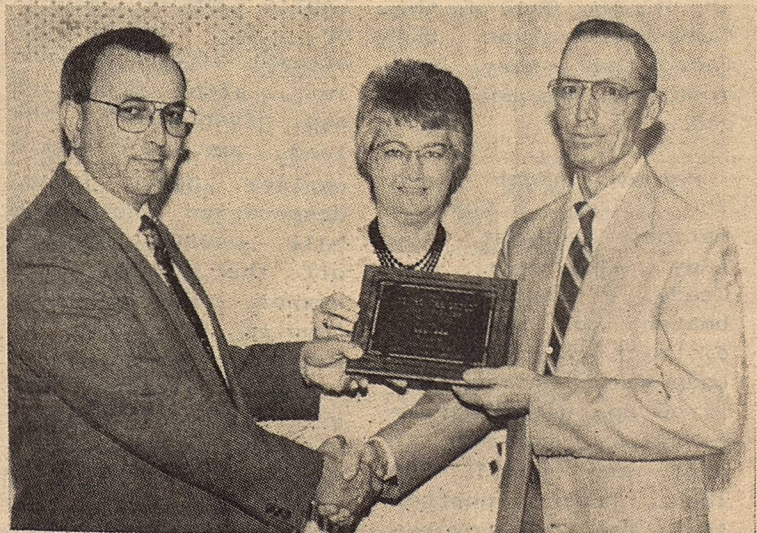

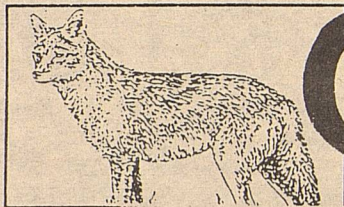

COYOTES TIE FOR SECOND WITH WIN OVER KLONDIKE

The Coyotes finished the first round of District play last Tuesday by defeating the Klondike Cougars 59-41. The victory tied the Coyotes for second place with Klondike, each team has a 2-2 district record. Sands is first with an unblemished 4-0 record.

Jimmy Rios led the Coyotes by scoring 21 points. The Senior point guard had 9 field goals, including one 3 pointer. Jimmy shot 50% from the

charity line, making two and bouncing out two. Jimmy had 5 steals, 5 rebounds and two assists.

Senior post, Cole Vestal, scored 11 points. Cole made 5 of 17 field goals and he was 1 of 4 from the free throw line. Cole pulled down 14 rebounds and 5 assists.

Sophomore forward, John Paul Harris, scored 10 points on the night, which included 4 field goals and two free throws. John Paul shot 100% from the foul line. He

also had 8 rebounds and 5 assists.

Shane Kemper contributed 7 points, consisting of 3 jumpers and 1 free throw. He also contributed 8 assists.

Klint Kemper scored 5 points, Rod Jeter scored 2 points and Juve Balaque scored 2.

The win lifted the Coyotes to 7-8 on the season and 2-2 in district play. Winning the game kept the Coyotes in the race for a playoff spot. If Klondike had won, it would have pushed the Coyotes into 3rd place with O'Donnell.

COYOTES COME FROM BEHIND TO WIN A CLOSE ONE

The Borden Coyotes were narrowly victorious Friday night at Grady. With 1:39 seconds left on the clock, the Coyotes were 4 points behind. With the aid of John Paul Harris hitting 1 free throw, Jimmy Rios' 3 point play with 6 seconds left, and Juve Balaque's steal and a lay up as the buzzer sounded, the Coyotes defeated the Wildcats 54-50.

Cole Vestal led the Coyotes scoring 18 points. He was 9 for 19 from the field. Cole did not shoot from the free throw line, he made 12 rebounds, 4 steals and 1 assist.

Shane Kemper had 9 points, including 3 field goals. He was 3 for 7 at the charity line.

Jimmy Rios scored 9 points for the Coyotes. Jimmy made 3 of 7

shots from the floor and was 1 of 2 from the free throw line. Jimmy also had 4 rebounds, 4 steals and 3 assists.

Junior guard, Juve Balaque also contributed 9 points, including 2 three pointers. Juve had 7 free throws, 3 steals and 3 assists.

Sophomore forward, John Paul Harris scored 8 points, including 3 field goals and 2 free throws. He also pulled down 10 rebounds.

The win over Grady made the Coyotes 3-2 in district play. Klondike was open so they are still 2-2 in the district. If the Coyotes play well the rest of the season, they could find themselves in the playoffs.

They will have to win 2 of their last 3 ballgames, but the Coyotes must beat O'Donnell at O'Donnell and Klondike at Gail.

LADY COYOTE BASKETBALL

The Lady Coyotes played two key district games on the road last week, and both games figured to be tough and close and they weren't disappointments from that standpoint. It would probably be impossible to play two closer games.

Things looked rosy by halftime at Klondike Tuesday night when we led the Lady Cougars by 29-18. The Lady Coyotes had dominated the first half offensively and defensively. The shooting cooled off considerably in

Shayne converted the first one, but the second shot hit the front of the rim and bounced away as the buzzer sounded, making the final score Klondike 44, Borden 43.

The game featured balanced scoring, with Shayne Hess and Amanda Anderson hitting 9 each, Melody Harrison had 8, Jeana Jones 7, Kristin Monger 6, and Kelly Jo Ogden 4. Klondike was paced by Cope and Brooks with 12 each, and Franklin with 10. The game was

a defensive struggle with both sides fouling frequently. The Lady Coyotes hit 14 of 23 free shots, while the Lady Cougars converted 16 of 21. One of the differences was the fact that they hit more of them near the end.

Friday night found the Lady Coyotes matched against the Lady Wildcats of Grady, a team they had beaten to open the district campaign. The Lady Wildcats came out fired up, with Sherrie McMorries scoring at will, and opened upon 18-8 first quarter lead. The Lady Coyotes adjusted their defense, and by half had closed the deficit to 25-21. McMorries had 15 of Grady's points by half-time. Grady outscored Borden by a basket in the 3rd to pull ahead 31-25. A good 4th

quarter, keyed by the scoring of Shayne Hess and Melody Harrison, brought the Lady Coyotes into a 37-37 tie late in the game. Laurie Romine missed on a one-and-one attempt with 4 seconds left, after McMorries had given Grady the lead just a little earlier. Jeans Jones' desperation shot from half court bounced off the rim at the buzzer, and the Lady Coyotes had come up short once again.

The scoring was well-balanced again, with Shayne Hess and Melody Harrison scoring 9 each, Amanda Anderson 8, Jeana Jones 6, Kristin Monger 4, and Kelly Jo Ogden 1. Heather also played for the Lady Coyotes. McMorries finished with 19, being held to just 4 in the last half; Melissa Romine had 10.

line.

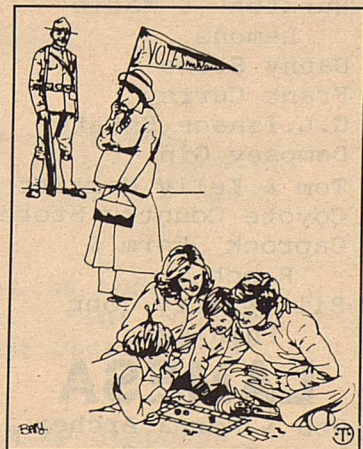

CROSS COUNTY FARM COMBINATIONS

Every year the County Committee is required to review farm records and combine farms which have the same owner, operator, and are a single farming operation. For 1991 we will expand our review to include farms in adjoining counties. Notification has been mailed or will be mailed shortly to those producers and operations affected. The County Committee made their initial review on January 8, 1991 and took appropriate action.

COTTON PRODUCTION EVIDENCE

Now is the time for you to stop by the gin office and complete an ASCS-503, Cotton Production Evidence Statement, for each farm you operate. Both you and a representative of the gin need to sign the card. Return the completed card to the Borden County ASCS Office.

CHANGE IN FARM RECORDS

Do not wait until signup to report operator or owner changes. Let us know as soon as they happen. Your prompt notification of operator/owner changes insures ASCS of current records and minimizes delays in service to producers. We want to get this type of task out of the way before we get busy with the new farm program. Help us help you by reporting these changes, timely.

The Superintendent's Office, on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Borden County Independent School District, will receive bids for food service commodities and supplies as follows:

Sealed bid proposals will be received by the District for Meat, Vegetables, Fruits, Condiments, Miscellaneous Food Items and Non-Food Disposable Products.

Bid proposals will be received in the office of the Superintendent until 2:00 P.M. on February 1, 1991. Bid proposals will be opened and read aloud in the Board Room at that time. 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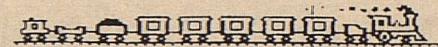

Black-eyed peas are a Southern New Year's tradition. This year, why not heat up your meal with this spicy specialty from the Lone Star State?

Sort black-eyed peas and soak overnight in 6 cups of water. Drain. Cook peas in 4 cups of fresh water until done but still firm, about 1 1/2 hours.
