did for the entire year last year. He said the taxes from the new motel that opened carli begun to flow inte city expected to open soon. Sales taxes are projected
to be $\$ 2.8$ million this next budget year. Last year, sales million.
The city had received enue as of June. That's $\$ 349,028$ more than for the same period last year, Bailey said.

The 65 -year-old Cheney,
who has a long history of
heart ailments, had an elec-
trocardiogram and high-
tech imaging to check on
repaired aneurysms on the
back of his knees, his
spokeswoman said.
Doctors also checked the
condition of a high-tech
pacemaker, known as an
implantable cardioverter
defibrillator, that was
placed in his chest in June
2001.
