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

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## Rest in peace

*Throngs bid farewell to Pope John Paul II in St. Peter's Square*

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Presidents, prime ministers and kings joined pilgrims and prelates in St. Peter's Square on Friday to bid an emotional farewell to Pope John Paul II at a funeral service that drew millions to Rome for the largest gathering of the powerful and the humble in modern times.

Applause rang out in the wind-whipped square as John Paul's plain cypress coffin, adorned with a cross and an "M" for the Virgin Mary, was brought out from St. Peter's Basilica and placed on a carpet in front of the altar. The book of the Gospel was placed on the coffin and the wind lifted the pages.

After the Mass ended, bells tolled and 12 pallbearers with white gloves, white ties and tails presented the coffin to the crowd one last time, and then carried it on their shoulders back inside the basilica for burial — again to sustained applause from the hundreds of thousands in the square, including dignitaries from 138 countries.

Chants of "Santo! Santo!" — urging John Paul to be elevated to sainthood immediately — echoed in the square.

The first non-Italian pope in 455 years was buried at 2:20 p.m. (8:20 a.m. EDT) in the grotto under the basilica, attended by prelates and members of the papal household, the Vatican said.

The 2 1/2-hour Mass began with the Vatican's Sistine Choir singing the Gregorian chant, "Grant Him Eternal Rest, O Lord." Cardinals wearing white miters walked onto the square, their red vestments blowing in the breeze.

Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, dean of the

## Not so welcome sign

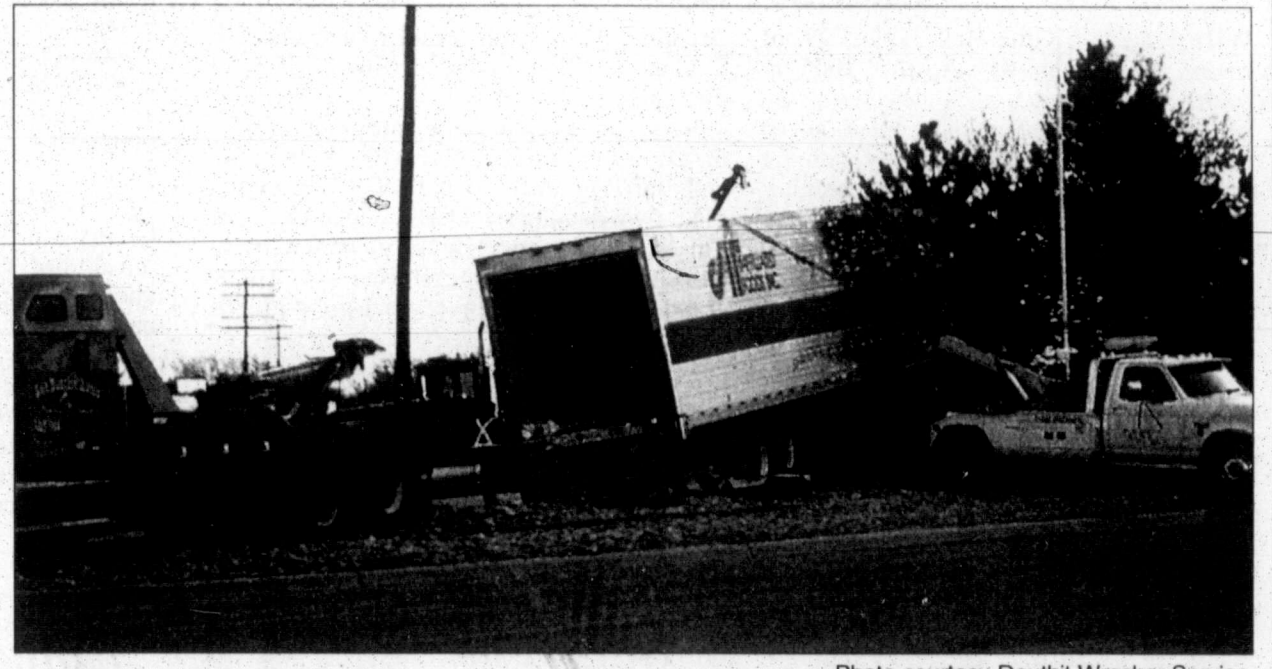

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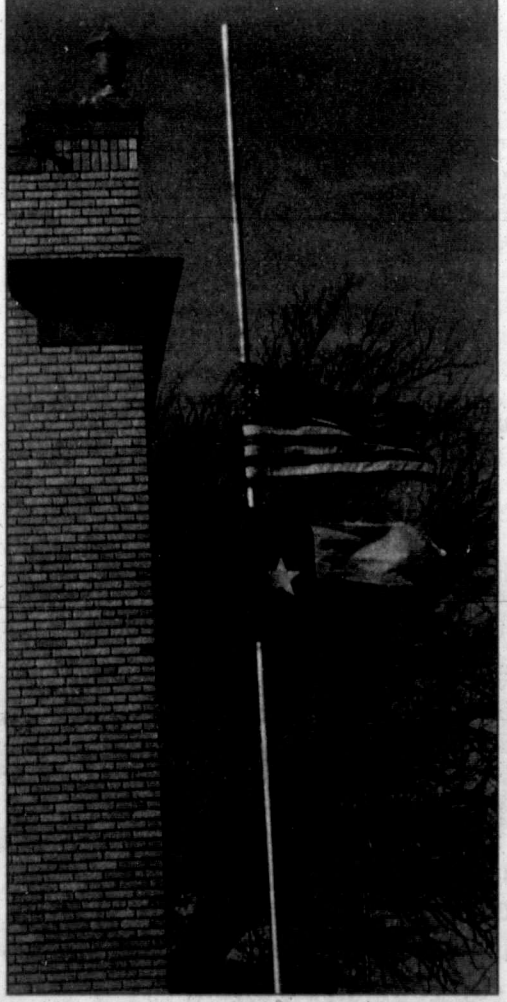

## Football player's father faces charges in shooting of coach

CANTON (AP) — A football player's father was charged with aggravated assault Friday for allegedly shooting his son's coach, who though critically wounded was able to call the school office for help.

Authorities said Jeffrey Doyle Robertson, 45, had been barred from the high school after several earlier confrontations, including one where he was accused of shoving coaches at a football team picnic.

Robertson allegedly went to the school just after classes started Thursday and shot coach Gary Joe Kinne, apparently with a .45-caliber pistol. Kinne was in critical but stable condition Friday at Trinity Mother Frances Health System hospital.

Kinne was alone in the field house when he was shot but managed to call the school's office, Canton schools Superintendent Larry Davis said in a statement.

The principal applied pressure to the wound until medical help arrived.

Robertson appeared haggard yet calm in court when he was charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, a felony punishable by two to 20 years in prison. Judge Lilia Durham set his bond at \$1 million, and sheriff's department officials said he is on suicide watch.

Robertson was not required to enter a plea. His attorney, William Reece, declined to comment.

Robertson — who has a tattoo on his arm of cartoon character Yosemite Sam brandishing two guns with the words "Born to

Raise Hell" — was arrested a few hours after the shooting in woods outside of town. He had two guns and a pocket knife with him, Police Chief Mike Echols said.

He was found with self-inflicted wounds, including cuts to his wrists and leg, authorities said. In court Friday morning, bandages were visible on Robertson's wrists.

Echols said Robertson had been barred from Canton High and told not to attend football games after several confrontations. One was at the annual football picnic, where he was accused of "shoving and verbally abusing" coaches, authorities said.

Police were investigating a possible motive. On Wednesday, Robertson's son, Baron, had

Consumer confidence holds steady over this past month

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer confidence held fairly steady over the past month despite surging energy prices and more cautious hiring by America's employers.  
 The AP-Ipsos consumer confidence index clocked in at 84.5 in April, compared with a reading of 84.2 in March, according to figures released Friday. A year ago, the index stood at 84.8.  
 April's reading suggests that consumers still feel pretty good about the economy in general even against the backdrop of high prices for oil, gasoline and other energy products, a slowdown in the growth of the nation's payrolls and rising interest rates.

 Oil prices closed at a new, all-time high last week of \$57.27 a barrel. They briefly surged past \$58.28 a barrel on Monday, then retreated somewhat.

 Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan this week said tight energy supplies and strong demand, have created "the current price frenzy."  
 Greenspan said he was hopeful the high prices would spur conservation by businesses and consumers, and greater energy exploration. That would help get prices under control.

**Nation's postal service seeks increase in stamp prices**

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Postal Service filed a request Friday seeking higher rates.  
 The agency wants a 2-cent increase in first-class mail, and similar increases for other types of mail, to take effect early next year. It would increase the rate for regular mail to 39 cents from 37 cents.  
 The agency said that it is seeking the increase, 5.4 percent across the board, only because of a requirement that it establish a \$3.1 billion escrow fund.  
 The agency has sought congressional action to eliminate that requirement. If that happens, postal officials said, the rate increase request will be withdrawn.  
 Postage rates last went up in 2002.  
 Congress mandated the escrow requirement in 2003 when it passed a law reducing the amount of money the agency has



to pay into its retirement system, which auditors said was being overfunded. Instead Congress ordered the money to be put into the escrow fund.  
 Elimination of that fund has been included in bills that would make other changes in postal operations, but Congress has not acted on the proposals.  
 Friday's rate increase request was filed with the independent Postal Rate Commission, which will now hold hearings and collect information before ruling on the proposal. That process can take as long as 10 months, meaning that if the rate increase is approved it wouldn't take effect until early next year.  
 While electronic communications have meant less business for the post office, officials have said that were it not for the escrow requirement the agency would not need to seek an increase for at least another year.

College of Cardinals, a close confidant of John Paul and a possible successor, presided at the Mass and referred to him as our "late beloved pope" in a homily that traced the pontiff's life from his days as a factory worker in Nazi-occupied

Poland to his final days as the head of the world's 1 billion Catholics.

Interrupted by applause at least 10 times, the usually unflappable German-born Ratzinger choked up as he recalled one of John Paul's last public appearances.

"We can be sure that our beloved pope is standing today at the window of the father's house, that he sees us and blesses us," he said to

applause, even among the prelates, as he pointed up to the third-floor window above the square.

"Today we bury his remains in the earth as a seed of immortality — our hearts are full of sadness, yet at the same time of joyful hope and profound gratitude," Ratzinger said in heavily accented Italian.

He said John Paul was a "priest to the last" and said

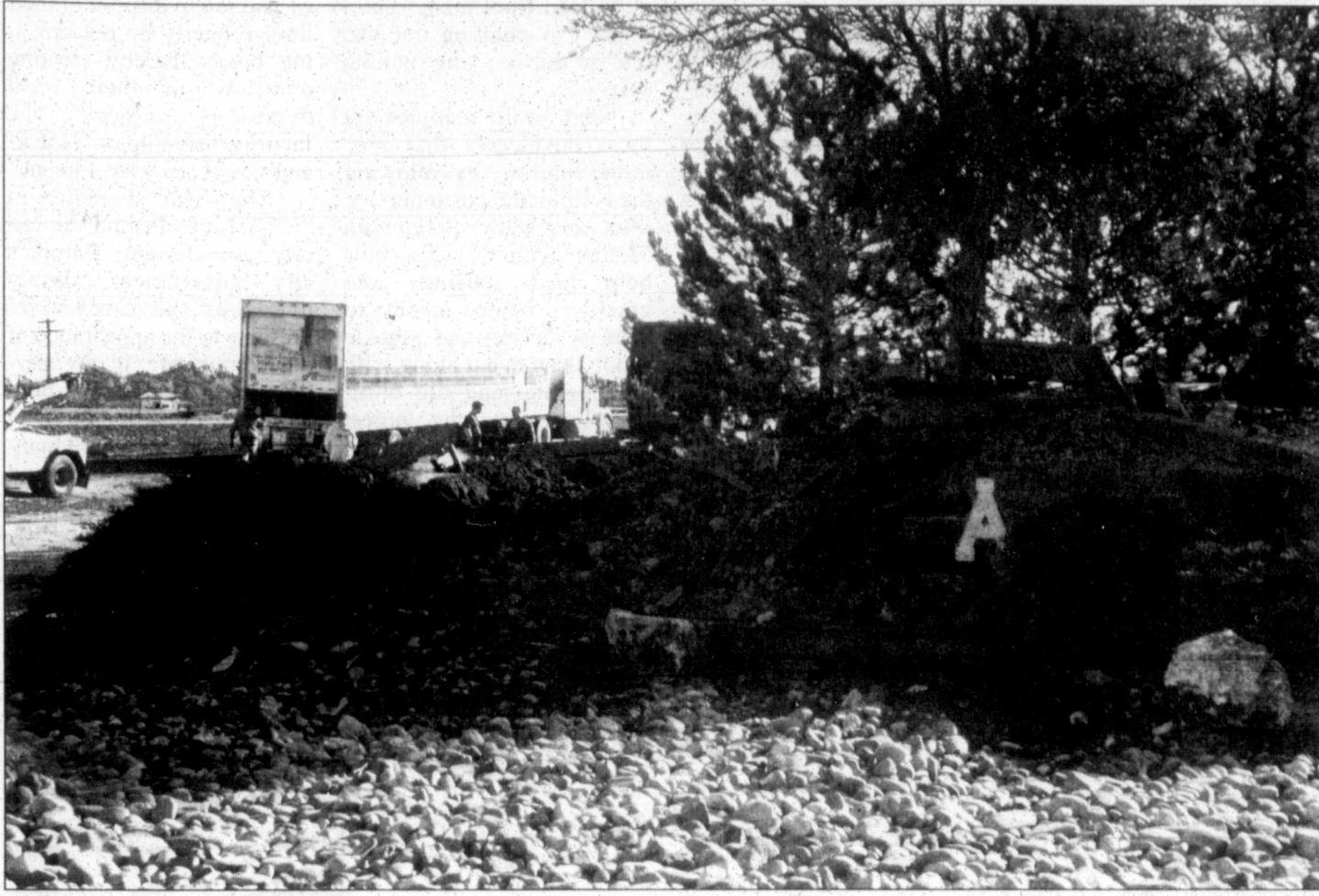
he had offered his life for God and his flock "especially amid the sufferings of his final months."

Ratzinger was interrupted again toward the end of the Mass by several minutes of cheers, rhythmic applause and shouts of "Giovanni Paolo Santo" or "Saint John Paul," from the crowd. The eruption of cheers came right before the Litany of Saints chant, in which the names of

the saints are read.

The Mass ended with everyone standing and singing together: "May the angels accompany you into heaven, may the martyrs welcome you when you arrive, and lead you to Holy Jerusalem."

John Paul requested in his last will and testament to be interred "in the bare earth," and he was laid to rest among the pontiffs from centuries past near the tomb traditionally believed to be of the apostle Peter, the first pope.

apparently been banned from playing all school athletics, said Steve Smith Jr., a senior who was a defensive end and kicker on the team.

"Yesterday, evil reared its head in Canton, Texas," the superintendent said Friday. "It is useless to speculate on the motives of the shooter since no motive justifies this

type of violence."

Baseball and softball games scheduled for Friday were postponed, but otherwise the school schedule was back to normal, Davis said.

Smith's father described Robertson as "a very high-strung, hot-tempered individual" who threatened Smith Jr. last year — grabbing his shirt and pushing him up against a fence — over an on-field teasing. He said Baron Robertson, then a

freshman, was walking off the field when some older students "razed" him.

"This guy blew up," Steve Smith Sr. said. "He thought some kids were picking on his son. My son wasn't even the one who said anything. But he threatened to kill him."

Smith said he complained to the school and police, but Robertson was never charged. Echols and Davis said they were unaware of any previous threats.

Rhonda Miller, a cousin of Robertson's wife, said the suspect is being portrayed unfairly.

"He's a man I would want with me at any time. He loves his family," Miller said. "You know, you do anything for your kids."

## Food manager certification course planned

Texas Cooperative Extension will conduct a food manager certification course for managers and employees involved in the food service industry April 25-26 at the Expo Center in Perryton.

According to a press release from TCE, the 16-hour course will help prepare food service managers to pass the certification exam required by Texas Department of State Health Services.

Class instruction will be from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day. Cost for the two-day class is \$79. This fee includes the training, study manual and exam fee.

The class will be facilitated by Sandra Mills, Lipscomb County Extension agent, Peggy Winegarner, Hansford Co. Extension agent, and Cynthia Shattles, retired Ochiltree Co. Extension agent.

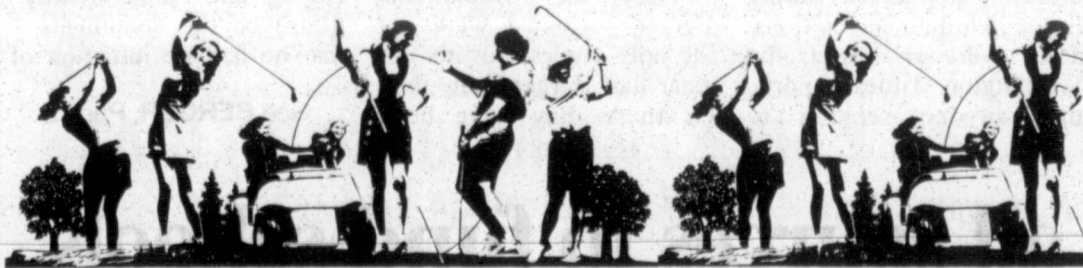
The state now requires, the press release said, at least one person in every food establishment to pass the examination and train

other employees on food safety. The goal of the training is to help participants learn to identify potentially hazardous foods and common errors in food handling; to prevent contamination and cross-contamination; to teach personal hygiene for employees; to comply with state regulations; maintain clean utensils, equipment and surroundings; and to control pests.

Participants will also learn the latest food safety practices for purchasing, preparing, serving and storing foods.

Pre-registration is required. To receive a registration brochure, contact Mills at (806) 862-4601, Winegarner at (806) 659-4130 or Shattles at (806) 435-2754. The deadline for registration is April 11.

Food managers are free to simply purchase the study book and take the exam without the benefit of the class, but Extension officials highly recommend the class. The cost of the exam is \$35.

## Pampa needs to clean-up act on litter drama

Some friends have cautioned me about overkill in Pampa's trash dilemma. There is so much journalistic fodder going on in our world that demands comment, and I've the itch to write my opine on many a current event. It's hard to go there, folks.

If all I had to do was tune in to the radio or TV or read the newspapers and print a comment for a living, why I'd be in journalistic heaven. I'm also satisfied with the moniker "pharmaceutical salesman alias Closet Writer" for I'll always remain; Walter Williams or Bill O'Reilly — never.

With that in mind, let's once again look at littering

on a grand scale in our little community. I see five players starring in the "Let's Litter Pampa" play that's has run longer than the most successful of Broadway plays — longer than the Arab-Israeli conflict — a long, long time, reader.

The first player with a starring role is Mother Nature herself. Mother Nature just likes to make wind here in the Panhandle — mucho wind — and has since I hit the ground running in 1949. By that I mean; since the dawn of time.

Mother Nature huffs and puffs, a bad hair day ensues and things tend to fly — many things and all things that can blow with her wind, from

hair to our refuse.

Some of you readers might be thinking "What's he refusing?" and I truly understand your confusion. By refuse, I mean trash. Mother Nature, when she prefers to blow around these parts, is not discriminatory. If litter is not contained and protected from Mother Nature — litter flies with her wind. God's little reminder, folks — cleanliness is next to Godliness.

Actors two and three are our adult citizens and youth who toss all kinds of trash

onto Pampa's streets rather than hit the refuse can. Adults should know better and should teach their offspring the hazards of littering; namely, when caught by an officer of the law, a fine from \$100 to \$1,000.

Here is a subplot to "Let's Litter Pampa." When parents are illiterate and their children are illiterate, brains don't work the way they should. Right? Pampa's illiterate homelife is trashy; therefore, the two generations and subsequent generations know only one type of waste disposal — lit-

ter. I know, illiteracy rears its ugly head from many directions. I'm pointing out just one for this is a long running play.

to the play? These businesses also fail to dispose of their litter properly by not crushing boxes thereby creating overflow in their trash dumpsters. Check the favorite drive-in on Hobart and you'll see what I mean.

The fifth character in "Let's Litter Pampa" is our city government. Pampa's city government simply overlooks the crisis litter presents to the appearance of our community. 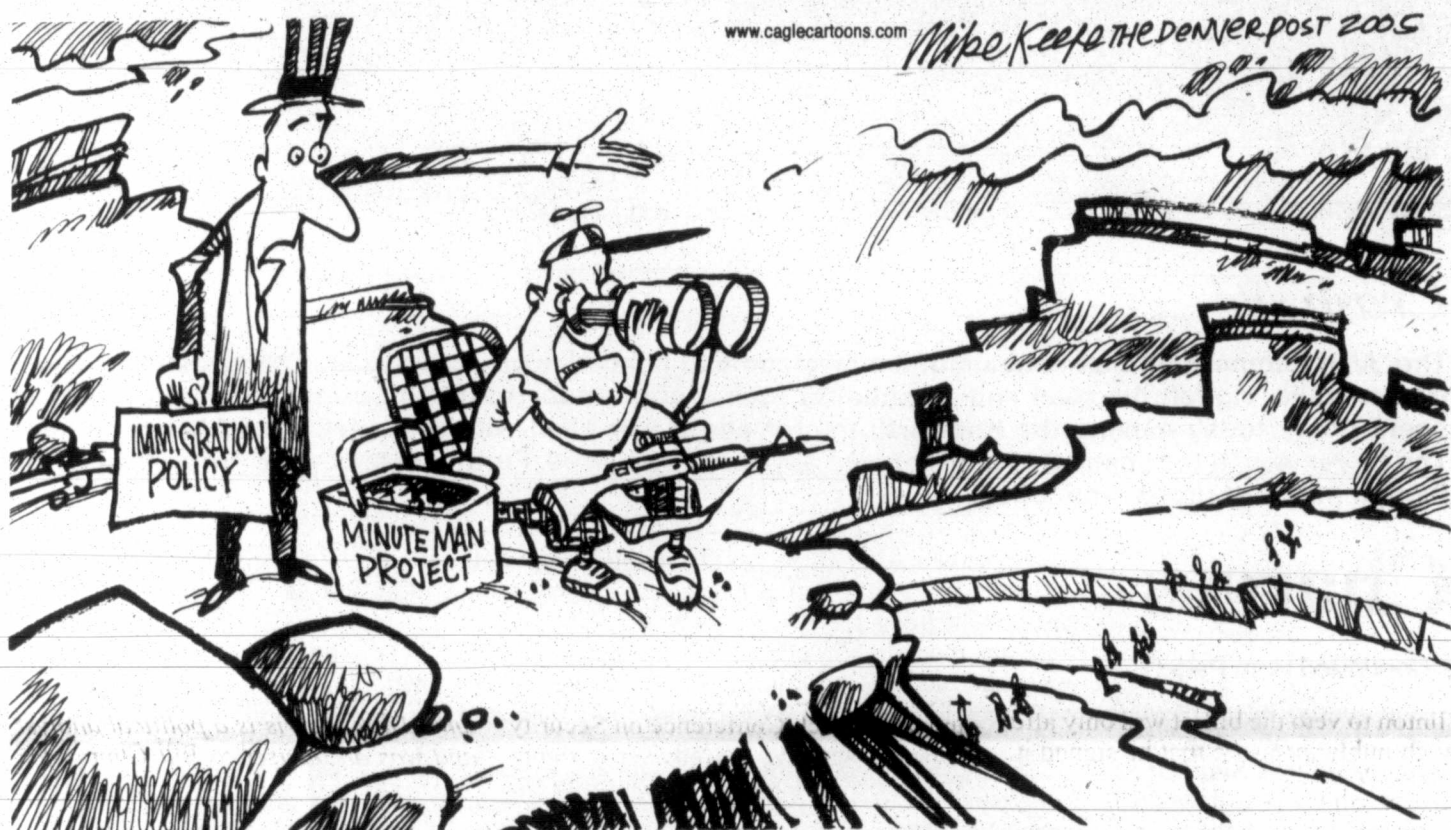

## Berger rolls over for Bill and Hill

Former National Security Adviser Sandy Berger has now joined the pantheon of those who, in the immortal words of Webb Hubbell, have chosen to "roll over one more time" to protect Bill and Hillary Clinton.

This Hall of Ill-Fame includes Susan McDougal, Vince Foster, Monica Lewinsky, Johnnie Chung, former Arkansas Gov. Jim Guy Tucker and old Webb himself. What they each have in common is their silence and willingness to take the fall to protect the Clintons.

Berger has admitted that he stuffed top-secret documents into his pockets, shirt and pants, and why he sliced some up with scissors,

destroyed them and then lied about it. Until he gives a credible explanation for this behavior, we are all entitled to make the logical inference — that he was hiding something to protect himself and his old bosses.

The documents were an "after-action review" by Richard Clarke, then the National Security Council's terrorism expert, discussing and analyzing our efforts to stop attacks during the Millennium celebrations. They were so secret, the Washington Times reports, that anyone seeking to

remove the documents would have had to do so in a briefcase handcuffed to his wrist. And, it seems, they were so critical of the former administration that Berger felt he needed to steal them. But why did Berger steal them?

The most obvious reason would be to stop the 9/11 commission from including embarrassing revelations in its report.

Yes, the documents Berger purloined were not the only copies, but it's not clear that Berger knew that. Or there may have been

handwritten notes in the margins of the copies Berger destroyed — written by the president, Berger or others.

Berger's "explanation" stinks: He claims he was too tired to review the documents in their secure venue, that eye fatigue moved him to stash them in his pocket for later comparison in the leisure of his home and office.

That's nonsense. After all, he went back a week later and helped himself to more documents.

Berger would also have us believe he "inadvertently" cut up and "inadvertently" destroyed the documents — that he had no intention of

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## Consider all sources to fund schools

Texas legislators should be careful before dismissing possible methods of funding the state's public schools.

Nothing should be off the table, including gambling, when it comes to considering how to raise money for Texas schools. The equity and effectiveness of the education being afforded Texas students will in large part determine many facets of Texas' future, from economics to quality of life.

The importance of a good education cannot be overestimated.

But the education system

must receive adequate and equitable funding, and that's what the Legislature is wrestling over during this session. It's not yet time to summarily discard income possibilities.

Certainly, there are moral and practical arguments against receiving money from gambling. But there are arguments against other methods, also.

More than 20 gambling proposals are before lawmakers, but Thursday GOP

and Democratic leaders united in saying they don't want an expansion of gambling. And, of course, it's being incredibly politicized, such as this statement from state Rep. Pete Gallego, D-Alpine:

"If we get gambling, it wasn't a Democrat who gave it to you."

Expansion of gambling might get voted down, and if it is, fine. But it deserves to be thoroughly discussed, as equally as such proposals as

a state income tax, payroll tax, "sin" taxes and sales tax increases.

Gov. Rick Perry was talking about existing illegal gambling and video slot-machine legislation when he said, perhaps prophetically, "The idea that we're not going to have any gambling in Texas, I think, is a fairy tale."

We need money for education. That's the overwhelming concern. Let's not cheat ourselves out of considering every practical means of acquiring that funding.

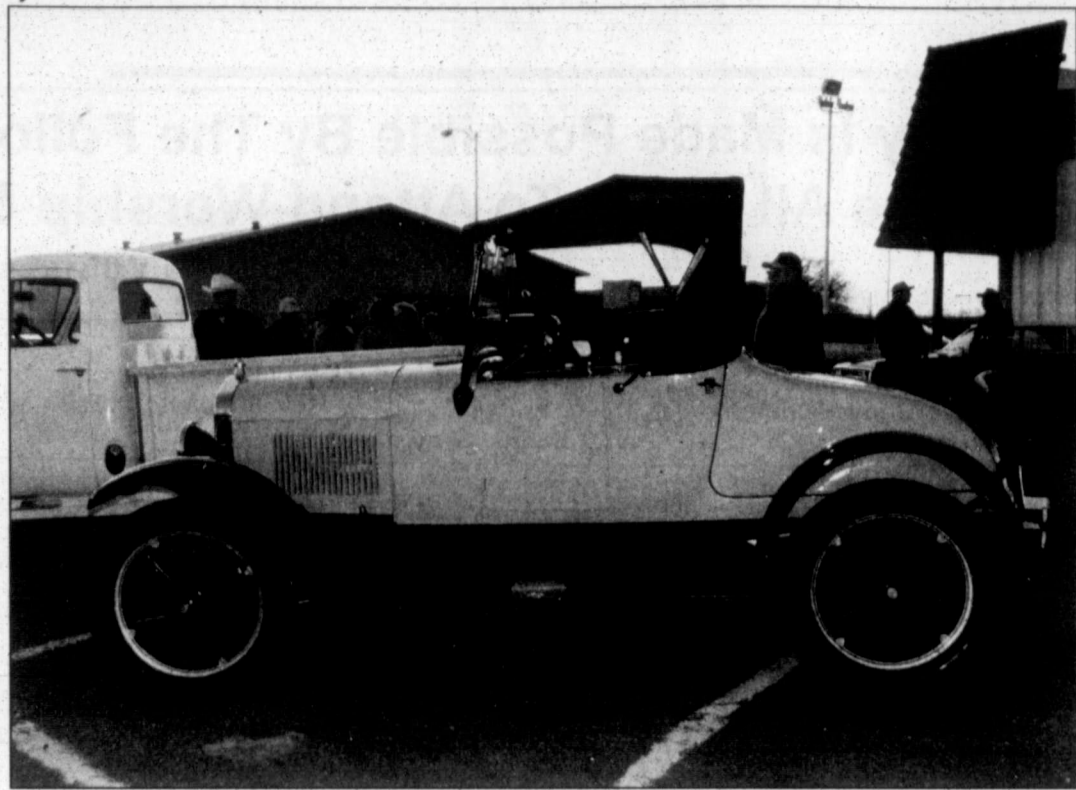

concealing anything from the commission. And then, I suppose, he inadvertently lied about what he'd done.

Come on. With a shabby explanation like that, Berger invites speculation that he is covering for himself or for the Clintons.

Back in the '90s, I found Berger consistently unwilling to act vigorously against terror-sponsoring nations. When Sen. Al D'Amato proposed sanctions against Iran, Berger tried to get Clinton to veto the bill; it was only after much public pressure that he signed it.

Berger was on a fast track to be the

next Democratic Secretary of State. He risked that in stealing those documents. Now he has destroyed his future career by pleading to a criminal misdemeanor — admitting what he did while still concealing why he did it.

The Clintons' reaction when Berger was caught? The former president's comments sound just too scripted to believe: He laughed and said that it was typical of Sandy to be disorganized and forget how he handled documents. Quite a comment about the man he appointed to superintend the nation's secrets.

Then Hillary announced, without being asked, that Sandy had just helped brief her for a February speech at the annual Munich Conference on Security Policy — sending the adviser a signal that he was still part of the family, even

though the grand jury was investigating him.

Picture the fevered atmosphere in the months after 9/11. Any indication by the commission investigating the attack that the Clinton administration hadn't taken terrorism seriously would badly damage the former president's reputation and the former first lady's chances.

Any loyal adviser would have worked to mitigate the possible damage. The measure of how serious the damage may have been is how far Berger risked falling to prevent it — and how far he did fall rather than reveal why.

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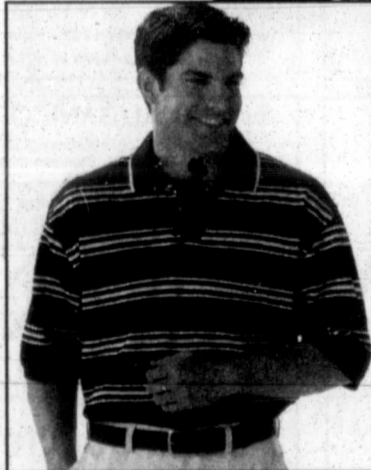

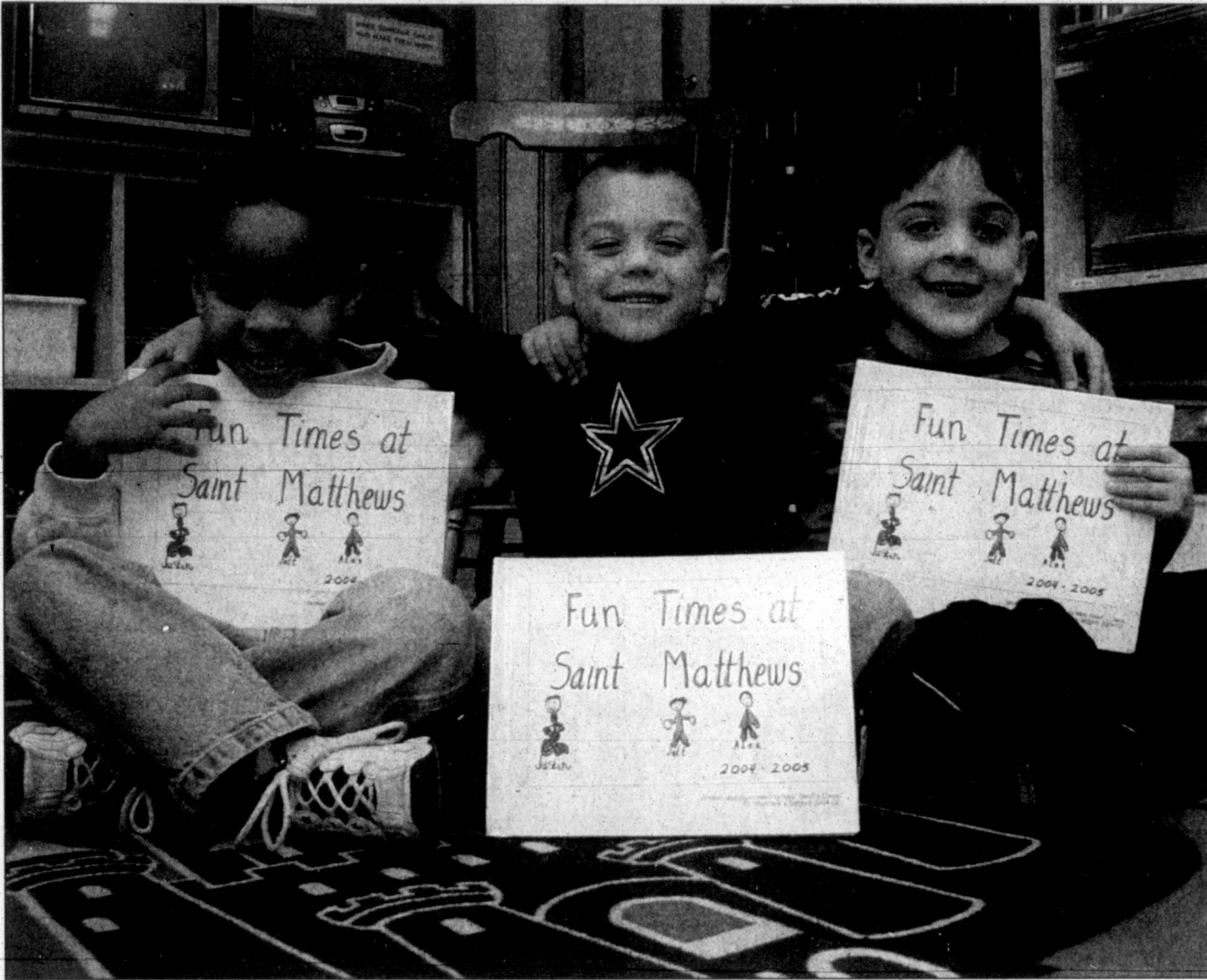

## Anchor of faith

(Acts 27:14-25)  
Nearly everyone had given up hope. Most of the cargo had to be thrown overboard. There was only a slim chance now that anyone would, or could, be saved. The waves continued to batter the ship, but standing on the sea-washed deck, Paul calmly and quietly gave us the four anchors of faith. And he showed us what to do in the different experiences that make up the storms of life.

**Anchor No. 1 - I believe in God.** In that darkest moment when our very life is threatened by the deadly, satanic forces, we can say with Paul, "I believe in God." He does exist. He is still in charge and He knows something about the storm that we don't know. You can settle back upon the anchor of your right believing and trust Him to take care of you in the crisis.

**Anchor No. 2 - Whose I am.** This means you belong to God. You are His property. You belong to Him; therefore, He belongs to you. You are His by right of what Jesus did on the cross.

**Anchor No. 3 - Whom I serve.** Although Paul's life was held in the death grip of the storm, he believe he was serving God at that moment. He said, "Whom I serve." 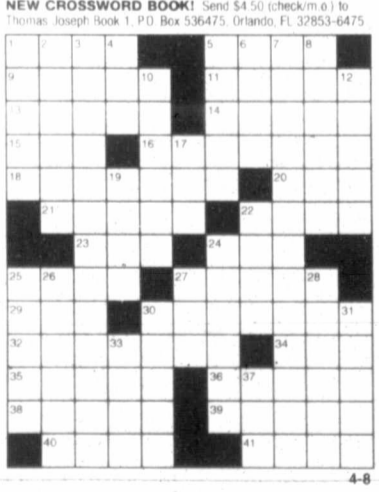

## A wet and wacky start to the Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Chris DiMarco was back in a familiar position — leading the Masters.

So was Tiger Woods. For the third year in a row, he failed to break par in the opening round at Augusta National.

DiMarco started Friday with a brilliant tee shot and finished off a 5-under-par 67 in the opening round, getting back on schedule after stormy weather delayed the start of the tournament.

The leader had four holes left to play Thursday when darkness fell over the course. He resumed at No. 6, a par-3 where he scored a hole-in-one last year.

DiMarco nearly holed out his tee shot again, leaving himself a short putt that gave him a stretch of four birdies in six holes on the front nine — albeit over two days.

Asked if he thought he could win, DiMarco said,

"Absolutely. I gave myself a really good chance. I'm feeling really comfortable and I'm putting well."

The 36-year-old DiMarco usually plays well at Augusta National.

In his Masters debut in 2001, he led after the first two rounds before tailing off on the weekend, finishing in a tie for 10th.

After tying for 12th the following year, DiMarco had his most embarrassing Augusta moment in 2003. He opened with an 82 and was 6 over in the second round when darkness halted play.

He didn't bother to return the following morning to finish the round, apologizing later for dropping out.

"I didn't know you don't

withdraw from Augusta," DiMarco said at the time.

There was no quitting last year. DiMarco took a lead to the final round before fading with a 76 on Sunday.

At least he had a hand in the outcome, providing the line for Phil Mickelson's winning putt at the 18th.

"All I can do is try to put myself into position Sunday and use what I learned last year," DiMarco said.

Woods, a three-time Augusta champion, was off to another rough start.

At No. 8, he knocked his tee shot into the pine trees along the right side, then struck a limb trying to get out.

The ball deflected the wrong way but at least set-

led in the fairway. He wound up with a bogey.

Woods finished at 74 and hasn't eclipsed par in the opening round since 2002, when he won the green jacket for the second year in a row and third time overall. He started with a 76 in 2003 and 75 last year.

Luke Donald was one stroke behind DiMarco after completing a 68.

Vijay Singh also was 4 under with two holes to play, having missed a chance to take the lead at 15.

The world's top-ranked player had a chance for eagle at the par-5 hole, but he curled the putt left of the cup.

Then he missed the short birdie attempt — bitten again by Augusta's treacherous greens.

Mark Hensby, one of just 24 players who completed the first round Thursday, was just two strokes off the lead with a 69.

## Finley, Angels nip Rangers 7-6

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — After fouling off a pitch on an attempted suicide squeeze, Steve Finley did what he does best — swing the bat and put the ball in play.  
Finley drove in the winning run with a ninth-inning single and Bengie Molina hit a three-run homer, leading the Los Angeles Angels to a 7-6 victory over the Texas Rangers on Thursday night.  
Brian Shouse (1-1) walked Jeff DaVanon and Vladimir Guerrero to open the ninth before Garret Anderson grounded into a force at second. Finley, who jumped from the NL West champion Dodgers to the AL West champion Angels as a free agent in December, slapped a 1-1 pitch to left to score DaVanon — one pitch after his failed bunt.  
"I think it was a great call. I just didn't get it down," Finley said. "It was 1-0 when I got the squeeze sign so I was kind of going out over the plate, thinking it was going to be another slider. But he threw a fastball up and in, and it was a tough pitch to bunt on."  
"The next pitch I was doing the same thing, just

looking out over the plate. He left one out there and it went through the hole. I was upset for not getting the run in my previous at-bat. If I did, that last inning's a moot point," he said.  
Scot Shields (1-0) got the win despite allowing a tying RBI single by Michael Young in the top of the ninth. David Dellucci led off with a walk and went to third on two wild pitches before Shields walked Rod Barajas. After Alfonso Soriano and Hank Blalock struck out, Young drove in Dellucci.  
Angels closer Francisco Rodriguez was not available to pitch because he worked the previous two nights, throwing 32 pitches in three innings. But pitching the ninth wasn't much of a stretch for Shields, who saved four games last season while Troy Percival was on the disabled list.  
"I felt fine out there. I feel like I was a little more amped up on opening day than I was tonight," Shields said. "But Michael Young is one of the best hitters in the game. I left a pitch up in the zone and he hammered it."

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## Mavericks 104, Spurs 68

DALLAS (AP) — Beating the San Antonio Spurs just isn't the same when they're missing Tim Duncan. That is, unless you can make it as memorable as the Dallas Mavericks did Thursday night.  
With Devin Harris starting a fast break by throwing a backward, overhead pass while falling down and Jerry Stackhouse setting up another layup with a behind-the-back pass in the lane, the Mavs resoundingly avoided a season sweep by their division nemesis with a 104-68 victory that was interesting at the end just to see how historic it would be.  
The answer: Dallas enjoyed its most lopsided win over the Spurs and tied the fewest points allowed in franchise history, while San Antonio endured its biggest rout since falling to Seattle by 38 in a meaningless finale in 2001. The Spurs also went 0-for-12 on 3-pointers, the most misses in team history without one made and just three shy of the NBA record.  
"It was pretty embarrassing," said San Antonio guard Manu Ginobili, who scored two points on 1-of-9 shooting and missed all four of his free throws. "Today was awful."  
The Mavs led the entire way, with the game tied only at 2. They held San Antonio to just 27 points during the middle two quarters, with the Spurs shooting 2-for-17 in the third period. Put another way, Dallas had as many highlight-reel baskets in the quarter as San Antonio did overall while sinking toward a sixth straight road loss since their two-time MVP was injured.

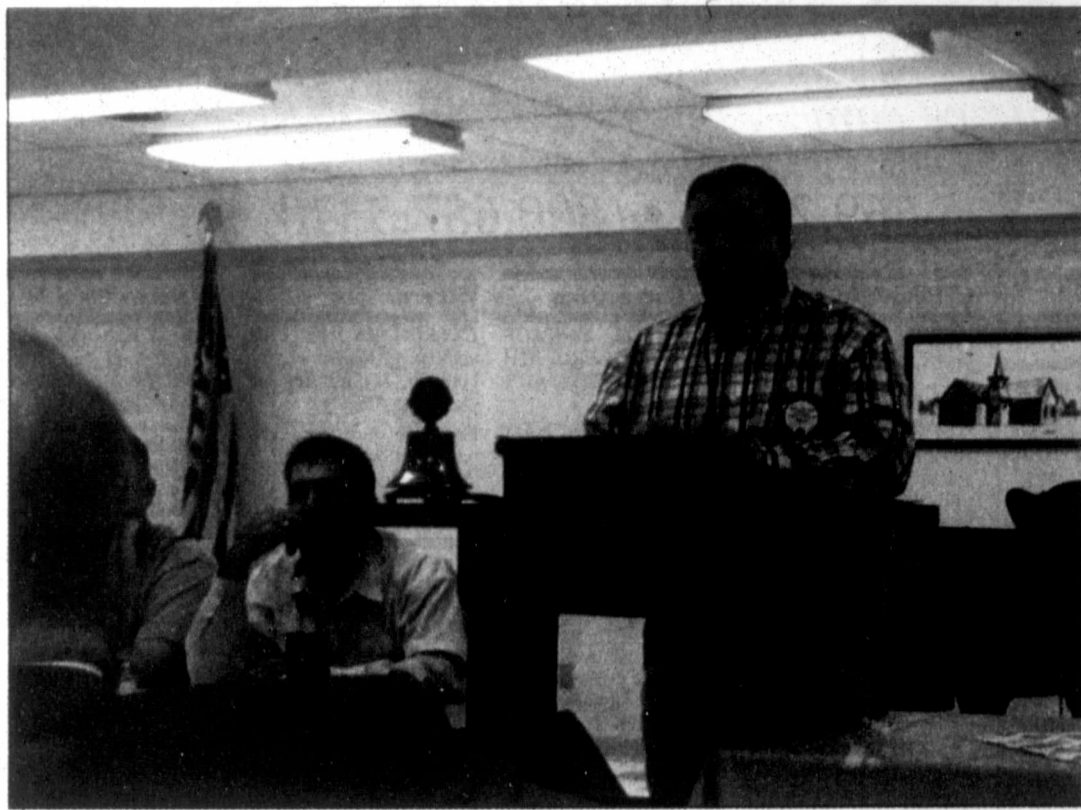

### Report: Suspect in courthouse shootings gained entry through an unlocked door

ATLANTA (AP) — The suspect in last month's courthouse rampage was able to enter the slain judge's chambers and hold the occupants hostage because the door was unlocked and a buzzer entry system was not activated, a sheriff's report said.

It also said the suspect had explained weapons found in his shoes days before the attack by saying they were for arch support.

A portion of the report on the March 11 attack, which left a judge and three others dead, was released Thursday. A judge was considering Friday whether to release the rest of the department's internal report.

After handcuffing a lawyer, deputy and an unspecified number of other people in the judge's chambers, suspect Brian Nichols entered the courtroom where his rape trial was to resume later in the day and killed Judge Rowland Barnes and his court reporter, the report says.

The report also says that it took a court officer 21 minutes to reach the deputy whom Nichols allegedly overpowered and stole her gun in order to start the killing spree. Outside the courthouse, a sheriff's deputy was killed, and a federal agent was killed elsewhere before Nichols was taken into custody the day after the rampage.

Despite the report, Cooke said, "There was no lapse in response time. Period."

The 15 pages of the report that were released Thursday following a court order include a timeline of the attack, an incident narrative and an executive summary. Witness statements, which make up the bulk of the report, remained sealed.

The sheriff's department, responsible for security at the courthouse, has been widely criticized for its handling of Nichols, who was unshackled at the time of the attack even though he had been caught with homemade knives hidden in his shoes two days before the attack.

The report says that after the weapons were found March 9, Nichols told officials that he was "using the contraband for arch support in his shoes" and wrote a statement to that effect.

The jail staff issued an incident report and forwarded it through the chain of command, but "took no further action" because "Nichols had posed no serious threat and had exhibited no other signs which might lead to trouble."
