduate leaves school \$80,000 in debt.

But the program hasn't been funded - and President Bush seeks no money for it in his 2006 budget. A few states have debt relief pro-

grams, including Pennsylvania and Texas. South Dakota offers tuition assistance for residents who earn veterinary degrees at Iowa State University and return home to practice.

Driving home after her day of farm calls, Thorp had blood and manure stains on her overalls. She castrated four young bulls and dehorned another, changed a leg bandage on a skittish horse and performed rectal exams on dozens of cows.

"I guess it's like being a farmer," she says. "It's either in your blood or it's not.'

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
