rowly tailored and not intended as a precedent for Congress to step into battles over the fate of seriously disabled or terminally ill patients.

- An overview of how forest residue is already used in
Southen forests. Southern forests;
- How to manage forests, old and new, for e
bio-fuel production; - How to harvest and
process forest residue for process forest residue for - How to utilize biomass for bio-energy, bio-fi
bio-based products; - The socio-economic
impacts and community development issues; and -How to develop environmentally sustainable biomass production systems for bio-
energy and bio-based prod ucts.
The last subject - environ mental sustainability - may be expanded to educate the
public, Foster said public, Foster said. Some
people might not understand people might not understand
the environmental benefits of burning forest residue to produce fuel.
But the economic benefits are two-fold, he said. First it is a truly renewable resource. Trees are efficient at turning sunlight, moisture and a few
basic nutrients into bio-mass Using nutrients into bio-mass.
Using forest residue as biofuel also will utilize a resource that is being left to rot in the field.
But another important
issue is carbon sequestration issue is carbon sequestration.
Trees "breathe" in dioxide, one of the carbon
breenhouse gases. The trees sequester the carbon as part of the biomass.

Another common concern, Foster said, was that harvesting forest residues could ause nutrient deficiencies and retard fu
